■ **New owners build a home, keep lighthouse and summer cottage**

The address, 1 Lighthouse Pte. on Lake Fenton, may officially belong to just one family, but hundreds of people who boat by this well known lake address every summer have taken ownership of this beacon of light since it was built in 1949.

SUMMARY

Lighthouse Point on Lake Fenton has always drawn a large number of on-lookers going by on boats. Now that the property has been sold and renovated, there’s even more interest.

Now that the property has been totally renovated by its fourth owner, Chris and Stephanie Carpenter, people have really noticed all the changes.

“People would drive by on their boats and say to us, ‘You’re not tearing down the summer house or lighthouse, are you?’”

said Carpenter, who finally moved in with his family on Labor

Day weekend, after 10 months of architectural design and 14 months of construction. “We felt at that point we had a moral obligation to keep this intact.”

The Carpenters, who moved to Lake Fenton from Davison, bought the home in the spring of 2014 from Fred Shaltz,

former county commissioner, who had lived there for 39 years. He and his wife, Judy, raised their five sons on the property, before her death 15 years ago.

There were only two owners before Shaltz, the second owner being Don Fessler, founder of Fessler & Bowman Concrete in Flushing. The first owners of the home, a family from Holly, built the lighthouse, according to Shaltz.

"We bought the house and property for \$39,400 back in 1975," said Shaltz, who has since bought a condo

in the city of Fenton.

Shaltz is the one who 30 years ago petitioned Fenton Township to change the name of the street to Lighthouse Point. "We were the only house on the street at the time, which is why we got the address, 1 Lighthouse Pte.," he said.

Carpenter, who had owned 22 acres for his family's recreation in Davison, had never been

interested in waterfront property, until he visited friends near Shaltz's home. "When I stood on the property and saw the spectacular views and couldn't see any other houses, I immediately put an offer in," he said. "It's a drastic change to have lake property, but we needed to downsize anyway. It was time to do something different."

The Carpenters originally planned to remodel the main house rather than build, but there was too much work to renovate to make it cost effective. Christopher Macklin Design did all the architectural work of the 4,000-square-foot home and Case Construction built the house. They also asked Fenton Township for a variance to build a garage.

The centerpiece of the new home is a 12-sided "dodecagon" for the main living space, plus five bedrooms and three-and-a-half baths, making plenty of room for their two sons, who still live at home, and two grown daughters and one granddaughter.

Since the Carpenters decided to keep the summer house, they totally renovated the structure, replacing the roof, the walls, adding a fireplace and a cupola to match the lighthouse.

They installed a new seawall, and brought their property up 2 feet, raising the inside of the lighthouse up 2 feet with a new concrete floor.

Besides a new paint job, the lighthouse remains as it always has been, a beacon of light.

"I remember across the road to the north of our property, there were always a lot of children," said Shaltz. "Parents told us they wanted their rooms to face the lighthouse. We always kept it lit at night."

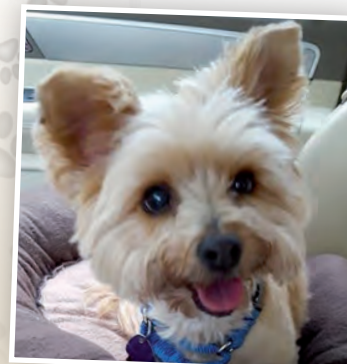

There were many 9/11 conspiracy theories floating around the internet years after the attacks. One theory

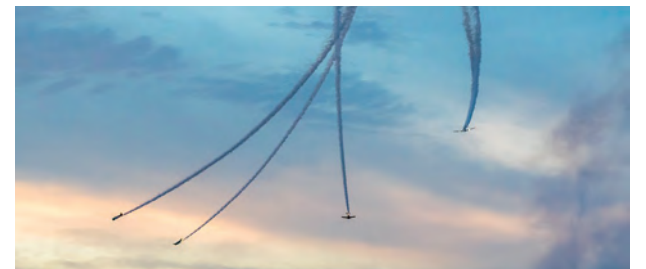

SEPT. 18

1793: George Washington lays the cornerstone to the United States Capitol building, the home of the legislative branch of American government. The building would take nearly a century to complete.

**SEPT. 19**

1959: Nikita Khrushchev arrived in the United States for an extended visit and a summit meeting with President Dwight D. Eisenhower. He indicated a desire to see Hollywood and a visit was arranged. On Sept. 19, Khrushchev and his wife arrived in Los Angeles. The day included a tour of the Twentieth Century Fox Studios in Hollywood, the movie "Can-Can," and lunch with Frank Sinatra, which delighted Khrushchev. He was angered, however, when he learned that he would not be allowed to visit Disneyland. Government authorities feared that the crowds would pose a safety hazard for the premier.

SEPT. 20

2012: Sixteen members of a dissident Amish group in Ohio are convicted of federal hate crimes and conspiracy for forcibly cutting the beards and hair of fellow Amish with whom they had religious differences.

SEPT. 21

1780: During the American Revolution, American General Benedict Arnold meets with British Major John Andre to discuss handing over West Point to the British, in return for the promise of a large sum of money and a high position in the British army. The plot was foiled and Arnold, a former American hero, became synonymous with the word "traitor."

SEPT. 22

1980: Glenn Dunn is shot and killed outside a Buffalo supermarket by a man carrying a gun concealed in a paper bag. His murder was the first in a series of strange attacks in both upstate New York and New York City. He was labeled by the press as the "Midtown Stabber."

SEPT. 23

1933: A party of American geologists lands at the Persian Gulf port of Jubail in Saudi Arabia and begins its journey into the desert. That July, the Saudi King Abdel Aziz granted the Standard Oil

Company of California rights to explore and drill, manufacture and transport what they found. In turn, Standard Oil immediately dispatched the team of scientists to locate the most profitable spot for the company to begin its drilling.

SEPT. 24

1996: Author Stephen King releases two new novels at once —Desperation and The Regulators. King was born in Portland, Maine, in 1947. King was sickly as a child and developed a love for books. He studied English at the University of Maine, where he met his wife, Tabitha. After college, the couple lived in a trailer while King taught school, worked in a laundry, and churned out four novels, which were rejected. Discouraged, he gave up on his fifth novel until his wife encouraged him to try again. In 1973, Doubleday paid him \$2,500 for the book Carrie, about the bloody revenge of a high school outcast. A few months later, he earned \$420,000 for the paperback rights. King's books have sold 300 million copies to date.

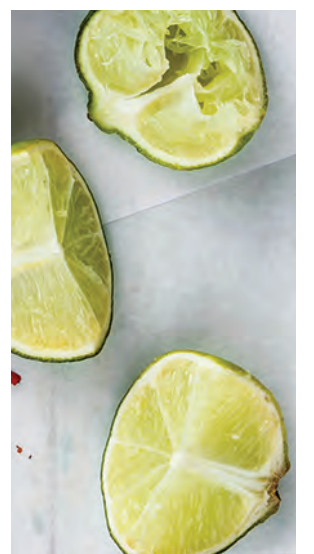

Future president?

■ Holly freshman is one of only eight teens in U.S. chosen to share political views

Phillip Godin, 14, pays more attention to politics and current affairs than most kids his age, and when he sees an opportunity to learn more, he seizes it.

That's why this Holly High School freshman was selected as one of only eight teens from across the U.S. to join Channel One News Team OneVote, giving voice to the political views of American youth.

His views on the 2016 presidential election and how the political process is affecting him, his family, his classmates and future

is part of the interview shared on Channel One (see sidebar to access the interview).

Channel One News is a daily news program produced by Houghton Mifflin Harcourt, viewed by approximately five million students in upper elementary, middle and high schools across the U.S.

Phillip was a student at Holly Middle School when he watched Channel One during fifth hour and decided to enter the application process with his essay, "Why I'm supporting my candidate."

He supports Donald Trump and says he is a conservative Republican. "I don't just follow my family's footsteps," he said, of his parents, Russell and Becky Godin of Holly Township. "I view certain things differently. I watch Fox News quite often."

As a OneVote contributor, Phillip hopes to share his ideas with a wider audience and discuss issues that are important to his generation.

OneVote 2016 will also hold a mock election in late October, in which millions of students are expected to vote. Interestingly, students have accurately predicted the next president of the United States in every OneVote poll since the program began in 1992. Election results will be announced during a special edition broadcast on Nov. 1.

Phillip participates actively in political issues, by writing to local congressional representatives and attending political rallies. "I was invited to the State Capitol with Senator Joe Graves in seventh grade, after writing him a letter about a state issue," he said. "Getting to meet my local congressman and talk to him was a good experience."

Looking toward his future, Phillip hopes to join the U.S. Marine Corps, attend law school and become a Michigan State Trooper.

"I could run for president some day, too," he added.

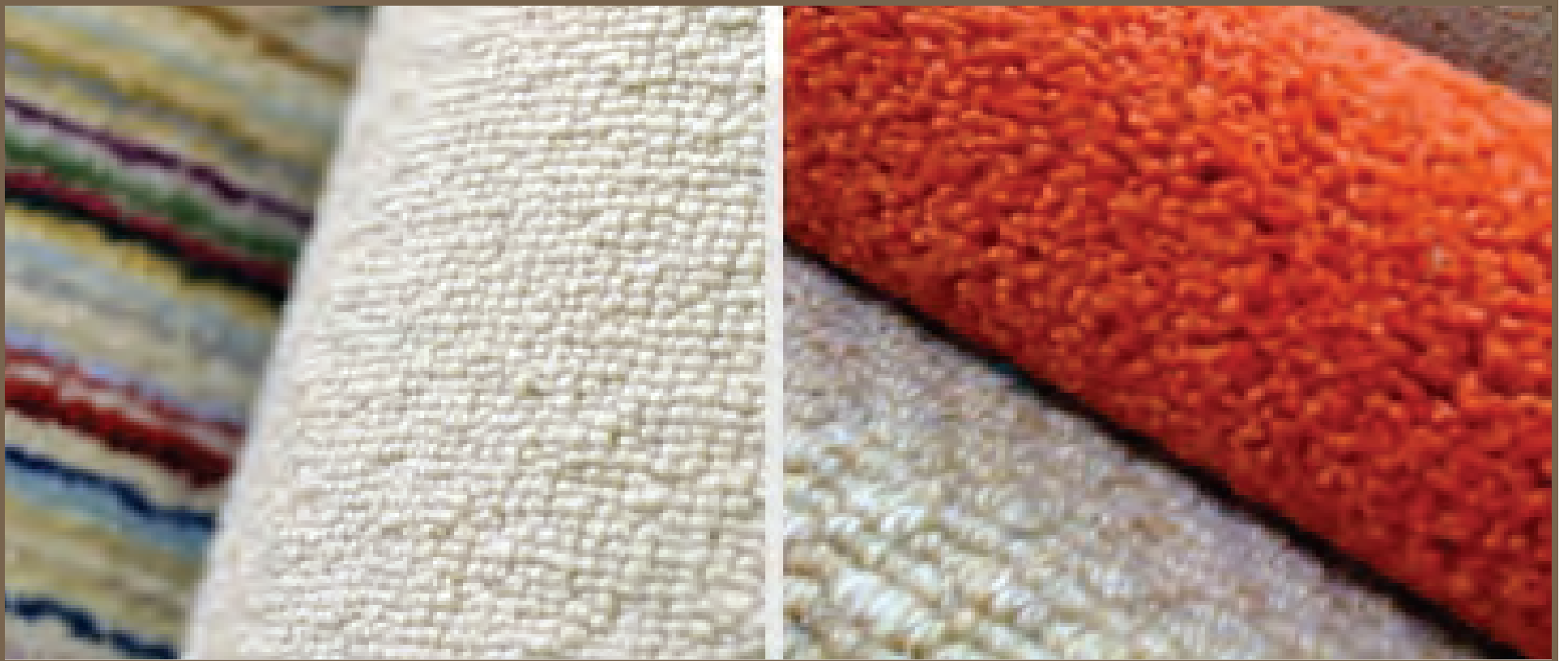

Passive-aggressive remarks must be cut off the moment they occur. The response should be swift and certain. — Happy

DEAR HAPPY:

I appreciate your smart, sensible and successful technique for dealing with a family member who is also a bully. It is all about boundaries and maintaining a neutral attitude of, “Hey, that’s your damage. I can’t change you, but I also won’t play.” Ultimately you should also save a shred of sympathy for the person who is so angry and limited.

DEAR AMY:

I really enjoy your column. You often get letters from women who are frustrated because their boyfriends won’t propose.

Maybe it’s the fact that I was not raised in North America, but I find this a bit infuriating. In this day and age when we are constantly asking for equal opportunities for men and women and trying so hard to earn their respect, why would women just sit and whine about a boyfriend who won’t propose? Back home (in my home country), there are usually no proposals — two adults who have a serious relationship just

discuss their future plans together and decide if they want to marry each other. We also don’t give or get engagement rings, so we don’t have this ridiculous competition over whose ring is bigger. Your thoughts? — Anti-proposal

DEAR ANTI-PROPOSAL:

My thoughts are completely in line with yours. I am mystified that, given our society’s drive toward gender equality, we seem to be headed full-speed backward regarding relationship proposals. Not only have marriage proposals become competitive, public and ridiculous, but I find the whole phenomenon of “promposals” (where young people make a production out of asking one another to a high school dance) less charming than alarming. 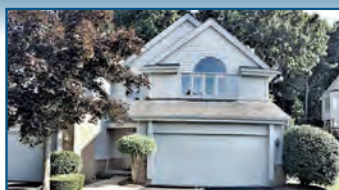

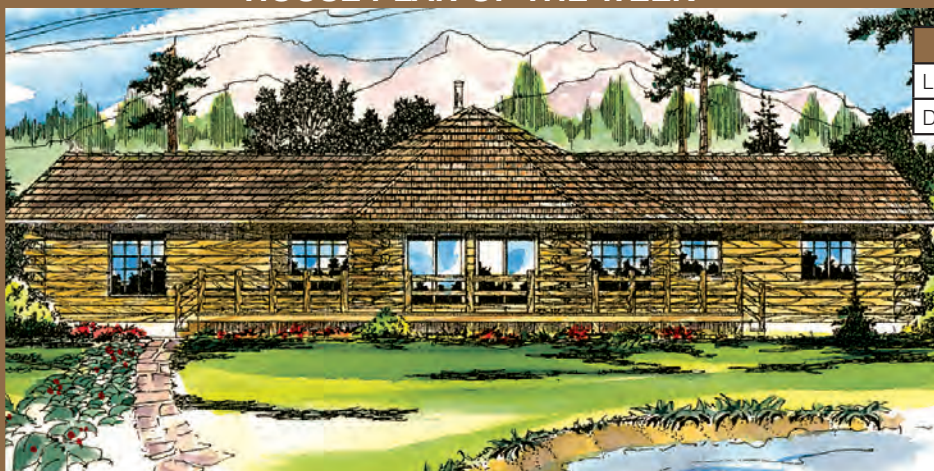

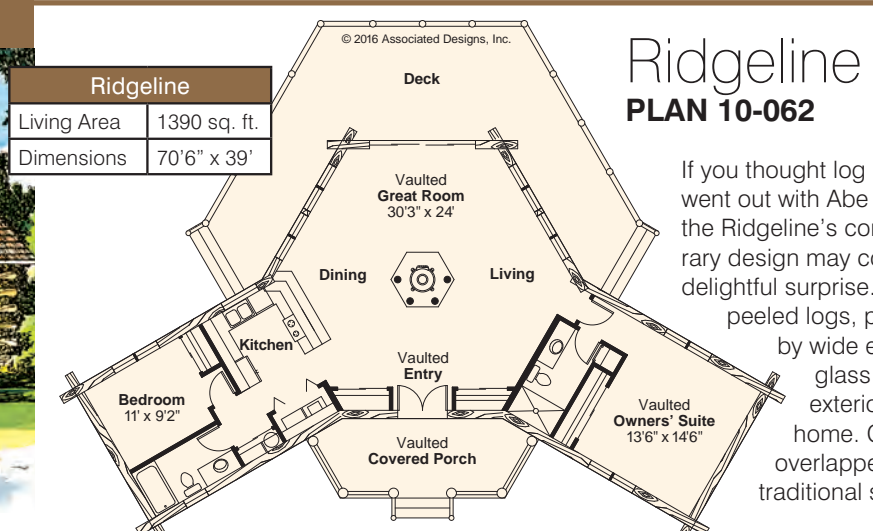

What’s the best age for shingles vaccine?

DEAR DR. ROACH:
You have written many times about chickenpox, shingles and the shingles vaccine. My question concerns the age at which one should get the vaccine. Most doctors and other sources recommend 60 and older; however, I am concerned about more and more younger people getting shingles, in their 50s and, in one instance, a woman in her 30s. Are these isolated cases? I am a 48-year-old female, and I did have chickenpox as a child. My husband’s insurance will pay for the vaccine at 50, and I intend to get it then. What are your thoughts? — L.A.B.

The vaccine is indicated by the Food and Drug Administration for those ages 50 and up, but advisory groups have recommended the vaccine to people over age 60, since the complication of post-herpetic neuralgia is more likely, lasts longer and can be more severe the older you get. It is reasonable to get the vaccine at 50 if you want, but it’s important to get it at age 60 or over if you haven’t already had it.

DEAR DR. ROACH:
A 95-year-old does not get enough blood flow to her lungs because she has a leaky heart valve. She is chronically short of breath after a small amount of exertion.

Her leg strength is low, and she has to use a walker to safely get around. She lived with a smoker for a few decades, and he died decades ago, but she never smoked herself. Would supplemental oxygen help, by enriching the air in her lungs, thus allowing blood to get more oxygen from the lungs? — Anon.

ANSWER:
Supplemental oxygen can improve symptoms and make people live longer in a few specific instances. The most prevalent is probably people with chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD) whose blood oxygen level is below 89 percent. Some other lung diseases also benefit from oxygen. In cases of poor blood flow due to heart reasons, including valvular disease, oxygen doesn’t help. It’s possible that the 95-year-old you are writing about has some lung disease due to secondhand-smoke exposure. It is easy now for doctors to check oxygen levels, and that would indicate whether she would benefit. Readers: COPD typically causes shortness of breath, especially with activity. 

Easy Teriyaki Chicken with Homemade Teriyaki Sauce

INGREDIENTS

Homemade Teriyaki Sauce
1/3 cup soy sauce
1/4 cup water
2 tablespoons mirin
1 tablespoon rice wine vinegar
1/4 cup (50g) granulated sugar
3 tablespoons (37g) brown sugar
1/2 teaspoon garlic powder
1/2 teaspoon ground ginger
1/2 tablespoon cornstarch whisked with 1 tablespoon water
Teriyaki Chicken
2 large or 4 small boneless skinless chicken thighs
Serve with Rice and Steamed Broccoli

INSTRUCTIONS

Homemade Teriyaki Sauce:
Combine soy sauce, water, mirin, rice wine vinegar, granulated sugar, brown sugar, garlic powder, ground ginger, and cornstarch and water mixture in a small sauce pan. Bring to a simmer over medium-high heat, stirring occasionally. Turn heat down to medium and simmer for 4 to 6 minutes, until sauce is thickened. (It will thicken further as it cools.)
Teriyaki Chicken:
In a small bowl or plastic bag, combine chicken thighs and about 3 tablespoons of teriyaki sauce. Toss to coat. Marinate for at least 30 minutes, up to 12 hours. Pre-heat your oven to 400°F. Line your baking sheet with foil for easy clean up and lightly grease. Remove thighs from the marinade and transfer to baking sheet. Bake for 8 minutes. Pour about 3 tablespoons of sauce into a small bowl and use to baste the chicken thighs. Discard remaining basting sauce. Bake for an additional 3 to 5 minutes before using an instant-read thermometer in the thickest part of the meat. Once the meat temp reads 165°, pull it from the oven and allow it to rest for at least 5 minutes before slicing. **Thigh size varies wildly, so baking time will too. Don’t be alarmed if the chicken thighs take longer to cook. ** Brush with additional teriyaki sauce if desired. Serve over white rice with steamed broccoli and enjoy!
Notes: *You can substitute white wine or sherry for the mirin. and use 1 ½ teaspoon white vinegar in place of the rice wine vinegar or omit it completely.
Doubling instructions: No cooking changes are necessary to double. 3 tablespoons of teriyaki sauce when marinating should be sufficient unless your thighs are quite large. Just use your best judgement. Leftover teriyaki sauce can be stored in an air-tight container in the refrigerator for up to 1 month.
