Who doesn't remember the fun of "The Dating Game," "The NewlywedGame," "WheelofFortune" and "Let's Make a Deal?"

One Fenton resident, Faye Mattord, now 85, recalls decades of watching "The Price is Right," America's longest running TV game show, and being selected as a contestant on the show in 2008. Mattord, then 76, was vacationing in California with her daughter and son-in-law, Judy and Al Yelle, when the trio decided to try out for the show. They got Tshirts screen-printed with "The Price is Right"

phrase, "Come on down!" hoping to be noticed by show producers.

"(Host) Drew Carey liked her spunk," said Judy. "They liked her personality and the way she could joke." Mattord was also the oldest person in the studio audience, which helped set her apart from other would-be contestants.



**1992**: Michelle Knapp, 18, is watching television in her parents' living room in Peekskill, New York when she hears a thunderous crash in the driveway. Alarmed, Knapp ran outside to investigate. What she found was a sizeable hole in the rear end of her car, an orange 1980 Chevy Malibu; a matching hole in the gravel driveway underneath the car; and in the hole, what looked like an ordinary, bowling-ball-sized rock. It weighed about 28 pounds, was shaped like a football and was warm to the touch. It also smelled vaguely of rotten eggs. The next day, a curator from the American Museum of Natural History in New York City confirmed that the object was a genuine meteorite.

# **OCT. 10**

**2004**: Actor Christopher Reeve, who became famous for his starring role Somewhere in Time and in four Superman films, dies from heart failure at the age of 52 at a hospital near his home in Westchester County, New York. Reeve, who was paralyzed in a 1995 horseriding accident, was a leading advocate for spinal cord research.

## OCT. 11

**2002**: Former President Jimmy Carter (1977-1981) wins the Nobel Peace Prize "for his decades of untiring effort to find peaceful solutions to international conflicts, to advance democracy and human rights, and to promote economic and social development."

## **OCT. 12**

**1492**: After sailing across the Atlantic Ocean with three small ships, the Santa Maria, the Pinta, and the Nina, Italian explorer Christopher Columbus sights a Bahamian island, believing he has reached East Asia. His expedition went ashore the same day and claimed the land for Isabella and Ferdinand of Spain, who sponsored his attempt to find a western ocean route to China, India, and the fabled gold and spice islands of Asia.

# <u>OCT. 13</u>

**1999**: The Colorado grand jury investigating the case of child beauty queen JonBenet Ramsey, who was murdered in December 1996, is dismissed and the Boulder County district attorney due to insufficient evidence.

## <u>OCT. 14</u>

**1962**: The Cuban Missile Crisis begins, bringing the United States and the Soviet Union to the brink of nuclear conflict. Photographs taken by a high-altitude U-2 spy plane offered evidence that Soviet-made, medium-range missiles in Cuba, capable of carrying nuclear warheads, were now stationed 90 miles off the American coastline. Tensions between the United States and the Soviet Union over Cuba had been steadily increasing since the failed April 1961 Bay of Pigs invasion.

## **OCT. 15**

**1965**: In a demonstration staged by the student-run National Coordinating Committee to End the War in Vietnam, the first public burning of a draft card in the United States takes place. David Miller, a young Catholic pacifist, became the first U.S. war protestor to burn his draft card in direct violation of a recently passed law forbid-ding such acts. Agents from the Federal Bureau of Investigation later arrested him. He was tried, found guilty and sentenced to two years in prison.

Here are some of them. Are they fact

# "Crops will grow after a year of snow."

That's true, according to the Old Farmer's Almanac. A several-inch layer of snow contains more air than ice. Trapped between the interlocking snowflakes, the air serves to insulate the plants beneath it. When the snow melts, the water helps to keep the ground moist.

# "A ring around the Moon means rain will come real soon."

It could happen. A ring, or halo, around the Moon is caused when the light of the Moon refracts through ice crystals present in high-level clouds. Although these clouds do not produce precipitation, they often occur in advance of an approaching low-pressure system, which often brings precipitation in the form of rain or snow.

# "Observe sheep, cats, and cows."

Their bodies are affected by changes in air pressure. When rain is on the way, old sheep turn their backs to the wind, cats sneeze, and cows lie down.

# "Red sky at night, sailor's delight...red sky in morning, sailors take warning."

While a red sky is not a 100 percent reliable indicator of upcoming weather, science generally does back this saying. In the U.S., Europe and some other parts of the world, weather systems tend to move from west to east, so if there is a red sky at night, when the sun is setting in the west, that could mean there's a high-pressure system to the west that will soon arrive, bringing nice weather with it. But if the red sky is in the morning when the sun is in the east, a high-pressure system might recently have passed, suggesting that a low-pressure system could soon arrive, bringing, cooler, rainy weather. A red sky could also be the result of air pollution.

# "When the dew is on the grass, rain will never come to pass."

Dew forms when overnight temperatures drop to the "dew point," the temperature at which water vapor in the air condenses into droplets. This is most likely to occur on cool nights when a high-pressure system is in the area. High-pressure systems tend to bring clear, dry weather, so morning dew does indeed suggest that rain is unlikely.

# "It's too cold to snow."

Yes, it really can get too cold to snow, but only if it is treacherously cold, when temperatures are at least 30 degrees below zero Fahrenheit. Snow requires not just freezing temperatures but also moisture in the air, and very cold air tends to be very dry air.

# "Watch birds in flight."

Air pressure affects many birds. For example, swallows have sensitive ears; when the barometric pressure drops, they fly as close to the ground as possible, where air density is greatest. Generally, low-flying birds are signs of rain: high flyers indicate fair weather. On the other hand, low-flying birds could also mean they may be looking for food.

# "Lightning never strikes

# twice in the same place."

Don't believe it! Lightning can, and does, strike the same spot repeatedly. Some tall buildings and trees get struck many times each year. Standing where lightning has already hit will not keep you safe in a lightning storm.

 I have a 2000 Dodge Neon which recently started a humming noise. It didn't affect anything on the driving, just the noise. However, after pulling out of my house it started jumping and making a loud sound, almost like something was falling off the car. Nothing is hanging down, nothing is falling off. It doesn't matter if I'm hitting the gas or brake. It will only do it once in a while. Today, while driv-ing around town, it only did it once. I noticed that if I'm pushing the brake when it happens, the pedal does jump a little. The whole car jumps but doesn't seem like its shutting off or anything. I cant get it into a mechanic until next week and wondered if there is something I can do myself. Please help. -Crystal Please help. -Crystal

A: Crystal, This sounds like a wheel bearing to me, but could be other things like an axle shaft, steering, suspension or brake prob-lem. The way it sounds I would not recommend driving the car until you are able to have someone look at it. To check for a bad wheel bearing, you will need to jack up the front end and support with jack stands. Then, grab the top and bottom of the wheel, trying to move it in at the top and out at the bottom. Go back and forth, you will need someone to look behind the wheel to see where the movement is and confirm that the lower ball joint or tie rods are not loose. Sometimes a wheel bearing will not show any movement and we need to run the vehicle in drive while it is Jacked up, listening with a stethoscope for noise. Be very careful if trying this, as we need to get the wheels spining up to 60 mph sometimes to hear the action. hear the noise.

showing up at the studio with her boyfriend, Mike Schilling, in wild costumes after scoring free tickets online, while at a business conference in Los Angeles. She played one of the games with host Wayne Brady, in a show that aired April 11, 2014.

Tim Helms, a 1983 Fenton High School graduate, won \$415,000 in prize money in 2000, when he appeared with host Maury Povich, on the game show "Twenty One."

Obviously, game shows have been around for years, with "Truth or Consequences" the first game show to air on commercial television in 1941 in the New York market, then going national in 1950.

During the following decade, game shows became a permanent fixture on American TV. Daytime shows like "The Price is Right" produced lower-stakes games and prime time game shows, like "500 Questions," offered higher stakes.

Why are they so popular? It's America's great spectator sport, according to TV

Guide. People like to watch other people think under stress. It's also more about the fun than the money, according to one "Password" producer in 1967.

America's fascination with game shows has gone up and down during the decades. "Who Wants to be a Millionaire," which debuted in 1999, has been credited for the revival of game show popularity. In 2006, "Deal or No Deal" became a popular series because of its high risk and high reward factor.

In the summer of 2015, ABC-TV brought the popular daytime game show "Family Feud" to prime time, adding celebrities into the mix. "Celebrity Family Feud," hosted by Steve Harvey, became more popular than ever, prompting ABC to not only renew it for a second season, but also revive two other popular game shows from the 1960s and '70s.

Now Sunday nights offer the new "ABC's Sunday Fun and Games," consisting of "Celebrity Family Feud" at 8 p.m., "The \$100,000 Pyramid" at 9 p.m. and "Match Game" at 10 p.m.

There's also a Game Show Network, which shows old favorites, like "The Newlywed Game" and "The \$25,000 Pyramid," as well as new shows like "Winsanity" and "Window Warriors."

# Pay attention to patients

### **DEAR AMY:**

Recently, I took an elderly relative to have a cancerous growth removed from her face. I was grateful that the doctor

allowed me to be with my relative during the procedure, but I was appalled that the doctor and his staff chatted to each other throughout the procedure. Occasionally, they would tell my aunt what they were doing, but by far most of their conversation was about their weekends and other ordinary details of their lives. My aunt was fully conscious the whole time, and after the procedure she told

me that this made her uncomfortable. I thought it was incredibly

disrespectful for medical professionals to treat their patient almost as if she wasn't there, even while they undertook the procedure, but I didn't say anything. What's the best way for patients — and patients' advocates - to remind medical professionals to keep their conversations professional

and to keep their focus on their patients? — Appalled

#### **DEAR APPALLED:**

I shared your question with Patricia McTiernan. a spokesperson for the National Patient Safety Foundation in Boston. Here is her response: "Many people find it hard to speak up during encounters with health professionals, but it is especially important to speak up if you think something is wrong or if you are uncomfortable. In this situation, the family member could have said: 'I know that you all do

this every day, but this is a new experience for us. Would you mind if we limit conversation to my aunt's care?' Alternatively, the relative could have asked to speak privately with a member of the health care team, who could then convey the message to the others. It is vitally important for patient safety that patients and family members be engaged in their care and are

recognized as members of the team."

# Tips for taking the next step in weight-loss journey

#### **DEAR DR. ROACH:**

I have been trying to lose weight, with no results. I have cut back on carbs and sugar. In general, I watch what

I eat. I also go to the YMCA and work out - in the water mostly, because my legs hurt so much. I weigh 286 pounds. I would love to lose 100 pounds, but I am not having any luck. When I go to my primary-care doctor, he tells me that I need to lose weight. When I tell him what I have been doing to try to lose weight, he doesn't believe me. I think I need more help with my weight problem. I don't

know if I should find a new doctor, or what! — J.S.

#### **ANSWER:**

I have heard variations of this story so many times from my own patients that I am sure you are trying. However, losing weight is a very difficult thing to do. Once your body has reached a certain weight, it is incredibly hard to get things turned around. Fortunately, it is possible for everyone to lose weight. But you certainly do need some help. So does your primary-care doctor. As an alternative to getting a new one, I think it might be worthwhile to see an expert in weight loss, since this is a field requiring knowledge of new medications, as well as potentially using medications approved for other conditions in an "off label" way



to help you lose weight. One of the first things to look at is the medicines you already take. Most primary-care doctors don't know (and I mightn't have, if I

didn't work at an institution where research and teaching about this goes on) how many medications for blood pressure, depression, epilepsy and diabetes (among others) can cause weight gain as a side effect. Sometimes switching medications can help a great deal. Most primary-care doctors are uncomfortable prescribing medications for weight loss, especially after the disaster caused by the combination of dexfenfluramine and phentermine (fen-phen). There

are newer and safer medications now. Metabolic conditions such as Cushing's disease and hypothyroidism need to be looked for.Careful evaluation of the diet using food diaries and often enlisting the expertise of a registered dietician nutritionist — is of paramount importance. Since there is so much misinformation, I almost always find people eating unhealthy foods and avoiding healthy ones, to their detriment. You should be congratulated on finding an exercise that you can do, and be encouraged to do so every day. Finally, since you are 100 pounds or so overweight, your doctor also should consider the risks and benefits of bariatric surgery, the most effective way (and only reliable one for most people) of losing that much weight.

# Pumpkin Pull Apart Bread





**INGREDIENTS:** 

- DOUGH:
- 2 3/4 cups bread flour
- 2 tablespoons packed brown sugar 1 package active dry yeast
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup canned pumpkin 1/2 cup very warm milk
- (120 degrees F)
- 1 egg

2 tablespoons butter, melted 1/2 cup packed brown sugar 1 tablespoon ground cinnamon

## FROSTING:


- 2 oz. cream cheese, softened 1/4 cup powdered sugar 1/2 teaspoon pumpkin pie spice
- 1-2 tablespoons milk
- 2 tablespoons chopped pecans, optional

INSTRUCTIONS: In the bowl of your stand mixer, combine the flour, brown sugar, yeast and salt. Stir in the pumpkin, milk and egg just until everything is combined then switch to your dough hook and knead for 5 minutes on a low speed. Cover and let rise in a warm place until doubled in size. (you may also refrigerate the dough for up to two days) Grease a 8x4 or 9x5 loaf pan and set aside. Turn dough out onto a lightly floured OR greased work surface. Roll dough into a 16x12 inch rectangle with the long side facing you. For the filling combine the brown sugar and the cinnamon in a small bowl. Spread the melted butter over the dough then sprinkle with the brown sugar and cinnamon mixture. Cut dough rectangle vertically into four 12x4 inch strips. Stack the strips then cut five or six 4x2 pieces leaving everything in stacks. Place in prepared pan cut side up. Cover and let rise until almost double. (let it rise to the top of the pan then bake) Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes or until golden. Cool loaf 10 minutes before removing from pan. Let cool completely before frosting. To make the frosting combine the cream cheese, powdered sugar, pumpkin pie spice and milk in a small bowl. Spread over cooled bread. Top with pecans it desired. \*Store leftovers wrapped in foil for up to two days. Enjoy!
