## Greatest hoax of all time happened 78 years ago today

## Radio broadcast of false Martian invasion terrorized nation

I'm talking, of course, about Orson Welles and his fake news bulletin describing a Martian inva-

sion of Earth. Millions of listeners mistook those bulletins for the real thing causing mass panic and nationwide hysteria. Welles' Mercury The-







## AUDIOBOOKS INCREASING IN POPULARITY

Recognizable voices bring the written word to life

Imagine listening to Morgan Freeman reciting your favorite story, or hearing one person use 134 different voices for various Harry Potter characters.

Audiobooks combine the written word and voice acting to bring a story to life.

Advances in technology have given rise to the ever-growing popularity of audiobooks, and while physical book sales have dropped, audiobook sales are soaring, according to Association of American Publishers (AAP). There are approximately 130 million books in the world, and more and more are being turned into audiobooks every year.

Audiobook sales increased 85 percent from 2012 to 2015, according to the AAP. Sales in 2015 totaled \$1.77 billion, up 20 percent from 2014, according to the Audio Publishers Association.

What makes audiobooks so popular? "The appeal of audiobooks, to me, is

that they cure the boredom of tedious commutes while allowing me to multitask and indulge in 'me' time, when I wouldn't otherwise have the time to read," said avid audiobook listener Marnie Boehlke of Fenton Township. She started listening to audiobooks on long car rides about two decades ago.

"When I changed to my current job six years ago, with a 40-60 minute commute each way, I absolutely had to get audiobooks on disc because I cannot stand driving long distances. Audiobooks help pass the time, and help keep me alert,' Boehlke said, adding that she has listened to more than a hundred audiobooks, and usually finishes them within one to two weeks.

She said she checks out audiobooks from the Fenton Jack R. Winegarden Library.

"I listen to a large variety of books. I usually check out three at a time, with one non-fiction, one mystery, and one See AUDIOBOOKS on 17A

## Fenton schools receive clean audit

### ■Fund balance increases by \$527,000

Fenton Area Public Schools (FAPS) received a clean and unmodified opinion on its recently completed audit for the 2015-16 school year from the Yeo and Yeo accounting firm.

Each school district in Michigan is required to retain the services of a third party auditor to conduct a comprehensive review of district finances.

In addition to an unmodified option, the district did not receive any audit findings and finished with a general fund operating surplus of \$527,000, which was \$103,000 better than projected.

This operating surplus has allowed the district to double its fund balance in one year and now holds over \$800,000 in reserves, up from \$272,000 in 2015.

FAPS was placed on the Michigan Department of Treasury Fiscal Distress list during the 2015-16 school year for a low fund balance, per PA 109 (MCL 380.1219(3)).

The district engaged in budget reduction and cost containment measures to reduce expenses and build the fund balance. "This is great news for us as we continue to build a responsible and sustainable budget that places teaching and learning first," said Superintendent Adam Hartley. "Everyone has found creative ways to work harder and work smarter to help turn the ship in the right direction," he added. "This is a big first step to rebuilding our fund balance while maintaining the quality education Fenton Area Public Schools has always provided our families."

Board of Education President Drew Shapiro said, "I am thankful and proud of the hard work and sacrifice from the teachers and administrators in Fenton to turn the budget around. It has not been easy, and there is still work left to do, but we are moving in a positive direction. As I move on, I find comfort in knowing that the district is left in very capable hands."

Tammy Valley, Fenton school board treasurer said, "The FAPS administration, teachers and staff have worked the past two years to overcome our fiscal challenges. It is rewarding to receive a clean audit report and to have in excess of \$500,000 added to our fund balance. I am extremely proud of the hard work and dedication that made this possible."

**Continued from Front Page** fiction novel "War of the Worlds" for

national radio. Despite his young age, Welles had been on the radio for several years, most notably as the voice of "The Shadow" in the hit mystery program of the same name.

"War of the Worlds" was not planned as a radio hoax, and Welles had no idea of the havoc it would cause, according to history.com.

When the show began at 8 p.m., a voice announced, "The Columbia Broadcasting System and its affiliated stations present Orson Welles and the Mercury Theater on the air in 'War of the Worlds' by H.G. Wells."

In 1938, Sunday evenings were prime time in the golden age of radio and millions of Americans had their radios turned on. To get an authentic visual of what family life was like during this period, watch one of the nightly episodes of "The Waltons" on the "insp" cable network (Charter channel 96) at 5 and 7 p.m. Monday through Friday.

On Sunday nights in 1938, most Americans were listening to ventriloquist Edgar Bergen and his dummy "Charlie McCarthy" on NBC and only turned to CBS at 8:12 p.m. after the comedy sketch ended and a little-known singer went on. By then, the audience had missed the introduction and the story of the Martian invasion was well underway.

Welles introduced his radio play with a spoken introduction, followed by an announcer reading a weather report. Then, seemingly abandoning the storyline, the announcer took listeners to "the Meridian Room in the Hotel Park Plaza in downtown New York, where you will be entertained by the music of Amon Raquello and his orchestra." Dance music played for some time, and then the scare began.

An announcer broke in to report that "Professor Farrell of the Mount Jenning Observatory" had detected explosions on the planet Mars. Then the dance music came back on, followed by another interruption in which listeners were informed that a large meteor had crashed into a farmer's field in Grover's Mills, New Jersey.

Soon, an announcer was at the crash site describing a Martian emerging from a large metallic cylinder. "Good heavens," he declared, "something's wriggling out of the shadow like a gray snake. Now here's another and another one and another one. They look like tentacles to me ... I can see the thing's body now. It's large, large as a bear. It glistens like wet leather. But that face, it ... it ... ladies and gentlemen, it's indescribable. I can hardly force myself to keep looking at it, it's so awful. The eyes are black and gleam like a serpent. The mouth

is kind of V-shaped with saliva dripping from its rimless lips that seem to quiver and pulsate."

The Martians mounted walking war machines and fired "heat-ray" weapons at the puny humans gathered around the crash site. They annihilated a force of 7,000 National Guardsman, and after being attacked by artillery and bombers the Martians released a poisonous gas into the air. Soon "Martian cylinders" landed in Chicago and St. Louis. The radio play was extremely realistic, with Welles employing sophisticated sound effects and his actors doing an excellent job portraying terrified announcers and other characters.

An announcer reported that widespread panic had broken out in the vicinity of the landing sites, with thousands desperately trying to flee. In fact, that was not far from the truth.

Perhaps as many as a million radio listeners believed that a real Martian invasion was underway. Panic broke out across the country. In New Jersey, terrified civilians jammed highways seeking to escape the alien marauders. People begged police for gas masks to save them from the toxic gas and asked electric companies to turn off the power so that the Martians wouldn't see their lights. One woman ran into an Indianapolis church where evening services were being held and yelled, "New York has been destroyed! It's the end of the world! Go home and prepare to die!"

When news of the real-life panic leaked into the CBS studio, Welles went on the air as himself to remind listeners that it was just fiction. There were rumors that the show caused suicides, but none were ever confirmed.

The Federal Communications Commission investigated the program but found no law was broken. Networks did agree to be more cautious in their programming in the future.

## **Millpond Manor residents evacuated**

Broken sprinkler head in third-floor apartment causes flood

More than 40 residents of Millpond Manor, a senior apartment complex in downtown Fenton, were displaced from their apartment Thursday night after a sprinkler head in a third floor apartment broke and sprayed out a substantial amount of water.

Fenton Fire Chief Bob Cairnduff said they received the 911 call shortly after 7 p.m. on Oct. 27. Fire crews cleared the scene at approximately 10:30 p.m.

Cairnduff said it appears that a resident on the third floor accidentally hit the sprinkler head on the ceiling. The sprinkler head broke and began spraying water. This water flowed to the floors below through the walls, ceilings and electrical outlets before the fire department was able to shut down the system.

Electrical power was shut off in the west wing of the apartment building and most of the residents in that area made arrangements to stay with relatives until they could move back in. Three residents went to a local hotel.

Cairnduff said a cleanup company began right away with industrial size dehumidifiers and fans. The water was clean, and he did not believe there would be too much damage, except for the watersoaked drywall, which would need to be replaced.

There were no injuries and the fire chief expects all of the displaced residents to move back into their apartments by Saturday.





Graves said photo identification is required for a person to vote, and poll workers check after each ballot is received to make sure the voter number goes up one number.

Graves would like to remind absentee ballot voters that ballots with green numerals at the bottom are correct, and ballots with black numbers are spoiled. The ballots with black numerals will count if residents cannot turn in the ballot with the green numerals.

City of Linden Clerk Lynn Henry said, "There is a system of checks and balances in place as prescribed by federal and state law, which is used to prevent voter fraud in Linden during absentee voting and on election day.

'The policies and procedures we have in place include the use of the Qualified Voter File (QVF), which allows us to track each person's ballot and verify every voter's identity."

#### **Absentee ballot voting**

City of Fenton Clerk Renee Wilson said there are many checks and balances in place to prevent voter fraud. In absentee voting, the ballots must have the voter's signature, which is compared to the Qualified Voter File database. Absentee ballot voters are only allowed one active ballot, meaning they cannot vote twice. A person would not be able to send in an absentee ballot and vote in person.

a few problems in the past, but they were only misunderstandings that were resolved.

Broecker said they program all the tabulators only to accept ballots that were correctly filled out. They know exactly how many ballots to expect on election day.

He said one of the concerns at a national level is this — can the programming cause the election results to be different from what people voted for? Can it be enough to sway the election?

"We are 100-percent confident that our tabulators will count the ballots correctly," Broecker said. "Is it impossible? Nothing is impossible. Is it likely? Do we think we have a problem? Absolutely not."

Broecker thinks that national campaign rhetoric gets "ramped up" too much.

"You've got one candidate saying 'if I lose, it's rigged.' All you need is 1 percent of the population believing it, and it's a problem. We know what we are doing,' he said.

#### Voting process at the polls:

1. Voter fills out an application to vote.

2. ID is checked against the electronic poll book.

3. A ballot is issued.

4. The resident votes and puts their own ballot in the machine, if they over voted, the machine beeps, ballot can be spoiled and voter can get a new ballot.

5. A poll worker checks after each ballot is received to be sure the voter number goes up one number. These numbers must match at the end of the day with the poll book.

6. Poll watchers and challengers are usually present in each precinct. There is a plan to have a challenger in the Absent Voter Counting Board, too.

7. Precinct workers represented by an equal number of Democrats and Republicans work each precinct and Counting Board.

8. Precinct workers swear to an oath and sign an honesty oath.



Their daughter, Tarah, was just 7 years old when her older brother took his life, but her entire childhood was ripped away from her and she suffered from guilt and depression. Finally, at the age of 17, she shared with her parents what she was feeling and was able to get help.


