Small town bookstores, **big time service**

■Social media helping to grow a loyal customer base

Residents of Linden, Fenton and Holly areas don't have to travel far to find new or used books, thanks to the variety of independent book stores in the area.

This is an impressive feat considering a decade ago, the number of independent book stores was decreasing.

However, this changed around 2009 when Borders started closing stores. Between 2009 and 2014, Borders closed more than 60 locations, according to the Wall Street Journal, leaving towns and cities without a bookstore.

Borders finished liquidating at the end of 2011, according to publishersweekly.com.

Independent bookstores jumped in. According to bustle.com, the number of independent book stores in the United States increased by 27 percent since 2009.

Currently, area residents have the option of going to Lizz's Books or Fenton's Open Book in Fenton, Past Tense Books in Holly, and the new Beloved Books in Linden.

A few years ago, Barnes & Noble pushed Nook, their e-reading device. According to peworld.com, the sales on these devices flopped around 2014.

Lizz Henderson, owner of Lizz's Books, a secondhand bookstore in Fenton, said, "I have a lot of customers

who don't like it (Kindles) either. They want a real book to hold onto, not just another tablet that you have to plug in and charge all the time. A book's a book." See BOOKSTORES on 15A

About Drew Shapiro

Drew Shapiro, who will be sworn in as the new Genesee County Commissioner for the 6th district on Jan. 3, 2017, is 28 years old.

He most recently served as the president of the Fenton Area Public Schools Board of Education (2012 to 2016). He presided over his last meeting on Dec. 5.

Shapiro's family moved to Fenton when he was 4 years old. He grew up in a home off White Lake Road. He attended State Road Elementary School through fifth grade.

said. "They were the greatest, phenomenal teachers." Melody Strang, who is now the

director of Instructional Technology & Curriculum, was Shapiro's fifth-grade teacher, he said.

"It was Mrs. Strang's 'stock market game' that got me seriously interested in finances," he said. Today, Shapiro works as a

managing associate for Mass Mutual Financial Group.

After State Road, Shapiro attended sixth and seventh grade at Valley School in Flint, a private school housed in the old Michigan School for the Deaf building. His parents thought he may have better opportunities there.

He returned, however, to attend school in Fenton — eighth grade at AGS Middle School, and graduating from Fenton High School in 2006. Shapiro graduated with a bachelor's degree in Political Science from Central Michigan University. He minored in entrepreneurship.

Shapiro's father, Dr. Steven Shapiro is a family practice physician. His mother, Dawn, is an X-ray technician. He has three older sisters and a brother, all of whom work in professional positions.

In his spare time, Shapiro enjoys hunting, fishing and boating. He has a dog named "Midas" that he rescued from the Genesee County Humane Society.

He also loves football, Tigers baseball and golf, although he admits he's not very good at the latter.

"I also read a lot," he said. "I'm a big history buff, especially presidential history."

At the age of 23, Shapiro ran for a seat on the Fenton school board and won. "I felt the school system needed to do a better job preparing students for the real world," he said.

"We were always taught that if we go to school and get good grades, the world's gonna knock down our doors," Shapiro said. "That's not how it worked out."

28-year-old is new county commissioner

Fenton's Drew Shapiro vows to improve communication with county residents

Drew Shapiro of Fenton is going places... and the next place he's going is the Genesee County administration building.

Shapiro, 28, a Republican, was elected to serve on the Genesee County Board of Commissioners, for the 6th district. District 6 serves the townships of Argentine, Fenton, Grand Blanc and Mundy, as well as the cities of Fenton and Linden.

He unseated incumbent Republican Tony Brown in the Aug. 2 Primary Elections, and he defeated Democrat Pete Ponzetti in the Nov. 8 General Elections.

Upon winning the election, Shapiro said, "Southern Genesee County deserves a strong voice and I won't let them down. I plan to give the constituents the representation they deserve, and I will pride myself on always being accessible to residents. People recognized that we deserved better, and I wouldn't dream of letting them down."

One of the first things Shapiro said he would like to work on as a new county commissioner is to improve transparency and communication. He said Board of Commissioner meetings are held on Monday mornings — when most people are at work.

"So, there are two ways to find out what happens at those meetings," said Shapiro. "Either attend, or drive to downtown Flint, pay to park, enter the clerk's office and wait in line for a copy of the minutes. There is no way it should be this difficult for people to find out what their elected officials are doing."

Shapiro said again this week that the fix is very simple. "Post the minutes online. Right now, only the agendas are posted online," he said.

"My number one priority is constituent service," he said. "I want people to know I'm available, an issue that has been lacking in the past."

Another thing important to Shapiro is attracting new, talented people into the community. "New business will increase our tax base and keep our community vibrant," he said.

"It used to be that people would get a new job and then look for a place in that community," Shapiro said. "Now people are looking for a great place to live and then look for a job. It's called place-making, something supported by Gov. Rick Snyder.

"The LAFF Pathway is one example of place-making," Shapiro said.

Although he won't be officially sworn in until Jan. 3, 2017, Shapiro has already

hit the ground running. He has spoken with all of the other commissioners on the board. "The hope is that we will all work well together," he said. "Even though we have differences as Democrats and Republicans, we have similar goals, but different ideas on how best to get there."

Shapiro has also met with leadership in all county offices.

"I'm in the process of forming a Public Safety Advisory Committee for Genesee County," said Shapiro. "The committee would be charged with addressing response times and safety concerns unique to this (6th) district." This committee will be made up of 10 people, seven of whom have already committed to the task.

"I want a mix of people in leadership positions, people who are out there every day," he said. "I want to be able to announce the full roster right after I'm sworn in."

Shapiro said he will provide quarterly updates to every municipality in the 6th district. They will be in elected officials' packets. He will also provide regular updates on his Facebook page.

When asked if the county commissioner position was a stepping stone for him, Shapiro said, "I get asked that a lot. No one ever became governor or president by thinking they couldn't doit."

For now, Shapiro said he is 100 percent committed to being the best commissioner he can be. "One thing that is frustrating to me is people want to get involved in politics because they like the idea of being involved in politics — not because they are passionate about an issue or are passionate about helping."

Born in Grosse Pointe Farms, Gerald Laskey Laskey grew up attending Holy Rosary School, then graduated from Glen Lake High School. He continued his education with degrees from Northwestern Michigan College, Ferris State University and Eastern Michigan University.

According to his obituary, "His love of learning led to a fulfilling and lifelong career in education as a teacher and varsity coach of basketball, baseball and track. He continued more than 30 years of service to Lake Fenton Community Schools as principal and retired as superintendent of schools."

Laskey also was active in his community. He served as president of the Genesee County Superintendent's As-

Adopt-A-Pet receiving new driveway and concrete pad because of one poodle

hball@tctimes.com; 810-433-6792 The story of one little poodle has touched the lives of a Fenton family, and all the lives at Adopt-A-Pet.

When Dana Beagle agreed to foster Gloria the poodle, no one expected her to live very long.

Gloria was picked up on the side of the street in Pennsylvania last August. Beagle said the first veterinarian that saw the dog recommended she be put down, but the woman who found her refused.

Jody Maddock, the director of Adopt-A-Pet, said when they took in Gloria, who was over 10 years old at the time, from the county pound, her fur was so badly matted that her teeth were falling out because fur was stuck in her mouth. All her teeth had to be pulled.

After taking her to the vet and having some tests done, they found out she had two types of cancer and "was not long for this world," Maddock said. She

needed multiple surgeries to remove mammary tumors.

"An amazing person stepped forward to care for Gloria knowing her heart would soon be broken," she said.

That person was Dana Beagle, along with her husband, Duncan.

"Literally, the first 24 or 48 hours I just held her. She was just shaking and scared," Beagle said. "Gloria was a tough case. She

was one of the more gut wrenching ones because you knew what the outcome was going to be."

After some time, Gloria started to get better and warmed up to the family. "She ended up being a part of the family. Everyone loved her," she said.

Gloria loved to go for walks, be outside, run and play. Beagle said she had an excellent quality of life, and touched her own life as much as her own dogs have. She was glad the vets



and Adopt-A-Pet let her be a part of the decision making even though she was only fostering Gloria.

Gloria lived 11 more months, dying in early July. Beagle said it's miraculous that she lived that long.

Toward the end of her life, Gloria was so comfortable at their house, Beagle didn't want to upset her by placing her with another family.

In memory of Gloria, Beagles' mother and father donated money to have the asphalt on the Adopt-A-Pet driveway redone be-

cause they loved Gloria so much.

"That was the last thing I ever expected. I just made a comment about how they needed a new driveway," Beagle said. "What are the chances that some little dog picked up on the side of the road can have the ability to make such a difference?"

Maddock said every animal comes to them

for a reason, and that they were honored to spend those last 11 months with Gloria.

"Through all of this, this little poodle touched the lives of so many people and showed that what someone else discarded became someone else's joy," Maddock said. "All along, we thought we were giving Gloria a gift and in the end, with all her love and fight she taught us a lesson of compassion and gave all the animals, our customers and volunteers an amazing gift."

In his presentation, Kramer said in 2012, there was an average of 20.9 million human trafficking victims worldwide. Of that 20.9 million, 5.5 million were children around the ages of 12 and 13.

In the United States, more than 100,000 children are forced into prostitution every year, Kramer said, and many are young boys. Many girls are taken at the age of 13, and many boys are taken when they're 12. He said 20 to 25 percent of those children victims are boys

"It could be anybody's daughter, sister, classmate, neighbor, mother, best friend, doesn't matter. It could also be you. Don't think it doesn't happen to you. As soon as that's what you start to believe, you make yourself open up to become a victim.'

Kramer said the most common situation is pimps acting like older boyfriends to young girls. They use false promises like lying about creating a better life, preying off the victims' desperation and naivety, and will

buy the victims expensive clothing as gifts. "The reality is, nobody would choose this

lifestyle," he said. "In order to understand the issue, you have to understand the victims." Kramer said boys are often trapped into this

life because they'll start talking to someone whom they believe to be a girl online, when in reality it's a 60-year-old man. He said these people will trick boys into sending indecent photos to use as blackmail.

At this, the audience of boys laughed.

"I wish I could make this up, I wish it was funny, guys," he said. "The shame of it alone will be enough for you guys to

ing the lifestyle. They die from suicide, overdose, or disease, Kramer said

"If you start at 12, you're not even 21 and you're dead," he said. "You haven't even lived before you died."

He urged the boys to look out for themselves and their girl classmates, and look for warning signs. He said not to use the app Kick, a free text messaging application, because they were more likely to be stalked, abused or turned into a victim on Kick than any other web application.

"Be the protectors," he said, adding that they can't forget that human trafficking happens to boys, too.

It's a toss up, depending on which study you read. According to Fen-

ton Police Chief Rick Aro, there are three main types of distraction: visual, like taking your eyes off the road; manual, taking your hands off the wheel; and cognitive, which is when a driver isn't paying attention to what they're doing.

Distracted driving includes using a cell phone, eating or drinking, talking to passengers, grooming, reading, which

includes maps, using any devices or navigation system, watching a video, or changing the radio station, CD or MP3 player.

A 2015 Erie Insurance report on distracted driving found that drivers will do many dangerous things while driving, like change clothes or brush their teeth.

Because texting involves all three types of distraction, it's considered the most alarming distraction, according to distraction.gov, the official U.S. government website for distracted driving.

Yung, There are a few possibilities on this car that can cause this. Most likely it is a bad evaporative vent valve, but could also be a clogged or collapsed line to the charcoal canister or a plugged canister. One last possible cause is a check valve in the fuel tank where you fill it at. That prevents fuel from poring out in the case of a roll over, but this is the least most likely cause. You may want to let a repair shop handle this one for you. It takes some specialty equipment and knowledge of how this system functions to diagnose and repair it properly without replacing parts that may be working properly.
