

# ■Some love it, some don't even bother watching pro football's annual championship contest

The Fenton varsity football coach was a teenager when the Pontiac Silverdome hosted Super Bowl XVI, and he was given a chance to go to the game.

"I got a phone call for a seat on a bus and I was asked if I wanted to buy a ticket," Setzke said. "It was \$150 and that was a lot of money, so I didn't go. That was my one chance to see the Super Bowl and I didn't take advantage of it. Now I'm 52 and I still wish I was at that one. Plus, it was the first one in the state of Michigan. And to this day I think it's still the highest rated Super Bowl (actually the second-highest rated after last year's game)."

Setzke's interest in the Super Bowl probably fits the stereotype of what one would suspect of a high school football coach. Setzke said his family "makes it a day-long event."

But, oddly, there are others who don't get

too worked up for it. In fact, Lake Fenton varsity football coach Eric Doyle is about the direct opposite of Setzke.

"To be honest, I hate it. I generally don't even watch it," Doyle said. "It's just a giant production more than it is a game. The last couple of years we've been fortunate to have some close games, but a lot of times, the quality of the game has been pretty poor. There have been a lot of blowouts, and the

flow of the game is disrupted continuously with stoppages and long halftime shows. I'm not an NFL fan anyway, and the Super Bowl is one of the reasons why."

# **INTEREST IN SUPER BOWL VARIES FROM COACH**

Most area coaches don't take Doyle's extreme view of the Super Bowl. Most seem to have a casual interest in professional football's annual championship contest. This year's game will be played on Sunday, Feb. 7 between the Atlanta Falcons and New England Patriots at Houston's NRG Stadium. Kickoff is slated for 6:30 p.m.

"It's one of the games I enjoy watching," Linden co-head football coach Nick Douglass

said. "I enjoy the football part of the game, I guess. I think some people like the commercials. I like to see a good commercial, but I enjoy seeing the competitiveness of the best two teams going at it."

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
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# Just sayin'...

# Thank you, Ed!

Every night before I go to bed, I pour myself a nice big glass of cold water from the tap to keep at my bedside.

And when I do that, I often think of one person and silently thank him for his efforts to make sure city of Fenton residents have good, clean drinking water.

That person is Edward Angeluski. When I was a reporter in the late 1990s, I covered the Fenton

City Council meetings. Ed attended each and every meeting and at each and every meeting, he spoke during public comment about the need for a new water plant.



He said over

and over that the most valuable thing a town has is good, clean drinking water. Towns that don't shrivel up and die, he said, and he had the data from towns out west to back up that claim.

In 1999, Ed said he was going to put his money where his mouth is and ran for a seat on the Fenton City Council. He won and served two, four-year terms.

As they had promised him, city leaders did eventually look into it, and the end result is the state-of-the-art water plant on North Road, which was completed and online by 2004. Fenton is one of the few cities in Michigan with municipally softened water.

The Fenton City Council, with the help of then-City Manager Michael Senyko, a hard-working oversight committee and a loan through Michigan's Drinking Water Revolving Fund, really came through and the \$8

million plant became a reality. Ed was involved throughout as a member of the water plant project oversight committee.

The softened water alleviated the need for home water softeners. It also contains a very low iron content, and meets arsenic standards mandated by the federal government. Originally, the new water flowing through our system didn't cost much more than what we were paying before it came online. A few years later, however, because of the increased cost of materials necessary to treat the water and maintain the plant, the water rates were raised accordingly. Then, because of a reduction in usage, they had to be raised again.

The city treasurer often said of the loan, "The bills have to be paid."

Ed took a lot of heat for the rate increases. People somehow blamed him for the construction of the water plant and resulting increased water bills.

I'll bet our neighbors to the north in Flint wish they had someone like Ed to look out for their best interests today.

Ed ran for re-election to the Fenton City Council for a third term when he was 86 years old. He was devastated when he lost the election. He was ready and willing to serve his community until he was 90.

Ed died on Aug. 7, 2009 at the age of 89. A veteran of the U.S. Coast Guard, he is resting at Great Lakes National Cemetery in Holly.

I will never forget when Ed entered the council chambers. Mayor Sue Osborn would say, "Hi, Ed, how are you doing today?"

Ed would give her a big smile and proclaim, "I woke up!"

Thanks for all of the fond memories, Ed, and for my nice big glass of cool, clean drinking water.

In 2009, Michael John Anderson was convicted for killing a nanny who thought she was applying for a job. Katherine Ann Olson's body was discovered in the trunk of her car abandoned in a park.

# Michael Delgado (2011)

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In 2011, Michael Delgado was arrested for raping a maid, reportedly for over an hour, he "hired" from Craigslist. He was charged with false imprisonment, assault, and rape with a foreign object.

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# Forty-five years and counting

Charles 'Charlie' Koan shares experiences with Fenton Fire Department

In July of 1971, Americans were earning an average of just over \$10,000 a year, minimum wage was \$1.60 an hour, average rent was \$150 per month, a movie ticket was \$1.50 and gas was about 40 cents per gallon.

We were listening to new songs like "How Do You Mend a Broken Heart" by the Bee Gees, watching that radical new rascal Archie Bunker in "All in the Family." At the movies, we watched "A Clockwork Orange," Richard Nixon was the President of the United States, and the 1971 Barracuda was the hottest car around.

July 1971 was also the year that Charles "Charlie" Koan, assistant fire chief for Fenton, began his career with the fire department.

Koan said he has lived in Fenton all of

his life, having graduated from Fenton High School in 1966. He was drafted into the U.S. Army right out of college. He just missed having to serve in Vietnam because he broke his trigger finger and had to go to the hospital instead.

While in the Army, Koan spent time in Germany, in Kornwestheim, just outside of Stuttgart.

Koan started with the Fenton Fire Department on July 15, 1971. He has never worked for another fire department.

When he started, Bruce Dorland was the fire chief. "I became a medical first responder 15 years ago," said Koan. "That's when fire service really changed. Before that it was car accidents, structure fires and grass fires."

The most significant change in fire service over the years has been the size and weight of the equipment, Koan said.

"That's one reason we had to move from the old station (on Ellen) to the new one (on Caroline)," said Koan. "The new equipment was putting too much weight on the floors." (See sidebar)





The protective gear firefighters wear is much heavier. The helmets are much more protective than they used to be and the coats, bunker pants and boots have all changed, Koan added.

"For the most part ours is a very safe department. We've seen some burns and twisted ankles," he said.

Technology also has changed fire service, especially in the way reports are prepared.

"I grew up before computers so learning has been a challenge," Koan said.

Koan said the worst moment in his entire 45-year career was a car accident many years ago on White Lake Road.

"John Gerych's granddaughter, Kim, was killed. I graduated with Kim's mother, who was devastated. I was there and helped put her in a body bag."

The most rewarding aspect of his job is the commaraderie between the people in the department.

"Everyonehascharacterandeverybody is different," Koan said. "We work well together and have been very close. You count on them to be there to cover you.

"I've been fortunate to have worked with four female firefighters. Every one of them has pulled their own weight. Plus, they are good to have on scene. When there's a car accident involving children, the kids respond better to a woman firefighter than a male."

Koan said if he had to do it all over again, he would. When asked if he ever plans to retire, he said, "I'm hoping to make 51 years. I just thought since I've gone this long I might as well keep going, as long as my health holds out."

In his free time, Koan said he and his wife, Pamela, who retired from The State Bank after 30 years when the grandchildren came along, like to travel.

Neither of the couple's adult children are involved in fire service. Their son, Jason Koan, is a controller at a robotics company in Auburn Hills. Their daughter Natalie (Koan) Cook is a teacher at AGS Middle School.

"For the family it's tough," said Koan of his career. "The family gatherings I've been late for ... I don't know how many meals had to be warmed up two and three times. My wife is very patient and understanding."

# The new fire hall

Assistant Fire Chief Charles "Charlie" Koan was instrumental in helping plan the construction of the new fire hall in 2001. He and all the firefighters took a "road trip" to Mundy Township, which had just completed its new state-of-the-art facility. They went back to Fenton and told the Downtown Development Authority (DDA), which funded the new \$4.3million hall, that Mundy's station was just what they were looking for. By today's figures, the same hall would cost around \$20 million, Koan said.

Here are 10 powerhouse foods recommended by Mark Hyman, M.D., chairman of the Institute for Functional Medicine and author of The 10-Day Detox Diet.

# Raisins

Berries are full of free radical-fighting antioxidants, but their wrinkly relative, the raisin, can also keep inflammation in check.

# • Soy

Soy has been singled out for its ability to reduce the inflammation marker C-reactive protein. Another bean benefit: protein-rich, satisfying legumes can help you replace pro-inflammatory meat in your meals.

# • Salmon

This fish, along with tuna, herring and mackerel, is full of omega-3 fatty acids, which moderate the inflammatory producing process.

# • Basil

Many spices are rich in antioxidant phytonutrients that fight inflammation, including crushed and dried rosemary, thyme, turmeric, oregano and cinnamon. One of basil's advantages is that it can be eaten fresh.

# • Ginger

The ginger root not only has nauseacalming properties, but studies also link it to lowering post-exercise inflammation and a drop in joint pain caused by chronic inflammatory conditions osteoarthritis and rheumatoid arthritis.

# Sweet potatoes

Packed with nutrients, sweet potatoes are good for your heart, skin and immune health. They're also anti-inflammation, with high vitamin C and E levels, and the alpha and beta-carotenes. Load up on other orange foods, like apricots, pumpkins, cantaloupe and carrots.

# Cherries

Like berries, cherries are full of phytonutrients, but they also deliver a powerful dose of anti-inflammatory compounds.

# • Kale

Kale is rich in sulfur, which forces your liver to put it through two detox cycles, stimulating your body to churn out more phase II enzymes, which break down toxins in the same way digestive enzymes break



down food. Other sulfur-rich cruciferous vegetables include arugula, broccoli, Brussels sprouts, bok choy and wasabi.

# • Walnuts

Walnuts earn the spotlight in the nuts category for having the highest concentration of plant-based omega-3s, plus more than 10 antioxidant phytonutrients and polyphenols that also help reduce inflammation.

# • Tea

Sip green, white or black teas between meals and help yourself to even more free-radical-fighting properties.

# Avoid these foods that cause inflammation:

- Sugar
- Vegetable oil
- Fried foods
- Refined flours
- Dairy especially full-fat
  Artificial sweeteners
- Artificial additives
- Saturated fats
- Traditional grain-fed meats
- Processed meats

that causes disease. But there are some bacteria that are actually good for you, including probiotics that can help you with your health, especially your digestive system.

The most common probiotic is lactobacillus, the one you'll find in yogurts or other fermented foods like sauerkraut, pickles, kimchi, etc. When buying yogurt for the best probiotic punch, look for the words, "live and active cultures" on the package.

Probiotics can keep you healthy by balancing your "good" and "bad" bacteria to keep your body working like it should.

According to mayoclinic.com, there's encouraging evidence that probiotics may help:

• Treat diarrhea, especially following treatment with certain antibiotics

• Prevent and treat vaginal yeast infections and urinary tract infections

• Treat irritable bowel syndrome

• Speed treatment of certain intestinal

infections • Prevent or reduce the severity of colds

and flu

There's also some research to suggest that probiotics can help lower blood levels of LDL or "bad" cholesterol, according to findings presented to the American Heart Association.

The Federal Drug Administration



regulates probiotics like foods, not like medications. Unlike pharmaceutical companies, makers of probiotic supplements don't have to show that their products are safe or effective.

Side effects are rare, and most healthy adults can safely add foods that contain probiotics to their diets. Before taking supplements, mayoclinic.com suggests you talk with your doctor to see if they are right for you, plus the correct product and dosage.

# Add these foods for more probiotics in your diet

• Kefir — similar to yogurt, but a more

your own patient portal is now as commonplace in medical offices as a stethoscope or digital thermometer. A patient portal is a secure online

website that provides patients with convenient 24-hour access to their own personal health information from anywhere with an internet connection.

Using your patient portal, you can refill prescriptions, check on the status of doctor appointments, get test and lab results and much more information.

Chances are your own doctor's office or hospital uses this technology, as it is becoming increasingly popular throughout the healthcare industry.

According to the National Coordinator for Health Information Technology, 64 percent of hospitals gave their patients access to view, download and transmit their health data and 51 percent had the ability to secure message with their patients.

"We've had our (patient portal) system for about three years," said Penny Teffner, assistant administrator at Fenton Medical Center. "Our patients really utilize it. They can send messages to their health care team, get test results, refill prescriptions, check appointment dates and pay their bill online."

Front Office Supervisor Michelle Durmon handles all messages from the patient portal and routes them to the appropriate people.

"It has streamlined getting the results to patients after they've had health care services here," said Teffner.

She estimates that at least a third of their patients use the patient portal. "It's offered to everyone."

# How does it work?

With a patient portal, patients using a secure username and password can view health information such as:

- Recent doctor visits
- Discharge summaries
- Medications • Immunizations
- Allergies
- Lab results

# Some portals also allow patients to:


- Exchange secure email with their health care teams
  - Request prescription refills
  - Schedule non-urgent appointments
  - Update contact information
  - Make payments
  - · Download and complete forms
  - · View educational materials

The benefits of using a patient portal include better communication between health care staff and patient, support care between visits, more complete and accurate patient information and the empowerment of the patient taking ownership of their health, according to patientengagementhit.com.

"We truly haven't had a single complaint about our patient portal," said Teffner.



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# **Vitamin D** – the 'sunshine vitamin'

Get plenty of sun, eat the right foods and talk to your doctor about a supplement

The experts don't call vitamin D the "sunshine vitamin" for nothing.

Vitamin D is a powerhouse vitamin, affecting as many as 2,000 genes in the body, and it's produced in your skin as a response to sunlight, according to healthline.com.

# What does vitamin D do for you?

Getting enough vitamin D is vital for regulating the absorption of calcium and phosphorous, and facilitating normal immune system function. It's also important for the normal growth of your bones and teeth and improved resistance against certain diseases.

If you don't get enough vitamin D, you risk developing bone abnormalities, including osteoporosis. Vitamin D may also play a role in reducing your risk of multiple sclerosis, lessening your risk of heart disease and reducing your likelihood of developing the flu.

Vitamin D also regulates mood and may help ward off depression. Do you get enough vitamin D?

Since we live in Michigan and the sun only shines (or partly shines) an average of 168 days per year, you may find yourself "d-ficient" in this important vitamin.

The use of sunscreen, spending more time indoors, pollution, having darker skin and living in big cities where buildings block sunlight are all factors that can "block" your ability to get a sufficient amount of vitamin D.


If you don't have enough vitamin D, your symptoms may include general fatigue, aches and pains and an overall feeling of malaise, severe bone or muscle pain or weakness. Doctors can diagnose a vitamin D deficiency with a simple blood test, followed by X-rays to check the strength of your bones if you are vitamin D deficient.

# Your vitamin D prescription

• Ten minutes a day of midday, presunscreen sun exposure, especially if you have fair skin. Vitamin D supplements, if you're diagnosed with a vitamin D deficiency.
Eating foods that contain vitamin D, including salmon, sardines, egg yolk, shrimp, milk (fortified), cereal (fortified), yogurt (fortified) and orange

juice (fortified).

Experts differ on exactly how much vitamin D a person needs. Healthline.com suggests that you talk to your doctor for guidance on how to get the right amount for your body.
