The 13 students in the Work Based Learning Opportunities in Linden, Fen-

ton and Lake Fenton's Three District Consortium CI (Cognitively Impaired Program) spend a few hours a week at either Goodwill, Family Farm and Home, Alpine Marketplace, VG's, Caretel Inns of Linden, Adopt-A-Pet of Fenton or a Linden elementary office gaining work experience, said Robin Hollifield, paraeducator and job coach.

"At first we started small jobs here instructions, said Linden Superintendent in our school...working in offices and libraries and recycling, that kind of thing.

As their confidence grew, our district allowed me to go out and find businesses that would allow our students to come in," Hollifield said.

The program began approximately five years ago, and was run by Special Education teacher Cheryl Heiss and Hollifield, as a way to help the students gain

confidence and transition them from school to a job environment. The students, who are in 11th or 12th grade, work at least twice a week in pairs under the supervision of a job coach.



Board approves \$185,000 for 1:1 digital learning initiative

approved the implementation of a 1:1 technology initiative beginning with the 2017-18 school year.

With this one-deviceper-student plan, the district will purchase approximately 700 chromebooks for students and staff. In addition, the district will be repurposing devices currently at its middle school to expand access in other buildings.

We are so excited for the opportunities this 1:1 initiative will bring to all Lake Fenton students," said Julie Williams, assistant superintendent.

EXPANDED TECHNOLOGY ACCESS INCLUDES:

• Students in grades six through nine will receive a district purchased chromebook. • Torrey Hill Intermediate School will more than double the number of chromebook carts in its building, to three carts per grade level.

• West Shore Elementary School will add a cart to its inventory, which includes a tub of six chromebooks in every classroom plus

one chromebook cart. • Lake Fenton High School will also double the number of chromebook devices available from approximately 180 to 360.

Domestic violence, a silent epidemic

Knowing what to do can save your life

vhogan@tctimes.com; 810-433-6823 Two years ago, the following was released as a PSA (public service announcement) during Super Bowl 15. The spot, based on a real story, was aired courtesy of the NFL (National Football League).

It has a powerful tip for victims of domestic violence. The tri-county area is not immune to this problem. Here is the PSA:

"911, where is your emergency?"

"123 Main St."

"Ok, what's going on there?" "I'd like to order a pizza for delivery."

(oh great, another prank call).

"Ma'am, you've reached 911" "Yeah, I know. Can I have a large with half pepperoni, half mushroom and pep-

pers? "Ummm.... I'm sorry, you know you've called 911 right?'

"Yeah, do you know how long it will be?" "OK, Ma'am, is everything OK over

there? do you have an emergency?" "Yes, I do."

"... And you can't talk about it because there's someone in the room with you?" (moment of realization) For women seeking help

"Yes, that's correct. Do you know how long it will be?

"I have an officer about a mile from your location.

Are there any weapons in your house?" "Nope."

"Can you stay on the phone with me?"

"Nope. See you soon, thanks"

If you or someone you know is impacted by domestic violence, a safe exit strategy is essential.

According to The National Domestic Violence Hotline, following these steps may improve your chances of leaving safely:

• Let a trusted family member, friend, coworker or neighbors know your situation. Develop a plan for when you need help; code words you can text if in trouble, a visual signal like a porch light - on equals no danger, off equals trouble.

• If you are injured, go to a doctor or an emergency room and report what happened to you. Ask that they document your visit.

• Keep a journal of all violent incidences, noting dates, events and threats made.

• Keep any evidence of physical abuse, such as pictures.

· Plan with your children and identify a safe place for them. Reassure them that



their job is to stay safe, not to protect you. • If you need to sneak away, be prepared. Make a plan for how and where you will escape.

• Back your car into the driveway, and keep it fueled. Keep your driver door unlocked and other doors locked for a quick escape.

• Hide an extra set of car keys.

• Set money aside. Ask friends or family members to hold money for you.

• Pack a bag. Include an extra set of keys, IDs, car title, birth certificates, Social Security cards, credit cards, marriage license, clothes for yourself and your

> children, shoes, medications, banking information, money — anything that is important to you. Store them at a trusted friend or neighbor's house.

Try to avoid using the homes of next-door neighbors, close family members and mutual friends.

• Take important phone numbers of friends, relatives, doctors, schools, etc.

• If time is available, also take citizenship documents (such as your passport, green card, etc.), titles, deeds and other property information, medical records, children's school and immunization records, insurance information, and verification of Social Security numbers.

 Know abuser's schedule and safe times to leave.

• Be careful when reaching out for help via internet or telephone. Erase your internet browsing history, websites visited for resources, emails sent to friends/family asking for help. If you called for help, dial another number immediately after in case abuser hits redial.

• Create a false trail. Call motels, real estate agencies and schools in a town at least six hours away from where you plan to relocate.



After leaving an abusive relationship

· Change your locks and phone number. Change your work hours and route taken to work.

 Change the route taken to transport children to school.

 If you need a restraining order, keep a certified copy of it with you at all times.

· Inform friends, neighbors and

employers that you have a restraining order in effect.

· Give copies of the restraining order to employers, neighbors and schools along with a picture of the offender.

· Call law enforcement to enforce the order.

I have a 1994 Pontiac Firebird w/88,000 miles. The frontend has not sounded tight or reliable since I bought it. I recently merged onto the freeway and felt a snap in frontend. It made a REALLY loud clunking noise, so I stopped it ASAP. I noticed it did not make this noise in reverse. Any ideas? It is now undrivable until I get it towed. -Trenna

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Makeup brushes explained

A foundation brush has densely packed, soft bristles in a curved shape. It's used for spreading foundation around the face.



bristles good for spreading bronzer. Cosmopolitan

recommends using this brush to sweep bronzer in a "3" shape along your temple, hairline, cheekbone and then jawline.

A powder brush, which is just smaller than a Kabuki brush, is used to evenly distribute loose

powder for less concentrated color.

An angled blush brush is self-explanatory. It's angled and

used for blush, and sometimes bronzer. The angled curve helps users evenly distribute blush to their cheekbones.

A concealer brush is a smaller.



densely packed brush with shorter bristles used to cover up blemishes. The rounded edges help to reach nooks around the eyes and nose.

The all-over eyeshadow brush, which has the same dimensions as a concealer brush with slightly looser bristles, is optimal for applying eyeshadow.

> The blending brush has very loose bristles and

is used for blending different eyeshadows.

A smudger brush, a tiny angled-brush, is used to smudge eyeliner.

An angled eyeliner brush has very short bristles cut an angle. This angle

allows users to hold the brush at an angle while using eyeliner for optimal application.

The lash/brow comb/brush has two sides — one is the comb, used to separate clumpy lashes and smooth messy brows, and the brush, used to tame thick, unruly brows and to even harshly filled in brow lines.

The fan brush is used to brush away fallen eyeshadow and apply powders like highlighters, bronzer or blushes.

The platform, held up by two large pontoons, had bedrooms, kitchens and lounges and provided a place for workers to spend their time when not working. Although there were gale conditions in the North Sea that evening, no one was expecting that a large wave would collapse and capsize the platform. It happened very quickly and many of the workers were unable to make it to the lifeboats. Most of the 123 victims drowned

eran of the Village of Holly Fire Department, is fighting Merkle Cell Carcinoma. Greene's family, friends and fellow

firefighters are doing everything they can to get him the help he needs.

"Andy joined the department in 2005," said Sgt. David Platz. "Before that he was a cadet at Groveland Fire and Springfield fire departments."

Greene, a village of Holly resident, is married with three children — two boys and one girl, ages 8, 6 and 3 respectively.

He was diagnosed with the rare form of cancer in 2015.

"We were doing a training burn at Groveland Fire as part of a joint training when we were toned out for a medical,' said Platz. "It was Andy that was calling for help. He had severe stomach pain and

after we rushed him to the hospital they discovered a tennis ball-sized tumor that was connected to his stomach and small intestine. He had emergency surgery to remove the tumor and that's when it all started."

About Merkle Cell Carcinoma

Merkle Cell Carcinoma (MCC) is a rare, aggressive skin cancer that is at high risk of recurring and spreading (metastasizing) throughout the body, with most recurrences taking place within two years after diagnosis of the primary tumor. While the disease is 30 times rarer than melanoma (an estimated 0.24 cases per 100,000 persons in the U.S.), it kills about one in three patients compared with one in six for melanoma. MCC most often arises on sun-exposed areas in fairskinned individuals over age 50.

"I just don't see how I can be lenient with you. It's just a lot of money. I can't minimize that."

Before the sentencing was given, defense attorney Michael Manley and John Neal, chief of the White Collar Crime Unit, spoke as well as LaJoice himself.

LaJoice spoke clearly and appeared to get choked up as he addressed the judge.

"I used to think that happiness came from money and I learned I was wrong," LaJoice said. He said he learned that happiness came from his family and God, and that admitting this was a weight off his shoulders.

"I ask for mercy so I can return home to my family," he said.

Manley argued that LaJoice has paid back in restitution more than \$3 million and that LaJoice's goal from the day he turned himself in was to make things right.

"There's no intellectual honest way to justify anything Mr. LaJoice did ... I was given orders from Mr. LaJoice to make things right," Manley said.

Manley further added that LaJoice did not commit murder or rape a child or commit a violent crime. LaJoice has lost over 100 pounds since he confessed.

"He's a father. He's a husband. He's a man that made terrible mistakes," Manley said, adding that his wife is sticking by him and his kids love him.

Ashleigh LaJoice was in the courtroom, visibly upset. She was being comforted by a friend or family member during court proceedings.

Neal said LaJoice committed an "exceptionally serious offense."

"The amount that was embezzled was staggering," he said.

The crimes were committed over a long period of time and were not "a lapse in judgment," he said.

He spoke of LaJoice's "callous disregard

for others" due to people at the credit union and Chassé losing their jobs.

"He didn't show any regard for the methods. As che people," he said. "Mr. LaJoice didn't have to **Cheff Ljust slapped you**

LaJoice didn't have to do this." LaJoice's sentencing matches the U.S. Attorney's Office, which recommended 132 months, or 11, years of imprisonment, while Manley asked for 60 months, or five years.

LaJoice will receive credit for time served. Drain also ordered LaJoice to participate in the financial responsibility program while in prison. After his

release, he will be on probation. BACKGROUND ON THIS CASE

LaJoice committed bank fraud from October 2007 to December 2015.

In federal court, LaJoice said he com-

mitted check fraud by addressing cashier checks out to himself, along with a few other methods. As chief financial officer (CFO),

he was able to write large deposits, and then approve them with no oversight.

According to U.S. Attorney Barbara McQuade, to conceal the fraud, LaJoice created fictitious investments in certificates of deposit and bonds, and represented to auditors and bank examiners that the money he stole had in fact been invested in these vehicles.

According to the U.S. Attorney's Office recommendation statement, on Jan. 5, 2016, LaJoice was confronted by regulators at the Michigan Department of Insurance and Financial Services about discrepancies in the credit union's books. This prompted him to turn himself in the following day.

The Clarkston Brandon Community Credit Union became insolvent from the embezzlement and joined with the Michigan State University Federal Credit Union.

LaJoice was ordered to pay restitution of \$17,748,380.

LaJoice's properties, including his multi-million dollar home in Tyrone Township, were sold to help pay restitution. Skypoint Ventures executed a purchase agreement to acquire the Fenton City commercial properties last summer.

The properties that Skypoint Ventures has purchased include 225 W. Caroline St., the now-vacant lot where LaJoice planned to construct a multi-million dollar, mixed development called "Riverview."

LaJoice been lodged in the Oakland County Jail since January 2016. He is expected to plead guilty in Oakland County Circuit Court March 27 on embezzlement charges.

Manley and Neal have asked that the sentences run concurrent.

Since Owen Road Partners LLC purchased the Pizza Hut and Big Boy Restaurant on Owen Road, they also have submitted plans to the city for preliminary site plan review.

A drive around town on Sunday, March 19, inspired the question, do we need more strip malls?

According to a previous interview, Building and Zoning Administrator Mike Reilly said the Owen Road Partners' concept includes up to a nine-tenant building. The property is zoned general business, which could include anything from retail and restaurants, to personal services like medical offices, banks, etc.

According to Carmine Avantini, planner for the city of Fenton, the applicant will be going before the Fenton Zoning Board of Appeals (ZBA) on March 28.

"The variances they are requesting will allow the cross access connections with the proposed development to line up with the Sunoco site to the east and the Tuffy site to the west," Avantini said. "In addition, the property narrows considerably for the current Big Boy site and makes it difficult to provide adequate parking while still meeting the ordinance parking setback requirements."

When and if they get a variance from the ZBA, the plan will proceed to the Fenton Planning Commission for site plan approval.

The two chief complaints from the public about this project are increased traffic in an already congested area, and the number of storefronts that currently sit vacant throughout the city.

son Slater, there have been 18 accidents at Owen and Silver Parkway in the past 15 months. He said there have been nearly as many at other nearby Owen Road intersections such as at Alloy and Donaldson.

U.S. Postal Service

The U.S. Postal Service (USPS) delivers to 155 million homes and businesses six and increasingly seven days a week, is based in the Constitution and is consistently rated the public's most-trusted federal agency.

Yet, some misinformation exists about this American treasure. Given USPS' importance to residents and businesses in the tri-county area and beyond, I'd like to offer some facts.

For starters, the Postal Service operates in the black — \$3.7 billion since 2013. Operating profit for Fiscal Year 2017's first quarter alone was \$522 million. This is all earned revenue; by law USPS gets no tax dollars.

As the economy gradually improves, letter revenue is stabilizing. And as the internet drives online shopping in Fenton and elsewhere, package revenue is rising sharply — up 16 percent in 2016.

There is red ink but it stems from congressional politics. In 2006, a lame-duck Congress mandated that the Postal Service pre-fund future retiree health benefits. No other entity has to do this even one year in advance; USPS must prefund these benefits decades into the future. That \$5.8 billion annual charge is the 'red ink.'

USPS is the centerpiece of a \$1.3 trillion national mailing industry employing 7 million Americans in the private sector, including 266,223 Michiganders. It's also the nation's largest civilian employer of military veterans.

If Michigan's elected representatives in Washington act on postal reform that addresses pre-funding while strengthening the invaluable postal network, the Postal Service can continue to provide residents and businesses with the industrial world's most affordable delivery services.

4 shooting death of Brady Alan Morris, 18, in Akl's Fenton Township home on Lake Fenton. He's also charged with receiving and concealing a stolen firearm, and two counts of felony firearm.

Akl is being charged as an adult and he remains jailed as bond was denied.

According to investigative reports from the Genesee County Sheriff's Office, at approximately 11 p.m., on March 4, law enforcement personnel from the sheriff's office and Fenton Police Department were dispatched to a home at 14170 Moffett Dr. in Fenton Township in response to a 911 call of a male with a gunshot wound to the head. Akl was immediately taken into custody

and a semi-automatic pistol was found on the front porch and secured by police.

The two teens, who were friends, were alone on the first floor of the residence when the shooting occurred and other members of Akl's family and one other guest were on the second and third floors.

According to the autopsy report, it appears that Morris was shot from behind at point blank range on the top left side of his head.

The court appearance on Thursday was set for Akl's pre-trial conference. However, Manley asked to postpone the pre-trial and preliminary exam, and instead send Akl to the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services Center for Forensic Psychiatry in Saline for a competency exam.

"We've found that Akl suffers from post-traumatic stress disorder. He's had prior incidents that have come to our attention," said Manley. He added that Akl may suffer from bipolar disorder.

"His current symptoms are such that it's difficult, if not impossible, to discuss this very serious matter with Mr. Akl in order to provide him with a defense."

Manley said that Akl and Morris were best friends at the time, and when he attempted to discuss the details of the event, "He breaks down, becomes emotional and is incapable of discussing the fact of the matter with his counsel."

Manley said there were several reasons to postpone the pretrial exam and have Akl tested for competency.

Assistant Prosecuting Attorney Lia Perryman had no objection and McCabe ordered that Akl be sent to be tested.

McCabe set a date of Friday, May 26, at 9 a.m. in his courtroom to review the results. *Editor Sharon Stone contributed to this story*.


