

Kellogg's... the history behind our morning cereal

The world's largest cereal maker began as a health food for patients at Battle Creek sanitarium

When you think of your morning bowl of cereal, perhaps you recall the Snap! Crackle! Pop! of Rice Krispies or the booming voice of Tony the Tiger saying "They're Great!!" with each bite of Frosted Flakes.

What you may not know is that today's popular cereal brands got their start from the accidental discovery of Kellogg's Corn Flakes behind the walls of Battle Creek's sanitarium

in the late 1800s.
John Harvey
Kellogg and
Will Keith
Kellogg were
brothers from
a SeventhDay Adventist
family in Battle
Creek.

According to
Historytoday.com, John
got his medical degree from the
University of Michigan Medical
School, and was a fanatical
advocate of a healthy lifestyle,
which he believed included
vegetarianism, absti nence
from alcohol, tobacco, tea,
coffee, condiments and even
sex, plus minimal quantities of
eggs and dairy products.

He became president of an Adventist sanitarium at Battle Creek in his mid-20s, providing a place for people to restore their health. Former patients there included Mary Todd Lincoln, the widow of Abraham Lincoln; Henry Ford, President Warren G. Harding, pilot Amelia Earhart and James Cash Penney, founder of JC Penney department stores.

The sanitarium, listed on the National Register of Historic Places, is now a federal office, the Hart-Dole-Inouye Federal Center.

The Kellogg brothers continued to invent healthy meatless breakfast foods for sanitarium patients before

accidentally concocting
a process that
allowed wheat to
flake in 1894.
Two years

later, corn flakes were formulated and they became an immediate success.

Charles W illiam
Post g ot in on the a ct
while recuper ating fr om a
nervous breakdown at the
sanitarium. He was inspired
to open his open spa and
continued his interest in coffee
products and breakfast foods.
By 1897, he was selling what
is today sold as Grape-Nuts and
his own brand of corn flakes,
Post Toasties.

Today, Kellogg's and Minnesota-based General Mills dominate the cereal industry in the U.S., each with about 30 percent of the market.

Worldwide, Kellogg's is the largest cereal maker.

In 2015, Post Foods purchased the former Malt-O-Meal Co., creating the third lagest cereal company in the U.S. Now known as Post Consumer Brands, they are headquartered in Lakeville, Minnesota.

Kellogg's is still headquartered in Battle Creek, but has branched out into cookies, crackers, toaster

pastries, cereal bars, fruit-flavored snacks and frozen waffles, manufacturing products in 18 countries and selling to 130 countries around the globe.

SUMMARY

Michigan is proud to be the home of Kellogg's in Battle Creek, the world's largest cereal manufacturer.

The Battle Creek manufacturer. plant used to allow company tours, retiring them in 1986 for safety reasons. Kellogg's Cereal City-USA, a tourist attraction opened in 1998 to tell the Kellogg's story in a hands-on museum format, closed in 2007.

Today, visitors to Battle Creek can learn the Kellogg story by visiting the John Harvey Kellogg Discovery Center at 480 Van Buren St. W.

Ninety percent of U.S. households still buy cereal, but new breakfast favorites have come into the marketplace, from protein smoothies to Greek yogurt and frozen waffles. However, cereal is still the main



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10 REJECTED CEREALS



This cereal, which came out in the '70s, featured an off flavor - grape. The food looked like purple cheerios, with little "grape starbits." The mascot was a fictional knighted man who enjoyed flying an airplane with no hands.

SUGAR CORN-FETTI

Featuring a typical pirate with a round belly, peg leg, and an eye patch, Sugar Corn-Fetti tried to use ads to sell




the product. However, marketing a product and blatantly saying it's coated in sugar turned out to be a bad idea.

FRUIT BRUTE


Even cereal can be too scary for

When it comes to weird mascots, Cecil the GSGL machine might take the cake. He could only make cereal when he was annoyed, and parents didn't buy in to that.



FREAKIES

Having a bowl


of Freakies for breakfast doesn't sound that desirable, and the cereal eventually died out. It featured alien goblins by the name of Gargle, Cowmumble, Grumble, Hamhose, Snorkeldorf, Goody-Goody and their leader, Boss Moss.



PRINCE OF **THIEVES**

Mascots are

supposed to be involved in the cereal in some way, but the Prince of Thieves was not. He was seen, in full archer garb, ready to shoot an arrow on the cereal boxes. Parents preferred brands less likely toencourage theirkid to shoot arrows at people.



MR. WONDERFUL'S SURPRISE

This cereal relied on the pull of a "surprise" in the center of each piece of cereal, which was just a chocolate or vanilla center. The biggest surprise was when consumers opened the boxes to find that the crispies tended to burst, and the inside was coated with chocolate



DINERSAURS

What could have been a prehistoric fantasyland became a band of

dinosaur food servers serving food out of one of their friends, who was made into a makeshift cafe.



CRUNCHY LOGGS

This sweetened corn and oat cereal were shaped like logs, which proved to be too weird for consumers. It

featured a beaver in human clothes eating the cereal, but it never took off.

MAGIC PUFFS

General Mills tried to promote Magic Puffs as their neutral cereal filled with a mysterious c ream. But when the mascot became

a talking hat, the cereal flopped.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF LINDEN ADOPTING THE 2012 EDITION OF THE INTERNATIONAL FIRE CODE, REGULATING AND GOVERNING SAFE-GUARDING OF LIFE AND PROPERTY FROM FIRE AND EXPLOSION HAZARDS ARISING FROM THE STORAGE, HANDLING AND USE OF HAZARDOUS SUBSTANCES, MATERIALS, DEVICES, AND FROM CONDITIONS HAZARDOUS TO LIFE OR PROPERTY IN THE OCCUPANCY OF BUILDINGS AND PREMISES IN THE CITY OF LINDEN; PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUANCE OF PERMITS AND COLLECTING OF FEES THEREFOR; REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES AND PARTS OF THE ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT THEREWITH; EFFECTIVE DATE.

THE CITY OF LINDEN ORDAINS:

Chapter 15.06

FIRE CODE ADOPTED

Sections:

15.06.010 Adoption of fire code 15.06.020 Revisions 15.06.030 Repealing clause 15.06.040 Savings clause

Section 15.06.010 Adoption of Fire Code. A certain document, three (3) copies of which are on file in the office of the City Clerk of the City of Linden, being marked and designated as the International Fire Code, 2012 Edition, including Appendix Chapters as published by the International Code Council, be and is hereby adopted as the Fire Code of the City of Linden, in the State of Michigan regulating and governing the safeguarding of life and property from fire and explosion hazards arising from the storage, handling and use of hazardous substances, materials and devices, and from conditions hazardous to life or property in the occupancy of buildings and premises as herein provided; providing for the issuance of permits and collection of fees therefore; and each and all of the regulations, provisions, penalties, conditions and terms of said Fire Code on file in the office of the City of Linden and hereby referred to, adopted and made part hereof, as if fully set out in the Ordinance, with the additions, insertions, deletions and changes, if any prescribed in Section 15.06.020 of the City of Linden Municipal Code.

<u>Section 15.06.030 Repealing Clause.</u> All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 15.06.040 Severability Clause. That if any section, subsection, sentence, clause or phrase if this ordinance is, for any reason, held to be unconstitutional, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this ordinance. The City of Linden hereby declares that it would have passed this ordinance, and each section, subsection, clause or phrase thereof, irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, sentences, clauses, and phrases be declared unconstitutional.

<u>Section 15.06.050 Savings Clause.</u> That nothing in this ordinance or in the Fire Code hereby adopted shall be construed to affect any suit or proceeding pending in any court, or any rights acquired, or liability incurred, or any causes of action acquired or existing, under any act or ordinance hereby repealed as cited in Section 15.06.030 of this City of Linden Municipal Code; nor shall any just or legal right or remedy of any character be lost, impaired or affected by this ordinance.

<u>Publication:</u> That the City Clerk is hereby ordered and directed to cause this ordinance to be published on April 9, 2017.

Effective Date. This ordinance shall become effective on April 20, 2017.

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND TITLE 15 – SECTION 15.04 TO ADOPT THE 2015 MICHIGAN BUILDING CODE INCLUDING THE 2015 MICHIGAN RESIDENTIAL CODE WHICH ESTABLISHES MINIMUM REGULATIONS GOVERNING THE DESIGN, CONSTRUCTION, ALTERATION, ENLARGEMENT, REPAIR, DEMOLITION, REMOVAL, MAINTENANCE AND USE OF ALL BUILDINGS AND STRUCTURES; AND TO REPEAL ANY AND ALL INCONSISTENT ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HEREWITH; EFFECTIVE DATE.

THE CITY OF LINDEN ORDAINS:

Section 15.04.010 Adoption of Building Code. That a certain document, three (3) copies of which are on file in the office of the city clerk, city of Linden, being marked and designated as the "2015 Michigan Building Code" including the "2015 Michigan Residential Code" and the "2015 Michigan Rehabilitation Code for Existing Buildings", as published, by the Michigan Department of Consumer Industry & Industry Services, is hereby adopted as the building code of the city of Linden, Genesee County, Michigan; for control of buildings and structures as herein provided; and each and all of the regulations, provisions, penalties, conditions and terms of said 2015 MICHIGAN BUILDING CODE including the 2015 MICHIGAN RESIDENTIAL CODE and the 2015 MICHIGAN REHABILITATION CODE FOR EXISTING BUILDINGS are hereby referred to, adopted and made part hereof, as if fully set out in this ordinance.

<u>Section 15.04.030 Repealing Clause.</u> All other ordinances of the city of Linden or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 15.04.040 Severability Clause. That if any section, subsection, sentence, clause or phrase if this ordinance is, for any reason, held to be unconstitutional, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this ordinance. The City of Linden hereby declares that it would have passed this ordinance, and each section, subsection, clause or phrase thereof, irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, sentences, clauses, and phrases be declared unconstitutional.

<u>Section 15.04.050</u> Savings Clause. Nothing in the ordinance or in the building code hereby adopted shall be construed to affect any suit or proceeding in any court or any rights acquired or liability incurred, or any cause or causes of acquired or existing, under any act or ordinance hereby repealed as cited in Section 15.04.030 of this ordinance; nor shall any just or legal right or remedy of any character be lost, impaired, or affected by this ordinance.

<u>Publication:</u> That the City Clerk is hereby ordered and directed to cause this ordinance to be published on April 9, 2017.

<u>Effective Date.</u> This ordinance shall be published as required by law and shall become effective on April 20, 2017.

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Bed sores linked to serious health problems

DEAR DR. ROACH:

I am 89 years old and just learned that I have the first stages of bed sores on my buttocks. My dermatologist said that I should stay off of it as much as possible and apply hydrocortisone cream. I have COPD, and I need to sleep sitting up. I wonder if you have any other suggestions to help my pain and discomfort. — A.A.



ANSWER:

Bed sores (also called pressure ulcers) are potentially serious problems that require immediate attention. We "stage" bed sores into four categories. Hopefully you have stage one, where there is skin redness, usually over a bony prominence such as the sacrum, the hand-shaped bone at the base of the spine. A stage two bed sore may be a shallow, open ulcer or a blister. At stage three there is full-thickness loss of the skin, while a stage four has exposed muscle or bone. Sometimes, it is impossible to stage ulcers from their appearance alone. A stage one bed sore often is treated with a clear film for protection. Hydrocortisone cream is surprising to me, since steroids can thin the skin when used excessively, which you certainly don't want to do. The pain should be treated, but you should be taking this as your body's warning that there is a problem. The key to preventing further injury is to find a way to take pressure off the area. Sleeping sitting up puts all your weight on your lower back, buttocks and thighs, which in turn puts these areas at a high risk for pressure ulcers. There are several ways to combat this, including different kinds of mattresses and pads, and

even a device that adjusts automatically to pressure. Changing positions frequently (every two hours or less) is critical if you are not using a special mattress or pad. There are wound-management specialists, both nurses and doctors, with expertise for your particular situation. I would ask your doctor about finding and consulting with one. People with COPD are at high risk for poor nutrition, and making sure you are getting adequate

protein and calories is critical, as poor nutrition is a big risk for serious bed sores. I strongly recommend a visit with a nutritionist. Also, perhaps your COPD treatment could be optimized to make it easier to sleep in a supine (lying-down) position. This means a revisit with your regular doctor or the consultant doctor who is treating your COPD.

DEAR DR.ROACH:

I am writing to you regarding your recent column about psoriasis. My husband spent most of his life suffering from severe psoriasis, until he was told of an all-natural solution: cilantro. In a matter of a few months he was completely symptom-free, and remains so after more than a year. He simply adds a few sprigs of cilantro to a garden salad once a day. —J.L.

ANSWER:

I also have read that eating fresh cilantro helps psoriasis. I couldn't find any study that looked at this, and people responding to online support groups reported mixed results. However, it is very safe and might be worth a try.



Cat's bad breath defies treatment

DEAR PAW'S CORNER:

My cat "Sheena" has had horrible bad breath for the past six months, and

nothing seems to help. She is almost 14 years old, spayed and in good health. I supplement her diet occasionally with a pill — brewer's yeast and garlic — crushed up in her food. I also use special dental-care dry foods and dentalcare treats. I brush her teeth (when she lets me) and massage her gums. I also put parsley in her vet 1000 occasionany. What else can I try? -Deborah W., via email



DEAR DEBORAH:

From your email it appears that Sheena sees the vet regularly, which is important for senior pets in particular. While bad breath (halitosis) often is due to dental problems like gingivitis — where bacteria builds up in the mouth around the

gums and contributes to a foul odor other conditions like diabetes, digestive disorders, cancer and even sinus inflam-

> mation have bad breath as a symptom. So make sure cats with chronic halitosis get a complete exam to rule out other underlying issues. As for home solutions to simple halitosis: You're doing all the right things. However, as Sheena ages, her immune system might make her more vulnerable to gum disease. Keep it up, especially massaging her gums and trying to brush her teeth. Instead of a brush, you

could try swiping her teeth with a cotton ball or very soft cloth soaked in warm water, a gentle swipe from the gum line downward. Additionally, be careful with the amount of brewer's yeast and garlic you give her daily, because garlic is toxic to cats. Follow the right dosage for her weight.

Cajun shrimp in foil

Yield: 4 Servings. Serving Size: 1 packet

INGREDIENTS:

- 1 tablespoon Caiun or Creole seasoning
- 24 (1 pound) cleaned large shrimp
- 3 ounces fully cooked Turkey/Chicken Andouille sausage (Applegate), very thinly sliced
- 1 medium zucchini (8 ounces each), sliced into 1/4-inch thick rounds
- 1 large red bell pepper, seeded and cut into thin
- 1 1/2 cups corn kernels
- 1/4 cup chopped fresh Italian parsley leaves
- 1/4 cup chopped fresh basil leaves
- 1/4 cup dry white wine, such as Pinot Grigio
- 2 tablespoon olive oil


- 1. In a medium bowl, combine the Cajun seasoning, salt, and pepper. Add the shrimp and toss to coat.
- 2. Place 4 large (10 x 18-inch) pieces of heavy-duty aluminum foil on a flat surface.
- 3. Divide the sausage, zucchini, bell peppers, and corn among the foil pieces, placing the vegetables in the center of each. Top each with shrimp (about 6), sprinkle each with 1 tablespoon of the parsley and 1 tablespoon of the basil.
- 4. Drizzle each with 1 tablespoon of the wine and about 1/2 tablespoon of the oil. Fold each piece of the foil to form a packet, sealing tightly and leaving a little room inside for air to circulate in the packet. The packets may be refrigerated (or frozen) at this stage.
- 5. To cook, preheat the oven to 425F. Arrange the packets on a baking sheet and cook until the shrimp is cooked through and the vegetables are crisp-tender, 13 minutes. Open the packets slowly, being careful of the hot steam. Transfer the shrimp, vegetables, and sauce that has accumulated to individual bowls or rimmed plates.

To freeze and heat:

- **1.** Place uncooked packets into sealable plastic bags, keeping them level and upright. (Two packets fit well into a gallon sized bag). Freeze for up to two (2) months.
- 2. There is no need to thaw before cooking.
- 3. Remove the frozen packets from the bags and place them on a baking tray in a cold oven set to 425F.
- 4. Once the oven comes to temperature, continue to cook for 35-40 minutes.

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
