Home grown, locally owned greenhouses in full bloom for Mother's Day

news@tctimes.com; 810-629-8282 Shirley Carlson is a mother and grandmother, but she'll be working on a holiday when most mothers are being taken out to dinner and given flowers to celebrate.

She's got plenty of flowers.

As the matriarch of **Carlson's Greenhouse** in Fenton Township, Shirley, and her husband, Ron, started their business more than 35 years ago and it has blossomed into one of the area's largest floral family businesses.

She and Ron, daughters Tammy and Michele and Tammy's husband, Scott, plus other "family" staff, will be carting out huge hanging baskets, bedding plants and planted containers for hundreds of customers throughout Mother's Day weekend. These blooms are all grown onsite in their huge greenhouse network, except for their tropical plants, including palm trees and Mandevilla.

"It's our biggest holiday for flowers and hanging baskets," said Tammy Carlson-Gregory. "Our latest thing is an air plant terrarium, very popular

for Mother's Day."

Mother's Day is traditionally one of the busiest holidays for local greenhouses, contributing to huge May volumes, thanks to warmer gardening weather and Memorial Day Weekend — the traditional

start of Michigan's gardening season. At **Zaiser Gardens** in Gaines, Mark and Tra-

cy Zaiser are a staff of just two, with more than 20 years of greenhouse ownership. They specialize in handcrafted planters made by Mark, and filled to the brim with bountiful blooms. Their main specialty is bedding and container plants, including geraniums, petunias, Lantana (in the verbena family) and SunPatiens.

Tracy's gardening advice for this spring: Make sure the frost danger is over before planting. "It has been a challenging growing year so far, with cold temperatures, rain, a recent hard frost, etc.," she said.

Thinking about Mom

Happy Mother's Day to all the great moms in my life — my sisters, mother of my stepsons, mother-in-law, friends and coworkers. Without knowing it, each one of you has in some way taught me something about being a good mother and for that I thank you.

I can't help but think about my own mother, Elli Pforr. She died on April 7, 2008 at the age of 79, four years after suffering a debilitating stroke, one that affected her ability to speak clearly. She and my father were retired in Arizona. After her stroke, it was very difficult to visit with her over the phone. I would speak and she would answer in gibberish.

It broke my heart because I know there were times that I must have said something inappropriate or said 'yes' to something negative because I didn't know what she was talking about.

When my mother broke her hip and needed surgery, I arranged to fly to



Phoenix on Friday, April 4, 2008. I spent the entire day at Detroit Metro. My flight kept getting postponed because of mechanical difficulties. I could not get on another flight that day and eventually went home. I called my sisters and they assured me that the doctor



said she would be OK, and it would be safe for me to take another flight on Friday, April 11. On Monday,

April 7, my mom took a turn for the worse and I learned the horrible news that

she was not going to make it after all. Today, I still take great comfort in the fact that three hours before my mother died, my sister put her on the phone and Mom said very clearly, "I love you, Vera."

If your mother is still among the living, cherish her because things can change in a minute.

We often ask people for our Mother's Day coverage, "What is the best advice your mother ever gave you," or "What is the most important thing you've learned from your mother.'

One piece of great advice my mother gave me was to not sweat the small stuff and to choose bigger and more important battles. "Let it go," she used to say. "It's not worth it."

I didn't always follow that advice, being the one who would always fight tooth and nail for what I wanted or believed in. But I am getting better at it and she's right, some things are just not worth getting all worked up about.

Another important thing I learned from my mother is that being shy and grumpy are not options. My parents used to love going to outdoor fairs and festivals, especially when dancing, food and beer-drinking were involved.

To my dad's chagrin, my mother would almost always walk up to a long table of 25 to 30 strangers, strike up a conversation (usually by telling an offcolor joke) and join them for the rest of the event. She had the craziest laugh ever and people loved her. Although she's been gone for just over nine years, I can still remember her laugh.

My mother loved to tell jokes and if she couldn't memorize one on the spot, she would insist that the joke-teller write it down so she could study it later. Just one more time I wish I could call

my parent's house and say, "Hey Mom, did you hear the one about the ... "

In 1988. Roseanne Barr became a television star with her own sitcom, "Roseanne." Her realistic depiction of a tough, but tender, wise-cracking mom struck a cord with viewers. The show ran from 1988 to 1997. The show is centered on the Conners, an American working-class family struggling to get by on a limited household income. The family consisted of outspoken Roseanne, married to husband Dan, and their three children: Becky, Darlene, and DJ. Many critics considered the show notable as one of the first sitcoms to realistically portray a bluecollar American family with two parents working outside the home, as well as lead characters who were noticeably overweight without their weight being the target of jokes. Barr's real-life brother and sister are gay, which inspired her to push for introducing gay characters and issues into the show.

Before Steve and Kathy Mathews opened Heavenly Scent Herb Farm in Tyrone Township 29 years ago, Steve was a UPS driver and Kathy was a physical education teacher.

"I fell in love with five herbs, that was it," said Kathy. "It was my hobby, and this is what has happened."

Today, Heavenly Scent Herb Farm now includes a full retail store, gardens and greenhouses, a wedding/shower/festival venue and classes and workshops.

They are ready for Mother's Day with multiple greenhouses filled with uniquescented geraniums (peppermint, strawberry, lemon, apple), topiaries in shapes of shoes and purses and a reputation for the largest hanging baskets in the area. Their petunias even have a touch of the unusual, with one variety of purple with speckles.

"We try to carry different things," said Kathy, pointing to her black-eyed Susan vines in yellow and orange. "No one else has them, they're so cool."

Calvin said that Bordine's is best known for quality. "We grow everything we sell. We're really farmers. That's what we do."

For all these hard-working business owners who are also mothers at local greenhouses, this Sunday's holiday is worth the effort.

"I'll be working on Mother's Day and I wouldn't have it any other way," said Kathy Mathews of Heavenly Scent Herb Farm.

LOOKING BACK at this week in NATIONAL HISTORY

MAY 14

1948: Three-year-old June Devaney, recovering from pneumonia at Queen's Park Hospital in Blackburn, England, is kidnapped from her bed. Nurses discovered her missing at 1:20 a.m. the next day, and police were immediately summoned to investigate. Two hours later, her body was found with multiple skull fractures. The medical examiner determined that Devaney had been raped and then swung headfirst into a wall. Two clues were found in the children's ward, footprints on the floor and a water bottle. After collecting over 40,000 sets of finger prints, police caught up with Peter Griffiths. When his prints came back a match, he confessed to the awful crime, blaming it on alcohol. Griffiths was found guilty of murder and was executed on Nov. 19, 1948.

MAY 15

1942: Gasoline rationing began in 17 Eastern states as an attempt to help the American war effort during World War II. By the end of the year, President Franklin D. Roosevelt had ensured that mandatory gasoline rationing was in effect in all 50 states.

MAY 16

1770: At Versailles, Louis, the French dauphin, marries Marie Antoinette, the daughter of Austrian Archduchess Maria Theresa and Holy Roman Emperor Francis I. France hoped their marriage would strengthen its alliance with Austria, its longtime enemy. In 1774, with the death of King Louis XV, Louis and Marie were crowned king and queen of France. Marie allegedly responded to the news that the impoverished French peasantry had no food to eat by declaring "Let them eat cake.

MAY 18



2016 Water Quality Report for the Village of Holly

This report covers the drinking water quality for the Village of Holly for the 2016 calendar year. This information is a snapshot of the quality of the water that we provided to you in 2016. Included are details about where your water comes from, what it contains, and how it compares to Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and state standards.

Your water comes from four (4) wells located on the West side of town. Wells are ap¬proximately 210 feet deep and are embedded into sand stone (Marshall Formation). The State performed an assessment of our source water in 2003. The susceptibility rating is on a seven-tiered scale from "very-low" to "very-high" based on geologic sensitivity, well construction, water chemistry and contamination sources. The susceptibility of our source is moderately high.

Several existing sources of contamination exist in the Holly Wellhead Protection area:

Leaking Underground Storage Tank (LUST) sites are located at Adelphian Academy, 820 Academy Road; Village of Holly, 201 Elm Street; Holly Area Schools, 800 Elm Street; Fresh Air Society, 4236 Grange Hall Road; Holly Volunteer Ambulance, 504 Maple Street; Mobil Oil, 15241 North Holly Road; Muffler Man of Holly, 503 North Saginaw; Wilkinson's Auto Repair, 402 North Saginaw; Mabel O. Barnes Trust, 1125 North Saginaw Street; Holly Gas Company Inc., 114 North Saginaw; Beacon & Bridge Market, 820 North Saginaw; and Larry Winklemann, 220 Elm Street.

Four Part 201 sites of environmental contamination include Delta Tube and Fabrication Corporation, 4149 Grange Hall Road; Carl Spencer, 422 North Saginaw Street; Larry Winklemann, 220 Elm Street; and E and S Trucking, 15391 Fish Lake Road.

Potential sources of contamination include Underground Storage Tank (UST) sites, Aboveground Storage Tank (AST) sites, and groundwater discharge permit sites. Abandoned wells provide a direct conduit for surface run-off and contaminants to easily reach the groundwater and may pose a potential problem. To ensure that these wells are not a potential threat, they should be searched and properly plugged.

We are making efforts to protect our sources by participating in the Wellhead Protection Program.

- Contaminants and their presence in water: Drinking Water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the EPA's Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).
- Vulnerability of sub-populations: Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immunocompromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune systems disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. EPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by Cryptosporidium and other microbial contaminants are available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).
- **Sources of drinking water:** The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. Our water comes from wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally-occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.
- Contaminants that may be present in source water include:
- Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations and wildlife.
- * **Inorganic contaminants,** such as salts and metals, which can be naturally-occurring or result from urban storm water runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining or farming.
- * **Pesticides and herbicides**, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture and residential uses.
- Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.
- Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can come from gas stations, urban storm water runoff, and septic systems.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations that limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. Food and Drug Administration regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water which provide the same protection for public health.

Water Quality Data

The table below lists all the drinking water contaminants that we detected during the 2016 calendar year. The presence of these contaminants in the water does not necessarily indicate that the water poses a health risk. Unless otherwise noted, the data presented in this table is from testing done January 1 – December 31, 2016. The State allows us to monitor for certain contaminants less than once per year because the concentrations of these contaminants are not expected to vary significantly from year to year. All of the data is representative of the water quality, but some are more than one year old.

Terms and abbreviations used below:

- Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG): The level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.
- Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL): The highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.
 - Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level (MRDL): means the highest level of a disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that addition of a disinfectant is necessary for control of microbial contaminants. Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level Goal (MRDLG): means the level of a drinking water disinfectant below
 - which there is no known or expected risk to health. MRDLGs do not reflect the benefits of the use of disinfectants to control microbial contaminants.
 - N/A: Not applicable ND: not detectable at testing limit ppb: parts per billion or micrograms per liter ppm: parts per million or milligrams per liter pCi/I: picocuries per liter (a measure of radioactivity).
 - Action Level: The concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements that a water system must follow.

In the 2015 Consumer Confidence Report the copper level was reported in ppm (parts per million) instead of the required ppb (parts per billion). This was corrected and a revised CCR was issued for the Village of Holly in September 2016. This error did not result in any violations or health risks to the public.

* While your drinking water meets EPA's standard for arsenic, it does contain low levels of arsenic. EPA's standard balances the current understanding of arsenic's possible health effects against the costs of removing arsenic from drinking water. EPA continues to research the health effects of low levels of arsenic, which is a mineral known to cause cancer in humans at high concentrations and is linked to other health effects such as skin damage and circulatory problems.

** Unregulated contaminants are those for which EPA has not established drinking water standards. Monitoring helps EPA to determine where certain contaminants occur and whether it needs to regulate those contaminants.

*** Information about lead: If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. The Village of Holly is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to have your water tested. 
