



■ History of the classic cocktail (gin and vermouth) is debated amongst drinkers

weekend drinking for Monday in honor of National Martini Day on June 19.

Coincidentally, one of the most popular places for drinks, The Relief & Resource Co., already has deals on martinis on Mondays, according to head bartender and co-owner Jon Foley.

The word "martini" has a different definition depending on if you ask a bartender or not.

"I define that term far more strictly than most people who work in bars," Foley said.

He said a lot of people define a martini as any drink that comes in a martini glass, but it's actually a specific drink consisting of gin, vermouth, and some type of garnish, usually an olive or lemon zest. The drink is either salty or has a hint of citrus. Foley prefers his with lemon zest.

Martinis in movies are often shown in the hand

of a gorgeous, wealthy woman drinking a martini in an elegant bathrobe with fake fur. They're reguthe history of cocktails larly consumed at bars and at home. Today, half of were deciding the hisall cocktails are served in a martini glass, according to punchbowl.com. The Relief &

Resource Co. has a special on tradi-

tional martinis for \$6 Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday.

"For two ingredients, that garnish is kind of important. It adds flavor," he said

They have an industry special on Monday, meaning people who work in the same business get a deal on martinis. "They like gin," he said.

Tanqueray is popular at The Relief & Resource Co., which is dry gin. Foley said they're fond of Botanist. a gin that's made in Scotland with 22

different botanicals.

Foley said the martini was invented sometime in the 1870s or 80s.

"There's debate over when it was exactly invited, but it coincided with when vermouth hit America," he said. "Traditionally, the French are the ones who make dry vermouth. Italians are known for sweet vermouth."

The first printed recipe for a "Martinez" cocktail was in a bartending manual published in San Francisco in 1887. Although, many believe the drink was developed on

the East Coast.

In 1911, Martini di Arma di Taggia, a bartender in New York City, served drinks that consisted of gin, vermouth, orange bitters and an olive garnish. It gained popularity among drinkers, partiers, and the high class.

The most expensive martini costs over \$60,000. It was created in a Scottish distillery.

The martini glass, with the thin neck and wide-opening saucer, was invented before the actual drink. Bartenders used the martini glass for many other drinks and was popular during the Prohibition.

> "The problem with the history of cocktails is that people who were

deciding the history of cocktails were drinking," Foley said. Those people never let a lie get in the way of a good story. Cocktail history is about 50 percent true story and 50 percent BS."

Some martiniloving notable people and literary icons include John

D. Rockefeller, Humphrey Bogart, Franklin D. Roosevelt, Clark Gable, Ernest Hemingway, F. Scott Fitzgerald, E.B. White, William Churchill, Dorothy Parker, and James Bond.

"I encourage people to try the original gin martini, not only the fruity drinks that come in the glasses. There's something to be said for the classic cocktail that's been around for 145 years. It's still around for a reason," he said.

INGREDIENTS

Crust

- 4oz unsalted butter, softened
- 1/4 cup granulated sugar
- 1 cup all-purpose flour

• 1/4 tsp salt

- Filling
- 3 eggs
- 1 1/2 cups granulated sugar
- Grated lemon zest from 1 lemon
- 1/2 cup freshly squeezed lemon juice
- 1/2 cup all-purpose flour
- · Confectioners sugar for dusting

DIRECTIONS

1. First, preheat your oven to 350 deg F and line a 9×9 inch baking pan with parchment paper. Prepare your crust by mixing together the softened butter, sugar and salt. Once you have a smooth mixture, add in the flour and mix until you get a soft dough. Press the dough into your prepared baking pan, then let it chill in the fridge until your oven is ready. Bake the crust for 15 – 20 minutes, until it is just slightly golden brown. 2. Let the crust chill and prepare your filling. Whisk together the eggs, granulated sugar, lemon zest and juice and flour and pour over the chilled crust. Bake (at 350 degrees F. again) for 35 - 40 minutes, or until the middle no longer jiggles. Let cool completely and dust with confectioners' sugar before serving.

13 quirky facts about companion animals

Think you know everything there is to know about your favorite furry, finned or feathered friend? Chances are there are some interesting facts that even the most ardent animal-lover may be surprised to learn.



- 1. Tough tongue: Cats' tongues are covered with little structures called "filiform papillae," which are like tiny hooks pointing toward the throat. These hook-like structures help hold food while a cat is eating. The papillae also help with grooming. Humans can feel these barbs when licked by cats.
- 2. Seeing spots: Dalmatians are born all white. Their spots will develop within the first few weeks of life and can be black. brown or liver colored.
- 3. Sleepy time: Cats are born loungers and will spend on average 16 hours of the day snoozing. Only sloths spend more time asleep.
- 4. Send a message: Fish do not have vocal chords, but they can use low-pitched moans, grunts, hisses, and wails to communicate with one another.
- 5. Watch the eyes: Pet birds can communicate feelings through their pupils. If pupils are dilated, the bird is calm. Pinprick-sized pupils mean birds are agitated and may bite.

- 6. Meeeoooowww: Cats only meow to communicate with humans, not amongst themselves.
- 7. Seeing colors: Dogs are not color blind as once presumed. They can see colors, just not as vividly as humans.
- 8. Kindle, not just for reading: A group of kittens is called a "kindle," while a group of cats is a "clowder."
- 9. Almost wild: Dogs are so genetically similar to wolves that they can interbreed.
- 10. Noseprints: Cats' and dogs' noses are unique, just like human finger-
- 11. Fishy growth rings: Fish do not add new scales as they grow. The scales increase in size and form growth rings that can reveal the age of the fish.
- 12. Not domesticated: Birds are not domesticated. They're still rather wild and must be taught acceptable pet behavior.
- 13. Barkless: Many dogs do not actively bark. One dog that rarely ever barks is the Basenji, due to a narrow larynx. It can yodel, however!


