Several readers have already sent in photos and shared stories with our reporters of where they were and what they remember from that day 10 years ago.



### Changing trends in giving birth

Midwifery is on the rise, and more expectant mothers are pre-planning every detail

The way a baby grows in the womb won't change. The way the parents plan for the birth, however, is evolving.

Many new mothers and fathers create what is called a birth plan. According to babycenter.com, this is a plan that an expectant mother or couple makes that outlines what they would like to happen in the delivery room.

Stanley Frye, MD, OB/GYN at McLaren Hospital in Flint, said he does encourage expectant mothers to have a plan, but plans will change if there's an emergency.

"It's great to have a plan. But I'm there to make sure everything's OK. I don't want them to have a really strict birth plan because emergencies can happen any minute," he said.

This birth plan contains information on who you want in the room while in labor, while actually giving birth, and who should be in the room directly after the delivery. The mother can write down what pain medication she wants, if any, such as an epidural.

"If they want to play music, have the lighting a certain way, I don't care as long as the mom and the baby are safe because it's not about me," he said.

Mothers can write down what kind of atmosphere they want, whether it's a vocally supportive team with nurses who shout encouragements, or a quiet-as-possible room. Mothers can identify what preferred position they want to deliver in, whether it's squatting,

semi-sitting, lying on their side, or on their hands and knees.

"If they want to do different positions and changes, I have no problem with that," he said. Frye said people want to be able to get up and walk around, use a birthing ball, or walk the hallways.

"They don't want to be strapped down

on their back. I think that's wonderful," he said.

On the form, mothers can describe what they would like to happen in the event of a C-section, like who she wants in the room for it. Mothers can write down if they want to hold their baby with skin-to-skin

contact directly after giving birth. People can specify what they want to happen with the umbilical cord, and if someone in particular wants to cut it.

However, in an emergency, the plan may be ignored. "I want to see that screaming, healthy child that they're going to love and cherish and

make fond memories with over the next 40, 50 years," he said.

Another trend is more people are choosing to use midwives instead of doctors. According to CNN, the number of babies born in birth centers has increased 56 percent since 2007.

• The average age of new mothers is rising.

In 2000, the average age of new moms was 25, according to the National Center for Health Statistics.

In 2014, the average age was a little over 26.

In 2016, the average age to have a child was 28.

- After a downward trend of low birth weight, the number of babies born at less than 5-pounds, 8-ounces, rose from 8 percent in 2014 to 8.07 percent in 2015, according to the CDC. However, women are still giving birth to big babies. A woman in Florida gave birth to a 13-pound, 5-ounce baby in June.
- The heaviest baby ever born was 22 pounds, 8 ounces, born to a woman in Italy, according to Guinness World Records.
- According to CBS, the oldest woman to give birth is a woman from India who was at least 70 years old. The oldest woman in America to give birth is Frieda Birnbaum, who gave birth to twin boys when she was 60 years old. Maria del Carmen Bousada de Lara of Spain gave birth to twin boys when she was 66, according to Guinness World Records.
- The most popular baby names of 2017 for girls are Emma, Olivia, Ava, and Isabella.

The most popular baby names for boys are Liam, Noah, Lucas, and Mason.

In 1997, the most popular names for girls were Emily, Jessica, Ashley, and Sarah.

For boys, the most popular names were Michael, Jacob, Matthew, and Christopher.

In 1917, the most popular names were Mary, Helen, Dorothy, Margaret, John, William, James and Robert.



The Fenton Regional Chamber of Commerce hosted the event.

Shelly Day, executive director for the Chamber, said, "Everything went really smooth. Everyone seemed happy. We had a big crowd.'

Day estimated approximately 1,200-

1,300 people attended. They walked around, listened to live music, and ate food from local eateries.

"People came, they really stayed the whole evening," she said.

Attendees enjoyed food from Fenton businesses, such as The Laundry, Fenton Fire Hall, Beale St. Smokehouse BBQ, VG's and many others, and kids frequented the bounce house and got their faces painted.

Dozens of people gathered to watch the competitions. The Times livestreamed the annual pie-eating contest, hosted by CRUST, on its Facebook page.

Fergus Tighe, a 27-year-old from Ireland, won the competition, eating a pie with 590 blueberries, faster than anyone else. He won \$500.

"It was good. It was really good pie," he

said. He's currently on vacation with his girlfriend, visiting his brother who moved to Fenton from Ireland. They saw the sign for the competition at CRUST and entered.

"I'm a pretty big eater so I was pretty confident that I'd win," he said. "We have apple pie in Ireland. I was happy to mix it up with the blueberries."

### World continues to mourn the 'People's Princess'

### ■It's been 20 years since the crash in a Paris tunnel that claimed Princess Diana's life

The world wept when they learned the news on Aug. 31, 1997, that Princess Diana, loved by everyone whether they knew her or not, had died from injuries she sustained in an Aug. 30, 1997 car crash in a Paris tunnel.

She and her companion, Egyptian film producer Dodi Al-Fayed, who was killed instantly in the crash, were attempting to escape the paparazzi, who had been hounding the princess since she married Prince Charles in 1981.

To put things into perspective, Mother Teresa died five days later on Sept. 5, 1997. Sadly, her passing did not garner near the worldwide publicity as Princess Diana's death.

### **EARLY LIFE**

Born Diana Spencer on July 1, 1961, in Sandringham, England, Diana became Lady Diana Spencer after her father inherited the title of Earl Spencer in 1975. Her parents divorced when Diana was young, and her father was awarded custody of her and her siblings.

Although she was known for her shyness growing up, she did show an interest in music and dancing. Diana also had a great fondness for children. After attending finishing school at the Institut Alpin Videmanette in Switzerland, she moved to London. She began working with children, eventually becoming a kindergarten teacher at the Young England School.

Diana was no stranger to the British royal family, having reportedly played with

Prince Andrew and Prince Edward as a child while her family rented Park House, an estate owned by Queen Elizabeth II.

In 1977, she became re-acquainted with their older brother, Prince Charles, who was 13 years her senior.

### **MARRIAGE TO PRINCE CHARLES**

As the heir to the British throne, Prince Charles was usually the subject of media attention and his courtship of Diana was no exception. The press and the public were fascinated by this seemingly odd couple — the reserved, garden-loving

prince and the shy young woman with an interest in fashion and popular culture. When the couple married on July 29, 1981, the ceremony was broadcast on television around the world, with millions of people tuning in to see what many considered to be the wedding of the century.

For boys and girls, and many adults, it was a fairy tale come true.

On June 21, 1982, Diana and Charles had their first child—Prince William Arthur Philip Louis. Prince Henry Charles Albert David, affectionately known as

Prince Harry, came along on Sept. 15, 1984.

Princess Diana, or as many have since come to call her, "Princess Di," became overwhelmed by her royal duties and the intense media coverage of nearly every aspect of her life.

She began to develop and pursue her own interests. Diana served as a strong supporter of many charities and worked to help the homeless, people living with HIV and AIDS and children in need.

### **THE DIVORCE**

Sadly, the fairy tale wedding of Princess Diana and Prince Charles did not lead to a happily-ever-after marriage. The two became estranged over the years, and there were reports of infidelities on both sides. During their union, Diana struggled with depression and bulimia. The divorce was finalized in 1996.

### **AFTER THE DIVORCE**

Even after the divorce, Diana remained highly popular. She devoted herself to her sons and to such charitable efforts as the battle against the use of land mines.





### \$8.1-million renovation planned for local Mott campus

### **■**Construction is set to begin Spring 2019

The Southern Lakes Branch Center of Mott Community College (MCC) on Thompson Road in Fenton Township will undergo an \$8.1-million renovation.

"This renovation project will enable us to perform nearly a complete remodel of the building," said Larry Gawthrop, chief financial officer at MCC. "The renova-

tions will enhance and upgrade classroom facilities and laboratories, replace and improve the operating efficiency of heating and cooling systems, upgrade water supply and building fire safety systems, and re-

pair or replace exterior wall systems including exterior doors and windows."

The Michigan Department of Technology, Management and Budget approved the project, as part of the Capital Outlay Request process, with a request that the state and college each pay 50 percent of the cost. The state and the college will contribute \$4.05 million each.

This work will help MCC maintain its mission to provide high quality, accessible, and affordable educational opportunities, while ensuring energy efficiency and health and safety of its students, staff, and community well into the future," Gawthrop said.

The Southern Lakes Branch Center building contains the Law Enforcement Regional Training Academy, the physical therapy and occupational therapy degree programs, and general education classes, according to MCC. The college bought the building from Consumers Energy in 1991.

Diana used her international celebrity to help raise awareness about this issue.

### **HER DEATH**

Diana's 1997 romance with Al-Fayed caused quite a stir and created a media frenzy. While visiting Paris, the couple was involved in a car crash after trying to escape from the paparazzi on the night of Aug. 30, 1997.

Diana initially survived the crash, but later succumbed to her injuries at a Paris hospital a few hours later. Al-Fayed and the driver also were also killed, and a bodyguard was seriously injured. French authorities investigated the crash and the driver was found to have a high level of alcohol in his system at the time of the accident. The role of the pursuing photographers in the tragedy was also scrutinized.

News of her sudden, senseless death shocked the world. Thousands turned out to pay tribute to the "People's Princess" during her funeral procession. The funeral was held at Westminster Abbey and broadcast on television. Her body was later buried at her family's estate, Althorp.

### **HONORING THEIR MOTHER**

In 2007, marking the 10th anniversary of her death, her sons, Princes William and Harry, honored their beloved mother with a special concert to be held on what would have been her 46th birthday. The proceeds of the event went to charities supported by Diana and her sons.

Prince William and his wife Kate Middleton also remembered Diana when naming their second child, Princess Charlotte Elizabeth Diana, who was born on May 2, 2015.

Continuing her charitable efforts is the Diana, Princess of Wales Memorial Fund. Established after her death, the fund provides grants to numerous organizations and supports initiatives to provide care to the sick in Africa, help refugees, and stop the use of land mines.

### **TODAY**

Today, Prince William and Princess Kate are fiercely protective of their children, having pleaded early on for the paparazzi to give them their space. In return, Princess Kate, who is very handy with the camera herself, regularly releases photos of their children for the world to enjoy.





### LEGISLATIVE ACTIVITY

MichiganVotes.org is a free, non-partisan website created by the Mackinac Center for Public Policy to provide concise, non-partisan, plain-English descriptions of every bill and vote in the Michigan House and Senate. This report was released Friday, July 21. The Legislature is on a summer break with no sessions scheduled until Aug. 16. Rather than votes, this report contains some interesting or noteworthy legislative proposals to amend the constitution. To become law these require a two-thirds vote in the House and Senate and approval by voters.

### House Joint Resolution L: Allow private school vouchers for special needs children

Introduced by Rep. Tim Kelly (R), to place before voters in the next general election a constitutional amendment to require the state to provide financial support for children with special needs to attend the school of their choice, including a nonpublic school, up to the amount that would be provided if the child were enrolled in a regular public school. Referred to committee, no further action at this time.

### House Joint Resolution M: Eliminate state board of education

Introduced by Rep. Tim Kelly (R), to place before voters in the next general election a constitutional amendment that would eliminate the current structure of an elected state board of education that selects a superintendent of public instruction who also directs the state Department of Education, and replace it with a governor-appointed department director like other state departments. Referred to committee, no further action at this time.

### House Joint Resolution N: Reduce number of legislators

Introduced by Rep. Michael McCready (R), to place before voters in the next general election a constitutional amendment to change the number of state representative districts from the current 110 to 76, which is twice the number of state senate districts.

up to 10 years in prison and false report of a felony, punishable by up to four years in prison.

Winslow was arraigned on Monday, July 31. Bond was set at \$800,000. He remains in the Genesee County Jail.

Kathryn Marie Serra, 32, of Fenton Township has been charged with accessory after the fact, punishable by up to five years in prison; false report of a felony, punishable by up to four years in prison and resisting and obstructing police, punishable by up to two years in prison.

Serra was arraigned on July 31 and her bond was set at \$225,000.

The following are the details of what allegedly occurred the night of July 28.

The Genesee County Sheriff's Office, with assistance from Fenton police, responded to a home in the 3000 block of Bay View Drive off North Road in Fenton Township at approximately 2:30 a.m. on a report of a stabbing. The victim, identified as a 28-year-old man, who resides at the Bay View Drive address, had been stabbed multiple times in the face.

Responding officers found the victim outside the home with multiple stab wounds to his head, neck and face. He said his alleged attacker, Winslow, might have fled the scene. He added that his girlfriend, Serra, also was allegedly present during the attack but he did not know where she had gone.

Winslow and Serra were found a short time later near Lake Ponemah Mobile Home Park, approximately one-quarter mile away, by a Mt. Morris Township K-9 unit.

The sheriff's office investigation revealed that Winslow, Serra and the victim met when they were all patients in a psychiatric unit at a Flint hospital in April. The two men became romantically involved with Serra. The men had a falling out because of their relationships with Serra and Winslow moved to Caro.

According to the sheriff's office, the victim and Serra picked up Winslow in Bay City on July 27 and brought him back to the Bay View Drive home where they drank alcohol and took prescription medications.

The victim reported that Winslow at-

tacked him, unprovoked, with a box cutter and stabbed and slashed him in the head, neck and face multiple times inside the home.

Winslow and Serra told police, when they were apprehended, that the victim was attempting to sexually assault Serra and Winslow attacked him to defend Serra. Winslow and Serra both admitted later to investigators that they made up that story so Winslow would not be in trouble.

Forensic science investigators from the Michigan State Police Crime Lab, who specialize in blood spatter evidence, were called to the home to process the crime scene.

The victim was transported to Genesys Health Park in Grand Blanc Township by STAT EMS ambulance and Genesee County paramedics with lacerations and stab wounds to his head, neck and face. He was listed in serious condition upon his arrival, but was later upgraded to stable condition. He was released on July 30.

Fenton resident Kim Weber is traveling to Virginia for the event.

"My husband and son are fascinated by anything to do with space and our solar system," she said. "I am going with my husband, Joe Weber, son Eric Weber and his girlfriend, Sarah Farrar."

People in Michigan will be able to see a partial eclipse, not a full one. The total eclipse path, called the path of totality,

is only about 70 miles wide crossing the U.S. from West to East. It will start in Oregon at 9:05 a.m., and then go through Idaho, Wyoming, Montana, Nebraska, Iowa, Kansas, Missouri, Illinois, Kentucky, Tennessee, Georgia, and North and South Carolina. It will end in Charleston, South Carolina at 2:48 p.m.

Weber and her family are renting a home 50 miles from the path of totality and are driving to a viewing point to see the total eclipse.

In Michigan, 75 to 90 percent of the eclipse will be visible, meaning the moon will block 75 to 90 percent of the sun. In Fenton, the eclipse will start at approximately 1 p.m., and peak viewing time will be at 2:26 p.m. The moon will move past the sun by 3:46 p.m. Everyone in North

America, parts of South America, Africa and Europe will be able to see a partial eclipse.

"I believe the last one I've seen was in the early '90s. I was at fifth-grade camp with

our son, Jason, and one occurred," she said.

According to NASA this is first time

According to NASA, this is first time since 1979 the U.S. has seen a contiguous total eclipse.

It's dangerous to look directly at the sun without eye protection, except during totality. NASA recommends buying a filtering device that protects your eyes. Eclipse glasses are available on Amazon for less than \$20.

Weber said they might use a paper plate with a pinhole to watch. This involves taking a large box, cutting out a

hole for your head. The longer the box, the larger the projection. Then you tape a small square of aluminum foil near the top on one end of the box, and poke a small hole in it. Tape a sheet of paper on the inside of the box, on the opposite side of the hole. Stick your head through the hole and stand with your back to the sun. The light will come in and you will see a small projection, a negative image, of the eclipse.

"Midwives give more of that holistic experience, more natural experiences," he said.

While there have been headlines about rising birth weights, Frye said he sees higher birth weights in populations with higher socioeconomic status.

"It depends on the genetics of the population," he said. "Also we are seeing a rise in diabetes as we are unhealthy people and we eat fast food. With diabetes, you see larger babies."

Pregnant women can also get gestational diabetes during pregnancy, which is caused by the placenta producing hormones that can lead to a buildup of sugar in the blood. Usually, the pancreas can make enough insulin to handle that. If not, blood sugar levels will rise and can cause gestational diabetes.

Frye said women who get gestational

diabetes have a 50 percent chance of becoming diabetics later in life.


One trend is that moms are wanting more immediate skin-to-skin contact with their babies right after delivery. They also want to delay clamping the placenta to let more blood flow to the baby.

"I'm very pro that," Frye said. "It's only going to help you."

This can help prevent head bleeds and other issues that come along with prematurity, and helps the baby survive longer. He said they still tell expectant moms to stay away from deli meat and caffeine. Women should gain about half a pound to a pound a week during a pregnancy.

Frye said McLaren is the only hospital in the area that has a labor and delivery, recovery and postpartum rooms.

"The room you come laboring in, you will deliver in and you will stay in there for your recovery," he said. "We try to cater toward the moms."

### AUG. 6

1926: On her second attempt, 19-yearold Gertrude Ederle becomes the first woman to swim the 21 miles from Dover, England, to Cape Griz-Nez across the English Channel, which separates Great Britain from the northwestern tip of France.

### AUG. 7

1959: From the Atlantic Missile Range in Cape Canaveral, Florida, the U.S. unmanned spacecraft "Explorer 6" is launched into an orbit around the earth. The spacecraft, commonly known as the "Paddlewheel" satellite, featured a photocell scanner that transmitted a crude picture of the earth's surface and cloud cover from a distance of 17,000 miles. The photo, received in Hawaii, took nearly 40 minutes to transmit.

### AUG. 8

1974: In an evening televised address, President Richard M. Nixon announces his intention to become the first president in American history to resign. With impeachment proceedings underway against him for his involvement in the Watergate affair, Nixon was finally bowing to pressure from the public and Congress to leave the White House. "By taking this action," he said in a solemn address from the Oval Office, "I hope that I will have hastened the start of the process of healing which is so desperately needed in America."

### <u>AUG. 9</u>

**1969:** Members of Charles Manson's cult kill five people in movie director Roman Polanski's Beverly Hills, California, home, including Polanski's pregnant wife, actress Sharon Tate. Less than two days later, the group killed again, murdering

supermarket executive Leno LaBianca and his wife Rosemary in their home. The savage crimes shocked the nation and, strangely, turned Charles Manson into a criminal icon.

### **AUG. 10**

1981: The severed head of 6-year-old Adam Walsh, who disappeared from a shopping mall two weeks earlier, is found in a canal in Vera Beach, Florida. Two years later, career criminal Ottis Ellwood Toole, then an inmate at a Raiford, Florida, prison, confessed to Adam's abduction and murder. However, investigators were unable to locate Adam's body where Toole claimed to have buried it and without any physical evidence the Florida state attorney couldn't prosecute the case. Toole died of cirrhosis of the liver and AIDS in 1996 in a Florida prison, where he was on Death Row for another murder. On Dec. 16, 2008, the police department in Hollywood, Florida, announced that the case against Toole was strong enough to close the investigation into Adam's death.

### **AUG. 11**

2014: Actor and comedian Robin Williams, who rose to prominence in the late 1970s in the hit TV sitcom "Mork & Mindy" then went on to star in dozens of films, including "Dead Poets Society" (1989), "Mrs. Doubtfire" (1993) and "Good Will Hunting" (1997), is found dead at his home in Tiburon, California, after committing suicide. After his death, it was announced the 63-year-old entertainer had been suffering from severe depression and was in the early stages of Parkinson's disease.

### **AUG. 12**

1990: Fossil hunter Susan Hendrickson discovers three huge bones jutting out of a cliff near Faith, South Dakota. They turn out to be part of the largest-ever Tyrannosaurus rex skeleton ever discovered, a 65-million-year-old specimen dubbed Sue, after its discoverer. Amazingly, Sue's skeleton was over 90 percent complete, and the bones were extremely well preserved.

We watch Michigan football religiously. Every Saturday, we watch college football. Our basement is obnoxiously decorated in Michigan colors. We have people over; we're always the host house.


### Where are you from?


### What's your favorite movie?

### **OPENING WEEK OF PREP FOOTBALL LOGISTICS TALK**

I can't believe it.

Sometime late Sunday night, I'll be sneaking out to either Lake Fenton or Fenton for a midnight football practice. Gosh, how fast the summer goes. It seems many of us think there is less time before the start of fall sports every year, particularly football. Depending on your initial reference point, there may be some truth in that statement. As late as 1998, the first game of the football season started a week later during the first Friday in September. It was in 1999 that Michigan football schedules changed to the present format. So the reality is we've had this format for about two decades.

What I think I find bothersome about the format is starting games almost two weeks prior to Labor Day. Most schools don't begin their academic years until after Labor Day, meaning teams play two games the kids even get into school. The first game of a new season is supposed to be special, and when the season begins prior to the start of school, it just doesn't feel 'real.'

### Special first game events

Last year Fenton opened the season with a game at Grand Valley State University. This year the Tigers open with a game at the University of Michigan's football stadium against Brandon, and Linden football plays in another at Flint's Atwood Stadium.

I haven't completely figured out what I think about these types of openers. I think it's cool for the kids to play in different venues, and I think it helps create that first-game excitement as well. It will be cool seeing both teams play in those venues. However, there's also something cool about playing in your own home stadium. Teams only get four or five home games as it is. My gut reaction is I wouldn't want to sacrifice one of my team's home games to play in one. But, I'm sure my thoughts on this one are a bit old fashioned. I'm sure the kids love it, and that's what probably matters the most.

"She's extremely bright. She has great vision. She's quick," Fiebernitz said. "The only thing I can say she lacks is she hates to head a ball. A lot of girls don't, but she can do everything else. She can serve balls in, do corners, her restarts are really good. She takes charge on the field and is a leader in our community. She's one of those kids that has it all."

Frederick did it all for the Linden Eagles during the spring, helping lead the squad to a record-breaking season. She scored 17 goals and dished a team-leading 23 assists. She ended with 57 total points, also leading the squad. Her six game-winning goals also tied for the top spot on the team. Her performances and leadership helped the Eagles to a 22-3-1 overall record and a Division 2 district title. The team's season didn't end there. They also captured the first-ever regional title in girls soccer history at Linden, earning a spot in the state semifinals. That's where the squad's run finally ended.

"I was pretty happy with (the season)," Frederick said. "It was probably my best season of the four years so it was nice going out on a good note. It always feels good when you play hard and I felt we played hard the majority of the season. When the seniors are working hard, the others work hard too, so that helped for whole atmosphere."

The Eagles always seemingly have a strong team, but this year the squad made their talent show in the postseason. One game that stuck out over many others was the regional championship contest against Notre Dame Prep. Linden trailed 1-0 late in the first half when a rain delay hit the contest. It was good timing because it seemed at the time the Eagles were losing their grip on the game.

However, when the teams re-

turned to play about 90 minutes later with about seven minutes to play in the first half, Frederick completely took over the contest. Her energy was infectious and she eventually scored

the game-tying goal in the final minute of the first half. The teams were tied 1-all at the half. In the second half the Eagles took over, scoring two more goals and earning the 3-2 win.

"When we played Notre Dame Prep how good was she after we came out of that break," Feibernitz asked.
