HUBBLe has discovered black holes, supernovas and more

Telescope designed to last 25 years, celebrating its 26th year in space this year

going where no man has gone before in space telescopes valuable data back to Earth.

The most famous space vehicle in the world, originally designed to last 25 years, is now in its 26th year of exploring space.

NASA extended the Hubble Space Telescope's mission life by five years last year, meaning it will explore the galaxy until at least 2021. Hubble will be joined by the James Webb Space Telescope (JWST) next year.

The JWST will be launched onboard an Ariane 5 rocket taking off in French Guiana. It is meant to go farther into space than the Hubble. While Hubble sees with visible and ultraviolet light, the JWST will see the universes in infrared. See HUBBLE on 7B



SUMMARY With two space telescopes exploring space, astronomers will be receiving twice the amount of data about galaxies beyond ours. The Hubble telescope took these pictures in space while traveling through the unknown. The telescope found supernovas, black holes, other galaxies with habitable planets and more. The Hubble will be joined by the James Webb space telescope in 2018.

Just sayin'...

Read the fine print

Last weekend I had to have my debit card replaced. Upon checking my bank statement, I discovered there were two charges pending against my checking account. One charge was for just over \$92, and the other just over \$91. The charges were for some sort of skin cream.

I immediately called the bank to report that my card had been hacked. The bank employee asked if I had ordered anything online within the last month, a free trial offer of something perhaps, where I agreed to pay the shipping.

She was right. I received a free trial offer for a dietary supplement just over a month ago. All I had to do was pay the shipping and handling, which totaled just over \$10. I placed the order.

The woman at the bank asked if I read the "terms and conditions" when I placed the order. What? No one ever reads the terms and conditions. Just click on the little box that says you did and move on.

Now I wish I had. Buried within

those terms and conditions is a sentence that says something like, "By agreeing to using our product via this trial offer, you agree to allow future shipments of like products, the cost of which will be deducted from your bank account ...

blah, blah, blah." This was not going to happen so

I called the company and spoke with a nice lady with a semi-heavy foreign accent. She said the same thing as my bank representative. I told her that when the two new products arrived, I was going to return them immediately and stressed that I

expected a refund. We went around and around about this but I was

firm. She finally said I could keep the products when they arrived, but the only thing she could do is give me a 35 percent discount on each.

By now I am flabbergasted and finally caved. I said OK. It was my fault for not reading the fine print, but I do want that 35 percent discount and my account cancelled.

She said, "OK, you use product and if you don't like, call back and I can-



cel account."

NO! NO! NO! I said I want that account cancelled NOW!

She finally cancelled the account and gave me the cancellation number.

In the meantime, while they did return 35 percent of the money to

my checking account, I still haven't received the products I allowed to be shipped because I didn't read the terms and conditions.

Please, if you plan to pursue a free trial offer and pay only shipping and handling, read those terms and conditions first. Not doing so cost me \$120.

Here's a tip though if you want to accept a free a trial offer and only pay shipping and handling — don't use your debit or credit card. Instead, buy a VISA gift card, in any amount, to handle the cost of shipping and the product itself, if the product is not free.

That's what I'm going to do next time — if there is a next time.

LOOKING BACK at this week in NATIONAL HISTORY

OCT. 8

1871: Flames spark in the Chicago barn of Patrick and Catherine O'Leary, igniting a two-day blaze that kills between 200 and 300 people, destroys 17,450 buildings, leaves 100,000 homeless and causes an estimated \$200 million (in 1871 dollars; \$3 billion in 2007 dollars) in damages. Legend has it that a cow kicked over a lantern in the O'Leary barn and started the fire.

OCT. 9

1942: Chicago bootlegger Roger "The Terrible" Touhy escapes from Illinois Stateville Prison by climbing the guard's tower. Touhy, who had been framed for kidnapping by his bootlegging rivals with the help of corrupt Chicago officials, was serving a 99-year sentence for a kidnapping he did not commit. He was recaptured a couple of months later. During Prohibition, Touhy began brewing his own beer and shipping it to speakeasies all over the state. His beer was widely considered the finest available at the time.

OCT. 10

1991: Former U.S. postal worker Joseph Harris shoots two former co-workers to death at the post office in Ridgewood, New Jersey. The night before, Harris had killed his former supervisor, Carol Ott, with a three-foot samural sword, and shot her fiance, Cornelius Kasten, in their home. After a four-hour standoff with police at the post office. Harris was arrested. His violent outburst was one of several high-profile attacks by postal workers that resulted in the addition of the phrase "going postal" to the American lexicon.

OCT. 11

1968: Apollo 7, the first manned Apollo mission, is launched with astronauts Walter M. Schirra, Jr.; Donn F. Eisele; and Walter Cunningham aboard. Under the command of Schirra, the crew of Apollo 7 conducted an 11-day orbit of Earth, during which the crew transmitted the first live television broadcasts from orbit.

OCT. 12

2000: At 12:15 p.m. local time, a motorized rubber dinghy loaded with explosives blows a 40-by-40-foot hole in the port side of the USS Cole, a U.S. Navy destroyer that was refueling at Aden, Yemen. Seventeen sailors were killed and 38 wounded in the attack, which was carried out by two suicide terrorists alleged to be members of Saudi exile Osama bin Laden's al Qaeda terrorist network.

OCT. 13

1975: The versatile and soulful Charlie Rich, the man voted Entertainer of the Year for by the Country Music Association of America one year earlier stood onstage at the CMA awards show to announce that year's winner of the Association's biggest award. When he opened the envelope and saw what was written inside, instead of merely reading the name "John Denver" and stepping back from the podium, Charlie Rich reached into his pocket for a cigarette lighter and set the envelope on fire, right there onstage.

OCT. 14

1947: U.S. Air Force Captain Chuck Yeager becomes the first person to fly faster than the speed of sound. After World War II, he was among several volunteers chosen to test-fly the experimental X-1 rocket plane, built by the Bell Aircraft Company to explore the possibility of supersonic flight. Genesee County buys new voting equipment

■ Argentine Township clerk says voter fraud highly unlikely in Michigan

hball@tctimes.com; 810-433-6792 People going to the polls this November in Genesee County will be voting with new election equipment.

Argentine Township Denise Graves said the county purchased Hart Intercivic voting equipment for municipalities with assistance from a federal Help America Vote Act grant by the state of Michigan.

"In the county, all the clerks got together and watched demonstrations of the three

top contenders" and they chose Hart, she said. "It's pretty easy to use. They're small, about the size of a sewing machine. I can pick them up and carry them to different precincts."

The new system, which includes the machines, necessary software, scanners and computers, cost approxi-

mately \$800,000 for the entire county, said John Gleason, Genesee County clerk. Argentine Township tested the new machines on Tuesday, Sept. 26, and everything worked well.

Argentine has five machines. The state paid for four and the township bought one.

"I'm impressed with how easy they are to operate. The other ones were big and cumbersome and hard to move. We had the oldest in the state for a while," Graves said.

The township also received a voting machine, which is compliant with the American with Disabilities Act.

Is voter fraud possible?

Graves said it would be very difficult to rig an election in Argentine. The person would have to have the key to the fire hall, have the key to the room where the machines are kept, have the key to the cabinet where the machines are, and avoid the security cameras. They would need to have an additional key to the machine as well.

Election results are sent through a modem to the county immediately as people vote. After voting time is over, they make sure the number of votes sent to the county matches the votes on the machine.

"I don't really know how you could

do it," she said. "Our elections in Michigan are honestly secure. The chances of someone doing this are just about nil. If a local candidate wins here, I think they legitimately won."

If the count is close, the candidates can request a recount. Graves said every recount she's seen in recent years yields the same results.

"Voting is a simple process but you really should educate yourself," she said.

How often do we vote?

Michigan municipalities could hold elections three times a year, one in May, August, and November. There could be four elections in one year during presiden-

sentee, you must qualify. People age 60 and older can request an absentee ballot, along with people who are physically unable to come to the precinct and people who "expect to be away from their community," Graves said. Graves said voting

absentee can be helpful, but it can also be a danger. Information could arise about a candidate a few days before an election, but after people have sent in their ballots, or a candidate could drop out and people who checked their box would have wasted their vote.

She mailed out ballots for the November election Wednesday, Sept. 27. Linden Community Schools is seeking a sinking fund (see sidebar).

The cost of an election

Linden schools will cover the entire cost of the election this November because it's the only topic on the Linden voters' ballot. If there's anything else on the ballot, like the election of elected officials, the township covers the cost.

The township will pay the county \$300 per precinct to program the machines, and Linden schools will reimburse the township, Graves said.

"Usually a regular election can cost maybe \$5,000," she said. "It could cost up to \$10,000. We're small."

The township has to pay people to work elections, and pay to print the ballots and send them out.

"The postage cost was \$722 I think in the November election for absentee ballots," Graves said.

Linden Community Schools tax proposal on November election ballot

"Shall the limitation on the amount of taxes, which may be assessed against all property in Linden Community Schools, Genesee and Livingston Counties, Michigan, be increased by and the board of education be authorized to levy not to exceed 1.3 mils (\$1.30 on each \$1,000 of taxable valuation) for a period of 10 years, 2018 to 2027, inclusive, to create a sinking fund for the purchase of real estate sites for, and the construction or repair of, school buildings, for school security improvements, for the acquisition or upgrading of technology and all other purposes authorized by law; the estimate of the revenue the school district will collect of the millage is approved and levied in 2018 is approximately \$805,922?"

Make easy work of fall yard cleanup

Here's how to get it done in seven steps while enjoying Michigan's crisp fall temps

You can break down the task into easy steps that will make this chore much less labor intensive, according to experts at Michiganhomeandlifestyle.com.

1. Map out your plan of attack

Look at your yard as a three-dimensional battlefield. It's not just leaves; it's also flower beds, areas with creeping vines and fence rows where these leaves and other debris have gathered. Consider your home's entire exterior and note any tree or shrub trimming that needs to be done. Give yourself plenty of time for each task. **2. Consider composting your collect**-

ed yard waste

Your plants will thank you for using this composted material, rather than just throwing it away as yard waste. Spread compost over your flowerbeds and garden. It will protect your dormant plants over the winter and will also infuse your soil with cherished nutrients that will be ready as your yard awakens in the spring. 3. Clean gutters and the roof first, before tackling your yard

Have a tarp below to catch the wet, heavy leaves.

4. Use your chainsaw and hedge trimmer before going after the leaves

Gather large dead branches first, and leave the smaller sticks to be handled along with the leaves.

5. Check out your perennials to see what should be cut down and what should be left

Some plants, including hosta, benefit from being left untouched so that their remains can provide winter protection to their hibernating core. Dead plants and vegetables also provide winter forage for animals and birds.

6. Make light work of your leaves

You may want to invest in a highpowered leaf blower to easily move and gather your leaves or consider mulching the leaves to provide winter protection for your lawn and flowerbeds.

7. Use the wind to your advantage

Use the wind direction to your advantage, while herding large piles of leaves and debris. Work in one direction, sweeping from side to side so that everything is gathered in one place as you go.

Most importantly, enjoy your time spent outdoors in the crisp fall temperatures.

The telescope is equipped with a near-infrared camera, near-infrared spectrograph, mid-infrared instrument, and fine guidance sensor/near infrared and slitless spectrograph. It's programmed to study what the universe was like after the Big Bang and the formation of planets capable of supporting human life.

Hubble's discoveries

The telescope has taken breathtaking photos of the universe during its tenure in space. Hubblesite.org describes it as "taking the universe's baby pictures."

Hubble has discovered what scientists call the Hubble Deep Field. It contains 3,000 galaxies of different shapes and sizes. Hubble has also discovered and taken photos of the Hubble Ultra Deep Field and the Great Observatories Origins Deep Survey. These are galaxies that existed when the universe was less than a billion years old.

Hubble discovered "quasars," which look like incredibly bright stars. The amount of light they give off originally made them appear closer than they are. Because they're so far away and give off an incredible amount of light visible via telescope, quasars are the brightest objects discovered in the universe.

Hubble has found that quasars are the center of a galaxy, and that they're powered by giant black holes. As matter falls into the black hole, the surrounding

region heats up and releases tremendous amounts of light and energy, which creates a quasar.

Hubble also discovered that supernovas, which are brilliant star explosions, can be used to measure if the universe is expanding or not. Scientists discovered that it is expanding, and Hubble helped determine that the expansion was happening faster than they thought.

Scientists still don't know why the universe is expanding, but Hubble continues to study it.

The age of the universe has always been a hot topic. With Hubble, scientists have studied Cepheid variable stars, which are a special type of pulsating star that have cycles of intense light and dimness.

Scientists compare how bright these Cepheid stars are and how faint they appear into the distance to determine the distance of those galaxies.

About Hubble

Hubble was launched on April 24, 1990 on the space shuttle Discovery and has been exploring the galaxy since. It was last serviced by a space shuttle crew in 2009.

NASA awarded a contract extension to Lockheed Martin Space Systems Corporations in Maryland to maintain the health and safety of Hubble. The company will conduct all no-science elements of Hubble to ensure the telescope is working correctly.

CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF FENTON

CONSUMERS ENERGY COMPANY GAS AND/OR ELECTRIC FRANCHISE ORDINANCE

Ordinance No. 798 Adopted: October 2, 2017

AN ORDINANCE, granting to Consumers Energy Company, its successors and assigns, the right, power and authority to lay, maintain and operate gas mains, pipes and services, and to construct, maintain and commercially use electric lines consisting of towers, masts, poles, crossarms, guys, braces, feeders, transmission and distribution wires, transformers and other electrical appliances on, along, across and under the highways, streets, alleys, bridges, waterways, and other public places, and to do a local gas and/or electric business in the Charter Township of Fenton, Genesee County, Michigan, for a period of thirty years.

THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF FENTON ORDAINS:

SECTION 1. GRANT, TERM

The Charter Township of Fenton, Genesee County, Michigan, hereby grants to the Consumers Energy Company, a Michigan corporation, its successors and assigns, hereinafter called the "Grantee," the right, power and authority to lay, maintain and operate gas mains, pipes and services, and to construct, maintain and commercially use electric lines consisting of towers, masts, poles, crossarms, guys, braces, feeders, transmission and distribution wires, transformers, and other electrical appliances on, along, across and under the highways, streets, alleys, bridges, waterways, and other public places, and to do a local gas and/or electric business in the Charter Township of Fenton, for a period of thirty years.

SECTION 2. CONSIDERATION

In consideration of the rights, power and authority hereby granted, said Grantee shall faithfully perform all things required by the terms hereof.

SECTION 3. CONDITIONS

No street, alley, bridge, highway, waterways, or other public place used by said Grantee shall be obstructed longer than necessary during the work of construction or repair, and shall be restored to the same order and condition as when said work was commenced. All of Grantee's structures and equipment shall be so placed on either side of the highways as not to unnecessarily interfere with the use thereof for highway purposes. All of Grantee's wires carrying electricity shall be securely fastened so as not to endanger or injure persons or property in said highways. The Grantee shall have the right to trim trees if necessary in the conducting of such business, subject, however, to the supervision of the highway authorities.

SECTION 4. HOLD HARMLESS

Said Grantee shall at all times keep and save the Charter Township of Fenton free and harmless from all loss, costs and expense to which it may be subject by reason of the negligent construction and maintenance of the structures and equipment hereby authorized. In case any action is commenced against the Charter Township of Fenton on account of the permission herein granted, said Grantee shall, upon notice, defend the Charter Township of Fenton and save it free and harmless from all loss, cost and damage arising out of such negligent construction and maintenance.

SECTION 5. FRANCHISE NOT EXCLUSIVE

The rights, power and authority herein granted are not exclusive. The right to do a gas business and the right to do an electric business hereunder are several, and such rights may be separately exercised, owned and transferred. Either manufactured or natural gas may be furnished hereunder.

SECTION 6. EXTENSIONS

Said Grantee shall from time to time extend its gas and electric systems to and within said Charter Township of Fenton, and shall furnish gas or electricity to applicants residing therein in accordance with applicable laws, rules and regulations.

SECTION 7. RATES

The Grantee shall be entitled to charge the inhabitants of said Charter Township of Fenton for gas and/or electricity furnished therein, the rates as approved by the Michigan Public Service Commission, to which Commission or its successors authority and jurisdiction to fix and regulate gas and electric rates and rules regulating such service in said Charter Township of Fenton, are hereby granted. Such rates and rules shall be subject to review and change at any time upon petition therefor being made by either said Charter Township of Fenton acting by its Township Board, or by said Grantee.

SECTION 8. REVOCATION

The franchise granted by this Ordinance is subject to revocation upon sixty (60) days written notice by the party desiring such revocation.

SECTION 9. MICHIGAN PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION, JURISDICTION

Said Grantee shall, as to all other conditions and elements of service, both gas and electric, not herein fixed, be and remain subject to reasonable rules and regulations of the Michigan Public Service Commission or its successors, applicable to gas or electric service in said Charter Township of Fenton.

SECTION 10. REPEALER

This ordinance, when accepted and published as herein provided, shall repeal and supersede the provisions of Ordinance No. 366, a gas and/or electric franchise ordinance adopted by the Fenton Township Board on December 21, 1987 entitled:

AN ORDINANCE, granting to CONSUMERS POWER COMPANY, its successors and assigns, the right, power and authority to lay, maintain and operate gas mains, pipes and services, and to construct, maintain and commercially use electric lines consisting of towers, masts, poles, crossarms, guys, braces, feeders, transmission and distribution wires, transformers and other electrical appliances on, along, across and under the highways, streets, alleys, bridges and other public places, and to do a local gas and/or electric business in the CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF FENTON, GENESEE COUNTY, MICHIGAN, for a period of thirty years.

and amendments, if any, to such ordinance whereby a gas and/or electric franchise was granted to Consumers Energy Company.

SECTION 11. EFFECTIVE DATE

This ordinance shall take effect upon the day after the date of publication thereof, provided, it shall cease and be of no effect after thirty days from its adoption unless within said period the Grantee shall accept the same in writing filed with the Fenton Township Clerk. Upon acceptance and publication hereof, this ordinance shall constitute a contract between said Charter Township of Fenton and said Grantee.

It happens every time I go to the farmers market. I see all the beautiful vegetables and end up going hog wild. The prices are

amazing - which leads to a counter-top full of vegetables that no one can reasonably use before the next visit to the market! It's an obsession! To scale down my vegetable "situation", I turned to a favorite comfort food, Ratatouille. *I* didn't have green pepper (a staple in the dish) so I improvised. If you have one, chop it up and throw it in - knock yourself out. - Trish

INGREDIENTS

• 2 tsp olive oil

- 1 clove garlic (a big one)
- 1/2 large onion, diced
- 1 small eggplant, diced
- 1 zucchini, diced
- 1 yellow squash, diced
- 1 large tomato, diced
- 2 tbsp fresh chopped parsley
- Salt
- Pepper
- Crushed red pepper flake
- Juice of 1/2 lemon
- 3 oz Ramen noodles
- Optional -
- Fresh grated Parmesan (however much you like)

DIRECTIONS

In a large skillet, heat olive oil over medium heat. Add onions. Cook for 2 minutes. Add garlic, cook for 4 more minutes, stirring often (be careful that the garlic doesn't burn). Add eggplant, zucchini, and squash. Cover and cook (stirring occasionally) for another 10 minutes. Add tomatoes, parsley, lemon juice and red pepper flake. Cover and cook over LOW heat about 15 minutes. Take off heat, set aside. Bring 6 cups water to boil in a large saucepan season the water with 1 tsp salt. Add Ramen noodles to boiling water. Cook, stirring often, for 4 minutes (or according to package directions). Drain noodles, add to Ratatouille. Plate, and grate some fresh Parmesan over the top. This dish is satisfying, and hearty... this can be served with or without noodles, warm or cold!
