Where have all the skilled trades workers gone?

■ Labor shortage continues to grow as Baby Boomers retire

When today's Baby Boomers were in high school, they were offered classes that included wood shop, metal shop, auto mechanics, home economics and more—classes that taught skills needed to make a decent living after high school or to become a good homemaker.

As the years passed, those classes started disappearing, giving way to students being encouraged to go to college. They were told that without a college degree they would never have successful careers.

Students and young adults are starting to realize that a college degree does not guarantee them a top-notch career making the big bucks—especially when that college degree comes with a hefty college loan that is going to take years to pay off.

Young folks are beginning to look toward the skilled trades for personally and financially rewarding careers—but not all of them.

Dave Lamb, owner of Dave Lamb Heating & Cooling in Fenton said, "I think anybody in the trades is having a hard time getting qualified people, people that want to learn a trade."

"I have hired people who've gone through schooling (HVAC through trade school), but I have to give them the experience," Lamb said. "Nowadays the only ones we can find we have to take in and teach ourselves."

Lamb said he doesn't know why there is a shortage in skilled trade workers, but added, "I do know that kids are a lot lazier than when I was a kid. We didn't have a choice but to go to work. Your dad said get out and go to work and we did. Kids aren't forced to do it. They're lazy and spoiled and it's our fault."

Matt Cramer, president of Dee Cramer HVAC Sheet Metal Contractors said he, too, is seeing a 100 percent shortage in skilled trades workers.

"There are a lot of contributing factors. I think 25 to 30 years it was OK or perceived as being OK to go into skilled trades. These days it is often seen as not politically correct thing to do."

Tone it down some

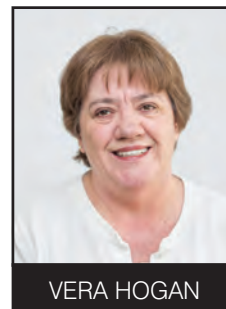
One of the mini pitfalls of writing for a newspaper is that some people, including family and friends, don't seem to understand, or forget, that I didn't personally have anything to do with what's going on in the story.

I often find myself saying, "I don't make the news, I just report it."

Still, I've had some pretty lively conversations about things and lately those things have been about city of Fenton issues.

For example, as many times as I have tried, I cannot seem to explain to people how the DDA (Down-town Development Authority) works, how it is funded, and why the DDA is not responsible for fixing city streets. I've written several detailed articles about the DDA, provided examples and believe I've done everything I know how to try and make readers understand. But some people just don't get it and I get frustrated.

"I don't care how many times you wash it, rinse it and spin it, that (DDA) money is taxpayer money and I don't like how it is being spent," a neighbor friend said to me last week.

He was talking about the sculptures downtown. I made the mistake of mentioning that the DDA was considering a request by the company that provides sculptures to increase the rental fee by \$1,200. The DDA did not make a decision on it, but just the idea set my friend off.

"They need to fix the roads. I can't drive on the sculptures," he said.

While we all agree that the brand new sculpture depicting the infamous card game at the Fenton Community & Cultural Center is beautiful and a great gift to the community, everyone knows that's just what it was — a gift to the community thanks to Phil and Jocelyn Hagerman.

It was not paid for or rented by the DDA. Personally, I like all the sculptures downtown, but I can't help but think that we need to tone down all the hype about them.

If city leaders want to pass the proposal on November's ballot that would allow for the levying of taxes for 10 years instead of three, and later, in May 2018 for a 6-mill road millage — they might want to consider less talk about artwork and sculptures, and more talk about how to pay for our infrastructure needs.

My friend's parting words the other night were, "You don't go out and buy big fancy, expensive paintings for your house when the kids need new clothes and their teeth fixed."

Well, shut my mouth!

"The reality is college is a great option, but there are certainly great options for people going into the skilled trades," Cramer said. "Another thing is skilled trades are hard jobs. Whether plumbing, mechanical, it's a physically demanding job. Kids today want their minds challenged and not necessarily their bodies.

Cramer said many people don't realize how much mind-challenging, technological work there is in skilled trades. Through apprenticeship opportunities, employees get paid to learn their craft.

"Some kids today don't realize they can be making \$50,000 to \$60,000 a year with great benefits," Cramer said.

There has been a growing amount of work for skilled trades due in large part because as Baby Boomers retire, companies are struggling to replace carpenters, electricians, plumbers, and other craftsmen needed for the work.

Mike Rowe, former television reality star of "Dirty Jobs" and current television host for "Somebody's Gotta Do It," has spoken out about the growing problem with available trade jobs and there not being enough workers to fill them. He is promoting skilled trades and trying to change the perception Americans have on these jobs that are so important.

Many people still view skilled trades as being dirty, lower level jobs when the truth is that they require great creativity and technical skills.

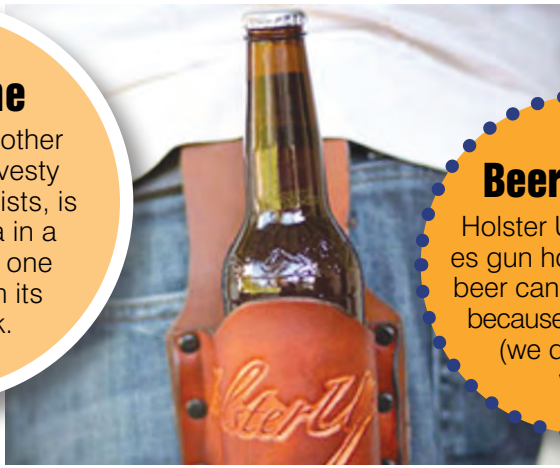
Pizza cone

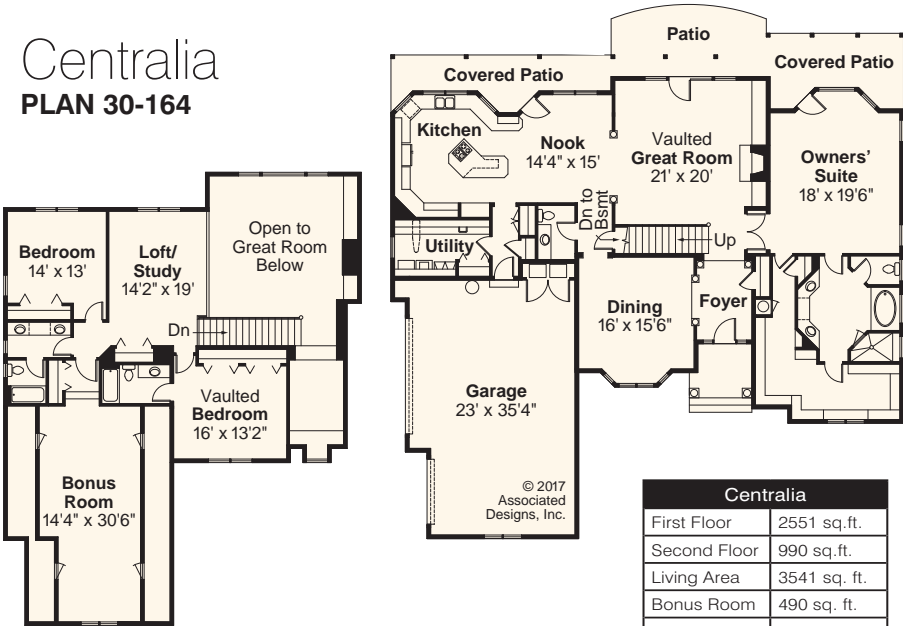

Recognize and relieve sources of pets' stress

Once stress is identified apart from any other health issues, pet owners can take steps to reduce it. Providing a security spot to which the pet can retreat, regular exercise, mental stimulation, and gradual changes to routine, diet or other things a pet has relied on can help.

Stress can affect anyone, even household pets. Although life may seem footloose and fancy free for companion animals, they have their share of stressors as well.

It may be hard to believe that dogs, cats, birds, and other animals can suffer from stress. But certain situations or scenarios may trigger a stressful response in pets, and pet owners should learn to recognize such stressors and do what they can to help pets avoid them.

Research indicates that stress, especially constant sources of stress, can impact pet health and well-being. A 2011 study published in the Journal of Physiology and Pharmacology found that when dogs are under stress, their bodies release an excessive amount of the fight or flight hormone norepinephrine. This can alter gut bacteria and interfere with gastrointestinal tract motility. Resulting diarrhea can compound stressful situations and exacerbate the situation.

The pet advice site Pet-Happy says that, during stressful situations, pets' blood pressure may climb, breathing may become more rapid, heart rate may increase, and the immune system can become less effective - instances that would also occur in humans. Various studies show that stress can be a contributing factor to disease.

Animals experience stress for different reasons and exhibit stress in ways that set them apart from one another and their human companions.

The following is a breakdown of what may contribute to stress in dogs, cats and birds

Dogs
The British Small Animal Veterinary Association's "Manual of Canine and Feline Behavioural Medicine" says that some of the most common dog stress triggers are novelty, housing changes, loud noises, changes in household members, and changes in schedule. Dogs may exhibit stress through appetite changes, isolation, digestive issues, lethargy, and increased sleeping.

Cats
Cats can become stressed over situations their owners may not consider major. Loud music and noises, changes in food or litter brands, having new carpet or furniture installed, or a number of visitors in the home may be stressors, says Pam Johnson-Bennet, author and cat behavior expert. Some of the easiest stress symptoms to spot include excessive self-grooming, urine spraying, aggression, extreme vocalization, and eliminating outside of the litter box.

Birds
According to James Morrissey, a veterinarian at the College of Veterinary Medicine at Cornell University, birds are very good at picking up stress in people, which may contribute to their own stress. It can be challenging to determine what is causing stress in birds. However, the appearance of stress bars on feathers, the sudden onset of aggression, fearful behavior, changes in appetite, and destructive behavior can indicate that stress is present.

TRISH delish

CILANTRO LIME CHICKEN

Let me start off by saying how easy and delicious this was. The flavor is vibrant and bright - and using chicken thighs really adds an intensity and depth of flavor! Prep the marinade and get the chicken in it at least 30 minutes but up to 2 hours before you make this dish. I use my fathers cast iron to sear/bake the chicken in. It really helps to get the skin nice & crispy!

INGREDIENTS

- 4-6 bone-in, skin-on chicken thighs
- 4 tbsp extra virgin olive oil - divided
- 2 limes juiced
- 1/4 c fresh, chopped cilantro
- 2 cloves minced garlic
- 1/4 tsp crushed red pepper flake (or more if you like the heat)
- 1/2 tsp cumin
- 4 cups cooked white rice
- Salt & pepper to taste

DIRECTIONS

Prep marinade by whisking together 2 tbsp olive oil, lime juice, cilantro, red pepper flakes, garlic and cumin. In a gallon size freezer bag, mix the chicken and the marinade. Refrigerate for at least 30 minutes but up to 2 hours. After marinating chicken, preheat the oven to 425 F. Pour remaining olive oil into a large oven proof skillet (I use cast iron) and heat over medium-high heat. Remove chicken from bag, place on a large platter and season with salt and pepper to your liking. To the hot skillet, add the chicken (SKIN SIDE DOWN). Pour in remaining marinade. Sear the chicken undisturbed for 6 minutes, or until the skin becomes golden & crispy. Flip the chicken and cook 2 minutes more (chicken will NOT be cooked all the way through yet). Turn off the burner and transfer the skillet/chicken to the preheated oven. Bake until cooked through, 10-12 minutes (or until chicken reaches an internal temperature of 165 F near the bone). Plate this with cooked white rice, and drizzle the pan drippings all over the place!! I have to add that if you just can't do bone-in chicken thighs, you can probably opt for boneless-skinless breast, but you're going to lose a lot of the flavor in doing so! ENJOY!!

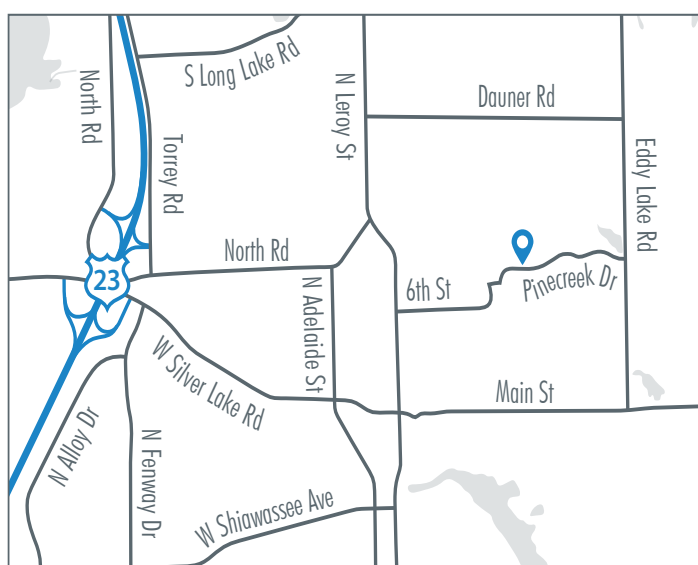
