Please don't ignore my email

One of my favorite conveniences as a writer for the Tri-County Times is the ability to ask my questions and receive answers via email. The benefits are many, at least in my opinion.

You could call that man, leave a message and celebrate your next birthday waiting for him to call you back. But if you sent him an email, he was on it within minutes, every time. He was great!

Other people are just the opposite, but they will have the decency to email back and say "call me." OK, I can do that, no worries.

When I ask people if they got my email, or why they didn't respond, many will say, "Oh, I'm sorry, you have no idea how many emails I get in a day. It just takes so long to go through them." That tells me you saw my name

as the sender, but couldn't be bothered.

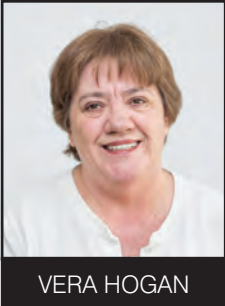
Others will say, "I've just been so busy, I have not had time to answer."

Others still will say things like, "Why do you give me such short notice? I need more time to answer. How about next week?"

We work on strict deadlines here. Or we have no choice but to move on and your story, no matter how nice it is, will have to wait.

That's true if we're waiting for a return phone call or an email.

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LOOKING BACK

at this week in

NATIONAL HISTORY

MARCH 18

1937: Nearly 300 students in Texas are killed by an explosion of natural gas at their school. The Consolidated School of New London, Texas, sat in the middle of a large oil and natural gas field. The area was dominated by 10,000 oil derricks, 11 of which stood right on school grounds. At 3:05 p.m. on March 18, 1937, a Thursday afternoon, the 694 students and 40 teachers in attendance were looking forward to the final bell, which was to ring in 10 minutes. Instead, a huge and powerful explosion, which literally blew the roof off of the building, leveled the school. The blast was felt by people 40 miles away and killed most victims instantly.

MARCH 19

2003: The United States, along with coalition forces primarily from the United Kingdom, initiates war on Iraq. Just after explosions began to rock Baghdad, Iraq's capital, U.S. President George W. Bush announced in a televised address, "At this hour, American and coalition forces are in the early stages of military operations to disarm Iraq, to free its people and to defend the world from grave danger." President Bush and his advisors built much of their case for war on the idea that Iraq, under dictator Saddam Hussein, possessed or was in the process of building weapons of mass destruction.

MARCH 20

1995: Several packages of deadly sarin gas are set off in the Tokyo subway system killing 12 people and injuring over 5,000. Sarin gas was invented by the Nazis and is one of the most lethal

nerve gases known to man. Tokyo police quickly learned who had planted the chemical weapons and began tracking the terrorists. Thousands of checkpoints were set up across the nation in the massive dragnet.

MARCH 21

1963: Alcatraz Prison in San Francisco Bay closes down and transfers its last prisoners. At it's peak period of use in the 1950s, "The Rock," or "America's Devil Island" housed more than 200 inmates at the maximum-security facility. Alcatraz remains an icon of American prisons for its harsh conditions and record for being inescapable.

MARCH 22

1933: President Franklin D. Roosevelt signs the Beer and Wine Revenue Act. This law levies a federal tax on all alcoholic beverages to raise revenue for the federal government and gives individual states the option to further regulate the sale and distribution of beer and wine.

MARCH 23

2011: Actress Elizabeth Taylor, who appeared in more than 50 films, won two Academy Awards and was synonymous with Hollywood glamour, dies of complications from congestive heart failure at a Los Angeles hospital at age 79. The violet-eyed Taylor began her acting career as a child and spent most of her life in the spotlight. Known for her striking beauty, she was married eight times and later in life became a prominent HIV/AIDS activist.

MARCH 24

1958: When Elvis Presley turned 18 on Jan. 8, 1953, he fulfilled his patriotic duty and legal obligation to register his name with the Selective Service System, thereby making him eligible for the draft. The Korean War was still underway at the time. After a couple deferments, Elvis Presley was finally inducted on March 24, 1958, starting his day as the King of Rock and Roll, but ending it as a lowly buck private in the United States Army.

BRIAN MAY

(lead guitarist for Queen and astrophysicist)

Brian May is revered around the world as the lead guitarist of Queen, one of the most iconic rock n' roll bands of all time. Queen's ascent was stratospheric, their reign imperial in its reach. (actress and restaurateur)

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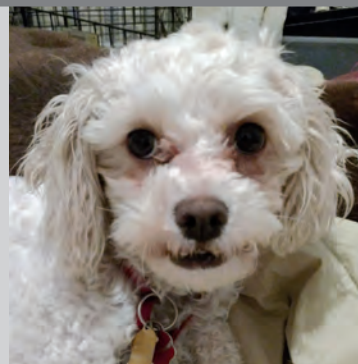

CITY OF LINDEN
ORDINANCE NO. 382

MUNICIPAL CIVIL INFRACTIONS ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE to establish the authority and procedures for the issuance of municipal civil infraction notices and citations; to establish a municipal ordinance violations bureau; and to provide generally for penalties and sanctions for municipal civil infraction violations.

THE CITY OF LINDEN HEREBY ORDAINS:

Section 1. Definitions.

As used in this Ordinance:

“Act” means Act No. 236 of the Public Acts of 1961 [MCL 600.8701, et seq], as amended.

“Authorized City Official” means a police officer or other personnel of the City authorized by this or any other ordinance of the City to issue municipal civil infraction citations or municipal civil infraction violation notices.

“Bureau” means the City of Linden Municipal Ordinance Violations Bureau as established by this ordinance.

“Municipal Civil Infraction” means an act or omission that is prohibited by this or any other ordinance of the City, but which is not a crime under this or such other ordinance, and for which civil sanctions, including, without limitation, fines, damages, expenses and costs, may be ordered, as authorized by Chapter 87 of Act No. 236 of the Public Acts of 1961, as amended.

“Municipal Civil Infraction Action” means a civil action in which the defendant is alleged to be responsible for a municipal civil infraction.

“Municipal Civil Infraction Citation” means a written complaint or notice prepared by an authorized City official, directing a person to appear in court regarding the occurrence or existence of a municipal civil infraction violation by the person cited.

“Municipal Civil Infraction Violation Notice” means a written notice prepared by an authorized City official, directing a person to appear at the City of Linden Ordinance Violations Bureau and to pay the fine and costs, if any, prescribed for the violation by the schedule of civil fines adopted by the City, as authorized under Section 8396 [MCL 600.8396] and 8707(6) [MCL 600.8707(6)] of the Act.

Section 2. Municipal Civil Infraction Action; Commencement; Dismissal.

An ordinance violation that is not abated within 7 days of the notice of violation shall be enforced as a municipal civil infraction. A municipal civil infraction action may be commenced upon the issuance by an authorized City official of (1) a municipal civil infraction citation directing the alleged violator to appear in court; or (2) a municipal civil infraction violation notice directing the alleged violator to appear at the City of Linden Municipal Ordinance Violations Bureau.

Section 3. Municipal Civil Infraction Citations; Issuance and Service.

Municipal civil infraction citations shall be issued and served by authorized City officials as follows:

- (a) The time for appearance specified in a citation shall be within a reasonable time after the citation is issued.
- (b) The place for appearance specified in a citation shall be the district court.
- (c) Each citation shall be numbered consecutively and shall be in a form approved by the state court administrator. The original citation shall be filed with the district court. Copies of the citation shall be retained by the City and issued to the alleged violator as provided by Section 8705 of the Act [MCL 600.8705].
- (d) A citation for a municipal civil infraction signed by an authorized City official shall be treated as made under oath if the violation alleged in the citation occurred in the presence of the official signing the complaint and if the citation contains the following statement immediately above the signature of the official: “I declare under the penalties of perjury that the statements above are true to the best of my information, knowledge and belief.”
- (e) An authorized City official who witnesses a person commit a municipal civil infraction shall prepare and subscribe, as soon as possible and

as completely as possible, an original and required copies of a citation.

- (f) An authorized City official may issue a citation to a person if:
 - (i) Based upon investigation, the official has reasonable cause to believe that the person is responsible for a municipal civil infraction; or
 - (ii) Based upon investigation of a complaint by someone who allegedly witnessed the person commit a municipal civil infraction, the official has reasonable cause to believe that the person is responsible for an infraction.
- (g) Municipal civil infraction citations shall be served by an authorized City official as follows:
 - (i) Except as provided by Section 8707 of the Act [MCL 600.8707], an authorized City official shall personally serve a copy of the citation upon the alleged violator.
 - (ii) If the municipal civil infraction action involves the use or occupancy of land, a building or other structure, a copy of the citation does not need to be personally served upon the alleged violator, but may be served upon an owner or occupant of the land, building or structure by posting the copy on the land or attaching the copy to the building or structure. In addition, a copy of the citation shall be sent by first-class mail to the owner of the land, building, or structure at the owner=s last known address.

Section 4. Municipal Civil Infraction Citations; Contents.

- (a) A municipal ordinance citation shall contain the name and address of the alleged violator, the municipal civil infraction alleged, the place where the alleged violator shall appear in court, the telephone number of the court, and the time at or by which the appearance shall be made.
- (b) Further, the citation shall inform the alleged violator that he or she may do one of the following:
 - (1) Admit responsibility for the municipal civil infraction by mail, in person, or by representation, at or by the time specified for appearance.
 - (2) Admit responsibility for the municipal civil infraction “with explanation” by mail by the time specified for appearance or, in person, or by representation.
 - (3) Deny responsibility for the municipal civil infraction by doing either of the following:
 - (i) Appearing in person for an informal hearing before a judge or district court magistrate, without the opportunity of being represented by an attorney, unless a formal hearing before a judge is requested by the City;
 - (ii) Appearing in court for a formal hearing before a judge, with the opportunity of being represented by an attorney.
- (c) The citation shall also inform the alleged violator of all of the following:
 - (1) That if the alleged violator desires to admit responsibility “with explanation” in person or by representation, the alleged violator must apply to the court in person, by mail, by telephone, or by representation within the time specified for appearance and obtain a scheduled date and time for an appearance;
 - (2) That if the alleged violator desires to deny responsibility, the alleged violator must apply to the court in person, by mail,

by telephone, or by representation within the time specified for appearance and obtain a scheduled date and time to appear for a hearing, unless a hearing date is specified on the citation;

(3) That a hearing shall be an informal hearing unless a formal hearing is requested by the alleged violator or the City;

(4) That at an informal hearing the alleged violator must appear in person before a judge or district court magistrate, without the opportunity of being represented by an attorney; and

(5) That at a formal hearing the alleged violator must appear in person before a judge with the opportunity of being represented by an attorney.

(d) The citation shall contain a notice in boldfaced type that the failure of the alleged violator to appear within the time specified in the citation or at the time scheduled for hearing or appearance is a misdemeanor and will result in entry of a default judgment against the alleged violator on the municipal civil infraction.

Section 5. Municipal Ordinance Violations Bureau.

(a) Bureau established; Employees. The City hereby designates the City Clerk as the Municipal Ordinance Violations Bureau ("Bureau") as authorized under Section 8396 of the Act [MCL 600.8396] to accept admissions of responsibility for municipal civil infractions in response to municipal civil infraction violation notices issued and served by authorized City officials, and to collect and retain civil fines and costs as prescribed by resolution of City Council. The City clerk may assign the functions and responsibilities of bureau operation to a deputy or, with the approval of the City Council, to any qualified City employee.

(b) Location; Supervision. The Bureau shall be located at the City of Linden City Hall, 132 E. Broad Street, Linden, Michigan 48451, and shall be under the supervision and control of the City Clerk.

(c) Disposition of Violations. The Bureau may dispose only of municipal civil infraction violations for which a fine has been scheduled and for which a municipal civil infraction violation notice (as compared with a citation) has been issued. The fact that a fine has been scheduled for a particular violation shall not entitle any person to dispose of the violation at the Bureau. Nothing in this Ordinance shall prevent or restrict the City from issuing a municipal civil infraction citation for any violation or from prosecuting any violation in a court of competent jurisdiction. The unwillingness of any person to dispose of any violation at the Bureau shall not prejudice the person or in any way diminish the person=s rights, privileges and protection accorded by law.

(d) Bureau Limited to Accepting Admissions of Responsibility. The scope of the Bureau=s authority shall be limited to accepting admissions of responsibility for municipal civil infractions and collecting and retaining fines and costs as a result of those admissions. The Bureau shall not accept payment of a fine from any person who denies having committed the offense or who admits responsibility only with explanation, and in no event shall the Bureau determine, or attempt to determine, the truth or falsity of any fact or matter relating to an alleged violation.

(e) Municipal Civil Infraction Violation Notices. Municipal civil infraction violation notices shall be issued and served by authorized City officials under the same circumstances and upon the same persons as provided for citations as provided in this ordinance. In addition to any other information required by this or any other ordinance of the City, the notice of violation shall indicate the time by which the alleged violator must appear at the Bureau, the methods by which an appearance may be made, the address and telephone number of the Bureau, the hours during which the Bureau is open, the amount of the fine scheduled for the alleged violation, and the consequences for failure to appear and pay the required fine within the required time.

(f) Appearance; Payment of Fines and Costs. An alleged violator receiving a municipal civil infraction violation notice shall appear at the Bureau and pay the specified fine and costs no later than 14 days after the date of the violation notice. An appearance may be made by mail, in person, or by representation.

(g) Procedure Where Admission of Responsibility not Made or Fine not Paid. If an authorized City official issues and serves a municipal ordinance violation notice and if an admission of responsibility is not made and the civil fine and costs, if any, prescribed by the schedule of fines for the violation are not paid at the Bureau, a municipal civil infraction citation may be filed with district court and a copy of the citation may be served by first class mail upon the alleged violator at the alleged violator=s last known address. The citation filed with the court does not need to comply in all particulars with the requirements for citations as provided by Sections 8705 and 8709 [MCL 600.8705 and 600.8709] of the Act, but shall consist of a sworn complaint containing the allegations stated in the municipal ordinance violation notice and shall fairly inform the alleged violator how to respond to the citation.

Section 6. Penalties and Sanctions.

(a) The sanction for a violation which is a municipal civil infraction shall be a civil fine in an amount set by resolution of City Council, plus any costs, damages, expenses and other sanctions, as authorized under Chapter 87 of Act 236 of the Public Acts of 1961, as amended [MCL 600.8701, et seq], and other applicable laws.

(1) Unless otherwise specified by resolution of City Council, the civil fine for a violation shall be not less than \$50.00, plus costs and other sanctions, for each infraction.

(2) Increased civil fines may be imposed for repeated violations by a person of any requirement or provision of this or any other City ordinance. As used in this section, "repeat offense" means any subsequent municipal infraction violation of the same requirement or provision (i) committed by a person within any twelve-month period (unless some other period is specifically provided by this or any other City ordinance) and (ii) for which the person admits responsibility or is determined to be responsible. Unless otherwise specified by resolution of City Council, the increased fine for a repeat offense shall be as follows:

(i) A second repeat offense shall be no less than \$100.00, plus costs.

(ii) A third repeat offense shall be no less than \$200.00, plus costs.

(iii) A "violation" includes any act which is prohibited or made or declared to be unlawful or an offense by this or any other City ordinance; and any omission or failure to act where the act is required by this or any other City ordinance.

(iv) Each day on which any violation of this or any other City ordinance continues constitutes a separate offense and shall be subject to penalties or sanctions as a separate offense.

(b) In addition to any remedies available at law, the City may bring an action for an injunction or other process against a person to restrain, prevent or abate any violation of this or any other City ordinance.

Section 7. Effective Date.

This Ordinance shall become effective thirty (30) days following publication.

At a regular meeting of the City Council of the City of Linden held on March 12, 2018, MacDermaid moved for adoption of the foregoing ordinance and Dick supported the motion.

**GAINES TOWNSHIP ORDINANCE NO. 136
CONSUMERS ENERGY COMPANY
GAS FRANCHISE ORDINANCE**

AN ORDINANCE, granting to CONSUMERS ENERGY COMPANY, its successors and assigns, the right, power and authority to lay, maintain and operate gas mains, pipes and services on, along, across and under the highways, streets, alleys, bridges, waterways, and other public places, and to do a local gas business in the TOWNSHIP OF GAINES, GENESEE COUNTY, MICHIGAN, for a period of thirty years.

THE TOWNSHIP OF GAINES ORDAINS:

SECTION 1. GRANT, TERM. The TOWNSHIP OF GAINES, GENESEE COUNTY, MICHIGAN, hereby grants to the Consumers Energy Company, a Michigan corporation, its successors and assigns, hereinafter called the "Grantee," the right, power and authority to lay, maintain and operate gas mains, pipes and services on, along, across and under the highways, streets, alleys, bridges, waterways, and other public places, and to do a local gas business in the TOWNSHIP OF GAINES, GENESEE COUNTY, MICHIGAN, for a period of thirty years.

SECTION 2. CONSIDERATION. In consideration of the rights, power and authority hereby granted, said Grantee shall faithfully perform all things required by the terms hereof.

SECTION 3. CONDITIONS. No highway, street, alley, bridge, waterway or other public place used by said Grantee shall be obstructed longer than necessary during the work of construction or repair, and shall be restored to the same order and condition as when said work was commenced. All of Grantee's pipes and mains shall be so placed in the highways and other public places as not to unnecessarily interfere with the use thereof for highway purposes.

SECTION 4. HOLD HARMLESS. Said Grantee shall at all times keep and save the Township free and harmless from all loss, costs and expense to which it may be subject by reason of the negligent construction and maintenance of the structures and equipment hereby authorized. In case any action is commenced against the Township on account of the permission herein given, said Grantee shall, upon notice, defend the Township and save it free and harmless from all loss, cost and damage arising out of such negligent construction and maintenance.

SECTION 5. EXTENSIONS. Said Grantee shall construct and extend its gas distribution system within said Township and shall furnish gas to applicants residing therein in accordance with applicable laws, rules and regulations.

SECTION 6. FRANCHISE NOT EXCLUSIVE. The rights, power and authority herein granted, are not exclusive. Either manufactured or natural gas may be furnished hereunder.

SECTION 7. RATES. Said Grantee shall be entitled to charge the inhabitants of said Township for gas furnished therein, the rates as approved by the Michigan Public Service Commission, to which Commission or its successors authority and jurisdiction to fix and regulate gas rates and rules regulating such service in said Township, are hereby granted for the term of this franchise. Such rates and rules shall be subject to review and change at any time upon petition therefor being made by either said Township, acting by its Township Board, or by said Grantee.

SECTION 8. REVOCAION. The franchise granted by this ordinance is subject to revocation upon sixty (60) days written notice by the party desiring such revocation.

SECTION 9. MICHIGAN PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION, JURISDICTION. Said Grantee shall, as to all other conditions and elements of service not herein fixed, be and remain subject to the reasonable rules and regulations of the Michigan Public Service Commission or its successors, applicable to gas service in said Township.

SECTION 10. REPEALER. This ordinance, when accepted and published as herein provided, shall repeal and supersede the provisions of a gas ordinance adopted by the Township Board on May 4, 1988 entitled:

AN ORDINANCE, granting to CONSUMERS POWER COMPANY, its successors and assigns, the right, power and authority to lay, maintain and operate gas mains, pipes and services on, along, across and under the highways, streets, alleys, bridges, and other public places, and to do a local gas business in the TOWNSHIP OF GAINES, GENESEE COUNTY, MICHIGAN for a period of thirty years.

and amendments, if any, to such ordinance whereby a gas franchise was granted to Consumers Energy Company.

SECTION 11. EFFECTIVE DATE. This ordinance shall take effect upon the day after the date of publication thereof; provided, however, it shall cease and be of no effect after sixty days from its adoption unless within said period the Grantee shall accept the same in writing filed with the Township Clerk. Upon acceptance and publication hereof, this ordinance shall constitute a contract between said Township and said Grantee.

**CITY OF LINDEN
ORDINANCE NO. 383**

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 3.10 OF ARTICLE 3 OF THE CITY OF LINDEN ZONING ORDINANCE TO REVISE THE PENALTIES FOR VIOLATIONS OF THE ZONING ORDINANCE.

THE CITY OF LINDEN ORDAINS:

Section 1. Amendment of Section 3.10 of Article 3 of the City of Linden Zoning Ordinance.

Section 3.10 of Article 3 of the City of Linden Zoning Ordinance is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 3.10 Violations and Penalties.

3.10.1. Enforcement Officer. The Zoning Administrator, Code Enforcement Officer, Chief of Police or designee of any of them shall be responsible for enforcing violations of this Ordinance.

3.10.2. Public nuisance; nuisance per se. A violation of this Ordinance is hereby declared to be a public nuisance subject to abatement by the City in any court of competent jurisdiction.

3.10.3. Municipal Civil Infractions. In addition to any other remedies allowed herein, a violation of this ordinance is hereby designated as a municipal civil infraction and be subject to the civil fines, sanctions, remedies and procedures set forth in Ordinance No. 382.

(A) General Penalty Clause. A violation of this Ordinance is hereby designated as a municipal civil infraction and violators shall be subject to the civil fines, sanctions, remedies and procedures as set forth in Ordinance No. 382 and Michigan law.

(B) Fines paid at Violations Bureau. If the civil fine is paid at the City of Linden Municipal Violations Bureau, the initial fine shall be Fifty (\$50.00) Dollars or other amount set by resolution of City Council.

(1) In the case of another offense within one (1) year of the date of the initial infraction, the civil fine shall be One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars or other amount set by resolution of City Council. (This shall be known as the second offense.)

(2) In the case of another offense within one (1) year of the date of the second offense, the civil fines shall be Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars or other amount set by resolution of City Council. (This shall be known as the third offense.)

(3) In the case of another offense within one (1) year of the date of the third offense, the civil fine shall be Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars or other amount set by resolution of City Council. (This shall be known as the fourth offense.) All subsequent offenses shall be Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars or other amount set by resolution of City Council.

All such fines are due and payable at the City of Linden Violations Bureau no later than 14 days after the date of the violation notice. The City of Linden Violations Bureau is hereby authorized to accept civil fines in the amounts specified. In case of payment at the Violations Bureau, no costs shall be imposed or collected.

Section 2. Effective Date.

This Ordinance shall become effective thirty (30) days following publication.

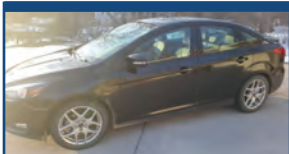
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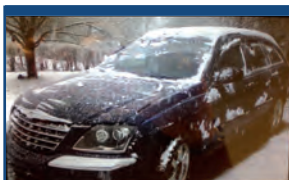

is the lack of confidence, and perceived lack of time to cook healthy.

"Food can be medicine for our bodies,"

said Sarah Van Pelt of Deerfield Township. "It can be a medicine; it can also be a poison." She also teaches cooking classes, but for Linden Schools Community Education.

Van Pelt is passionate about cooking organic, and even rarely shops at a grocery store. Most of what she uses she grows herself, or buys as directly from a farm as possible.

Her rule of thumb: "don't eat anything your great grandma wouldn't have." This means nothing processed, and most likely eating local and organic.

It took her some time to cook and eat

the way that she does, and said it can be done incrementally. She suggests switching certain foods to organic — such as milk and produce. "There is a taste and a better quality between the two," she said, when comparing organic, and non-organic.

To get started eating healthy, she suggests cutting out processed food.

The old rule about staying out of the middle of the store still applies. And again, switch to organic items slowly over time. "You've gotta want it, and you can do it," she said.

Overall, Gartland said that planning is the root of healthy eating, and then making healthy substitutions in your diet. "You've got to make a menu for the week, or you're going to end up giving in to impulse," he said.

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Making healthy changes to meals

BREAKFAST:
Gartland suggests cooking something high in lean protein and whole grains to keep hunger away until lunch.

Van Pelt suggests switching to healthier versions of the same food over time. Stop buying instant oatmeal, and “squishy” (soft, white) bread. Buy healthier versions of those, like bakery bread and oatmeal that doesn’t include flavoring. Instead, add your own cinnamon and unprocessed sugar. “You’re still monitoring what you eat,” she said. “It’s not going to change overnight.”

LUNCH:
Gartland suggests eating something higher in fiber and vegetables and lower in sugar and fat to avoid the calorie/sugar crash.

Van pelt suggests avoiding processed lunch meats and bleached breads. Or better yet, wrap your lunch in organic romaine lettuce. Substitute out less healthy items over time.

DINNER:
Gartland suggests something with a good balance of protein, vegetables and complex carbohydrates. “Try to focus on keeping vegetables the higher focus at dinner,” he said.

Van Pelt suggests avoiding tilapia for a protein, and instead buy cod or salmon. As a rule, go for lean meat. She said the leanest is rabbit, but this isn’t usually readily available at VG’s. Lessening starches for greens is also a good rule.

For a revolving price, companies will send you a complete meal in a box — you just have to follow the instructions to cook it. Gartland likes these meals because it can lead to someone learning about cooking and taking on more recipes themselves.

Example: HelloFresh.com has a variety of plans, which can average \$9.99 per serving, depending on the plate and number of meals per week. Featured options include chicken cheddar fajitas and one-pan orzo Italiano. BlueApron.com is another popular service.

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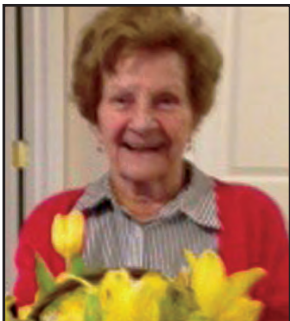

Brush up on oral hygiene for pets

Oral hygiene, this oft-overlooked component of pet care, can mean the difference between a happy, healthy pet and one that may be suffering in silence.

The American Veterinary Dental College says brushing an animal's teeth is the single most effective means to maintain oral health between professional vet examinations. Bacteria that forms naturally in an animal's mouth will contribute to the formation of plaque which, left untreated, can lead to periodontal disease. By brushing away the precursors to plaque, pet owners can achieve optimal dental health for their pets.

Oral hygiene doesn't begin and end with regular brushing. The American Veterinary Medical Association also suggests pet lovers work with a veterinary dentist to evaluate the health of teeth, the jaws and the roots below the gum line. These professionals are invested in all aspects of oral healthcare and can be called on for routine cleaning, filing, extraction, or tooth repairs if need be.

The AVMA says that periodontal disease is the most common dental condition in dogs and cats, and by the time the animal reaches three years of age, it may have some early evidence of periodontal disease, which can only worsen if preventative measures are not taken.

Pet dental problems are similar to those that occur in people. While dental caries (cavities) are less likely, abscesses, infections, broken teeth, and palate defects can occur. Signs of potential oral problems include bad breath, abnormal chewing, disinterest in eating, swelling in the gums, tenderness when the mouth is touched, or bleeding. Pets may become irritable if their mouths are bothering them, so if behavior changes are observed, dogs or cats should be seen by a veterinarian to find out if a dental issue is at the root of the problem.

Some pet owners are reticent to handle oral healthcare for their companion animals because they fear the pet may bite if uncomfortable. Although this is always a possibility, dogs and cats can grow accustomed to teeth being brushed or wiped with patience, says AVDC. Oral rinses and special chews also can reduce plaque formation.

Dental health is an important component of responsible pet ownership. Home oral hygiene and professional cleanings and examinations can help pets remain healthy.
