

## The FENTON DAM

#### First structure built by Clark Dibble, one of Fenton's original settlers

Other than the fact that it's there and working, not too many people give much thought to the dam in Fenton's downtown Millpond Park. The dam is just another pleasant, working feature of the downtown area, one that will keep flood waters at bay in the event of inclement conditions.

According to Ruth Anne Silbar, in her book on Fenton history, "A Time To Remember," former Fenton historian, the late Charlie Damon, assembled information concerning the mill, the dam and the mill pond for a WPA office in 1936 when a new dam was constructed with WPA funds.

The Works Progress Administration (WPA, renamed in 1939 as the Work Projects Administration) was the largest and most ambitious American New Deal agency, employing millions of people (mostly unskilled men) to carry out public works projects, including the construction of public buildings and roads.

The mill burned on June 3, 1921, and the then-village of Fenton acquired the property April 28, 1931.

#### IN THE BEGINNING

Clark Dibble, one of Fenton's original settlers, is said to have built the first dam. He built it at the site of the present dam and installed an undershot wheel to operate a small sawmill, consisting of one upright saw to cut the logs into plank boards or square timber and a circular saw to rip the edges and boards. Dibble got his sawmill running in the fall of 1834.

In December of 1836, William Fenton and Robert LeRoy came to Dibbleville (downtown Fenton) and platted the village of Fenton in the spring of 1837.

Before platting the village, the men secured flowage rights for all property on both sides of the proposed millpond, giving them a 9-foot flowage right over and top of the original dam.

What Dibble's legal height of the dam was is unknown, according to Damon, "but Fenton and LeRoy surely owned 9 feet more on top of Dibble's franchise."

After that, flowage rights were sold and possession of the dam changed hands a few times. However, since William Fenton was a very able lawyer and Judge Daniel LeRoy (Robert's father) was attorney general of the state of Michigan at the time (1837), it was a given that all legal matters pertaining to the titles and flowage rights to the mill, dam and incorporation of the village were in perfect legal order.

Thirty-nine years later, in May of 1876, the dam in Holly went out and took the Fenton dam out with it, along with a twostory wooden building that stood on the dam. The building served as a woodworking shop where chair rungs and spinning wheels were turned out. One of the occupants, Fred Riggs, was a surveyor and went west as a buffalo hunter, bringing back quantities of buffalo pelts, which he tanned and stored in the upper floor of the building. They were carried away by the destruction of the dam.

The lumber and rubbish formed a jam at the railroad bridge (located in the area of Tim Horton's today), holding the flood water back and thereby flooding the lower floor of a brick building northwest of the bridge.

In later years, the mill buildings were improved and upgraded. In July of 1887, the water was let out of the millpond and the gates were moved 10 feet farther upstream so they could be reached conve niently. Doing so greatly strengthened

According to Fenton Public Works Director Dan Czarnecki, the DPW keeps an eye on the structure, making sure the sluice gates work and there are no obstructions at that location or at the spillway.

"We open and close the gates a couple times a year and leave it slightly ajar during the summer months to help the water flow and not get stagnant during the concert in the parks," he said.

The dam was inspected last on Nov. 3, 2017. "They did not find any significant problems. The worst issue they found is the spalling of the concrete from the walls and mill race surfaces, which are cosmetic problems," Czarnecki said.

In addition to Czarnecki's office, all inspection reports are sent to the state of Michigan where they keep on file all the

When asked, Czarnecki said he has not seen any kids walking on the spillway, but added, "I would definitely discourage anyone trying to do so as the concrete is slippery and one wrong move could be fatal. I have seen ducks walking along on the spillway and slipping down the incline. Before they get to the bottom, where the concrete and boulders are, they fly off."

#### SINCE THE CIVIL WAR TOO MANY OF AMERICANS HAVE DIED FIGHTING FOR OUR FREEDOMS

#### **American Civil War**

(April 12, 1861 to May 13, 1865) Approximately 620,000 soldiers died from combat, accident, starvation, and disease during the Civil War. This number comes from an 1889 study of the war performed by William F. Fox and Thomas

Leonard Livermore. Both men fought for the Union.

#### **World War I**

(July 28, 1914 to Nov. 11, 1918)

American losses in World War I were modest compared to those of other belligerents, with 116,516 deaths and approximately 320,000 sick and wounded of the 4.7 million men who served. The United States lost more personnel to disease (63,114) than to combat (53,402), largely due to the influenza epidemic of 1918.

#### **World War II**

(Sept. 1, 1939 to Sept. 2, 1945)

World War II fatality statistics vary, with estimates of total deaths ranging from 50 million to more than 80 million. The higher figure of over 80 million includes deaths from war-related disease and famine. Civilians killed totaled 50 to 55 million, including 19 to 28 million from war-related disease and famine.

#### **Vietnam Conflict**

(Nov. 1, 1955 to April 30, 1975)

The Vietnam Conflict Extract Data File of the Defense Casualty Analysis System (DCAS) contains records of 58,220 U.S. military fatal casualties of the Vietnam.

#### **Iraq War**

(March 30, 2003 to Dec. 18, 2011) After 4,486 U.S. soldiers died in Iraq and 2,345 U.S. soldiers died in Afghanistan, 1 million U.S. soldiers wounded in both wars, and a potential cost of up to \$6 trillion, a new group like ISIL now causes havoc in the Middle East.





#### **Korean War**

(June 25, 1950 – July 27, 1953) The Pentagon put Korean

War battle deaths at 33,652 and "other deaths" meaning deaths in the war zone from illness, accidents and other non-battle causes at 3,262. That yields a total of 36,914.



(Aug 2, 1990 to Feb 28, 1991)

According to "Gulf War Air Power Survey" by Thomas A. Keaney and Eliot A. Cohen, (a report commissioned by the U.S. Air Force; 1993-ISBN 0-16-041950-6), there were an estimated **10,000 to 12,000** Iraqi combat deaths in the air campaign and as many as 10,000 casualties in the ground war.

animals: The Humane Society of America says most shelter pets end up in facilities not because of behavioral issues or something they did wrong, but due to circumstances affecting their owners, such as moving or divorce. That means there are thousands of housebroken, behavior-trained pets just waiting for a new family.

• Lower costs: When a person adopts a pet, microchipping, first immunization costs, neutering/spaying, and some vet costs may be covered by the adoption fee. Plus, that adoption fee can be hundreds

of dollars less than purchasing a pet from elsewhere.

- Longer life expectancy: The Canine Journal says "mutts," or animals whose genetic makeup are a combination of at least two breeds, tend to have fewer health problems and live longer than their purebreed counterparts. But shelters also house many purebreeds for those who prefer to go that route.
- Room for others: For every adopted cat or dog, room is freed up to take in more pets that need assistance.
- Hurt puppy mills: Puppy mills produce pets in factory-style facilities that seldom take the welfare of animals into consideration. Adoption hurts puppy mills' bottom lines and helps fight against their inhumane breeding
