Continued from Page 1B and to connect the public with agriculture through showcasing these activities.

The Oakland County Fair ran for 10 days, ending Sunday, July 15. During that time, Scramlin estimates 109,000 visitors came through the fair, which is slightly higher than last year.

There are all manner of livestock cows, poultry, pigs and goats. There are 4-H participants, and also just members of the public who wanted to compete for colorful ribbons.

Scramlin said that 90 percent of the showcases and competitions are for the youth, which sets this fair apart from other county fairs. "That is our number one mission, through demonstrations and competition." Scramlin said.

The fair started as the "4-H Fair," which was only changed about 10 years ago. It also opened up who may compete, and added some adult competitions.

"We think, truly, we have a little something for everybody," he said. Competitions and demonstrations have been extended to computers, writing, cooking and canning, dog show, photography and farm design.

There is also a packed schedule of entertainment including petting zoos, watermelon seed spitting competition, a lookalike contest and different grandstand

activities, like figure eight races, monster trucks and safety day with first responders.

There's even a science day with GM engineers, and, of course, a full carnival with midway.

Change expected to counter stigma, encourage diagnoses and treatments While sex addiction is a topic many avoid talking about or don't find valid, the World Health Organization (WHO) recently classified the condition as a mental disorder, giving more validity to

symptoms and treatments.

By Hannah Ball hball@tctimes.com; 810-433-6792 SEX ADDICTION, which is also called nymphomania, hypersexuality, or erotomania, describes someone who feels a lack of control concerning sexual thoughts, urges and behaviors, *according to addictionhope.com*. One sign of sex addiction is not feeling in control of sexual desires.



WHO now defines sex addiction, or better known as compulsive sexual health disorder in the medical world, as a "persistent pattern of failure to control intense, repetitive sexual impulses or urges resulting in repetitive sexual behavior." This now means that "sex addiction" can be classified and diagnosed based on a set of criteria:

- Repetitive sexual activities becoming the focus of a person's life
- Numerous unsuccessful efforts to reduce sexual behavior
- Continued sexual activity despite deriving little satisfaction from it

According to USAToday, experts hope this new classification will change how doctors, and the public, view addiction and other addictive disorders, such as alcoholism, drugs and gambling. By having medical criteria, the moral aspect isn't as important and doctors can recognize that someone has a problem.

RECOGNIZING SEX ADDICTION

Sex addiction can include uncontrollable compulsions with pornography, masturbation, phone sex, cybersex, escorts, prostitutes, meaningless affairs, voyeurism and more. - Addictionhope.com



TREATMENT may include therapy or going to a rehabilitation facility, or simply journaling.

Most sex addicts maintain a façade of normality and functionality — holding jobs, paying bills, and showing up physically (though usually not mentally or emotionally) at family functions and other important events, according to addiction.com.

Psychguides.com explains a few unwanted effects from sex addiction as venereal diseases contracted due to behavior. Approximately 38 percent of men and 45 percent of women with sex addiction have venereal diseases.

Another effect is pregnancy. Approximately 70 percent of women with sex addictions reported they'd had at least one unwanted pregnancy.

According to addictionhope. com, research on the causes of sex addiction is lacking and not completely understood.

NOTICE ARGENTINE TOWNSHIP AMENDMENTS TO ORDINANCE #12

SECTION 17.04 ACCESSORY BUILDINGS

ADD: .02 Waterfront structures such as boat docks, boat hoists and boat hoist covers shall however be permitted as regulated in this section (Section 17.04.10)

Eliminate .07 and renumber 8, 9 and 10.

ADD: .10 Roof structures or fabric coverings over boat hoists shall be allowed subject to the following conditions:

- a) The boat hoist cover or roof shall not exceed three hundred twenty (320) square feet.
- b) The peak height of the roof shall not be higher than ten (10) feet above the water level and the eave height shall not be higher than eight (8) feet above the water.
- c) In order to maintain visibility and clear views from neighboring properties, side panels or vertical walls shall not extend more than eighteen (18) inches below the eave of the covering or roof.

SECTION 27.01 VIOLATIONS

Delete 27.01 wording and replace with: Any person, firm, corporation violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be responsible for a Municipal Civil Infraction.

ADD:

SECTION 27.2 PUBLIC NUISANCE PER SE

Any building or structure which is erected, altered, or converted, or any use of premises or land which is begun or changed subsequent to the time of passage of this Ordinance and in violation of any of the provisions thereof is hereby declared to be a public nuisance per se, and may be abated by order of any court of competent jurisdiction.

Delete section 27.03. Fines; Imprisonment

These Amendment changes will become effective immediately upon publication.
