Homes cost between \$17,000 and \$20,000 to build; usually about 200 square feet

Fenton Twp. — The tiny home built on a trailer on North Road rocks as large vehicles pass. Inside it feels small, but rich, with artisan woodworking and modern appliances and hardware.

It took Brian Fox and his father, Jack Fox, eight months to build the home, practically on a whim. Jack built the structure, while Brian built the cabinets and countertops out of luxurious woods like live ash, cedar, black walnut,

cherry, and 110-year-old heart pine out of a house in Linden. "We built this to meet or exceed all our local codes," Brian said. "We want to build it as if we're going to keep it ourselves."

They were looking for a project to do together, along with Brian's son, and this simply seemed like fun.

The tiny home is for sale, and they said there has already been a lot of interest from passersby — some are just curious because of what they saw on TV, others are actually thinking about a tiny house lifestyle.

This home has a self-contained toilet and shower stall. It's also cedar-lined with Delta hardware. Brian said the materials cost between \$17,000 and \$20,000. It's listed for \$29,750, and a percentage



will benefit Toys for Tots.

Technically, this is a trailer, and it would be registered this way with the state. It would be insured through the vehicle that tows it, Brian said. This would change if it becomes permanent. In that case, the local municipality would have a say in what houses can be placed, and where.

AT ICTIMES.COM WITH THIS STORY placed, and where. The city of Fenton's minimum home size is 950 square feet. Many tiny houses, such as the

unit built by the Fox's are about 200 square feet. In Fenton, Linden and Holly, the homeowner would have to seek a variance from the Zoning Board of Appeals, and the home must first meet Michigan Pre-Manufactured Housing approval.

None of these municipalities have yet received an application for a tiny house.

Seeing that big yellow school bus facing Owen Road with the "bus drivers needed" sign at Fenton schools brings back some very fond memories, memories of my old school bus driver, John Fox.

Before my family moved to the Chicago area after my eighth-grade school year, we lived outside of a very small town (at the time) called Bonfield, just about 12 miles west of Kankakee, Illinois. My younger sister, Monika, and I attended the one and only elementary school called Bonfield Grade School.

Monika and I rode the school bus every day. We would stand out on the side of the road in front of our house and wait for about five to 10 minutes.

THE REASON THE stop sign's working so well at Shiawassee and Owen is because during the day not a lot of cross traffic is there. So when you reinstall a light city of Fenton, just make it operable between 6:30 and 9 a.m., and again from 3 until 6 p.m. Other than that just leave it a four-way stop.

WE DON'T HAVE a second chance in life. But we have a chance to get forgiveness and change to a new life and drop those old habits. Stay on the good line. No matter what, you can set a good example for others and yourself. When the bus arrived, the doors would fly open and there would be John Fox to greet us with a cheery "good morning, girls" and big warm smile.

I remember the daily ride to school like it was yesterday. Some kids hate riding the bus but I loved it,

even in the winter. We were on the bus for about 45 minutes on a good weather day, picking up kids throughout the farming countryside. I remember sitting close to the window so I could see all the big farms, with the barns, silos, farmhouses, cows, horses, pigs and much more. I was amazed by it all.

John Fox was our school bus driver the entire time we were in that grade school. One time my little sister got sick at school and because she

Halloween also was very special in Bonfield, and especially at John Fox's house. He lived in a big, beautiful old house with his wife and family, right in the middle of town. Their front yard was completely decorated for the

occasion. They had a big black caldron hanging over a real fire pit and Mrs. Fox, who dressed in the most authentic witch costume I had ever seen, was standing next to it stirring hot chocolate. They served hot chocolate and caramel apples to all of us kids.

Mr. and Mrs. Fox truly loved children and I will never forget them.

I learned recently that John Fox died in a nursing home in April of 2006 at the age of 83. In his obituary it says he was a custodian and bus driver at Bonfield Grade School for nearly 30 years. Mrs. Lorene Fox, who I only knew from their Halloween celebrations, died in January of 2007 at the age of 85. She was a very nice lady, who had a riot of beautiful red hair in her younger years.

My heart is heavy right now just thinking about them. I hope that every Fenton student will benefit from a wonderful bus driver, one that they will lovingly remember 50 or more years into the future.

"Living in a big suburban home and also build something that's growing up, the structure allowed me accurate reflection of himself.


to accumulate a ton of things in my life, which ended up taking a lot of energy from progressing in my life," he said. "I could be developing my studies or my businesses or working in communities."



MichiganVotes.org is a free, non-partisan website created by the Mackinac Center for Public Policy to provide concise, non-partisan, plain-English descriptions of every bill and vote in the Michigan House and Senate. This report was released Friday, July 13.

The Legislature is on a summer campaign break. Rather than votes, this report contains some interesting or noteworthy recent bill introductions.

Senate Bill 937: Authorize "extreme risk" firearm seizures from individual Introduced by Sen. David Knezek (D), to authorize courts to order firearms to be seized from an individual based on

a "reasonable cause to believe" that the person poses "a significant risk of personal injury to himself or herself or others.' Family members, roommates or people in a close relationship with the target could petition a court to issue an order to seize the individual's firearms, and the court could issue this order without any notice to the target. The bill prescribes standards and procedures for this, and an appeals process. The court order would be in effect for up to one year and could be renewed. House Bill 4706, introduced in the House by Rep. Robert Wittenberg (D), would enact similar provisions. Referred to committee, no further action at this time.

Senate Bill 944: Revise road tax revenue distribution formula

Introduced by Sen. Steve Bieda (D), to revise the formula adopted in 1951 to allocate state road tax revenues between the state, county and local road agencies. The bill would change the formula from

one based on the miles of roads in a jurisdiction to miles of lanes, which would have the effect of transferring more money to more densely populated jurisdictions that have more multi-lane roads. The formula has not been substantially changed since 1951 because there has never been a consensus on how to reallocate this money. Referred to committee, no further action at this time.

Senate Bill 967: Require police agencies have specific form for reporting police sexual abuse

Introduced by Sen. Ian Conyers (D), to require a state board to create a standard form for reporting sexual misconduct by employees of a law enforcement agency, and require the form be distributed to all police agencies. Referred to committee, no further action at this time.

Senate Bill 971: Make drivers slow and move over when passing any stationary vehicle

Introduced by Sen. Morris Hood III, to revise a law that requires drivers to move over or slow down when passing a police car or other emergency vehicles on the side of the road, by expanding the requirement to include passing any stationary vehicle, not just emergency or service vehicles. Referred to committee, no further action at this time.

House Bill 5734: Mandate "sexual assault and dating violence" lessons in sex ed classes

Introduced by Rep. Tom Cochran (D), to require public school districts that offer sex education classes to include lessons on "sexual assault and dating violence," and lessons on "affirmative consent." Also, to require specified state officials and political appointees to develop a model curriculum for this. Referred to committee, no further action at this time

AUG. 5

1998: Marie Noe, age 70, is arrested at her Philadelphia home and charged in the smothering deaths of eight of her children, who died between 1949 and 1968. Each of the eight infants was reportedly healthy at birth, but later died when home alone with Noe. In August 1998, Noe confessed to killing four of her children but claimed she couldn't remember what happened to the other four. Noe was given 20 years probation and ordered to spend five years under house arrest.

AUG. 6

1965: President Lyndon Baines Johnson signs the Voting Rights Act, guaranteeing African Americans the right to vote. The bill made it illegal to impose restrictions on federal, state and local elections that were designed to deny the vote to blacks.

AUG. 7

1947: Kon-Tiki, a balsa wood raft captained by Norwegian anthropologist Thor Heyerdahl, completes a 4,300-mile, 101-day journey from Peru to Raroia in the Tuamotu Archipelago, near Tahiti. Heyerdahl wanted to prove his theory that prehistoric South Americans could have colonized the Polynesian islands by drifting on ocean currents.

AUG. 8

1974: In an evening televised address, President Richard M. Nixon announces his intention to become the first president in American history to resign. With impeachment proceedings underway against him for his involvement in the Watergate affair, Nixon was finally bowing to pressure from the public and Congress to leave the White House.

AUG. 9

1969: Members of Charles Manson's cult kill five people in movie director Roman Polanski's Beverly Hills, California, home, including Polanski's pregnant wife, actress Sharon Tate. The savage crimes shocked the nation and, strangely, turned Charles Manson into a criminal icon. Manson preached his own blend of eccentric religious teachings to his followers, who called themselves his "Family." He told them a race war between blacks and whites was imminent and would result in great power for the Family. Manson said they should instigate the war by killing rich white people and trying to make it look like the work of blacks.

AUG. 10

1981: The severed head of 6-year-old Adam Walsh, who disappeared from a shopping mall two weeks earlier, is found in a canal in Vera Beach, Florida. Two years later, career criminal Ottis Ellwood Toole, then an inmate at a Raiford, Florida, prison, confessed to Adam's abduction and murder. However, investigators were unable to locate Adam's body where Toole claimed to have buried it and without any physical evidence the Florida state attorney couldn't prosecute the case. Toole died of cirrhosis of the liver and AIDS in 1996 in a Florida prison, where he was on Death Row for another murder. On Dec. 16, 2008, the police department in Hollywood, Florida, announced that the case against Toole was strong enough to close the investigation into Adam's death.

AUG. 11

1994: The longest work stoppage in major league history begins. Because of the strike, the 1994 World Series was cancelled; it was the first time baseball did not crown a champion in 89 years. During the negotiation of a new collective bargaining agreement, tensions between owners and players had arisen over the owners' desire to institute a cap on player salaries.






