Fostering animals

— sometimes sad, always rewarding

■ Adopt-A-pet employee has fostered 100 dogs

Helping animals that come from terrible situations isn’t for everyone, but it is for Joyce Zentmeyer, a Davisburg resident who works at Adopt-A-Pet in Fenton.

Since Jan. 1 2015, she and her husband have fostered approximately 100 animals. Zentmeyer is the kennel administrator and event coordinator, and specializes in animals that need help before they can be adopted.

Her first foster was a puppy, who was reportedly “bitey and growly,” she said. Zentmeyer took her in to see if she did have a behavioral problem, or if she was just being a puppy.

Since that puppy, she’s helped dozens of dogs, including a pit bull named Incz that was hit by a car. He had issues with his front left leg and back left leg, and would hop around. Incz was brought in from Genesee County Animal Control (GCAC).

“It was determined that he didn’t need to have his leg amputated, but he needed surgery,” she said. They reached out on Facebook, and one woman sponsored his entire first surgery, which cost thousands of dollars.

“The dog has been hit by a car, he’s limping, but he’s the happiest dog on the face of the earth. He loves people and he loves life even though he’s in pain,” she said. Incz, 5, still needs one more surgery.

“It’s hard in the sense of what he suffered. He’s still suffering. These are the ones we fall in love with the most, the ones that have the hardest deal,” she said. Her husband wanted Incz to be a foster fail — meaning he wanted to keep him — but they found him a great home. The Zentmeyers

have two foster fails.

Her favorite foster case was one of the hardest. The GCAC found a Labrador retriever mix that had been living in a basement in a cage that was not big enough for him.

“He had been down there for three weeks with no food and water,” she said. “He couldn’t walk. He was literally skin and bones. The vet said he was probably one hour from dying.”

They named him Ezekiel. He was “afraid to death” of everyone, she said, so Zentmeyer would carry chicken in her pocket when taking him around town. She would give people the chicken to give to him.

After a few months, Ezekiel, 3, learned

to trust humans. It took awhile for him to get adopted, which perplexed Zentmeyer. She took him to adoption events around town, but no one wanted him. Ezekiel also wasn’t as social with people as he usually was. But, at an adoption

event at the Detroit Zoo, he met a family who he loved.

“Dogs wait for a specific family,” she said. “He now sits on the back of their couch and watches the deer, he goes on their boat, he has the best life. He snuggles with the kids. When they come along, it’s like ‘that’s the piece you were missing.’”

They’re currently fostering a 14-week-old puppy, who was very sick. They don’t know what the sickness was, but “she was going to die,” Zentmeyer said. The puppy, whose name is Hope, is doing much better.

“The most rewarding part is when they get a home. There’s nothing like it. The harder the case, the better the feeling,” she said.

She urges those interested in fostering to get a hold of Adopt-A-Pet to apply, and to always get your dogs and cats spayed and neutered.

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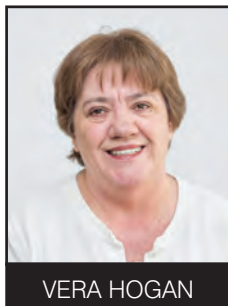

The milkman is long gone, but today, I am very happy because I can get all of my regular groceries delivered right to my house, from my favorite grocery store, which, of course, is VG's. I have utilized their "shop the fast lane" convenience at least five times. This is where you order your groceries online, choose a time to pick them up and pay online. When it comes time to pick them up there are four special parking spots at the store. You call the number on the sign and your groceries are delivered to the car.

With home delivery, which I tried for the first time last week, you choose a time slot, order and pay for your groceries online, and go about your busi-

ness while you wait for your purchases. When my groceries were on the way I received a text message that said the driver was three minutes away.

Less than a minute after she dropped off my stuff and left though, I slapped myself in the forehead and grumbled, "Oh no, Vera!" Was I supposed to give her a tip? So the next day I checked with someone in the know and learned that yes, a tip is customary. The amount is dependent on the size of the order. I will catch up with this lady and make sure she gets her tip.

Grocery home delivery may not seem like an affordable option, but it really is for me. There is a \$4.95 pick fee, and a \$9.95 delivery fee (plus whatever the tip will be). But I justify that in two ways. First, I am very busy and don't like spending a lot of time in the grocery store or the extra gas money to get there. Second, when I am in the food store, I can't help myself, I spend probably \$25 or \$30 (at least) on things I did not intend to buy. Take bread and shrimp rings, for example. Those two items are never on my list, I don't intend to buy them. But I can't go past either without buying one or the other, or both. I know, I have no self-control.

By ordering exactly what I need online, I save a significant amount of money by avoiding my compulsive shopping habit.

Believe me, it's a win win — at least for me.

The iOS vs. Android debate is one of the most popular in technology history, and isn't likely to disappear anytime soon considering the success of Apple and Samsung products.

While Apple is ever popular with its iPhones, more people worldwide use the Google operating system (OS), Android. According to IDC, a technology analyzing company, Android companies shipped a total of 1.24 billion smartphones in 2017. Apple shipped approximately 215.8 million iPhones.

While numbers are one factor, one thing to consider is that only Apple makes and sells iPhones, while numerous companies sell Samsung products. Google offers the Android software to Samsung, HTC, LG and Motorola. This is why Android phones vary more in size and quality.

Picks from five technology websites

Technology websites ignite this debate with information comparing the two operating systems on hardware, compatibility,

With hardware, **Lifeware.com** said it was a tie when it comes to the two OS's operating systems. It rated Apple higher when it comes to running updates and apps. Google is less strict when it comes to allowing apps in the app store. The Apple App Store offers fewer apps than Google Play, but there are more security threats with apps on Google Play. Lifeware also rated Apple higher in pure experience.

Lifeware rated Android higher in storage and battery life, intelligent assistant (Google Assistant vs. Siri), compatibility

with other software and companies, more USB ports, and cost. All in all, iOS and Android tied in six categories, iOS won eight and Android won six.

Computerworld.com said Android won in personalization and having control over the phone system. Apple won in attractiveness, but lost in cost. Android wins when it comes to integration of alternative applications, and in connecting phones to other electronics, battery life and Cloud integration programs.

Apple won for timely updates, video conferencing with Facetime and camera quality.

According to **CNNTech**, Android beats iPhones in nine out of 15 categories in user capabilities.

Across all these websites, Apple was the undisputed winner when it came to security.

"If you care about the security of your smartphone, there's only one choice: iPhone. The reasons for this are myriad and too long to completely go into here,"

according to Lifeware. Reportedly 97 percent of all malware viruses were found on Android devices, while none of those viruses attacked iPhones.

They rated Android the winner in the intelligent assistant debate, putting Google Assistant over Siri.

"Google Assistant is more than an excellent voice interface to Google search. If you use Google applications, such as Google Calendar and Google Maps, Google Assistant can make life simpler," according to Computerworld. "Siri may have been first to market, but it's still pretty basic. It's fine for answering questions, but it's not really that much of an assistant."

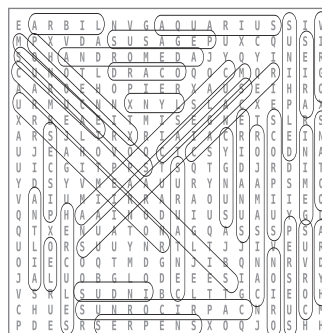

“This is easy as pie... no pun intended. The smokey flavor from the wood fire puts a great twist on an old favorite and with the help of a pizza stone, doing this over an open fire is easier than you may think.”

INGREDIENTS

- 1 pound refrigerated pizza dough
- 1/4 cup pizza sauce
- 1/2 cup shredded mozzarella cheese
- 1/2 cup sliced pepperoni

DIRECTIONS

Place pizza stone on grill directly over wood fire. You may need to begin by spreading out the wood if the flames are too tall. Roll out the pizza dough to desired thickness. Place it on the pizza stone and cook 10 minutes on one side until golden. Remove from the fire and on the cooked side, spread the pizza sauce in an even layer over dough leaving about a half inch around the rim of the pizza dough bare. Sprinkle mozzarella cheese evenly on top of the sauce, followed by the pepperoni slices. Place uncooked side down, back on the pizza stone. Cover with a foil tent and cook until cheese has melted, about 10 minutes more. Transfer pizza to a cutting board and let cool slightly before cutting and serving.

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
