A grand jury indictment was unsealed Thursday, Aug. 16, charging three individuals, including a Fenton Township doctor,

with health care fraud. An additional charge of money laundering was also was issued to one of those three defendants. The announcement came from United States Attorney Matthew Schneider.

Those charged with health care fraud include Patrick Wittbrodt, owner of Wittbrodt Consulting, LLC, Dr. April Tyler of Fenton

Cha-nell Flemming, 30, of Detroit is expected to appear in Genesee County 67th District Court for a probable cause conference Thursday, Aug. 23, for her alleged involvement in a jewelry store robbery in Fenton.

Flemming was arraigned July 11 on one felony count of unarmed robbery and one felony count of larceny of more than \$20,000. A cash surety bond of \$20,000 was ordered.

Arrest warrants have been issued for her two co-defendants, KK Lavon McGilary, 28, of Detroit and Marquis Boykins, 18, of Detroit. McGilary and Boykins face charges of unarmed robbery and larceny of more than \$20,000. They are not in police custody.

Shooter of pregnant woman offered plea deal

■Murder of two women occurred two years ago

The 55-year-old woman who was

charged with fatally shooting a pregnant Linden woman and her co-worker is considering a plea deal. She is expected to be back in court Monday, Aug. 27.

Jacquelyne Faye Tyson is charged with first-degree premeditated murder, assault with intent to murder and two counts of felony firearm after shooting Lyric Work, 20, and Tamara Johnson, 45, of Mt.

Morris, at the leasing office of Grand Oaks Apartments on July 26, 2016.

Tyson was offered the plea deal Aug. 6 at a pre-trial hearing, said Genesee County Deputy Chief Assistant Prosecutor John Potbury. She can plead guilty as mentally ill with two counts of second degree murder, one for each victim. The sentencing agreement would mean a prison sentence of 20 to 50 years.

Since the killings, Tyson has been declared incompetent twice, but was found to be competent Wednesday, Jan. 21 in Genesee County District Court.

She was placed on the record and the defense counsel asked for time to consider the offer and discuss it with Tyson.

"It's very difficult to say how the defendant will respond to our offer. If she accepts it, then the court will

make note of the offer and may allow her a chance to plead pursuant to the plea offer on the 27th. Otherwise, if the defendant declines the offer, the court will set a trial schedule," Potbury said.

The case is currently in Judge Joseph Farah's Circuit Court room.

The shootings

According to Grand Blanc Police Chief Brian Lipe, on Tuesday, July 26, 2016, police officers responded to the leasing office of Grand Oaks Apartments, for reports of two females being shot.

Once on scene, the two victims were located and transported to Hurley Medical Center. Johnson was pronounced dead. Work, who was pregnant at the time, was put on life support so doctors could deliver her baby. Work died Friday, July 29, 2016. Her baby, now 2 years old, survives her and is being raised by family.

Today it looks like nothing happened

Friday, Aug. 24, marks the 11th anniversary of the devastating F-2 tornado that ripped through the Fenton and Holly areas, knocking out power and causing devastating damage to countless vehicles, homes and businesses in its wake.

It was about 5:34 p.m. on that Friday, Aug. 24, 2007, when storms roared through the area, seemingly aimed directly through the historic downtown Dibbleville area.

The city of Fenton alone lost more than 4,000 trees. "The whole southern half of the city is damaged," said then-City Manager Michael Senyko.

A command center was established at the Fenton Fire Department. The city's emergency plan went into effect immediately. "Everyone knew their role," Senyko said.

A shelter was set up at the Fenton Intermediate School. The Red Cross and Salvation Army assisted. A curfew for all residents and nonresidents became effective that Friday at 8:30 p.m. The curfew for all individuals was still in effect the next day, Saturday.

1968 'Hello Democrats, welcome to Chicago'

The convention left the party with scars that last to this day

As delegates arrived in Chicago the last week of August 1968 for the 35th Democratic National Convention, they found that Mayor Richard J. Daley, second only to President Lyndon B. Johnson in political influence, had lined the avenues leading to the convention center with posters of trilling birds and blooming flowers.

Along with these pleasing pictures, he had ordered new redwood fences installed to screen the squalid lots of the aromatic stockyards adjoining the convention site. At the International Amphitheatre, conventioneers found that the main doors, modeled after a White House portico, had been bullet-proofed. The hall itself was surrounded by a steel fence, topped with barbed wire. Inside the fence, clusters of armed and helmeted police mingled with security guards and dark-suited agents of the Secret Service. At

The weather chanting crowds was oppressively hot and humid. The air conditioning, the elevators and the phones were operating erratically. Taxis weren't operating at all because

the drivers had called a strike before the convention began. The National Guard had been mobilized and ordered to shoot to kill, if necessary.

Even as delegates began entering this encampment, an army of protesters from across the country flowed into the city, camping in parks and filling churches, coffee shops, homes and storefront offices. They were a hybrid group radicals, hippies, yippies, and moderates - representing a myriad of issues and a wide range of philosophies. But they were united behind an encompassing cause: ending the long war in Vietnam and challenging Democratic Party leaders and their delegates to break with the past, and create change.

The 1968 Chicago convention became a lacerating event, a distillation of a year of heartbreak, assassinations, riots and a breakdown in law and order that made it

Holly Twp. — It was standing room only for the last to arrive at the Aug. 15 Holly Township Board of Trustees meeting.

Approximately 50 residents attended, and most public comments concerned the proposed expansion of the Holly Hills manufactured home park.

The topic isn't new — it's been in the planning and discussion phase since earlier this summer.

There were more than nine comments on the matter, many soliciting applause and cheers from the audience. "There is only one answer for this, and that's a big 'no," Edward Mills said.

■At the peak of the industry, there were 4.000 across the U.S. and 150 in Michigan

Mundy Twp. — The rumbling exhaust systems quieted down just quick enough for visionary carmaker biopic "Tucker" to start at the US 23 Drive-In Theater.

As the final few hundred settled down for the movie to start, the concentration of classic cars lined up for a movie resembled the scene during the heyday of the industry.



"People always talked about concern of (drive-in) movies when VHS came out, or TV came out ... but it's prevailed every time," said owner Johny Thomas, 35. He's worked to keep up with the times. For example, he up-

graded to digital projectors in 2013.

The theater is open "rain or starlight." He said the summer 2018 season has been "rough," with rain on many weekends. "Alot of factors in this busi-

Easements — Part II

A plat is a map showing how an area of land (tract) is divided into lots to create a subdivision. It shows the land's size, boundary locations, nearby streets, and other details including rights of way and easements.

Plats are recorded with the County Register of Deeds.

I presume that the only document evidencing the easements is the recorded plat, which is one of the proper methods of conveyance under Michigan law. Because your parcels aren't on the lake, you are considered to be a "back lot" owner.

One of the most important considerations in these cases is to ascertain the meaning of the easement grant language.

If the language is plain and unambiguous it is to be enforced as written. If it's not, then a court may consider other evidence to determine the scope of the easement.

Since I don't know what the language is here, I will simply say that lake easements come in various forms and give you two examples of the many possibilities.

The first is an easement, which provides lake access to back lot owners to use the surface of the water in a reasonable manner for such activities as boating, fishing and swimming. There may also be the right to temporarily anchor boats.

The second allows not only for the activities mentioned above, but also the erection of a boat dock or docks. This type of easement must be provided for in an original plat.

When one has a lake access easement, the general rule is that there is a right to use it without unreasonable interference by the servient estate owner.

In your case, it appears that by parking their vehicles and storing their property on the two easements, the servient estates' owners may well be unreasonably interfering with your lawful use.

The best advice that I can give you is to make an appointment with a real estate attorney and take all of your documents and paperwork.

The attorney will review the easement language and everything else and give you an opinion as to your rights and what your next step should be.

A simple letter from the attorney may suffice. If it doesn't, you may have to go to court for relief.

Creative Healthcare in Fenton Township and Jeffrey Fillmore, who worked for Wittbrodt as an independent contractor compensated by commission. Fillmore also was charged with money laundering.

Schneider was joined in the announcement by William P. Conway, special agent in charge, FDA Office of Criminal Investigations' Chicago Field Office and Lamont Pugh III, special agent in charge of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services Office of Inspector General's (OIG) Chicago Regional Office.

The indictment charges the defendants with a conspiracy to commit health care fraud and 17 counts of health care fraud.

According to the 16-page indictment, Wittbrodt worked with Tyler at Fenton Creative Healthcare between July 2014 and July 2017. He served as an unpaid consultant/manager while working out of Tyler's Fenton Creative Healthcare clinic.

Tyler is an osteopathic physician who owns and operates Fenton Creative Healthcare, at 1361 N. Long Lake Rd., Fenton. She is the sole practitioner at this location.

Fillmore worked for Wittbrodt as an independent contractor and he also operated out of Fenton Creative Healthcare.

The indictment specifically charges that between 2014 and 2017, the defendants would attend meetings of the United Auto Workers (UAW) union. At those meetings, the defendants touted unnecessary prescription pain cream, scar cream, pain patches and vitamins to UAW members. The prescriptions were unnecessary because Tyler did not establish a valid doctor-patient relationship with any of the UAW members and/or did not determine medical necessity for the prescriptions she wrote for the UAW members. Many of the compounded pain and scar creams were billed to the insurance company at over \$15,000 per prescription.

Over the course of the conspiracy, the defendants caused fraudulent claims to be submitted to Blue Cross/Blue Shield of Michigan and/or Express Scripts totaling approximately \$9,500,000. Over the same period, Medicare paid over \$800,000 in fraudulent prescription claims.

Wittbrodt also is charged with seven counts of money laundering in connection with the illegal proceeds of the health care fraud conspiracy.

"Health care fraud involving medically unnecessary prescriptions not only is dangerous to those patients receiving the drugs, but also drives up the cost of health care for everyone," stated United States Attorney Matthew Schneider. "This indictment demonstrates that our office is committed to stamping out health care fraud in the Eastern District of Michigan."

"When medical professionals and others scheme to illegally provide unneeded drugs to consumers, they violate the public trust," Conway said. "Our office will continue to pursue and bring to justice those who are criminally involved in the distribution of medicines."

"Writing medically unnecessary prescriptions for health care items and products and thus causing them to be billed to federal and private health insurance programs is wrong and illegal," Pugh said. "Fraudulent acts such as this threaten vitally

important programs such as Medicare and the beneficiaries they serve. The OIG will continue to work with our law enforcement and prosecutorial partners to ensure that individuals that perpetuate these types of fraudulent schemes are held accountable."

Health care fraud, conspiracy to com-

mit health care fraud and money laundering are each punishable by up to 10 years imprisonment and/ or a \$250,000 fine on each count.

This case is being prosecuted by Assistant United States Attorney Michael Heesters and Health Care Fraud Chief Wayne F. Pratt.

The case was investigated by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, Office of Inspector General and the U.S. Food and Drug Administration.

An indictment is only a charge and is not evidence of guilt. Each defendant is entitled to a fair trial in which it will be the government's burden to prove guilt beyond a reasonable doubt.

Despite the passion directed at the township board, technically the board has no regulating power over the expansion. The planning commission must approve the plans as long as they meet state guidelines. Township Supervisor George Kullis said it's difficult when their "hands are tied."

Their hands are tied due to the original consent decree, which allows the park, which is privately owned by Meritus Communities in Farmington Hills, to regulate itself.

Rose Township resident Sue Julian took to the podium to remind residents that a consent decree can indeed be re-opened if new information is discovered, which would have altered the judge's original decision.

She said that all the parties on the original judgment would have to agree to come back "to the table."

There were no decisions made at the meeting, but the next step is a Planning Commission meeting on Wednesday, Sept. 4, at 6:30 p.m. at the Karl Richter Campus.

At a press conference held on Saturday, Mayor Sue Osborn said, "We are requesting citizens to assist us with this effort for their own safety and to help speed up our recovery. We respectfully request that only residents of the city enter Fenton at this time." The curfew was lifted at noon on Sunday.

Post office clerk Patty Bandy said at the time, "You look around here and it looks like a war zone."

It wasn't just downtown Fenton, however, many areas of the city sustained serious damage. The tornado that swept through Fenton that Friday knocked down

the east wall and collapsed the roof of the new Tractor Supply Company building, on Owen Road next to the Fenton High School.

"I was standing right by the doors next to the registers when all of a sudden it got pitch black," said one employee. "We told everybody to run and when the roof came down it went halfway down and stayed that way. It sort of sounded like thunder. It was like kaboom and then the roof was gone." No one was hurt.

Fenton Fire Chief Bob Cairnduff said there were multiple funnel clouds that day, but only one is believed to have touched down. It touched down all the way through the city. The tornado, which was later classified an F-2, rotated at speeds of 150 miles per hour. It reportedly began in Livingston and Ingham counties, went through Fenton and headed through the Holly area to Hadley Township.

The road to Holly, Grange Hall Road specifically, was closed for a few days due to fallen trees and damage. With the exception of one good samaritan, who came to the area to help with the cleanup, there were no deaths or injuries.

Life after 'Streetscape' makes war zone of 11 years ago a distant memory

Strolling through downtown Fenton today, the tornado and its devastating aftermath is a distant memory. Walking along LeRoy Street — browsing through the shops, enjoying the many activities and events taking place downtown, and dining in one of the many restaurants, existing and new since the tornado — it's hard to believe that it looked like a war zone only 11 years ago.

The city of Fenton's "Streetscape" project, which began in the spring of 2015, was the key to making downtown what it is today. The \$4.7-million project



was paid for by the DDA (Downtown Development Authority), with additional federal and state grant dollars.

The plan called for renovating and upgrading the streets, curbs, sidewalks, approaches and equipment like benches and trash receptacles.

The total reconstruction work, which involved complete replacement of the road and included infrastructure like

storm sewers underneath, took place from Adelaide to LeRoy Street on Shiawassee, and on LeRoy, from Elizabeth to Silver Lake Road.

The streets were upgraded with everything new from the curb to the storefront, with scalloped

pavers, and wider sidewalks designed to bring pedestrians closer to store fronts.

New trees were planted with lighted planters. Instead of angled parking, there is now parallel parking.

Final touches on the project, such as landscape restoration and additional planting, etc., took place in the spring of 2016.

"I think both of them will be ready by fall," said city of Fenton Building and Zoning Administrator Mike Reilly. "They've already been rough-framed inspected."

The commercial space totals more than 18,000 square feet in two separate buildings, but by building code standards are considered one space because of the narrow area between the buildings.

None of the other sites are spoken for yet, although Reilly isn't worried about them filling quickly. "The way things are going in this town, it's going to go pretty fast," he said. "We're moving and shaking."

The Owen Shoppes project is replacing landmark Fenton restaurants, Big Boy and Pizza Hut, which were demolished in late 2017 to make room for this new re-development. Originally, a new concept Pizza Hut was going to be part of this project, but pulled out of its plans.

Speculation of specific tenants have ranged from Qdoba to Jersey Mike Subs. Originally, there was talk about a Mediterranean restaurant, with a concept like 2941, a fast casual organic eatery in Rochester and Auburn Hills, whose landlord, Doraid Markus, is the owner of Owen Shoppes through Owen Road Partners, LLC.

This company was created last December by Markus, a principal at Markus Management Group LLC of Birmingham.

"I've heard a lot of rumors, but until it hits my desk, it's not happening," Reilly said.

The property is being marketed by CMP Real Estate Group of West Bloomfield.

Linden football looking to make it 17 straight years into the playoffs

What were you doing during October of 2002?

The Linden varsity football team was busy qualifying for the state playoffs for the just the fifth time in school history.

Apparently the Eagles enjoyed the feeling, because since then, Linden has qualified for the state playoffs each year. Only six schools currently have a longer streak than Linden, making the Eagles one of the most successful teams in the state over the last 20 years based on the playoff qualifying measure.

Can the Eagles make it 17 straight this year? Linden did have some graduation, losses, but the Eagles also have some fine players returning. So, the odds look

pretty good entering the season. But Linden doesn't look at the playoffs, league titles or even individual wins when they chart their success. They chart progress.

"Our goal is to get better every play, every day," Linden cohead varsity football coach Nick Douglass said. "If we take it one step at a time, we will be OK, as long as we maintain the attitude of controlling what you

can control and the rest will take care of itself. Be a championship person on and off the field."

OFFENSE

The Eagles scored 446 points a year ago, and the quarterback that made that point total possible returns.

George Walterhouse returns for his second full season as the starting quarterback. He threw for 2,905 yards

and 28 touchdowns during his first season as signal-caller.

"He's progressing and working hard," Linden co-head football coach Denny Hopkins said. "He worked hard in the

Fenton football gunning for eighth straight Metro League crown

Life on the varsity Fenton varsity football team will be a tad different this season.

The high expectations remain. After all, when a team has won at least a share of each of the last seven Metro League titles, there's no reason to think a squad can't win a league title an eighth season. However, if it does happen, it will have to happen with a lot of new faces dotting the starting lineup.

Fenton, who has now won 29 straight league games, graduated a lot of strong players that made last year's perfect Metro League season and their 9-2 overall record possible a year ago. Most notably gone is Josh Czarnota, who can easily be argued as the greatest quarterback in school history. But others who are gone include Chanse Setzke, Grady Sondgeroth, Josh Maher, Hunter Chappell, Devin Fuller, John Sage and David Pietryga, so while reloading is the name of the game in Fenton, it will be a challenge.

'They are attentive and they work hard," Fenton varsity football coach Jeff Setzke said. "They listen and accept the coaching. All of that stuff is good. This is a little bit younger group and less experienced group

than we've had in the past, but we have some experienced guys who are bringing along the underclassemen."

OFFENSE

With Josh Czarnota at quarterback the last two years, the Tigers scored 491 points, the most points Fenton has ever scored in combined years. In fact, their 500 points in 2016 and their 461 points in 2017 are the two highest scoring teams in school history. So who will replace Czarnota? Right now it looks like that may be sophomore Dylan Davidson. If not Davidson, then it will be senior Logan Welch.

"Dylan is a special talent, but at the end of the day it may take some time to get his legs under him," Setzke said. "Logan is capable of stepping in the quarterback as well, but he plays a multitude of other positions. His ability to help us in other areas on the field make us a stronger football team."

The running game should be strong. Three-year starter Lance Mercord is back as is second-year starter Spencer Rivera. The two combined for more than 1,000 rushing yards a year ago, with Rivera collecting most of those yards. But also look at Zack Pierson, Jaden Lainesse and

Kaleb Anderson to get reps.

Fenton graduated quality receivers, but do have some strong ones back. Ryan Miller should emerge as one of the league's best, while Logan Welch, Frankie Shehorn, Cameron Steeves and Eythan Fulton will get ample action.

"We are pretty deep and have a lot of kids that can play," Setzke said. "It's a good group. They are not afraid to block and not all have to be pass catchers. They are hard working and really gritty kids. We may not have a kid catch 61 balls like Chanse last year, but we may have a bunch of kids catch 20 passes."

The offensive line returns three-year starter Logan Prater and fellow returning starter Dane Dean. Sophomore Josh Thompson should get a starting spot while Mike Miller, Zack Schulz, Elliott Wakeham, Jake Sullivan and Cole Patterson




