A passion for the beautiful winged creatures

■ Local woman saving the butterfly population, one monarch at a time

Fenton Twp. — Carmoleta Foley watches as a recently hatched female monarch butterfly clings to her fingertips.

It flexes its wings before rushing back to the window of her kitchen, Foley's colorful flower garden just beyond.

"Everyone used to call me the flower lady, now everyone's starting to call me the butterfly lady," she said.

This is the second monarch she's released back into nature.

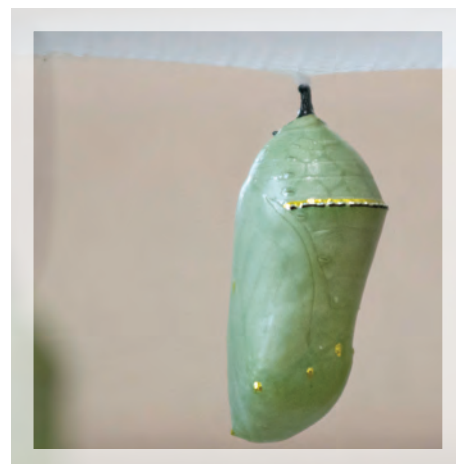
On the morning of Thursday, Sept. 6, another emerged from its chrysalis in the mesh box she built just for this purpose.

On a small table near a set of windows is her "menagerie" of monarch butterflies.

Currently she has several monarchs in various stages of development in her care. She has eight caterpillars, three about to go into chrysalis stage, five in the chrysalis state, and two about to fly away. She keeps a calendar of the butterflies' progress, mapping out when the next chrysalis should open.

While Foley helps these monarchs, the population as a whole is in decline in Michigan. According to Michigan.gov, these important pollinators have declined by 90 percent.

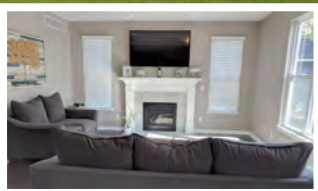

**My visit with
Leo and Jean**

Last week, I told you about my long ago interview with Ivar Strom of Fenton. A couple of weeks later, I also had the pleasure of interviewing Leo Weigant in the Shiawassee Avenue home he shared with his wife, Jean. He talked about the old days of Fenton.

The mayor from 1975-1977, Leo was a wealth of knowledge on Fenton history. His editorials, written to area newspapers under the pseudonyms of "Shiawassee Sam," "Mr. Fenton," and "Ole Snarl," were among the many fond memories people have of Leo.

During that interview in early 1995,

Leo recalled the days when downtown Fenton was a large trading center. "Folks from eight to nine miles in either direction would come in to do their business," he said. "If they got

into town early enough on Saturday, they would have reserved parking spots. When I was in high school, there were two blocks on the main street that still had hitching rings for horses."

Jean, a retiree from Fenton schools, recalled the Saturday night crowds as well. "Sometimes people came just to sit in their cars and watch everyone else," she said. "I also remember Saturday nights at the community center. Entire families would come for dancing and potluck dinners."

Like Strom, the Weigants also remembered the schoolchildren who would come in for the week from area farms. "We had three girls in our house at different times," Jean said. "They tended the furnace, cooked, helped out with the kids or whatever was necessary to earn their keep. The girls who stayed at our house became part of the family."

Leo also made an interesting statement during that interview. "U.S. 23 doomed the town," he said. "How can local shops compete when you can get to Flint in minutes? We want things to be the way they used to be, but with the amenities of modern life. That can't happen."

Leo said in 1995 that he believed the next phase of urban renewal was taking place out on Owen Road with Silver Lake Village and the new Kmart complex. "The pattern has been set now. The downtown area will be primarily service businesses such as doctors, lawyers and insurance agents. The downtown we grew up with no longer exists. All business sections have migrated to the nearest accessible roads."

Thank goodness he was wrong. I wish he and Jean, who both lived to be in their 80s, could see downtown Fenton today.

On that day, more than 23 years ago, Leo told me he was writing a book about growing up and living in Fenton, but said he probably wouldn't be able to finish it. Unfortunately, he was right.

The first part of his book, "Fenton — As he Knew It" was written by Leo. It was finished by former Times Features Editor (the late) Jan Rynearson.

When I moved to the city of Fenton in 1995, my parents, who lived in Phoenix, often asked me why I chose to live in this "rinky dink" town. When it was finished and published, I purchased a copy of Leo's book and sent it to my parents for Christmas. In it, I put a little note that said, "This is why. I can't think of a better place to raise my sons."

Let us never forget one of the darkest dates in America's history

Here's what happened that day:

Nineteen men hijacked four fuel-loaded U.S. commercial airplanes bound for west coast destinations. A total of 2,977 people were killed in New York City, Washington, D.C. and outside of Shanksville, Pennsylvania, in a terrorist attack orchestrated by al Qaeda leader Osama bin Laden.

At the World Trade Center site in Lower Manhattan in New York City, 2,753 people were killed when hijacked American Airlines Flight 11 and United Airlines Flight 175 were intentionally crashed into the north and south towers, or as a result of the crashes.

At the Pentagon in Washington, D.C., 184 people were killed when hijacked American Airlines Flight 77 crashed into the building.

Near Shanksville, Pennsylvania, 40 passengers and crew members aboard United Airlines Flight 93 died when the plane crashed into a field. It is believed that the hijackers crashed the plane in that location, rather than their unknown target, after the passengers and crew attempted to retake control of the flight deck.

Sept. 11, 2001 timeline

- 8:46 a.m. ET — American Airlines Flight 11 (traveling from Boston to Los Angeles) strikes the north tower of the World Trade Center in New York City.
- 9:03 a.m. ET — United Airlines Flight 175 (traveling from Boston to Los Angeles) strikes the south tower of the World Trade Center in New York City.

- 9:37 a.m. ET — American Airlines Flight 77 (traveling from Dulles, Virginia, to Los Angeles) strikes the Pentagon Building in Washington.
- 9:59 a.m. ET — South tower of WTC collapses in approximately 10 seconds.
- 10:03 a.m. ET — United Airlines Flight 93 (traveling from Newark, New Jersey, to San Francisco) crashes in a field near Shanksville, Pennsylvania.
- 10:28 a.m. ET — North tower of WTC collapses. The time between the first attack and the collapse of both World Trade Center towers is 102 minutes.

FAST FACTS

- Of those who perished during the initial attacks and the subsequent collapses of the towers, 343 were New York City firefighters, 23 were New York City police officers and 37 officers were officers at the Port Authority.
- As of July, 2018, 1,642 (60 percent) of the 2,753 World Trade Center victims' remains have been positively identified, according to medical examiner's records.
- Victims ranged in age from 2 to 85 years. Approximately 75 to 80 percent were men.
- Cleanup at Ground Zero (the former World Trade Center site) took 3.1 million hours of labor to clean up 1.8 million tons of debris, at a total cost of \$750 million.



- One World Trade Center in downtown Manhattan, replacing Ground Zero, is the tallest building in the Western hemisphere at 1,776 feet. Its height was a deliberate reference to the year when the U.S. Declaration of Independence was signed.

There's also an invasive plant in northern Michigan that attracts, and poisons, these butterflies.

The black swallowwort has been seen in the Grand Traverse County community of Kingsley, and is very hard to kill, according to the Traverse City Record-Eagle.

This May, the Midwest Association of Fish & Wildlife Services was working on a plan to reverse the decline of the monarch, which included bolstering habitats and planting milkweed, in a coordinated regional effort.

Foley's own impromptu conservation plan began just this summer when she was out in the garden one day and saw a monarch caterpillar. Her friend Lynn Behar suggested she bring it inside instead of letting a bird eat it. "It's addicting, I love doing it, I love watching them," she said. "It's very gratifying."

From the eggs, hatch the caterpillar, which she said can be the size of an eyelash, when young. She carefully collects them and keeps them inside where they can grow without being eaten by predators.

She gives them fresh milkweed every morning and night. "I'm just helping mother nature a little bit," she said.

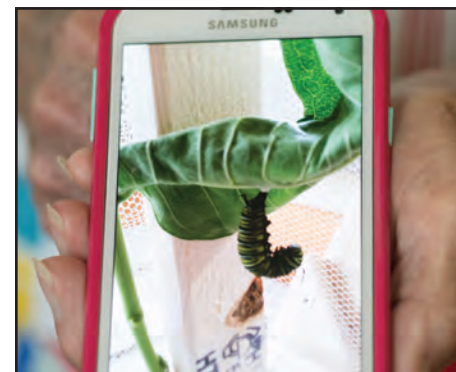
The city of Fenton has adopted the butterfly as a symbol, and has invested \$54,000 into the idea, as the butterfly garden nears completion downtown.

Assistant City Manager Michael Hart said the construction of the butterfly garden in downtown Fenton is still going well. Most of the work is done. The fences will stay up until the grass grows in, and the lighting is being tested nightly. For a peek at the work-in-progress light

show, check out the garden at around 10 p.m. each night.

He said the next major step is the handrails that need to be fabricated specifically for the steps. He expects the garden to stay within the budget of \$54,000.

"(The butterfly is) definitely symbolic of renewal, there's a lot of positive stuff going on in the city and downtown area," Hart said.

The life cycle of a monarch butterfly

Monarchs go through four stages — egg larvae (caterpillar) pupae (chrysalis) and finally the adult butterfly.

In February or March, the previous year's last generation of adult monarchs wake from winter hibernation to find a mate.

Then they migrate north to find a place to lay their eggs, which are on milkweed plants.

According to monarch-butterfly.com, this new set of eggs begins the first generation for that year. Eggs are laid in March or April.

It takes four days for the eggs to hatch. The caterpillars stay on the milkweed leaf, eating, and growing.

After two weeks, the larvae will be fully grown, and search for a place to attach itself to begin metamorphosis.

In this phase, the caterpillar attaches itself to the bottom of a leaf, and transforms itself into a chrysalis.

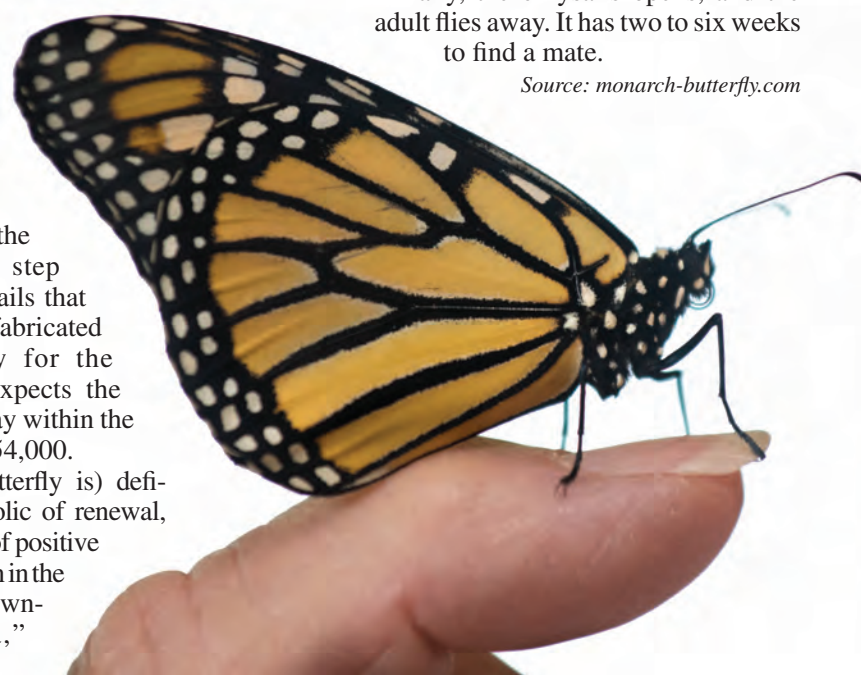
This period lasts 10 days. During this time, the larvae changes completely, and develops into the adult butterfly.

Finally, the chrysalis opens, and the adult flies away. It has two to six weeks to find a mate.

Every time you purchase a car raffle ticket, a Friday Night Fish Fry dinner or a ticket for rides on the midway, you're helping to support a sizeable outreach ministry at St. John the Evangelist Catholic Church in Fenton.

The funds raised by Applefest go back into the Fenton community through parish activities, including support for the St. John Outreach Program, the St. Vincent DePaul Society, St. John School and other parish ministries.

"Last year we netted \$212,000, which was one of our best years ever,"

said Will Stiverson, 2018 Applefest chairman. "We had four days of sunny, hot weather with no rain."

It was also the first year of Applefest corporate sponsorships, which helped add to the bottom line.

Stiverson emphasized that none of the funds raised at Applefest leave the local parish. "The majority of the programs offered at St. John's are free, because of Applefest," Stiverson said. "We have cut and trimmed everything possible; all the money goes to our parish programs."

Keeping track of all the finances during the four-day festival is a huge job undertaken by the Applefest finance committee, headed

"My grandparents, Joffee and Linda Mishall, were the event's chief fundraisers back in the '70s to the early '90s. They brought Nite-N-Reno to Applefest. My dad (Will Stiverson, Sr.) handled all the public address systems for the entire festival. He lived at Applefest from morning to night. I've helped with chicken dinners, security, set up and tear down and chaired the corporate sponsorship committee last year.

"Last year, I shadowed Sara and Dave McDermott, who chaired Applefest for six years, longer than any other couple. Now, I'm chairing the event, and my son, Logan, is helping out as the next generation of volunteers."

Laura (Faricy) Carpenter's grandparents, Dora and Tony Benvenuto, were involved after the couple moved to Fenton from Detroit in the late 1970s. "It was mostly just my grandma who helped in various tents," Carpenter said. "I remember that she made some doll clothes for the doll booths."

Carpenter said that her dad, Tim Faricy, was the ride chairman for the very first Applefest 46 years ago. "When my parents (Tim and Linda Faricy) wanted to re-start the spaghetti dinner, in about 1980, they 'doctored' my grandmother's authentic Italian recipe," Carpenter said. "They ran that for several years. My parents also chaired the Applefest in 1992 and 1993."

Carpenter, along with her husband, John, chaired the festival in 2000 and 2001, "just three days after 9/11," she recalled. "All four of us have been involved every year since. Now we chair the spaghetti dinner again with my sister."

Ron and Pat Lockwood have been involved in Applefest since its beginning. "That was when the Entertainment Tent was just one keg of beer," she said.

She served as chairperson of Applefest 38 years ago and has jointly shared the chairmanship of the finance committee with Ron for the past 14 years. "We followed in the footsteps of Lee and Kathy Johnson," Pat said. "We were co-chairs then. Now their daughter, Carolyn, helps us every year."

"Our whole family is also involved, from our kids, Brooke, Heather and Brad, to my brothers, Tim, Bob and Gary Winn, sister Donna and all of the kids and spouses. They come to help us for the weekend. It's a full, four-day event and we have to be there every day from morning until night to handle the finances, along with The State Bank."

Pat wouldn't have it any other way. "It's such a great group of people to be around, so I stay with it," she said.

"We usually get 75 bushels of apples, a mixture of all different kinds," said Amy Blissett, chairperson of the apple pie-baking committee for Applefest. "There's not one kind used more than another; that's what makes the pies so good."

Blissett has been the chairman of this apple pie-baking committee for "seven or eight years," she said, and was co-chair before that. "No one else wants the job," she said.

But Applefest pie-baking is a serious business, although volunteers have a lot of fun doing it. More than 1,000 pies and 100 to 200 apple crisps are handmade on-site in the St. John's Activity Center kitchen, all in just a four-day period, from Sunday, Sept. 9 through Wednesday, Sept. 12. Parishioners will also hand-make about 600 to 700 pies.

Pie bakers use the same original apple pie recipe every year, but it gets tweaked along the way, depending on the sweetness or tartness of the apples. "Everyone has to do taste testing," Blissett said. "Is the pie done? Is it too sugary? You have to make adjustments along the way."

Sunday and Monday are apple peeling days. "All our apples are hand-peeled," Blissett said. "Volunteers come in after the noon Mass on Sunday, and stay 'til 8 or 9 in the evening. On Monday, we'll peel for 12 or 13 hours."

It's a big job that takes about 80 volunteers at any one time. "We have to bag about 88 bags of apples, with each bag making about 15 pies," Blissett said.

"It's a pretty well-oiled machine."

Kids even get involved in this aspect of pie-making, earning community service hours for their efforts. "On Tuesday and Wednesday, it's baking time and kids can't be in the kitchen," Blissett said.

The last pie goes in the oven on Wednesday night, and we never know exactly when that will be," Blissett said. "We can do about 80 pies at a time, until all are done. I put all the pies in and take all the pies out. By the end of Wednesday night, I am sore," she said.

But the soreness and pressure of getting this huge baking job done is nothing compared to the reward of friendships made along the way. "I've met a lot of fabulous people," Blissett said. "That's why I keep doing it."

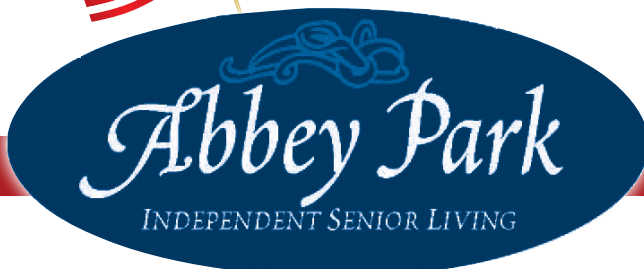

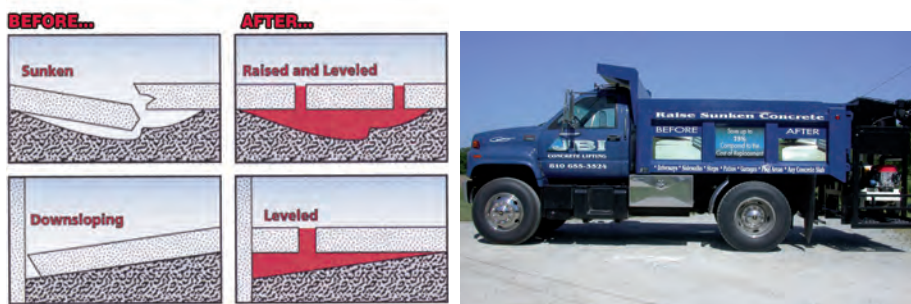

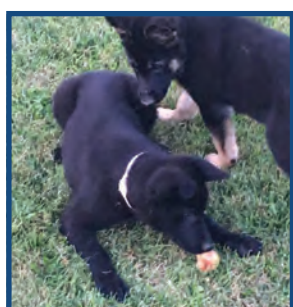

SESAME PASTA CHICKEN SALAD

INGREDIENTS

- 1/4 cup sesame seeds
- 1 (16 ounce) package bow tie pasta
- 1/2 cup vegetable oil
- 1/3 cup light soy sauce
- 1/3 cup rice vinegar
- 1 teaspoon sesame oil
- 3 tablespoons white sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon ground ginger
- 1/4 teaspoon ground black pepper
- 3 cups shredded, cooked chicken breast
- 1/3 cup chopped fresh cilantro
- 1/3 cup chopped green onion

DIRECTIONS

Heat a skillet over medium-high heat. Add sesame seeds, and cook stirring frequently until lightly toasted. Remove from heat, and set aside.

Bring a large pot of lightly salted water to a boil. Add pasta, and cook for 8 to 10 minutes, or until al dente. Drain pasta, and rinse under cold water until cool. Transfer to a large bowl.

In a jar with a tight-fitting lid, combine vegetable oil, soy sauce, vinegar, sesame oil, sugar, sesame seeds, ginger, and pepper. Shake well.

Pour sesame dressing over pasta, and toss to coat evenly. Gently mix in chicken, cilantro, and green onions.
