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OULT PULLIN' MY LEG!

Americans use idioms in their everyday language and may not even realize it. A good number of them involve our limbs, especially legs. Here are a few of them and their "unofficial" origins.

Cost an arm and a leg

If something costs an arm and a leg, it is extremely expensive. The exact origin of this idiom is unknown; however, most people believe that it started being used around the time of the First or Second World War. There were many soldiers who lost an arm and a leg during the war – this was a very high "cost" to pay for their country.



Shake a leg is an idiom which means to hurry up, to get going. The first use of shake a leg to mean hurry up is found in the New York Magazine in 1904. The origins of the phrase shake a leg are murky, though there are claims that the term comes from the American Civil War, when after a battle, stretcher-bearers would violently jostle a leg or arm to see if they could elicit a response from a victim on the field and thereby ascertain if he were alive or dead.



This phrase is a folksy way of describing something that has no support. The metaphor probably refers to furniture rather than human legs. Years ago we used to have four-legged, three-legged and even one-legged stools. All of these had functionality, but a stool without a single leg to stand on was incapable of supporting you.

Three-legged stools are used most often for milking cows, while one-legged stools are to put under your hinie and allow you to lean or sit unstably while watching races or other interesting outdoor activities where there are no "stands."

To pull one's leg is to deceive someone. The two most commonly repeated of the literal 'leg pulling' theories are: Thieves used to pull at people's legs to trip them and then use the quarry's disorientation as an opportunity to rob them. The "pulling my leg" theory is that people, the so-called "hangers on," were hired at executions to hang onto the victim's legs in order to give them a quick end.



Break a leg is said to actors for good luck before they go on stage, especially on an opening night. Theatrical types are well known for their belief in superstitions, or at least for their willingness to make a show of pretending to believe in them. The term "break a leg" appears to come from the belief that one ought not to utter the words "good luck" to an actor. By wishing someone bad luck, it is supposed that the opposite will occur.

This means to help a person mount an obstacle, to advance in some way. The original sense was to help a person up into the saddle by cupping one's hands for him/ her to place one foot in as a "step."

• **Book vendors early:** peak fall color times will be booked quickly, so book early.

• Make guest comfort a priority: Fall is pretty, but realize that wind and rain and cool weather are a possibility. Have a plan for rain, if your venue is outdoors, and consider extra heaters.

• Use the season's colors and harvest yield: fall isn't just about centerpieces — there's also the natural beauty of a fall sunset to consider.

• Also consider coordinating the menu with some fall touches, like chanterelle mushrooms, various types of squash, or slow-roasted meats.

SEPT. 30

1918: President Woodrow Wilson gives a speech before Congress in support of guaranteeing women the right to vote. Although the House of Representatives had approved a 19th constitutional amendment giving women suffrage, the Senate had yet to vote on the measure.

OCT. 1

1890: An act of Congress creates Yosemite National Park, home of such natural wonders as Half Dome and the giant sequoia trees. Environmental trailblazer John Muir (1838-1914) and his colleagues campaigned for the congressional action, which was signed into law by President Benjamin Harrison and paved the way for generations of hikers, campers and nature lovers, along with countless "Don't Feed the Bears" signs.

OCT. 2

1985: Actor Rock Hudson, 59, becomes the first major U.S. celebrity to die of complications from AIDS. Hudson's death raised public awareness of the epidemic, which until that time had been ignored by many in the mainstream as a "gay plague.

OCT. 3

1995: At the end of a sensational trial, former football star O.J. Simpson is acquitted of the brutal 1994 double murder of his estranged wife, Nicole Brown Simpson, and her friend, Ronald Goldman. In the epic 252-day trial, Simpson's "dream team" of lawyers employed creative and controversial methods to convince jurors that Simpson's guilt had not been proved "beyond a reasonable doubt," thus surmounting what the prosecution called a "mountain of evidence" implicating him as the murderer.

House Joint Resolution C: Protect "electronic data and communications" from unreasonable search and seizure

To place before voters in the next general election a constitutional amendment to add "electronic data and communications" to the Article I provision that recognizes the right of the people to be secure from unreasonable government searches and seizures of their "person, houses, papers. and possessions." The Senate never took up this amendment so it is not on the November ballot.

Passed 107 to 0 in the House on May 17.2017

OCT. 4

1965: Pope Paul VI arrives at Kennedy International Airport in New York City on the first visit by a reigning pope to the United States. During his American visit, limited entirely to New York City, Pope Paul VI visited St. Patrick's Cathedral and Cardinal Francis Spellman's residence. He met with President Lyndon Johnson at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel, addressed the General Assembly of the United Nations, attended a public Mass at Yankee Stadium, visited the Vatican Exhibit at the New York World's Fair, and then flew to Rome from Kennedy Airport. During less than 14 hours in the United States, the pope was seen in person by one million people and on television by an another 100 million.

OCT. 5

1947: President Harry Truman (1884-1972) makes the first-ever televised presidential address from the White House, asking Americans to cut back on their use of grain in order to help starving Europeans.

OCT. 6

1866: This new method of sticking up moving trains in remote locations low on law enforcement soon became popular in the American West, where the recently constructed transcontinental and regional railroads made attractive targets. With the western economy booming, trains often carried large stashes of cash and precious minerals. The sparsely populated landscape provided bandits with numerous isolated areas perfect for stopping trains, as well as plenty of places to hide from the law. Some gangs, like Butch Cassidy's Wild Bunch, found robbing trains so easy and lucrative that, for a time, they made it their criminal specialty. Railroad owners eventually got wise and fought back, protecting their trains' valuables with large safes, armed guards and even specially fortified boxcars. Consequently, by the late 1800s, robbing trains had turned into an increasingly tough and dangerous job.

House Bill 4205: Limit state

department rulemaking authority To prohibit a state department from promulgating rules more stringent than required by federal standards, unless specifically required by state statute, or if the department director determines "the preponderance of the evidence" shows a need to do so. Republican Gov. Rick Snyder has vetoed previous versions of this proposal. Passed 57 to 50 in the House on May

House Bill 4351: Exempt private aircraft owners from sales tax on parts

To exempt owners of private general aviation aircraft from having to pay sales tax on parts. This expands an existing exemption that benefits out of state aircraft owners (as an incentive to buy parts in Michigan), so that it applies to all private aircraft owners who reside in this state. Fiscal agency projections indicate this will save aircraft owners \$4 million annually, and reduce state revenue by the same amount. The Senate has not voted on this bill.

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Help reduce animal overpopulation

Companion animal overpopulation is a problem that continues to tax the resources of communities throughout North America. Each year, millions of animals are euthanized in animal shelters because there are simply not enough people to adopt them.

One of the easiest ways to prevent pet overpopulation is to spay and neuter animals. Cats can reproduce at very fast rates. According to the Cat Rescue, Adoption & Foster Team of Central Oregon, two uncontrolled breeding cats can create the following situation if they have two litters a year at a survival rate of 2.8 kittens per litter: 12 cats in the first year, 66 cats in the second year, and 2,201 cats in the third year. Cats reach puberty between 4 and 12 months of age. Female cats reproduce between January and September, and might come back into "heat" every 14 to 21 days until they have bred or daylight decreases considerably. Cats can give birth 60 days after they have bred.

With regard to when to spay or neuter animals, experts advise taking a "the earlier the better" approach. The North Shore Animal League America's SpayUSA says that, for many years, veterinarians were taught that cats and dogs had to be one year old to be spayed or neutered. But it is now known that kittens and pups can be spayed or neutered at the age of two months (or two pounds). The American Veterinary Medical Association has endorsed this practice, which is referred to as "early age neutering." When



spayed or neutered early, animals recover more quickly from surgery than they would if spayed or neutered later in life.

The Canadian Federation of Humane Societies offers that spaying or neutering is the responsibility of all pet owners. But for some owners, the cost of spaying or neutering can be a deterrent. Several municipalities, humane societies and SPCAs now offer low-cost spay/neuter programs or clinics to address this issue. One such organization is the Beat the Heat Alliance, Inc., which offers spay/neuter access, assistance and education in northeastern Tennessee. The group also sponsors the Beat the Heat annual event.

By controlling the rate of reproduction, communities can help alleviate the strain that is posed by pet overpopulation.



Honey Chicken Kabobs

Honey chicken kabobs with veggies. You can marinate overnight and make these kabobs for an outdoor barbecue as a tasty alternative to the usual barbecue fare! Fresh mushrooms and cherry tomatoes can also be used. (This can also be done in the broiler.)

INGREDIENTS

- 1/4 cup vegetable oil
- 1/3 cup honey
- 1/3 cup soy sauce
- 1/4 teaspoon ground black pepper
- 8 skinless, boneless chicken breast halves
- (cut into 1 inch cubes) • 2 cloves garlic
- 5 small onions (cut into 2 inch pieces)
- 2 red bell peppers (cut into 2 inch pieces)

DIRECTIONS

In a large bowl, whisk together oil, honey, soy sauce, and pepper. Before adding chicken, reserve a small amount of marinade to brush onto kabobs while cooking. Place the chicken, garlic, onions and peppers in the bowl, and marinate in the refrigerator at least 2 hours (the longer the better).

Preheat the grill for high heat.

Drain marinade from the chicken and vegetables, and discard marinade. Thread chicken and vegetables alternately onto the skewers.

Lightly oil the grill grate. Place the skewers on the grill. Cook for 12 to 15 minutes, until chicken juices run clear. Turn and brush with reserved marinade frequently.
