HAPPENS DURING DEEP SLEEP

CAN IMPROVE MEMORY

INDICATES UNBROKEN REM SLEEP

Most people dream. If you don't dream, it might be a sign of poor sleep health, which can impact your overall health.

Dreams have puzzled humans for all of history. There is no clear answer to their purpose or whether they mean anything. According to Psychology Today, ancient Egyptians thought dreams were messages from the gods.

So technically, what is a dream?

"It's really vivid mental imaging," said Dr. George Zureikat, medical director of the Mid-Michigan Sleep Center in Grand Blanc. "Some activities I think are related to their life ... You're mentally dreaming and

not acting out your dreams.”

He said 80 percent of dreams occur during REM (rapid eye movement) sleep, which is the deepest sleep stage of the cycles our brains go through each night. He said the human adult brain cycles every 90 minutes, and the deepest state happens at the end of each cycle.

During REM sleep, a dream can last a few seconds or up to a minute. It's possible, he said, that REM sleep is used for memory consolidation. If you've achieved REM sleep, you might better remember what happened the day before.

No thanks to the creepy crawlies

My son and his new bride as of Sept. 6 are returning home from their honeymoon today. They spent a glorious week in paradise — also known as Costa Rica.

Last week was so cold that I decided to live vicariously through the kids and checked out Costa Rica online, just to see what they were enjoying while we were freezing at home. They stayed at a beautiful luxury resort and I am sure took advantage of many adventures.

This online look-see led me to another site though and now, as beautiful as Costa Rica appears to be, there are a few little things that have resulted in my crossing that destination off my bucket list.

The site, at destinationtips.com, cautions visitors about 20 things not to do in Costa Rica. Here are a few of them:

Don't let your snake guard down. "We certainly don't want to scare you away from Costa Rica, but you should be aware that there are 22 venomous species of snake slithering around the country. This includes the fer-de-lance, eyelash viper and coral snake. In fact, it is estimated that there are two deadly snakes per hectare (100 acres) there. Rest assured, they're usually shy and try to avoid people, but bites do happen (about 300 per year). The medical system is very good here, so most afflicted people live, but it's not something you want to experience on your holiday. Be vigilant, stay on marked trails and obey

your guide."

Don't forget to shake out your shoes. "Okay, we're really not trying to scare you away from visiting Costa Rica. However, it's prudent to be aware that the world's most toxic spider makes its home there, and might be lurking in your shoe. The Brazilian wandering spider is particularly prevalent in Corcovado National Park, and it's a nightmare for arachnophobics. Bites are very rare, but you might want to shake out your shoes in the morning just to be on the safe side."

Don't go near the ants. "Costa Rica's various ant species aren't going to kill you, but their burning pain might just make you want to die. The jungles are home to creepy crawlies like fire ants, leaf-cutter ants and bullet ants, the latter having one of the most painful stings out there. The agony lasts for about 24 hours, and is likened to a gunshot wound—hence the name. These industrious creatures are quite fascinating to watch marching over trees, leaves and the ground, but don't get too close."

Don't touch the tiny frogs. "Another type of critter to beware of when you're wandering the rainforest is the thumbnail sized cute and colorful frogs with the elaborate designs — aptly named poison dart frogs. They're super cute and look like rubber toys you'd find in a gumball machine, but some of them have a deadly poison that packs a punch. Resist the urge to reach out and poke these cartoonish creatures if you have a cut on your finger. The deadliest little guys have enough venom to kill 10 grown men if it gets in your bloodstream."

Alrighty then! I know every vacation destination has some issues, and my son is just going to say 'Oh Mom!', but when it comes to deadly creepy crawlies — I'm sorry, I'm out!

"If you get lousy REM sleep, you probably won't remember things well from the previous day," he said.

Psychology Today suggests that dreams can be for memory consolidation and also threat simulation.

However long the dream is, it doesn't reflect the health of the sleeper — it's just important that they're achieving REM sleep overall.

"Kids have more REM sleep than adults for sure, so they'll have more dreams," he said. Young and older adults all have about 20-percent REM sleep at night.

Achieving REM sleep is important for children who are students. Better sleep means better recollection of new information learned the previous day.

It's also more likely you'll only remember the dreams from the final REM sleep cycle, which lasts the longest, at

about 25 minutes. You'll probably forget dreams from the first cycles unless you wake up and write them down.

It's likely not healthy if you're not dreaming, not reaching REM, or it could be due to apnea, medications or restless leg syndrome.

Interrupted REM sleep can also lead to more nightmares.

If someone experience a trauma, it's also possible that they can have more nightmares.

Consuming alcohol before sleep and sleep apnea are things that interrupt sleep and cause bad dreams.

Sleep apnea is the condition in which the airway is blocked as the body relaxes during deep sleep. The sleeper would then wake up, interrupting healthy REM sleep, and therefore dreams.

Alcohol helps initiates sleep, but can suppress melatonin if consumed an hour before sleep, according to thesleepdoctor.com.

Entertaining in a pet-friendly home

Pet lovers often find their companion animals to be the center of their worlds. Data from the ASPCA says approximately 44 percent of all American households have a dog and 35 percent have a cat. Similarly, the Canadian Veterinary Medical Association, in partnership with Hill's Science Diet, found that roughly 35 percent of Canadian households have a dog, while 38 percent have a cat.

Cats and dogs are cherished family members, earning gifts and premiere spots for lounging around the house. But even in pet-friendly homes, certain concessions may need to be made when entertaining. And don't forget about safety in regard to your pets, who may be frightened by the noise and commotion when guests arrive.

"PARTY ANIMALS"

Many animals are right at home during parties, while the sights, sounds and aromas may cause anxiety in others. For pets known to be a bit skittish, establish a safe haven for them away from the festivities. Keep the room as dark and quiet as possible, and include comfort items.

KNOW YOUR GUESTS

Some people enjoy playing with others' pets, while others may be more hesitant around

animals. Ask guests how they feel about pets and then make accommodations based on their responses.

PET BEHAVIOR

If yours is a boisterous puppy who loves jumping up on others, or a cat that can't resist napping on guests' laps while seated on the couch, he or she may need to sit the party out. Pets that behave well and know how to stay quiet may be better suited to hang out during the festivities.

CLEAN UP WELL

For guests who suffer from pet allergies, having animals around can be uncomfortable. Placing pets in another room and using a HEPA vacuum to go over carpets, upholstery and drapes may help tame the dander and fur that can trigger reactions among people who are allergic to pets.

FOOD AND ESCAPE ROUTES

Pets may try to eat party food that can be toxic to them. Guests will need to throw away scraps instead of leaving them out where items can be consumed by curious pets. Also, advising guests to exercise caution when entering and exiting the house can prevent nervous pets from escaping into the neighborhood.

INGREDIENTS

- 2 cups shredded leftover fully cooked turkey (may sub shredded leftover fully cooked chicken)
- 2 15-ounce cans cream style corn
- 1 15-ounce can sweet yellow whole kernel corn
- 3 cups low sodium chicken broth or vegetable broth
- 1 celery rib, chopped
- 1 red bell pepper, diced
- 2 cups cubed golden or red potatoes
- 1 1/2 teaspoons Italian seasoning
- 1 teaspoon garlic powder
- salt and pepper to taste

INSTRUCTIONS

1. In a large stock pot combine cream style corn, whole kernel corn, broth, celery, bell peppers, potatoes, Italian seasoning, and garlic powder.
2. Cover and simmer over medium heat for 20-25 minutes until potatoes are tender and easily pierced with a fork.
3. Stir in turkey and season with salt and pepper. When turkey is heated through, serve and garnish with fresh parsley or thyme as desired.
