Cooking, baking and food service management in demand

■ 'There's a giant market for this industry'

This is the fourth article in a series on skilled trade opportunities.

Anyone can follow a recipe, but not everyone understands why ingredients act the way they do and why food tastes a certain way.

Chef Matt Cooper, coordinator of the Culinary Arts Program at Mott Community College, said, "It's a great time to be a student in the culinary arts. There's a giant market for this industry.

'Right now, they're begging for skilled trades in just about every industry."

Culinary businesses are experiencing a shortage of qualified people in the front of the restaurant and in the kitchen. This extends to cupcake shops, bakeries, and

an increased demand for food management in hospitals and care facilities.

The Culinary Arts Program at Mott Community College offers an associate's degree in baking and pastry arts, an associate's degree in culinary arts and an associate's degree in food service management. These programs are ap-

proximately two years long, which includes students working spring and summer. Mott also offers shorter certificate programs in professional baking and professional cooking.

For our students, there's a 100-percent chance of employment if they put their

heart into it. 77

Currently, they have nearly 200 students. Cooper said they get "all different kinds of students" from people seeking a career change

to single moms.

"We spend a lot of time on utilization," Cooper said. "How do we use each part of the cow, of the chicken? Just because one food is more expensive, we don't nec-

essarily say this one is of higher value. All food is of high value. We teach how to be sustainable."

In the introductory courses, students learn theory. It's not about learning recipes; it's about learning why the ingredients do what they do, and the science behind it. Courses also cover international cuisine.

Students learn the modern ways of cooking before getting "fancy."

"You can learn to cook in a restaurant but you won't know why you're doing what you're doing, and you can't go further," said Cooper, who's been at Mott for 16 years.

The program has an advisory board, comprised of industry professionals from different food businesses. This includes representatives from white tablecloth restaurants, sports arenas, retirement and

elder care centers, mom and pop restaurants, quick serve establishments, country clubs, food trucks and more. The board even votes on the program's curriculum.

"We try to get a really diverse snapshot of our market. We know what they're looking for in the market. That's being a community college," he said.

A few well-known graduates of the program are the creators of the Coffee Beanery franchise.

The community can try the students' food at Applewood Café, which is completely run by the students. It's open Monday through Thursday, 11 a.m. to 1 p.m.

Cooper, who lives in Fenton Township, said it's a "great time" to get into skilled trades.

"Forourstudents, there's a 100-percent chance of employment if they put their heart into it. We have more employers looking for help than we have students," Cooper said.

The program also offers scholarships and study abroad opportunities.

Tuition varies in cost. The associate's degree in baking and pastry arts costs approximately \$14,500. The associate's degree in culinary arts costs around \$13,800. The associate's degree in food service management costs around \$13,500. Living outside of Genesee County will impact the cost.

LOOKING BACK at this week in **HISTORY**

MARCH 10

1988: With his brothers' songwriting talents backing him up, 19-year-old Andy Gibb staged an unprecedented display of youthful pop mastery in the 12 months following his American debut in the spring of 1977. And his star may have risen even higher were it not for the cocaine habit that derailed his career and contributed to his premature death. With his heart greatly weakened from years of cocaine abuse, Gibb succumbed to an inflammatory heart virus on this day in 1988. He was only 30 years old.

MARCH 11

2004: On this day in 2004, 191 people are killed and nearly 2,000 are injured when 10 bombs explode on four trains in three Madrid-area train stations during a busy morning rush hour. The bombs were later found to have been detonated by mobile phones. The attacks, the deadliest against civilians on European soil since the 1988 Lockerbie airplane bombing, were initially suspected to be the work of the Basque separatist militant group ETA. This was soon proved incorrect as evidence mounted against an extreme Islamist militant group loosely tied to, but thought to be working in the name of, al-Qaida.

MARCH 12

1938: German troops march into Austria to annex the German-speaking nation for the Third Reich. In early 1938, Austrian Nazis conspired for the second time in four years to seize the Austrian government by force and unite their nation with Nazi Germany. Austrian Chancellor Kurt

von Schuschnigg, learning of the conspiracy, met with Nazi leader Adolf Hitler in the hopes of reasserting his country's independence. Schuschnigg eventually gave in to pressure from Hitler and resigned on March 11.

MARCH 13

1965: In and of itself, one man leaving one band in the middle of the 1960s might warrant little more than a historical footnote. But what makes the departure of Eric Clapton from the Yardbirds on March 13, 1965, more significant is the long and complicated game of musical chairs it set off within the world of British blues rock. When Clapton walked out on the Yardbirds, he did more than just change the course of his own career. He also set in motion a chain of events that would see not just one, but two more guitar giants — Jeff Beck and Jimmy Page — pass through the Yardbirds on their way toward significant futures of their own.

MARCH 14

1958: For as long as most people have been buying popular music on records, tapes and compact discs, the records, tapes and disks they've bought have carried labels like "Certified Gold" and "Double Platinum." When a young trade organization called the Recording Industry Association of America (RIAA) created and trademarked its preciousmetals-based scale for measuring music sales it awarded its first official Gold Record to Perry Como for his smash-hit single "Catch A Falling Star."

MARCH 15

1970: Boston Bruin Bobby Orr becomes the first defenseman in NHL history to score 100 points in a season, after scoring four goals in one game against the Detroit Red Wings. Orr would finish the 1969-70 season with 120 points, a record for a defensive player that cemented his status as the best offensive defenseman in NHL history.

MARCH 16

1903: Roy Bean, the self-proclaimed "law west of the Pecos," dies in Langtry, Texas. A saloonkeeper and adventurer, Bean's claim to fame rested on the often humorous and sometimes-bizarre rulings he meted out as a justice of the peace in western Texas during the late 19th century. By then, Bean was in his 50s and had already lived a life full of rough adventures.

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



The Southern Lakes Parks and Recreation Commission is considering applying for a MNRTF Grant in the amount of \$300,000 for the development of the Silver Lake Road Connector Trail. 



Set realistic expectations when housebreaking puppies

Individuals and families who decide to bring new puppies into their homes understand that their lives are bound to change until the new pup acclimates to the household. Many are willing to accept the work involved because of the love and affection their adorable puppy offers.

Arguably one of the most challenging and often frustrating — components about puppyhood is training the dog to use the outdoors for bathroom needs. It's easy to underestimate the time involved in housebreaking a puppy. The Humane Society of America says puppies typically can control their bladders for one hour for every month of age. That means if the dog is three months old, he can hold it for about three hours.

How often a puppy will need to defecate depends on the food being fed and when meals are offered. The American Kennel Club says that most puppies will need to poop shortly after a meal, anywhere from 15 minutes to a few hours.

Puppies typically can hold urine a little longer overnight, but probably won't be able to go the entire night without a potty break. Many pups can last around six hours from the last time they've gone out. An early-morning bathroom break will be needed, or consider penning the dog with puppy pads to catch the mess until the dog gains greater control over its bladder. Housebreaking requires extreme patience, routine and practice. Eventually the puppy will gain greater control of its bowels and stop soiling inside the house.

The following are some other tips for housebreaking success:

- Take pups outside immediately in the morning, after naps and after vigorous play.
- Pick up food bowls and water several hours before bedtime. This can prevent accidents by ensuring dogs' stomachs and bladders are not full overnight.
- Some pups may be hesitant to go outside when the weather is cold, rainy or snowy, so people who live in cold climates may want to wait until the weather warms up to adopt their puppies.
- Err on the side of caution at the start and take the pup outside once every 30 to 60 minutes to establish a system of reward and praise for going outside.
- Contain the pup when you can't provide it with your undivided attention. It only takes a moment for a puppy to wander off and have an accident.



Serves 2

INGREDIENTS:

- 1 large garlic clove
- ½ inch piece fresh ginger,
- 2 teaspoons teriyaki sauce
- 1 teaspoon rice wine vinegar
- 1 cod fillet, about 3/4 lb
- Freshly ground black pepper Spray made of water-diluted oil

- Salsa of choice

Black Bean Tomato Sauce

- 4 cloves garlic, peeled
- 1 inch fresh ginger
- 6 to 7 scallions, chopped
- 1¼ cups stock
- 1/4 cup dry sherry
- 1 teaspoon oyster sauce
- 1 teaspoon Chinese chili sauce • 2 teaspoons Chinese black bean sauce
- ½ cup passata
- Juice of 1 lime
- 2 tablespoons fresh cilantro

ROASTED BLACK BEAN

DIRECTIONS:

Make the black bean sauce and set aside:

Crush together the garlic and ginger and put in a wok with the chopped scallions, stock and sherry. Simmer briskly until the liquid has almost evaporated.

Stir in the oyster, chili and black bean sauces and bring to a boil. Continue to boil, stirring for a few seconds.

Stir in the passata, and then simmer briskly for 30 seconds. Stir in the lime juice and chopped cilantro and simmer for a few seconds longer.

Make the cod:

Crush together the garlic and ginger and put in a bowl with the teriyaki sauce and vinegar.

Put the cod on a plate and cover with the ginger-garlic mixture. Grind over some pepper. Marinate at room temperature for approximately 20

Mist a baking sheet with the oil-water spray. Put the cod on the sheet, scraping all of the marinade over the fish. Spray with oil and oven-roast for 9 to 10 minutes per one-inch thickness of fish.

Spoon the heated Black Bean Tomato Sauce onto a plate. Set the roasted fish on top, then surround with salsa as garnish.
