PEPPERMINT

Looking for an effective, yet natural way to combat mosquitoes? Try peppermint! Combine a few drops of peppermint essential oil with one cup of water in a spray bottle, shake well, and spray onto skin. Not

only will the chemical compounds in peppermint help repel the blood-sucking beasts, but you'll also smell minty fresh!

Citronella candles are great for repelling insects, but they can be pricey. Get

the same effect for much cheaper by mixing garlic with water and spraying it near all your outdoor light bulbs. As the bulbs heat up, they spread a faint garlicky scent across your yard, which will keep mosquitoes and other bugs away.

ROSEMARY AND SAGE

Do mosquitoes hover over the grill when you barbecue? Next time, place a few springs of rosemary or sage on top of the coals. They'll repel mosquitoes, leaving your meat in peace.

There is only one thing that can make rational human beings slap themselves in the face mosquitoes. Those little blood suckers (a.k.a. the Michigan Air Force) will surely be out in full force this summer, even more so than usual because of all the rain we received this spring. There are ways to keep them off your body and yard, too, with do-ityourself methods that don't require the use of scary, unknown chemicals.

If you don't like the smell of garlic (a key ingredient in some of the following sprays), don't worry, human noses aren't sensitive enough to detect the smell (you may smell a mild scent for an hour as it dissipates).



EUCALYPTUS
When shopping for a natural mosquito repellent, look for one that contains oil of lemon

LEMON

one that contains oil of lemon eucalyptus. It's extremely effective and provides longlasting protection.

ONION, GARLIC AND CAYENNE

One cocktail these little critters will be sure to hate is an (almost) all-natural insect spray to repel mosquitoes as well as other insects like flies. Chop one small onion and one clove of garlic. Mix together with four cups of water, four teaspoons of cayenne pepper, and one tablespoon of liquid dish soap. Spray around your deck and in places where your children play (rather than on the children themselves). This mixture will last a week or so if stored in a jar with a tight-fitting lid and kept in a dark, cool place.



NATURAL VERSION WITH APPLE CIDER VINEGAR

Mix together a quarter cup of apple cider vinegar, a quarter cup of witch hazel, and around 20 drops of a combination of any the following essential oils: rosemary, citronella, tea tree, cedar, eucalyptus, or lemongrass. Transfer the mixture to a spray bottle, and shake before each use. Spray directly on exposed skin and the bugs will stay away.

EGG CARTONS AND COFFEE TRAYS

You don't have to buy citronella candles, mosquito coils, or the latest gadget to repel mosquitoes — you can just use cardboard egg cartons and coffee trays (the kind you get when you order more than a couple of coffees to-go). Light them on fire, then blow them out and let them smolder in a firesafe location. The burning smell they produce is pleasant, but keeps mosquitoes away.

LOCAL NATURE SANCTUARIES

These local sanctuaries are both owned by the Michigan Nature Association (MNA). They are the quickest way to be immersed in nature, where the trees, plants and animals are es sentially left alone by humans. They're both open during daylight hours andare free to explore.

Dauner-Martin Nature Sanctuary in Fenton

This 15 5-acre pr eserve is on e of five Michigan preserves located within the borders of a city, according to the MNA. It features lage pine groves "in terwoven among hardwood forests." The hiking trails are marked, with occasional maps along the way.

The property was used in 1863 to grow hops for owner Philip Dauner 's brewery. He passed the property down to his great-grandchildren Marion and Robert Martin, who donated it to the MNA in 1998.

Location: There's an entrance adjacent to the North LeRoy Street VG's, and on Dauner Road, just east of North LeRoy Street.

Sharon Zahrfeld Memorial Nature Sanctuary

in Argentine Township

The preserve, according to the MNA, is made of gently rolling hills around Save It Creek, which is part of the Shiawassee River Watershed. The trails are marked, but narrow . Long sleeves, boots and bug spray is recommended, and it may not be navigable or fun for small children.

The sanctuary is the namesake of long time volunteer and MNAmember Sharon Zahrfeld. Location: 8350 Rolston Road, Linden

The current aquatic plant control program on Byram Lake is scheduled to end this year. It is proposed to continue the project through 2024. The project will consist of herbicide treatments, and if feasible mechanical harvesting for aquatic plant control and continued water quality monitoring to gauge the effectiveness of the project. Estimated annually project costs for the proposed project 2020 through 2024 are:

In order to ensure assessments levied are proportionate to the benefit derived from the project, it is proposed that lot size be considered when determining individual assessments. Under this plan, a "unit" assessment would be levied against lots with a mean lot width of 300 feet or less. Lots greater than 300 feet in width would be assessed two units in the proposed Byram Lake special assessment district. This equates to a unit assessment of approximately \$266.67 per year for 5 years.

Pork Chops with Butter Bean Salad

Serves 4 **INGREDIENTS:**

- 1 slice sandwich bread, torn into pieces
- 4 tablespoons olive oil
- ٠ 2 scallions, sliced
- Kosher salt and black pepper ٠
- 4 boneless pork chops (1 inch thick; about 1.5 pounds total)
- 1 bunch spinach, thick stems removed and leaves thinly sliced (about 4 cups)
- 1 14-ounce can butter beans, rinsed
- 1 tablespoon red wine vinegar
- 1/2 teaspoon dried oregano

DIRECTIONS:

- 1. Heat oven to 400 F. In a food processor, pulse the bread and 2 tablespoons of the oil to form coarse crumbs. Spread on a rimmed baking sheet and bake until crisp, 5 to 6 minutes. Toss with the scallions, 1/2 teaspoon salt, and 1/8 teaspoon pepper.
- 2. Meanwhile, heat 1 tablespoon of the remaining oil in a large ovenproof skillet over medium-high heat. Season the pork with 1/2 teaspoon each salt and pepper and cook until browned, 2 to 3 minutes per side. Transfer the skillet to the oven and roast the pork until cooked through, 6 to 8 minutes.
- 3. In a large bowl, toss the spinach and beans with the vinegar, oregano, the remaining tablespoon of oil, 1/2 teaspoon salt, and 1/8 teaspoon pepper. Top the pork with the bread crumbs mixture. Serve with the salad.

Safely take dogs for wilderness walks

Hiking is a rewarding, healthy activity that can help people connect with nature. Walks in the wilderness also present perfect opportunities to get the family dog out for some fresh air.

When walking dogs in wooded areas, pet owners must exercise caution to protect their dogs, themselves and fellow nature lovers.

· Confirm leash policies. When walking dogs in public settings, it's always best to keep them on a leash. Many areas even have laws that mandate dogs be kept on leashes at all times. If you hope to walk a dog off-leash, visit the park or wooded area ahead of time or contact your local parks department to determine the laws governing the area.

· Recognize the benefits of leashes. Even if you're not legally obligated to keep the dog on a leash while walking through the woods, the benefits of doing so are numerous. Keeping your dogs on a leash makes it easier for you and your dog to get away if you encounter something unexpected, like a coyote or a bear. It's also easier to keep your dog on the

walking path and out of brush or bushes, where ticks or other bugs might attach themselves to the dog and ultimately put its health in jeopardy.

· Apply tick repellant. Even dogs that stay on walking paths in wooded areas are vulnerable to ticks. That vulnerability increases their owners' susceptibility to ticks as well, as ticks that attach to dogs may eventually bite the dogs' owners. Flea and tick collars can effectively deter ticks from feasting on dogs. Owners also should apply tick repellant to themselves before entering wooded areas.

· Bring water and treats. Hikers bring extra water and food along during a hike to satisfy any hunger pangs they have while walking and to ensure they have some sustenance should they get lost. The same precautionary measures are necessary for dogs. Pack a portable water bowl and extra water for your pooch so the dog does not become dehydrated during the walk. Some healthy, energy-boosting snacks can help dogs withstand lengthy hikes as well.



· Recognize signs that the dog needs to turn around and go home. Heavy panting, a slow gait and repeated efforts to lay down are signs that dogs have grown tired. Monitor your dog's energy levels and turn around or return to your vehicle at the first sign a dog is running out of gas.

Wilderness walks provide great opportunities to get dogs exercise and fresh air. Some simple precautionary measures can ensure such walks are enjoyable for everyone.
