one example, where conservation can be taught amidst the din of the festival. Lubrano hails from Bastrop, Texas and helps run "Wildlife Revealed," a 40-bird conservation 501(c)3 non-profit organization dedicated to wildlife education.

"Bird shows are one way in which we like to have people encounter wildlife and understand their relationship with the birds," said Lobrano, a trainer and falconer.

There are other learning opportunities, according to Kim Heidger of the festival marketing department. There are glass blowing demonstrations, leatherworking demonstrations, and a festival Friday that is geared a little more toward school groups.

Every year there are themed weekends, which are listed in detail at michrenfest.com.

What's new this year?

"Ulfgard" is the new Viking encampment. There are various demonstrations, like blacksmithing, Viking wrestling (glima) and Viking lore.

If you're lucky, you could catch **pickle** jousting, a new "lame game" that happens randomly throughout the day.

New this year is the **Pegasus perfor**mance. You can see this from 10:30 a.m. to noon, 3:45 to 4:30 p.m., and 6 to 7 p.m.

You can reserve the **Tower of Dragons** party location. This spot overlooking the jousting field is bookable for groups and gives you a spot to store belongings and offers a party food menu.

Visitors also can watch the **new joust** troupe or experience the MedEvil es-

cape room.

These themed weekends and activites are brainstormed by the festival staff, including Heidger. "There is literally something for everyone," she said. "We have such a wide demographic that come out. It's tons of fun."

Holly VFW to help school marching band get to Ireland

■ Carnival will raise funds and provide fun for the whole family

The Holly VFW Post and VFW Auxiliary 5587 are hosting a fundraising carnival Sunday, Sept. 15 at the post home, 201 Airport Dr., Holly.

The event will take place between 2 and 6 p.m. and feature carnival games and food. Activities will provide fun for the whole family. There is no admission, however, there is a nominal charge for food and games.

Proceeds from the event will help the Holly Broncho Marching band get to Ireland. The band will perform in the 89th St. Patrick's Day Parade next year in Dublin, Ireland. The group will travel with more than 200 students and parents of the village of Holly from March 13 to 18, 2020. This is a major milestone for the Holly band program. Preparations have been going on for two years.

In May 2018, the Holly Area Schools district received a letter from the Lord Mayor of Dublin officially inviting the band to perform in the 2020 St. Patrick's Day Parade.

Superintendent Scott Roper said there currently are only a few high school bands from the United States performing in the parade along with several college marching bands. While in Ireland, the Holly band will visit the city of Limerick, Bunratty Castle and Trinity College along with various other historical landmarks and castles. The band is also getting new uniforms, which they will debut for the first time in the parade.

The band is under the direction of Ben Baldwin, a former professional trombonist with the U.S. Marine Corps Band.

Pineapple Upside Down Cake

Pineapple upside down cake is a familiar dessert classic on which people can put their own unique spins. With this recipe from "Vegan Cooking for Beginners" (Publications International) by PIL editors, vegan dessert guests can also enjoy the fare thanks to vegan-friendly ingredients.



Makes 10 servings

INGREDIENTS: TOPPING

- ½ cup packed brown sugar
- 1/4 cup vegan buttery spread
- 7 canned or fresh pineapple slices
- 7 maraschino cherries

CAKE

- 3 tablespoons boiling water
- 1 tablespoon ground flaxseed
- 2 cups all-purpose flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- ½ teaspoon salt
- 1 cup granulated sugar
- ½ cup vegetable oil
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 cup refrigerated coconut milk beverage
- ½ teaspoon baking soda
- 1 tablespoon apple cider vinegar

DIRECTIONS:

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 F. Grease 9-inch round baking pan.
- 2. For topping, cook and stir brown sugar and buttery spread in medium skillet over medium heat until melted and smooth. Remove from heat. Pour into prepared pan. Arrange pineapple slices in pan, placing cherries in centers of pineapples
- 3. Combine boiling water and flaxseed in small bowl. Let stand until cool. Whisk flour, baking powder and salt in medium bowl. Whisk granulated sugar, oil and vanilla in large bowl until well blended. Whisk in flaxseed mixture. Stir in flour mixture just until moistened. Stir in coconut milk just until blended. Place baking soda in small cup; stir in vinegar. Gently stir vinegar into batter just until blended. Pour batter over pineapple.
- 4. Bake 45 to 50 minutes, or until toothpick inserted into center comes out clean. Cool in pan on wire rack for 10 minutes. Run thin knife around edge of pan to loosen cake. Invert onto serving plate.

Cool completely.

Note: The cake can also be baked in a 12-inch cast-iron skillet. Melt the buttery spread and brown sugar in the skillet, add the pineapple and cherries and pour the batter over the fruit. Check the cake for doneness at 40 minutes.



CITY OF LINDEN

ORDINANCE NO. 392

An ordinance to repeal Sections 71.01, 71.02 and 71.03 of Chapter 71 of the Code of Ordinances and to adopt new ordinances regarding pedestrians.

THE CITY OF LINDEN ORDAINS:

Section 1. Repeal Sections 71.01, 71.02 and 71.03 of Chapter 71 of the Code of Ordinances.

The City hereby repeals Sections 71.01, 71.02 and 71.03 of Chapter 71 of the Code of Ordinances in their entirety.

Section 2. Adoption of New Regulations Concerning Pedestrians.

The City hereby adopts new sections under Chapter 71 to read as follows:

71.01 Obedience to Traffic Laws

Pedestrians shall obey the instructions of all official traffic control signals, signs, and other control devices applicable to vehicular traffic unless otherwise directed by a police officer.

71.02 Crosswalk Defined

"Marked crosswalk" means any portion of a roadway distinctly indicated for pedestrian crossing by appropriate markings, signs, barriers, or other devices to give notice thereof.

71.03 Traffic Control Orders

The Chief of Police may issue traffic control orders to designate and maintain by appropriate devices, marks, or lines upon the surface of the roadway crosswalks at those places where there is particular danger to pedestrians crossing the roadway.

71.04 Crossing Other Than at Crosswalk.

Every pedestrian crossing a roadway at any point other than a crosswalk shall yield the right-ofway to all oncoming vehicles.

71.05 Blocking Intersection.

Notwithstanding any traffic control signal indication or other right to proceed, no driver shall enter an intersection or a marked crosswalk unless there is sufficient space on the other side of the intersection or crosswalk to accommodate his or her vehicle without obstructing or blocking the passage of other vehicles, bicycles or pedestrians.

71.06 Overtaking Vehicles Yielding to **Pedestrians**

Whenever any vehicle is stopped at a marked crosswalk or at any unmarked crosswalk at an intersection to permit a pedestrian to cross the roadway, the driver of any other vehicle approaching from the rear shall not overtake and pass such stopped vehicle.

71.07 Stopping or Yielding for Traffic Within Crosswalk

The operator of a vehicle shall stop for a pedestrian crossing the roadway within any marked crosswalk, or within any unmarked crosswalk at an intersection, except at intersections where the movement of traffic is being regulated by a police officer or a traffic control signal; and at such regulated intersections operators of vehicles shall stop for all pedestrians crossing or who have started to cross the roadway on the "go" or "walk" signal.

Section 3. Effective Date.

This Ordinance shall become effective ten (10) days following publication.

At a regular meeting of the Linden City Council held on August 26, 2019, adoption of the foregoing ordinance was moved by MacDermaid and supported by Dick.

The Mayor declared the ordinance adopted.

NOTICE OF MORATORIUM ARGENTINE TOWNSHIP, GENESEE COUNTY

On August 26, 2019, the Township Board for Argentine Township adopted a moratorium ordinance that will be effective throughout Argentine Township and for all lakes within the Township. NOTICE- ORDINANCE NO. 391 CITY OF LINDEN

"Linden City Council adopted Ordinance No. 391, entitled the City Storm Water Management Ordinance, on August 26, 2019. The Michigan Department of Environment, Great Lakes, and Energy (EGLE) is requiring that the City of Linden adopt a Illicit Discharge and Connection Ordinance as it pertains to the City of Linden's municipal storm sewer system. The purpose of this ordinance is to provide for the health, safety, and general welfare of the citizens of the City of Linden through the regulation of nonstorm water discharges to the storm drainage system to the maximum extent practicable as required by federal and state law. This ordinance establishes methods for controlling the introduction of pollutants into the municipal separate storm system (MS4) in order to comply with requirements of the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System permit process. The objectives of this ordinance are:

- (1) To regulate the contribution of pollutants to the municipal separate storm sewer system (MS4) by storm water discharge by any user;
- (2) To prohibit Illicit Connections and Discharges to the municipal separate storm water system;
- (3) To establish legal authority to carry out all inspection, surveillance and monitoring procedures necessary to ensure compliance with this ordinance.

Finally, the ordinance repeals all other ordinances on the same subject. A complete copy of the ordinance is available to the public for inspection and distribution during regular business hours at the City Clerk's office located at 132 E. Broad St., Linden, MI 48451.



Signs of separation anxiety in dogs

Dogs are loyal and beloved companions that make great household pets. When leaving for work in the morning, dog owners may lament that they can't take their furry friends with them. But it turns out those dogs might be even more upset that they can't follow their owners out the door each morning.

Separation anxiety is a significant issue that can affect any breed of dog. According to the ASPCA, separation anxiety is triggered when dogs become upset because they've been separated from their guardians, such as in the morning when owners leave for work. Separation anxiety is a very difficult problem for dogs, creating a sense of distress that can pave the way for destructive and potentially harmful behaviors.

Dog owners may wonder what they can do to soothe their dogs' anxiety so they can be left alone without experiencing the fear or distress associated with separation anxiety. Learning to recognize the symptoms of separation anxiety is a great first step in that healing process.

• Urinating and defecating: Some dogs urinate or defecate when left alone, even if they're potty trained. This is a sign of separation anxiety. The ASPCA notes that dogs that urinate or defecate in the presence of their owners are probably not suffering from separation anxiety but a different issue, and such behavior should be discussed with a veterinarian.

• Barking and howling: Dogs experiencing separation anxiety may persistently bark or howl when separated from their guardians. Neighbors may complain that dogs continuously bark throughout the day, which can signal to owners that their dogs are experiencing separation anxiety. The ASPCA notes that barking or howling is typically only triggered by being left alone.

- Destructive behaviors: Destructive behaviors when left alone, such as chewing on objects, door frames or window sills, is a telltale sign of separation anxiety. Some dogs will dig at doors and doorways, perhaps in an attempt to escape the home and follow their guardians out the door, or destroy household objects, including furniture. These destructive behaviors not only aggravate owners, but they also pose a significant injury risk to dogs. Dog owners typically do not witness the destructive behavior, which can cause injuries like broken teeth, cut and scraped paws and damaged nails.
- Coprophagia: Some dogs defecate and then consume all or some of their excrement when left alone. This is all called coprophagia and likely won't occur when owners are present.

Dogs that act up when owners leave home aren't being destructive for the sake of being disruptive. In fact, these dogs are often suffering from separation anxiety, the recognition of which can be the first step toward helping dogs overcome this troubling condition.
