Think you're not afraid of the dark? You will be, as a Halloween evening guest in this spooky Romanian fortress

Dracula may have slept here, or maybe not. But one thing is for sure — this 14th century fortress, known officially as Bran Castle, is a national monument and landmark in Transylvania, Romania that truly "awakes from the dead" on Halloween. Perched dramatically on a hill above a crown of trees in the Carpathian Mountains, its burnt orangetiled turrets and steeples hint at the chilling history that gave rise to the name, "Dracula's Castle."

While Dracula is the fictional character created by Irish novelist

Bram Stoker when he wrote the book, Dracula, in 1897, the basis of this character is chillingly real.

Evil 14th century ruler, Vlad Tepes, better known as Vlad the Impaler, was said to have killed 20,000 to 100,000 people during

the war between the Ottoman (Turkish) Empire and Wallachia.

His death method of choice was by impalement — impaling his enemies through the torso with large stakes and

erecting these stakes in the ground, causing slow, agonizing deaths.

The fortress became known as Dracula's Castle because it is the sole royal estate that fits Stoker's description of the iconic vampire's castle, even though Vlad the Impaler never

really lived there. Vlad the Impaler's family name was "Dracul," adding to today's fascination with the bonechilling fictional story of Dracula.

While Dracula's Castle is open to visitors all year long, it really comes alive when the clock clangs midnight on Halloween.

G Adventures, a small group adventure travel company, offers a seven-day "Halloween in Transylvania" tour. The entire castle property has been rented loween night. Ingrid Ream, owner of Superior Travel, with offices in Fenton and Lapeer, is pleased her two sons, Alec Schmitt and Derek Ream, both 23, will be making the

trip to Dracula's Castle this year. "It's an event they'll never forget," she said.

The tour also includes visits to the medieval, cobblestone cities of Brasov, the capital city of Bucharest, the culturally vi-

brant town of Sibiu, and the nearby city of Sighisoara, a UNESCO World Heritage Site that dates back to the 16th century.

Other castles also are on the itinerary, including the ruins of Poenari Castle, an actual former fortress of Vlad the Impaler, and a tour through the Rupea Citadel, on a hilltop near the Carpathian Mountains.

This entire region of Eastern Europe, including Romania, Slovakia,

Lithuania, Croatia, Macedonia, Serbia, Slovenia, Poland, Russia, Montenegro, Czech Republic, Albania and Hungary — is no longer under Soviet rule, and these countries are becoming popular new tourist destinations.


Rich in culture and medieval architecture with as much grandeur as many other European destinations, many of these countries can be seen from the luxurious vantage point of a river cruise, said Ream.


"Avalon River Cruises offer a more in-depth experience for travelers," Ream said. "You can actually cook the cuisine of the region. The ships are also smaller, holding about 170 passengers, making a more personal travel experience."

Travelers to this region can expect to pay about \$800 to \$1,100 per person for airfare from Detroit to Bucharest, and about \$5,000 to \$8,000 per person for a river cruise.

Ream said that travel to Eastern

Europe is still relatively new, and that now is the time to visit. "Embrace it right now before it gets too 'touristy,'" she said.

6 ways to keep an active puppy out of trouble

It is hard to resist the beckoning big eyes, soft fur and lovable kisses of a puppy. When that tail begins wagging, it can be easy to forget how much attention and work puppies require.

Puppies love to learn about the world and are naturally curious and energetic. Puppies also can become easily bored and mischievous if not given chances to expend their energy.

Puppies do not know what is right and wrong in their new environments and have to learn such lessons through trial and error, often getting into trouble along the way. However, puppy owners can take steps to curb potentially troublesome behaviors.

1. Provide a lot of exercise. A tired dog is a well-behaved dog, offer many experts. The American Kennel Club says that puppy parents should speak with their vets and/or trainers about what is a reasonable amount of physical activity for their dogs. Activity to burn off excess energy is vital.

4. Puppy-proof the home. Look around the house for possible hazards. Move trash





into hard-to-reach areas, erect gates to block restricted spaces, address cords and other electrical hazards, and clear counters or tables of easy-to-reach food scraps.

5. Use positive reinforcement. Rewarding dogs when they do the right thing rather than punishing them when they behave badly helps puppies learn manners and how to become good members of the family, offers the AKC. Teaching is also a way to offer exercise and stimulate dogs' minds.

6. Understand the breed. Some dogs are bred for their unique behaviors. For example, a bird dog like an English setter may seek out prey in the yard. Certain concessions may need to be made to keep puppies comfortable. Offering alternative activities that tie into this natural instinct also can work.

Keeping puppies out of trouble can take work, but as they become full-grown dogs, they will learn and negative behaviors will be abandoned.


Tigers collect key victory vs. rival Grand Blanc
