# Mott culinary thriving in new facility

■ Need for chefs and head cooks expected to grow 11 percent in next decade

**Flint** — On the third day they've been open this year, the lunch rush is heating up at Applewood Café on Second & Saginaw.

These Mott Community College

(MCC) students have donned the white culinary uniforms of the professionals, assuming every different role in a modern classy restaurant. From the sous chef to the hosts, students run the business. Patrons order, eat and pay like in the real world and

students make all this happen.

Culinary Arts Institute students rotate though different kitchen and restaurant roles, spending a week in each.

This professionalism is nothing new for MCC's culinary program, but this is a new facility that just opened for business last summer.

On Wednesday, the menu included oven-roasted pulled-pork sandwiches with appetizers like the date and chorizo rumaki drizzled with a balsamic-maple

sauce.

While sous chef Emily Torok of Genesee Township kept the line working, Lake Fenton Ethan Martinbianco, 18, was the

expediter, working to make sure plates were getting out to the servers on time, complete and looking presentable.

Chef Matt Cooper of Fenton Township helps coordinate the program. He coached Martinbianco in proper presentation of the dates and chorizo before he handed the plate off to the server.

"The first thing I ever cooked was eggs and I fell in love with cooking," Martinbianco said. "As soon as I started cooking, I couldn't stop."

He loves the brand new facility and said the students take good care of it. "Someone spent millions on it," he said. "The students couldn't be more appreciative of it."

The 36,000-square-foot facility cost \$13 million overall. It includes the café and Coffee Beanery.

Martinbianco is one of 300 students in the program of three associate degree programs. These include Baking and Pastry Arts, Culinary Arts and Food Services Management. There are two certificate programs — Professional Cooking and Professional baking.

The Bureau of Labor Statistics projects the employment of chefs and head

cooks to grow 11 percent between 2018 and 2028.

Cooper said the curriculum is the same as in the original facility, but delivery of the curriculum has been improved. The new facility is better equipped with state-of-the-art cooking equipment such as Rational brand multifunction ovens, a dry age room and a temperature-controlled wine cellar, along with a chocolates and confections lab.

He thinks with the new facility, they can grow the program and attract 500 students in the near future.

"The downtown location has brought us to the center of the new growth of Flint," Cooper said, adding that sales at the café are expected to quadruple those of the previous winter term.

"I think we are also bringing people downtown that might not have otherwise come to see all of what this city has to offer."

# SUPER BOWL

The Super Bowl is the annual championship game of the National Football League (NFL). The game, played between mid-January and early February, is the culmination of a regular season that begins in the late summer of the previous year. The following are some fun Super Bowl facts:





## **«** Tickets are not cheap

You might have known this Super Bowl fact already, but getting to the big game isn't cheap. According to StubHub, the average get-in price for Super Bowl 53 last year was \$2,577 and the average purchase price was \$4,613. Less than a week prior to kickoff, the cheapest ticket sold on StubHub for Patriots vs. Rams last February was \$2,000. Tickets for the very first Super Bowl in 1967 cost an average of \$6, which was apparently too pricy for many as there were 30,000 empty seats.

## Lombardi Trophy is huge >>

\$5 million-plus for ads >>

Super Bowl ads are big money. On average, a 30-second Super Bowl spot runs in the millions. According to cnbc. com if you go all the way back to the first-ever Super Bowl in 1967 ads cost anywhere from \$37,500 to \$42,500, based on Nielsen's numbers. According to cnn.com for Super Bowl 2020 Doritos, Mountain Dew and Pop-Tarts have all decided to buy spots. One 30-second spot costs about \$5 million.



The Lombardi trophy's appearance features a football in a kicking position on a three-sided stand. It stands at 22 inches (56 cm) tall and it weighs seven pounds (3.2 kg). The Super Bowl trophy is made entirely of sterling silver. The trophy costs \$50,000 to produce, takes four months and 72 staff hours to complete. Each player on the winning team also gets a small replica of the trophy said to be worth \$1,400.

Each team gets 108 footballs
Each team playing in the Super Bowl gets 108

footballs, according to the Wilson Football Facto-

ry. Of those, 54 are for practice and 54 are for the

actual game. During a typical Super Bowl, 120

balls are used. The additional ones are kicker

footballs, used for all kicking plays.





## Pecan Toffee Oatmeal Cookies

#### **INGREDIENTS:**

- 1½ cups unbleached all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 3/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 3/4 teaspoon kosher salt
- 1 cup unsalted butter
- 1 cup packed dark brown sugar
- ½ cup granulated sugar
- 1 teaspoon pure vanilla extract
- 2 large eggs
- 3 cups old-fashioned
- 3/4 cup chopped pecans, toasted
- 1 cup toffee pieces

Oatmeal is a versatile ingredient found in desserts, breakfast foods, savory dishes, and so much more. ## DIRECTIONS:

- 1. Preheat the oven to 350 F. Line two rimmed baking sheets with parchment paper or silicone liners.
- 2. In a medium bowl, combine the flour, baking soda, cinnamon, and salt and
- 3. In the bowl of a stand mixer fitted with the paddle attachment, cream together the butter and both sugars until light and fluffy, about 2 minutes. Add the vanilla. Add the eggs one at a time, mixing and scraping down the sides of the bowl after adding each egg. Gradually add the flour mixture until just combined.
- 4. With the mixer on low, stir in the oats, pecans and toffee bits.
- 5. Using a 2-tablespoon scoop, measure out the cookie dough onto the prepared baking sheets, spacing them ½ inch apart. Bake for 10 to 12 minutes, rotating the baking sheets halfway during bake time for even baking.
- 6. Let cool on the baking sheets for 5 minutes before using a spatula to transfer to a wire rack. Repeat with the remaining dough.



# What to expect when adopting a shelter dog

Millions of dogs reside in shelters or in foster homes just waiting for someone to make them permanent members of their family. The ASPCA says there are nearly four million dogs in shelters across America. Bringing home a puppy or an older dog can be an exciting, selfless endeavor.

Shelter dogs have the capacity to be loving, devoted pets. Unfortunately, many such dogs have been dealt difficult hands, ending up in shelters through no fault of their own.

Prospective pup parents should be aware that there can be a transitional period as dogs acclimate to their new homes. Understanding what to expect the first few weeks and months can be helpful.

- Creatures of habit: Dogs are creatures of habit and feel most comfortable when they know what to expect. Moving from a shelter into a home can be a big change. Shelter dogs will need time to understand the workings of a household. By remaining consistent and patient, dog owners can help their pooches acclimate to their new surroundings. Feed the dog at the same time and place each day. Take the dog for a walk the same time each day with the same route. Knowing what to expect can be calming for the dog.
- Housetraining regression: New puppies likely do not fully know the rules of housetraining, but even older dogs who may have been housetrained can regress in a new environment. Pet parents may have to go back to basics and reinforce housetraining lessons.



Shelter dogs can become warm and loving pets with the right care and a little patience.

- Shyness and anxiety: It's impossible to know what dogs went through before landing in a shelter. Shelter workers may have conducted certain tests, such as food aggression or resource guarding, but that only paints part of the picture. It will take time for the dog to trust and understand, and dogs may be timid and experience anxiety for a brief period. Some may even act out by exhibiting damaging behavior.
- Safe space: The experts at Hill's Pets advise employing a crate that can serve as a den for the dog. It not only is an area that can keep the dog out of trouble as he or she learns the rules of the house, but it also can serve as a safe haven that is familiar and comforting.
- Training classes: Enroll in training classes so that the pup begins to learn commands. Obedience training also helps keep the animal safe.
- Vet care: Make an appointment to have the shelter dog checked over by a vet as soon as possible. This helps everyone get on a vaccination schedule and can pinpoint illnesses or behavior problems. Many shelter dogs have common communicable illnesses like kennel cough or worms that require prompt treatment.






