Running for fun

■ Non-competitive ‘fun runs’ offer an excuse to get moving this winter

To get ready for spring fun runs, just start walking now.

This is the advice of Fenton High School cross country coach Sue Larsen. “Many of the fun runs are in the warmer months,” she said. “If you have never participated in one, the winter is a great time to start to prepare/train.”

She adds that indoor walking equipment might be safer depending on the road conditions, and of course, consult your doctor.

A “fun run” is a road race that is timed, but less competitive than say, The Crim Festival of Races. If you go to runmichigan.com, you can view a calendar of races. There’s a Paczki Run in Hamtramck on Saturday, and a Mardi

Gras race on March 7 in Reese, for example.

Runs often support a cause such as the Runway 5K benefitting Wings of Mercy, or the World Vision 6K for access to drinking water in third world countries.

Of course, Larsen is competitive, but she adds that it can be fun to just jump into an organized race without the pressure to compete. Really, there’s no pressure to even run if you’re unable.

Either way, the benefits are substantial for running or walking in an organized fun race. “First of all, you are getting a great cardiac workout and getting outside

permanent improvements to renovating, remodeling, improving, equipping, re-equipping college buildings and sites and other buildings to be used by the college for instructional purposes. It also will be used for acquiring buildings and sites for buildings, and constructing buildings and additions to buildings.

On Aug. 2, 2016, Genesee County voters supported a .641 mill, 10-year tax renewal to provide funds for operations at the community college. This renewal was for 2018-2027 and was expected to generate an estimated \$5.7 million during its first year.

Homeowners whose property has a taxable value of \$100,000, have since 2018 been paying \$64.10 for the Mott operating millage. They will pay an additional \$36 for the Mott capital improvements millage if it passes on March 10, for a total of \$100.10 per year.

MCC is a community college district comprised of the Genesee Intermediate School District boundaries excepting any territory located in Saginaw County, and operating under Act 331, of Michigan Public Acts of 1966, as amended.

THERE'S AN HERB FOR THAT

There's still snow on the ground, but there is nothing stopping us from starting our indoor herb gardens. The following are the most popular herbs, easily grown inside and used by cooks to make a host of delicious meals.

BASIL



Basil's fresh taste is wonderful with tomatoes, served with slices in a summer salad or added to a sauce for depth of flavor. Basil also works well in cocktails, squash, lamb, fish, eggs, cheese, potatoes, and pasta dishes.

PARSLEY



One of the most popular herbs in cooking, parsley can be used in salads, combined with basil to make pesto, and used in soups, stews and fish dishes. Curly parsley, with its decorative curled leaves, is often used as a garnish to dishes.

THYME



Thyme is a more subtle herb, which, like basil, can work just as well in a cocktail as it does in a soup or mashed potatoes. Also use it in stuffing, beef, pork dishes, eggs, cheese, bean and vegetable soups and fish.

CILANTRO (coriander)



Bright and fresh cilantro is always great to have on hand. You can also add the herb to pesto for a kick, or go all out with salsa recipes and a host of Mexican dishes.

DILL



Dill is a seriously underrated herb. The pickle-esque flavor is a tried-and-true pairing with fish, sour cream and cottage cheese, potatoes, fish, vegetable salads, pickles, tomatoes.

CHIVES



A hardy perennial and especially easy to grow, the entire chive plant is edible. Its flowers can be used as garnishes, and the bulb and leaves also can be eaten. With their light onion flavor, chives can be used in all sorts of dishes, from the classic potato salad, to soups and omelets.

SAGE



Sage is fragrant and woody, especially well-suited for comforting fall dishes. Sage is a delicious complement to stuffing (think Thanksgiving turkey), pork roast, sausage, poultry and hamburgers.

ROSEMARY



Pair rosemary with roast meats such as lamb and chicken, and use it to flavor poultry stuffing, potatoes, cauliflower and fish stuffings.

OREGANO



Oregano is often used for Italian and Greek-style dishes. It also makes an excellent seasoning for egg dishes, meats, poultry, legumes, and breads.

The game plan worked for the Holly Bronchos pretty well.

Holly hit seven first-half three-pointers helping set up a 68-42 non-league victory.

The Bronchos opened the game

with a Danny Mathews three-pointer against WOLL's 1-3-1 zone defense.

That was followed by a Ben Wilson three-pointer, and from there the Bronchos were hot. Holly (8-9) led 22-12 after one quarter and led 37-28 at halftime.

In the second half, the Bronchos' offense remained reasonably hot while the team's defense also stiffened. Holly

outscored WOLL 14-7 in the third quarter, cruising to a 51-35 lead entering the fourth quarter. Holly's de-

Holly, Linden fall in team regional at Goodrich

Goodrich — It was a team regional wrestling meet that it appeared all four squads had a reasonable chance to earn the crown.

All four teams at the event had their moments at the Goodrich Division 2 team regional, but Croswell-Lexington was a tad better than all three, earning the regional crown.

In the process, Croswell-Lexington defeated both tri-county team district champions — first Linden in the semifinals and then Holly in the championship match — to earn the title.

Linden won six of the 14 bouts but lost a 43-30 verdict to the Pioneers while the Bronchos edged Goodrich 37-33

in the other semifinal contest. In the title match Holly won four of the first eight bouts, but Croswell-Lexington won the next two matches en route to the 49-21 victory against the Bronchos.

"I'm proud of the fight, but I'm not happy with the result," Holly's first-year varsity wrestling coach Zachary Wood said. "But I love this team. I don't have any bad things to say about anyone on the team."

"Our goal is the same (as when ex-Holly varsity wrestling coach Don Pluta coached), it's the standard. Our goal all year was making it to team states. We have to reassess right now and focus on our individu-

Fenton swimmers continue hot ways, defeat Holly Bronchos

Fenton — Jake Kennedy and Anthony Barnett have had a great senior season with the Fenton varsity boys swim team.

During their senior season, the Tigers have won the county meet and have earned a dual victory at Grand Blanc High School for the first time in school history. Indeed it's been a great season already.

"We haven't ever won county, and Grand Blanc has been champion for 19 years so it was nice to them what we have this year," Kennedy said. "Also, Fenton has never gone to and won a meet at Grand Blanc and we won two Tuesdays ago by beating them 114-66, so that was pretty convincing. It's something that is nice to have during our last season."

"I feel really good about this season," Barnett said. "Overall the team has stepped up, especially considering all of the great seniors we lost last year. I'm pretty proud of this season."

The Tigers continued their impres-

sive season with a 141-39 dual meet victory at home against the Holly Bronchos Tuesday night.

The Tigers were fresh off a pretty strong performance at the MISCA meet and dominated on Tuesday, winning all 12 events while also sweeping the top three positions in two of the individual events.

Kaz Sieja and Joel Diccion each had two individual wins. Sieja won the 200 freestyle (1:59.99) and the 100 freestyle (56.40) while Diccion won the 200 individual medley (2:15.04) and the 500 freestyle (5:20.42). Diccion also was a member of two winning relays. He teamed with Jack Fries, Kennedy and Justin Miller to win the 200 medley relay (2:02.69) while Gavin Crews, Jacob Shannahan, Alec Maddock and Diccion won the 400 freestyle relay (3:49.74). Sieja also teamed with Evan Koch, Shanahan and Kennedy to win the 200 freestyle relay (1:43.10).

The other individual event winners for Fenton were: Crews in the 100

breaststroke (1:11.64), Koch in the 50 freestyle (25.50), Justin Miller in diving (162.05), Max Haney in the 100 butterfly (1:00.04) and Maddock in the 100 backstroke (1:04.22).

Fenton took seven of the nine individual seconds as well. They were earned by Justin Melchor in the 200 freestyle (2:00.51), Crews in the 200 individual medley (2:19.20), Lucas Shampo in diving (137.75), Haney in the 100 breaststroke (1:11.77), Jack Fries in the 100 butterfly (1:07.98), Barnett in the 500 freestyle (5:47.22), and Braden Falvo in the 100 backstroke (1:07.83).

"I like the camaraderie of our team," Kennedy said. "One of the best things about this team is how well we

get along. We all get together outside of school regularly and go out to eat. It's a good team atmosphere. To my knowledge any team in this school or any school has this. We all get along. That's the way to make a team work."

"Our hard work practices help us bond with our teammates and doing fun stuff together," Barnett said.

The Bronchos were without a full squad.

"We came into the season with a bit smaller team than we've had the last few years," Holly varsity swim coach Kurtis Knight said. "We have 12 kids right now and tonight we only had nine. We had three with the flu and that didn't help us at all. There's not much





Pros and cons to pet doors

Pets quickly take up residence in their owners' homes and hearts. Many pet parents treat their pets as full-fledged members of the family, with the same privileges and attention they devote to other family members.

A 2016 Harris Poll found 95 percent of Americans consider their pets to be part of the family, and there is not much they won't do for their companion animals. One area where pet owners may focus their attention is giving their pets more freedom to explore the outdoors. This can be achieved with the installation of a pet door. With busy schedules taking many pet parents away from home, pets may spend many hours home alone. An outdoor retreat could be just what the veterinarian ordered for pets who need more fresh air. Before pet owners install doors for their four-legged friends, it may behoove them to consider the advantages and disadvantages to doing so.

PROS

Pet doors can be very convenient for pet owners and pets. Unencumbered bathroom breaks is one of the prime reasons to get a pet door. Not having to wake up early in the morning or rush home from work to let out a pup can give pet owners more freedom. Cat owners may choose to have their cats soil outdoors, removing the hassle and odor of indoor litter boxes.

A pet door provides a way for pets to regulate when they need to go and not be at the mercy of their human companions. This is handy when training a puppy who cannot hold his bladder for more than a few hours.

Avoiding indoor accidents can be a great reason to install a pet door.

Pets need exercise and stimulation to alleviate boredom and avoid destructive behaviors. Access to the outdoors promotes physical activity and mental stimulation. Cats may chase bugs or small animals. Dogs may run around the yard and play with a ball or stick. Easy access to outdoor play can take some of the burden off of busy pet owners.

CONS

As convenient as pet doors can be, they may disconnect pet owners from their pets. People may feel they don't need to spend the time in the yard or walking the animal, and that can adversely affect the bonds between pet owner and pet.

Another potential disadvantage concerns alpha-driven pets. Giving pets control over their comings and goings may reinforce ego and

potentially cause the animal to be less responsive to his owner's commands.

Safety is another concern. Although there are smart doors that can only open when triggered by a chip on the pet's collar, one never knows what pets may bring indoors. Cats may present dead rodents and dogs may dirty the house with muddy paws.

Weather is another concern. In colder climates, pet doors may be another source of drafts, contributing to inefficient heating and cooling situations.

Dogs or cats who are prone to roaming could get into trouble if left to their own devices outside.

Pet owners should consider a host of factors before installing pet doors in their homes.
