There is help available for people in need during the COVID-19 pandemic

At 65, Mona Knapp of Fenton is in the age group that is supposed to be sheltering in place from the coronavirus. She is staying home and using her phone as much as she can, but she's on a mission to round up resources for her senior citizen friends, many of whom have no one else to turn to.

"The elderly, the vulnerable people, what are they supposed to do?" she said. "Many feel lonely and isolated. My heart breaks for the people who have no transportation and are afraid to leave the house. When the elderly get isolated, they fail fast."

She urges local residents to do more than just check on an elderly family member or neighbor. "Find out what they need and help them get it," she said.

Schools are closed; kids still learning

Districts adapt with online teaching, video lessons

Grand Blanc Twp. — Despite being out of school due to the COVID-19 pandemic, West Shore Elementary School student Jackson Gregory can still get six hours of instructional time remotely from his teachers.

From an Acer notebook computer, Jackson can work on math, art, music and even physical education (PE).

According to the National Center for Education Statistics there are no minimum instructional hours required per day in Michigan, but schools must provide 1,098 hours in 180 days. This works out to just over six hours per day, in session.

Jackson's mother, Courtney, said he easily received his six hours on Monday, March 16. Overall, Courtney said the teachers want the work done by Sunday night so they can start on a new course of work.

"At this point I'm just going with the flow," she said. Father Randy appreciates the technology that makes this all possible.

The remote teaching plan varies by district, but most are making efforts to include elective classes like art and PE. Families without internet also are receiv-

ing assistance. Programs like Google Classroom and Screencastify have been utilized to connect to students.

For Lake Fenton Community Schools (LFCS) students, materials are delivered Monday, Wednesday and Friday.

"The Lake Fenton

staff embraced the challenge of creating online content, in a very short amount of time, to ensure they could continue to provide educational opportunities for our students," Superintendent Julie Williams said. "This is obviously very new to all of us and we will continue to learn as we go."

Teacher training for remote instruction started March 13, which included involving the Technology Department.

All Fenton Area Public School (FAPS) teachers spent time on Thursday, March 12 creating lessons for the shutdown using online programs, Superintendent Adam Hartley said. "Included within

the teacher's Google Classrooms will be many resources for our students and families," he said. "Our goal right now is to connect with our students, engage them in learning the content they would have received in class and help our families have purposeful activities for

this unprecedented time."

Holly Area Schools (HAS) created a "Broncho Home Enrichment Opportunities" page for students and families on the main HAS page. Go to hask12.org and click the "COVID-19 Updates" button.

"While Holly Area Schools teachers

are not required to provide remote instruction, many of them will be sharing learning opportunities with students and their families during the closure," said Superintendent Scott Roper.

Linden Community Schools Superintendent Russ Ciesielski said their teachers are offering virtual learning experiences and opportunities through the use of Google Classroom, email, and other resources. "Teachers are making attempts to engage students in a learning experience," he said. He added that staff is dedicated to the learning process of their students.

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Michigan Severe Weather Week

Starts March 22 and runs through March 25; statewide tornado drill at 1 p.m. on March 28

While Michiganders, and the entire country, are taking proactive steps to lessen the spread of COVID-19, citizens are reminded that severe weather season is approaching. This includes tornados, flooding, high winds, and other severe weather that could disrupt daily lives.

According to Michigan.gov, "While we are practicing social distancing, we do not encourage you to congregate in groups for drills, but ask that you review what your plan is in the event of severe weather. Disasters don't plan ahead, but you can."

With Gov. Gretchen Whitmer declaring March 22-28 as Michigan's Severe Weather Awareness Week, the



Michigan State Police, Emergency Management and Homeland Security Division (MSP/EMHSD) is calling on residents to take action by participating in a voluntary statewide tornado drill at 1 p.m. on Wednesday, March 25.

"While tornadoes can happen any time of the year, they are especially common in late spring and early summer," said Capt. Emmitt McGowan, deputy state director of Emergency Management and Homeland Security and commander of the MSP/EMHSD. "This drill is an opportunity for residents to make a plan and test it as if this were a real event. Plan now and you'll be better prepared when a disaster happens." Businesses, organizations, families and individuals are encouraged to engage in this statewide preparedness activity but are not required to do so. Nearly all state of Michigan facilities will participate.

During the statewide tornado drill, residents will observe or hear alerts on NOAA Weather Radios, TV and radio stations.

The average lead-time for tornadoes to develop is 10 to 15 minutes, which means residents need to be ready to react quickly when a warning is issued. To be ready for a tornado, know the difference

Tornado Watch means conditions exist for a tornado to develop.

Tornado Warning means a tornado has been sighted or indicated by weather radar.

The Fujita Scale

Measures tornado intensity based on damage

Ted Fujita was the Japaneseborn American meteorologist who in collaboration with Allen Pearson, created the Fujita Scale, or F-Scale, a system of classifying tornado intensity based on damage to structures and vegetation. He also discovered macro-bursts and micro-bursts, weather phenomena that are associated with severe thunderstorms and are hazards to aviation.

The following are the scale numbers, wind speeds and damage that could be expected:

— FO — Gale tornado; 40-72 mph

Some damage to chimneys; breaks branches off trees, pushes over shallow-rooted trees; damages sign boards

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Treasury: small business taxpayers get tax assistance

Penalties and interest waived for 30 days for some sales, use and withholding tax filers

Small businesses that have experienced disrupted operations due to the COVID-19 pandemic now have additional time to make their sales, use and withholding tax monthly payment, according to the Michigan Department of Treasury.

Effective immediately, small businesses scheduled to make their monthly sales, use and withholding tax payments on March 20 can postpone filing and payment requirements until April 20.

The state Treasury Department will waive all penalties and interest for 30 days.

Tax deadline extended to July 15

Last week, the federal government announced that payment for taxes owed would be delayed due to the CO-VID-19 pandemic. On Friday, March 20, major news outlets reported that the filing deadline also would be extended to July 15.

Lewis & Knopf principal and Certified Public Accountant (CPA) Joel Gibbons took time to answer a few questions about the extension.

Is there a need for such an extension? Why?

Yes, this extension has become necessary, as more and more people have been affected by COVID-19. Many businesses have scaled back operations or completely shut down and this brings additional difficulties for filing tax returns in a timely manner. Many accounting firms have closed operations or have asked employees to work from home, which also creates difficulties for filing in a timely manner.

What does the federal extension actually do?

The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) has extended the tax payment deadline for 2019 income taxes for individuals who owe up to \$1 million and corporations that owe up to \$10 million.

When is the new deadline?

The deadline to pay has been extended by 90 days and puts the new payment deadline at July 15.

Who does it help and how do they take advantage?

This helps any taxpayer who owes the IRS with their 2019 taxes, which includes individuals and businesses. Instead of owing taxes on April 15, the deadline has been pushed to July 15.

Penalties and interest will not accrue for unpaid taxes during this 90-day time period. Taxpayers who expect a refund when they file their taxes will not be affected by this extension of time to pay.

\$125 million in emergency funding approved

■Local state rep votes in favor for helping Michigan in coronavirus response

State Rep. Mike Mueller (R-Fenton Township) has voted in favor of a new emergency budget plan adding another \$125 million to help the state of Michigan and local communities respond to coronavirus.

The measure brings the total state funding approved to \$150 million, including the \$25 million approved by the Legislature last week. The plan will provide \$50 million for immediate needs, such as virus monitoring and testing, \$50 million for critical health care providers to expand capacity for coronavirus response, and \$50 million to keep in reserve for when necessary.

The financial support also comes with important accountability and legislative oversight provisions to ensure money will be spent in the best interests of the public and taxpayers.

The measure also will make it easier to use federal assistance related to coronavirus.

"The health and safety of our commu-

nities is of utmost importance," Mueller said. "Local health care professionals at Hurley, McLaren, and Ascension Genesys are working around the clock to protect citizens of Genesee County.

"I am proud to support funding to help Michigan get through this unprecedented public health crisis."

Church and The Freedom Center, are participating members.

Genesee County does not currently have any confirmed cases of coronavirus, but more people are working from home to help slow the spread. Gov. Gretchen Whitmer ordered dine-in services at bars and restaurants to shut down until late March, and customers are bulk buying at stores.

Swanson announced the creation of the Community Care Task Force, over livestream on the Genesee County Sheriff's Office Facebook page, to address these concerns.

"Over the last couple days, we have seen an increase in, what I call, concern over basic food goods," he said. His goal is to alleviate the stress that comes with social isolation and ensure residents have necessities, such as food, baby products, hygiene supplies, transportation, counseling, needed medications and more.

"Everything is operating. It's going to be okay. I keep saying that. We're going to make it through," he said. "In the meantime, we want to have good prevention. We put together what's called a community care task force."

During the livestream, about a dozen faith-based leaders stood behind Swanson at the podium.

"We don't know how it's going to turn out. There could be more restrictions coming. Right now, the churches don't meet. The restaurants are closed. People are starting to ask questions. The folks behind me are going to bring you peace and encouragement. They're also going to bring you toiletries, food, transportation, anything you need," he said.

Swanson deputized them on the livestream. It's in effect for 90 days.

He said he's praying for wisdom and strength for our government, and that if people have worries and don't know where to turn to, churches will offer the hope of the gospel.

"We are an active resource for all of Genesee County to meet physical and spiritual needs," Morris said. "If there's anybody out there that is alone and wants to talk or has a need that is not being met, they can call us. We'll try to help."

employment and facilities. COVID-19 Task Force on Health and Human Services covers the provision of medical and human services, including protecting the healthcare workforce.

COVID-19 Task Force on Education covers K-12 public schools and universities and colleges. COVID-19 Task Force on Economy/Workforce covers general economic impact, workforce, supply chain, business continuity, and related issues.

March 6 — Whitmer announced that the Michigan Medicaid Program will waive copays and cost-sharing for testing and health care treatment related to the coronavirus disease (COVID-19). A number of insurers, including Blue Cross Blue Shield of Michigan, Blue Care Network of Michigan, Priority Health, CVS Health, McLaren, and Meridian also announced they will fully cover the cost of medically necessary COVID-19 tests for members. March 10 — Whitmer declared a state of emergency in Michigan due to the virus.

March 11 — The first two cases of coronavirus are confirmed in Michigan. **March 12** — Whitmer released a statement, announcing all Michigan K-12 schools will close until April 6.

Also on March 12, Whitmer announced that her administration will expand access to telemedicine for Michiganders by immediately allowing Medicaid beneficiaries to receive services in their home while the state combats the spread of the virus.

March 13 — The Governor orders a ban on all events with more than 250 people.

March 16 — Whitmer signed an executive order stating that all dine-in services at restaurants and bars must close. Takeout is allowed.

March 17 — Whitmer signed an executive order prohibiting public events or assemblies in shared indoor spaces with more than 50 people. This is in effect until April 6.

March 18 — Whitmer signed Execu-

tive Order 2020-14, which extended the deadline for Michigan residents to pay back taxes and avoid foreclosure on their property during the pandemic.

Executive Order 2020-14, which took effect immediately, will move the tax foreclosure deadline from March 31, 2020, to May 29, 2020, or 30 days after the state of emergency declared in Executive Order 2020-4 is terminated, whichever comes first.

Ford, General Motors and Fiat Chrysler shut down production to help slow the spread of the coronavirus.

The first person to die from coronavirus in Michigan was a man in his 50s at Beaumont Health in Wayne County.

Continued from Front Page St., at Rockwell, Shaw paid \$302,500

for the 7,707-square-foot facility. The property is currently zoned MDR (medium density residential). It was last sold in August of 2007 for \$1.25 million.

According to Fenton's Building and Zoning Administrator, Mike Reilly, the company plans to expand the house with numerous additional beds.

Reilly said in order to make that work, the owner would have to install an elevator in the building, costing approximately \$85,000. He said this type of healthcare facility is "transient," in that it involves physical therapy and other rehabilitation services mainly for vehicle accident victims, many patients who would be coming and going regularly, not all living there as it was with the memory care facility.

According to IINN's website at iinn.com, "Seeing the need for rehabilitation services continue to grow, Insight has purchased a vacant building in Fenton that it will use for a dramatic expansion of its rehabilitation program.

"The Insight Healing Center currently is a 12-bed adult rehabilitation facility with an additional six-bed residential-type recovery unit in Flint. Insight's program will now expand with the purchase of an unoccupied building in Fenton that will be converted into a 40-bed long-term care rehabilitation facility."

According to IINN, the need for rehabilitation services has grown over

the last two years as Insight neurosurgeons concluded they could control patient outcomes more effectively after they conducted surgeries on accident victims by managing their own facility.

While initial treatment of catastrophic injuries such as auto accidents are effective, Insight's leaders say they believe that a continuity of care with enhanced long-term rehabilitation treatment can enhance recovery.

According to the Crain's article (link is on the IINN website) Shah said he and his associates have admitting privileges and share emergency oncall coverage at a number of hospitals near Flint, including McLaren Flint Hospital, Hurley Medical Center and Ascension Genesys Hospital in Grand Blanc Township, where they treat seriously injured patients.

Community focus CEO Chad Grant of McLaren Flint said there are few people like Shah who both contribute to the growth of Flint from a business and health care standpoint and are also as committed to community and civic development

Shah's efforts to improve Flint's economy and community services, also are supported by U.S. Rep. Dan Kildee of Flint, who said, "He sets a really good example for being the ultimate citizen."

IINN has other facilities, including one in Warren, in a former GM building.

Spoofing health department phone numbers seeking Medicaid, Medicare Information

Michigan Attorney General Dana Nessel is warning that scammers are spoofing phone numbers of at least one local public health department and calling residents to offer medication while asking for their Medicaid and Medicare numbers for billing purposes.

Incoming calls to the local health department are then jamming up phone lines and delaying official business in responding to the coronavirus disease.

Reports so far have been focused on the Ionia County Health Department. The Attorney General's office issued a consumer alert making residents aware of the situation earlier today.

"Scammers will not hesitate to gain

access to your private information, and false promises of medications will not be fulfilled," Nessel said. "As a result of this scam, the number of calls to local public health departments are also hindering their ability to respond to the current COVID-19 pandemic.

"Never provide any personal information over the phone unless you have first independently confirmed who you are talking to." To seem more official, scammers often use a process known as "spoofing" – when a call appears to be coming from a legitimate government phone number. The caller may also sound professional and be very persuasive.

Anyone who receives a phone call they suspect to be a scam should hang up the phone. No one should give out personal information to an unsolicited caller.

Residents should also be aware of online coronavirus scams selling bogus products and providing false information on COVID-19 tests and

treatments. These attempts to obtain the personal information of consumers may include emails or online posts pitching unreliable products, advice, fake tests and cures to prevent the spread of COVID-19.

Those who wish to make a report

about potential scams, price-gouging and any other violation of the Michigan Consumer Protection Act can do so with the Attorney General's Consumer Protection team by filing a complaint online or by calling (877) 765-8388.

Pandemic affects Loose Center operations

County directive says they are available for essential services

The spread of COVID-19, and the threat it poses to the elderly population, have dramatically changed the way senior centers operate.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), older people, those with heart and lung complications, diabetes and immunological conditions are the most vulnerable to the effects of the coronavirus.

Loose Center Director Carl Gabrielson said due to a directive from Genesee County issued Monday, March 16, the center is only open for essential services. This includes food services, planned informational appointments and a few other exceptions. Food cannot be eaten inside the building — it has to be taken out.

This directive affects the 13 senior centers in Genesee County which operate similar to Loose Center.

Significant tornado; 113-157 mph

Considerable damage; roofs torn off frame houses; mobile homes demolished; boxcars pushed over; large trees snapped or uprooted; light object missiles generated

Roof and some walls torn off wellconstructed houses; trains overturned; most trees in forest uprooted

These winds are very unlikely. The small area of damage they might produce would probably not be recognizable along with the mess produced by F4 and F5 wind that would surround the F6 winds. Missiles, such as cars and refrigerators would do serious secondary damage that could not be directly identified as F6 damage. If this level is ever achieved, evidence for it might only be found in some manner of ground swirl pattern, for it may never be identifiable through engineering studies.

Know the signs of an approaching tornado — dark, often greenish sky; large hail; a large, dark low-lying cloud; and loud roar, like a freight train.

Develop an emergency preparedness kit with essential items such as a three-day supply of water and food, a NOAA Weather Radio, important family documents and items that satisfy unique family needs.

Conduct regular tornado drills. Make sure each household member knows where to go and what to do in the event of a tornado.

Stay tuned to commercial radio or television broadcasts for news on changing weather conditions or approaching storms.

Although it has been just nearly 13 years, residents won't soon forget the F-2 tornado that ripped through Fenton and Holly just after 5:30 p.m. on Friday, Aug. 24, 2007.

Many homes were damaged and some were leveled. In the city of Fenton alone, more than 4,000 trees were destroyed.

About 50 homes in Fenton Township

were affected by a May 28, 2013 tornado, also classified as an F-2. Most of the damage was near Jennings Road.

If a tornado warning is issued:

• Identify the lowest place to take cover during a tornado.

• If a basement does not exist, find an interior hallway away from windows, doors and outside walls.

• Go under something sturdy, such as a workbench or stairwell when taking shelter in the basement or designated spot.

• Conduct regular tornado drills. Make sure each household member knows where to go and what to do in the event of a tornado.

• Stay tuned to commercial radio or television broadcasts for news on changing weather conditions or approaching storms.

Do not ignore the tornado sirens. In years prior, the city of Fenton's emergency warning signal would be activated if a tornado siren was sighted anywhere in Genesee County. Today, if the tornado sirens in Fenton are activated - it means one has been sighted in or near Fenton, or is heading this way.

Churches adapt due to virus

Large public gatherings prohibited; local churches go digital

Churches are meeting places that regularly host Bible studies, group meetings, Sunday services and more. However, due to the coronavirus pandemic, Gov. Gretchen Whitmer has limited public gatherings to 50 people, and experts are encouraging social distancing to slow the spread of the virus.

Local churches are working to adapt.

"We have gone completely digital as far as preaching and Bible teaching," said Pastor Wes Morris of The Rock Church. They're holding livestreams throughout the week and weekend for the foreseeable future.

This has taken "very little adjustments" for them, Morris said, because the congregation regularly uses technology in their operations.

"We've been really thankful for our technology infrastructure. We record everything anyway and livestream a

majority of what we do," Morris said.

The one big change is there's very few people in the room when he preaches, which he said can be a little awkward, but he knows many people are watching from home.

"You can almost feel the members watching," he said. "We've also reached out to other churches who don't have the technology, and we've offered to help livestream and get their messages out there." Morris said some of the church's members are concerned and feeling uncertainty. Others are adapting and taking this as an opportunity to reach out to people in a time of crisis.

"We are having our membership reach out and check in on each other and see what kinds of needs they have. We're trying to stay connected to our members and community so no one gets left behind."

The Rock Church is a member of the Genesee County Community Care Task Force, which was announced Tuesday, March 17 by Sheriff Chris Swanson.

At St. John the Evangelist Catholic Church in Fenton, Operations Manager Shauna Meyers said they received information the morning of Tuesday, March 17 from their diocese about guidelines. Public Masses and activities have been canceled from now until April 8. Private baptisms, marriages and funerals will still take place, but only with immediate family present.

They received dispensation for Sunday Mass, which means they are forgiven for not being in a position to attend Mass, Meyers said. Many of the smaller Bible studies have been canceled, as well as the fish fries. Confirmations, which were supposed to take place next Thursday, have been postponed. Meyers said they haven't yet received any information about Easter.

St. John is working on livestreaming Mass to the parishioners. It will be the first time the church will livestream a service.

Schools are closed at least until April 8. Meyers said they had a day for parents and students to pick up materials. Teachers have been sending out assignments since last Friday.

"We've been very lucky. Our parishioners have been very understanding. They're obviously concerned about not being able to attend Mass. They've been very gracious with the predicament that everyone is in. We've done our best to communicate any information we receive in a timely manner just to keep them up to date," Meyers said.

As for outreach, St. John is still accepting clients and people seeking help. However, they are not taking walk-ins, only phone calls and emails. Call (810) 629-2251.

MARCH 22

1765: In an effort to raise funds to pay off debts and defend the vast new American territories won from the French in the Seven Years' War (1756-1763), the British government passes the Stamp Act. The legislation levied a direct tax on all materials printed for commercial and legal use in the colonies, from newspapers and pamphlets to playing cards and dice.

MARCH 23

1839: The initials "O.K." are first published in The Boston Morning Post. Meant as an abbreviation for "oll korrect," a popular slang misspelling of "all correct" at the time, OK steadily made its way into the everyday speech of Americans.

MARCH 24

1989: One of the worst oil spills in U.S. territory begins when the supertanker Exxon Valdez, owned and operated by the Exxon Corporation, runs aground on a reef in Prince William Sound in southern Alaska. An estimated 11 million gallons of oil eventually spilled into the water. Attempts to contain the massive spill were unsuccessful, and wind and currents spread the oil more than 100 miles from its source, eventually polluting more than 700 miles of coastline. Hundreds of thousands of birds and animals were adversely affected by the environmental disaster.

It was at that time, I started realizing our lives would take course down a 'new normal' for a decent period of time.

Events moved fast from that point. Eventually the rest of the prep winter sports season was suspended and the start of the spring sports season was suspended until at least April 5.

When the dates for the Lake Fenton varsity girls basketball regional championship game and Linden's varsity boys basketball district title game went by one had to think about the emotions that the players were going through, realizing that it's very likely the games they had been waiting to play in for a lifetime may never happen. And for the Fenton varsity boys swim team state qualifiers I probably felt even worse. Swimmers set their training schedules to peak at the state meet, so they can post their best times against the best competition in the state. Yet, when their state meet was suspended, it meant even if by the slim chance the state meet is held after April 5, there won't be a single state swimmer properly trained for the event.

It's a shame this happened. The loss of their chances to accomplish postseason glory will probably always bother the prep athletes it impacted but looking back now, it was obvious calling these games when the MHSAA did made perfect sense. Waiting another day or two really was playing Russian Roulette with those at the events. The health of not only the students, fans and officials attending these events had to be the primary concern. While it may not erase their pain certainly most of the athletes even realize it was the right thing to do.

"Some have said you're giving folks false hope with this approach," Uyl said during the interview. "I don't think we're giving false hope. I don't know where we're going to be in three weeks or six weeks and nine weeks. Frankly, with as much negativity and as anxious as we feel right now, I just want some hope, period. I think that promising nothing beyond what we're going to announce or do in the next three weeks, I think most people understand that."

Uyl said a deadline date when it's too late to continue the winter seasons or return to spring activities does currently exist. Uyl said the MHSAA will continue to listen to what government leaders and medical personnel are saying and will evaluate that situation in three week segments.

"I think it's a pretty prudent plan of let's just take things in three-week segments and let's see what the world looks like on April 6," Uyl said. "If we're still in a shutdown, but a long-term decision hasn't been made, it will be then let's look again at what late April brings and

How to choose the right dog collar

New pet parents quickly learn just how many supplies they need to raise happy, healthy animals. Collars and leashes are two essential items dog owners will need. No matter how well-trained a pooch may be, collars and leashes are oftentimes necessary, especially when taking dogs to public places.

In addition to helping keep pets close, collars are a great place to hang identification tags, increasing the likelihood that dogs will be safely returned if they dash off.

There are various types of collars, each offering unique attributes. Choosing a collar involves investigating the key functions collars can serve, and assessing the pros and cons of each.

Flat collar

A flat collar is the standard collar used by many dog owners. Flat collars are typically made from nylon, fabric or leather, and many come with plastic or metal quick-release tabs. Some may have buckles similar to a belt.

Flat collars are useful for many dogs. However, some pet parents find dogs are more apt to pull when wearing flat collars, choking themselves in the process. A properly fit collar shouldn't slide off and should be gentle on the dog's neck.

Martingale collar

Also known as limited slip collars or greyhound collars, according to the consumer information site The Spruce: Pets, martingale collars are designed primarily for dogs with narrow necks and heads. The martingale will tighten (only to the size of the dog's neck when properly adjusted) when the dog pulls, so he can't be a collar Houdini. Some people worry that the collar will squeeze too tightly, but proper sizing can prevent that. Head collar

A head collar is reminiscent of a horse's halter, as it slips over the dog's snout and attaches behind the ears. The purpose of head collars is to redirect a dog's attention

> so pulling is minimal. Some dog's do not like the feeling of a collar on their faces and may resist.

Prong collars

Sometimes called pinch collars, prong collars are controversial. Prong collars are made of various links that can be expanded or shortened by "pinching" the links and removing or adding links. When the dog puts tension

on the leash, the prongs will add pressure to the neck to help correct pulling, offers the Canine Journal, a pet care resource. Many trainers advise that prong collars should be used only as a training tool and not for extended periods of time as the primary collar. Also, the Humane Society emphasizes that prong collars must be properly fitted with the size of the prong links appropriate for the size of the dog, and it must sit high on the dog's neck. A chain collar works similarly as a pinch collar, in that it also tightens when tension is applied. **Harness**

Some pet owners like a harness, which puts the pressure on the dog's chest and back instead of its neck. Harnesses come with back clips or front clip attachments to offer control where owners want it.

A knowledgeable pet store employee or a dog trainer can help guide new pet parents in regard to which type of collar may be most appropriate for their dogs.

Venetian Pears

Serves 10

INGREDIENTS:

- 10 firm Bartlett pears, peeled, halved, and cored, keeping the stem intact on one half
- 6 cups full-bodied red wine
- 1 tablespoon whole black
 peppercorns
- 2 2/3 cups sugar, divided
- 6 cups full-bodied white wine
- 1 vanilla bean

DIRECTIONS: ***

 1/2 cup heavy cream, stiffly whipped

While they might not be a food one traditionally associates with winter, pears are versatile and can be utilized in various recipes, particularly those that will be served when the dessert bell rings. Pears come in many different varieties. However, when preparing this

"Venetian Pears" from "Serena Food & Stories: Feeding Friends Every Hour of the Day" (Stewart, Tabori & Chang) by Serena Bass, Bartlett pears are ideal. Look for pears with a stubby rather than pointy top and the stalks left on.

- Cut a level ½ inch slice off the base of each pear so it will stand up straight. Choose two saucepans - one for the red wine and one for the white - both big enough to hold 10 pear halves. Add the red wine, the peppercorns (see note), half the sugar, and 1½ cups water to one pan; add the white wine, vanilla bean, the remaining sugar, and 1½ cups water to the other pan. Bring each pan to a slow boil and reduce the liquid for 5 minutes. Add the pears, making sure you have five of the ones with stems in the red wine and five with stems in the white. Cover and simmer 30 to 40 minutes, depending on the ripeness of the pears. When a toothpick enters without too much resistance, remove from the heat and set aside to cool. Refrigerate overnight.
- 2. When you come to arrange the pears on a platter, take 1 red pear half with a stalk and 1 white half without a stalk, and then vice versa; sandwich them together carefully with a tablespoon of the whipped cream.

Note: Don't worry about the peppercorns. Just let them rattle around in the pan and pick off any stuck to the pears after cooking.
