Applicant withdraws proposals from planning commission agenda

Jawad Shah Property Holdings, LLC, of Insight Institute of Neurosurgery & Neuroscience (IINN) asked to have its special land use request and site plan proposal removed from the agenda of Fenton City Planning Commission meeting, which was held remotely Thursday, April 23.

The meeting was held remotely due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Shah purchased the property that once housed the Rockwell Memory Care home at 700 S. Adelaide St., at Rockwell and paid \$302,500 for the 7,707-square-foot facility.

Pandemic causes organizers to make difficult decisions

Multiple Linden events have been canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

The Linden Community Cleanup, scheduled to take place Saturday, May 2, was canceled.

On March 31, the Linden Arts Council announced that the dance troupe from Germany — Tranzensemble would not be coming to Linden this year.

On Facebook, the statement read, "We are sad that we can't provide the community this wonderful performance and experience. Hopefully in 2021. Thank you for your support."

Sue Turpen, president of the Linden Arts Council, is currently sheltering in place in Florida, unable to return to Michigan yet.

"We're just basically on hold. At this point, we even wonder about our Christmas parade," she said. "I just think we're in an unbelievable wait-and-see situation. That's just about where we are with Happening in Linden."

Happening in Linden, a group dedicated to organizing events in the city, has been growing this past year. Turpen said the pandemic is going to "desperately" affect their fundraising.

"Mostly, I don't know what's going to happen," she said.

Beverly Vondra, Linden treasurer and chair of National Night Out, said they're discussing what's going to happen with the event, which is planned for Aug. 4.

"I don't have a clue as to whether we're going to cancel it or move it to a different date," she said.

The national campaign for National Night Out sent out an email to community organizers and said they could move the event to October.

"If we move it to Oct. 6, school is back in session. I don't know how that's going to work," she said. "As of this moment in time, we're still doing it Aug. 4."

However, she expressed doubt and said they would cancel if needed.

Unanimous jury verdicts in criminal cases

One of my favorite movies of all time is "12 Angry Men" starring Henry Fonda, which was released in 1957.

The story centers around the deliberations of a New York City jury when it is deciding the fate of a young defendant who has been charged with murdering his father.

Without giving the entire plot away, suffice it to say that Mr. Fonda turns out to be the only holdout juror to vote not guilty. The jury then conducts a thorough discussion of the evidence and the defendant is ultimately found not guilty by a unanimous vote.

Fast forward to April 20, 2020 when the United States Supreme Court released its decision in Ramos v Louisiana.

This case involves Mr. Evangelisto Ramos who was convicted of murder in Louisiana in 2016 by a jury vote of 10 to 2. He was sentenced to life in prison without the possibility of parole.

At the time, Louisiana was one of only two states (Oregon being the other) which did not require a unanimous verdict for criminal convictions.

Mr. Ramos appealed and claimed his non-unanimous verdict was unconstitutional.

In a 6 to 3 decision, the Supreme Court agreed and held for the first time that under the Sixth Amendment to the United States Constitution unanimous verdicts in state criminal cases are required. Federal courts already have this requirement.

Justice Neil Gorsuch wrote the main opinion of the court.

He traced the history of this requirement back to 14th century England and found that in 1791, when the Sixth Amendment was

Boaters eager to enjoy area lakes

■Local marinas report hundreds of calls after change in executive order

With the updated executive order that went into effect late last week, Gov. Gretchen Whitmer now

allows the use of motorized boats on Michigan lakes.

She originally prohibited them to slow the spread of the coronavirus. Now, local marinas are reporting that residents are eager to get out on the lakes.

Jonathan Hamel. owner of White's Land-

ing and Marina in Fenton, said they received hundreds of calls over the weekend. They have approximately 300 boats in storage.

"It's going to be extremely difficult for dealers to get boats back to people. They think we can deliver them back tomorrow. It's a long process. We lost four or five weeks. We're asking people to be patient. We're going to try to get everything delivered as fast

ratified by the states, it included requiring unanimous verdicts.

He also found that the original reason for allowing less than unanimous verdicts in both Louisiana and Oregon was racially based to ensure that minorities' juror service would be meaningless or the influence diluted.

Justice Gorsuch then determined that a 1972 Supreme Court case, Apodaca v Oregon, allowing such laws, was no longer binding precedent and should be overruled. The reasons included the court having previously found at least 13 times that unanimity was a requirement.

In the end, the central message of "12 Angry Men" has in essence been confirmed — when a person's freedom is at stake it is critical to make sure that one has all the information and only then make a decision.

Castles expects they will put in 100 before Memorial Day. Their store still isn't open to the public, and all transactions happen online. The marina puts the boats in the water and the customer pays online.

"We don't have any contact with

them," he said.

With the nicer weather, he's expecting more calls. Castles urges people to have patience and to call ahead to schedule for their boats to be put in.

"Any bit of relief helps. At least we can get boats to people, and they can go out and enjoy their summer," he said. He's hoping they can open their store soon and have more in-person contact with customers.

Fenton Twp. — A left-up holiday decoration is now a colorful tribute to honor nurses at one Fenton Township couple's home.

Jean Johnson and her husband, Ken, have a rainbow arch over their driveway with more than two dozen hearts with names of nurses as a way to support those fighting the coronavirus.

"They're in the thick of it. It was like, 'what can we do?' This mess is not going to go away anytime soon," Jean said.

The arch has been over the driveway for years, and the Johnsons decorate it for the holidays.

Jean is a consultant for a scrapbooking company. She said the business has "imploded" and she can't hold in-person classes, though she is working more with technology and hosting virtual classes. Ken works in Indiana





doing tube work for hospitals. The arch is made from the tubing that her husband works with.

"We're all thrown out of our normal, everyday life. It's just so weird even trying to carry out

everyday stuff. We feel off kilter," she said.

Jean said Ken was trying to think of something that would cheer her up, and he suggested decorating the arch. She saw the Rainbows Over Michigan Facebook group, which

is a movement aimed at spreading positivity using rainbows. Some participants use chalk to draw rainbows on sidewalks, or paint rainbows in their windows.

The Johnsons wanted to do something more visible than a window display. They bought the supplies and painted the rainbow over one weekend.

"It was really fun to be able to do this. We had a project. We could focus on the project," she said. People just stop and take photos of it. If that's what it takes to just lift one or two people's spirits, it's okay. It's well worth it just to do that," she said.

Most of the names on the arch are family members who work as nurses. Her nephew, Mike Bierkmeier, has worked at a few local hospitals, and he's currently at Beaumont Royal Oak. He's given them more than a dozen names to add. to a large rainbow arch that spans the width of his driveway. "I drive past it on my way to work. She said I want you to feel supported and loved," she said.

Corrion said it's a "very scary and very sad" time. The ICU at McLaren takes care of COVID-19 positive patients.

"I'm afraid I will get exposed and bring it home. I do a lot of social distancing. I have purchased my own PPE," she said. "I don't enter the building with anything less than an N-95."

Dealing with the patients and families is very sad. Families aren't allowed to be in the room with their loved ones, so Corrion often puts her phone on speaker and puts it in a protective bag so their families can talk to them from outside the room. myfenton.com

Today we announce that effective April 27th, we are reinstating regular yard waste collection. For safe and efficient service, please follow these instructions:

• Yard waste must be in biodegradable paper bags or loosely placed into a 35-gallon or smaller can that is clearly marked YARD WASTE ONLY.

• Ensure all bags or cans weigh less than 50 pounds and do not contain any rocks, dirt or sod.

• Branches and twigs smaller than 2" in diameter must be placed in bundles no larger than 2' by 4' long or 50 pounds per bag or bundle.

• Absolutely no plastic bags, tree stumps, or demolition and/or construction debris will be accepted.

Additionally, Republic will also be reinstating bulk collection. (e.g. couch, television, mattresses, carpet, etc.). Each residence is limited to one (1) bulk item per week.

** Please do not place trash or recycle material in cardboard boxes. All cardboard must be broke down to fit in your recycle bin or cart. If your community uses Republic provided trash carts all additional bagged trash should be placed next to your cart, not on top.

As Republic continues to observe social distancing guidelines our drivers start times will continue to vary. Please make sure that all material intended for pick-up is at the curb by 6:00 AM or the night before. Levton said that at approximately 7:13 p.m., April 20, Michigan State Police troopers were dispatched to a residence in the 11000 block of Hill Road in Gaines Township in reference to reports of a man shot. Upon arrival, a man later identified as Holmes was found lying on the floor with two obvious gunshot wounds to his head and torso. Efforts to revive him failed and he was pronounced dead at the scene.

Witnesses earlier had observed a vehicle leaving the scene and were able to provide police with a description and license plate number, which were relayed to other police officers. Moments later, a Metro Police Authority officer spotted the vehicle and with back-up from the Michigan State Police, a traffic stop was made. Six passengers in the vehicle were taken into custody and all six are facing felony charges.

"According to the police investigation, the homicide occurred after members of the group got into an argument and a fight with the victim inside the house and guns were drawn and shots fired," Leyton said.

Michigan State Police Lt. David Kaiser said it appears a dispute over money led to the fatal shooting.

The property is currently zoned MDR (medium density residential).

According to Fenton's Building and Zoning Administrator, Mike Reilly, the company planned to expand the house with numerous additional beds.

Had the land use request and proposed site plan been approved, the healthcare facility would have involved physical therapy and other rehabilitation services mainly for vehicle accident victims. Many patients would have been coming and going regularly, not all living there as it was with the memory care facility.

When asked why the agenda item was removed, Reilly said the city planner and city attorney both had told the applicant that they most likely could not get the use of the property changed to what they wanted.

"They may be reevaluating what they are doing," Reilly said. "We're waiting to hear."

IINN has other facilities, including one in Warren, in a former GM building.

"One of my patient's moms asks God to look out for me. Then we discuss her son," she said.

When she gets home from work, she gets undressed in the garage, showers and changes into clean clothes. Then she wipes down everything with Clorox wipes, even parts of her car.

"I live for my day off and then I can't think of anything but work. I don't sleep very well. Lots of anxiety," she said. "I've always worked in ICU and always had the ability to leave it there, but this is so horrific you really can't."

The ICU has about 18 patients who are on a ventilator. Corrion said it's a lot of work, especially if patients also are on dialysis.

"We've gotten a huge outpouring of support from local restaurants sending us food and water. It's kind of scary to eat there. If there's more than four people in the breakroom, I don't want to go back there. It's safe to assume everyone is positive," she said.

Corrion said she's seen more people put rainbow hearts in their windows to support them.

"There's a lot of things that have been put into perspective since this thing happened," she said, adding that they're having more family dinners.

"Just stay home and stay safe. It's like beating a dead drum but it really does make a difference. I feel like my whole world hinges upon that right now," she said. "This virus would be gone if we just didn't have to be in contact with each other."
