...it's what we do in Michigan

Whether you have a small pup tent, pop-up camper, fifth-wheel trailer or motorhome, camping in the great outdoors connects you and your family to nature.

According to the Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR), there are more than 300 state run campgrounds in Michigan. There

are also hundreds of privately run campgrounds.

Because of the COVID-19 pandemic and Gov. Gretchen Whitmer's executive order, Michigan state park and recreation area campgrounds, and overnight facilities are closed though at least June 21. State forest campgrounds are closed through at least June 9.

Even though campgrounds are currently closed, planning and prepping can be done now.

The first thing you should research is to find out if your campground of choice is open or will be opening. Search for their individual website or Facebook page for their latest updates.

Some privately run campgrounds plan to open when the current “stay-at-home” order is lifted. Lake Sch-Nepp-A-Ho Campground in Muskegon County plans to open as soon as the order is lifted. The owners posted on the campground’s website that they are working with their local authorities to ensure that when they are able to open, it will be with all safety precautions.

Things could change though if the governor extends the stay home order.

Families can start making reservations for camping, overnight lodging and shelter reservations at state parks and recreation areas beginning June 22.

State forest campground reservations can begin June 10.

Pam Rush, co-owner of Rush RV repair and auto repair on Dixie Highway in Holly, said they are busy getting their customers’ campers and RVs ready for their first camping trip of the season.

Speaking of their clients, “They’re going as soon as it’s open,” she said. “Some are camping in their backyard right now.”

Rush RV is an essential business, per COVID-19 guidelines since they perform automotive repairs. They have seen no decrease in business.

“They’re (families) waiting, ready to go. They’re unafraid. We can social distance while camping just as easily as at home,” Rush said.

One of Rush RV’s services is increasing in popularity. Families can rent one of their campers, have it delivered and set up at a local campground, and then leave it for Rush RV to come and get when the weekend is over.

Reservations

If you had already made a camping reservation for between May 15 and June 21, it was automatically canceled, according to the DNR. There are reimbursement and rescheduling options. No reservation fees or cancellation fees will be charged. Reservation holders who want this option must contact the call center at 800-447-2757 by May 15 at 8 p.m.

Reservation holders whose camping reservations for stays between March 23 and May 15 were canceled due to COVID-19 are eligible for a free night of camping on reservations made later in the season. Call 800-447-2757 by May 15 at 8 p.m. for details.

Reservations extending beyond June 21 will be changed to a June 22 arrival date and canceled nights will automatically be refunded to the original payment method.

What’s open

Most state parks and recreation areas and state-managed trails and boating access sites remain open to provide local opportunities to enjoy the outdoors, but social distancing is key. According to the DNR, Silver Lake ORV Area (Oceana County) is set to open June 3. On June 10, state forest campgrounds and DNR-operated harbors are set to open.

On June 22, campgrounds, overnight lodging facilities and shelters in state parks and recreation areas are set to open.

MICHIGAN VOTES

LEGISLATIVE ACTIVITY

MichiganVotes.org is a free, non-partisan website created by the Mackinac Center for Public Policy to provide concise, non-partisan, plain-English descriptions of every bill and vote in the Michigan House and Senate. This report was released Friday, May 1.

Senate Bill 858: Accelerate lifting of epidemic lockdowns — to amend a 1976 "Emergency Management Act," one of two state laws that grant extraordinary emergency powers to a governor.

This law limits these powers to 28 days unless extended by the legislature, which on the same day as this vote the legislature declined to do. This makes Gov. Whitmer's exercise of emergency powers more reliant on a 1945 "Emergency Powers of Governor" law, which does not limit how long a governor may retain these powers and does not require legislative approval.

The bill does two things. It essentially "writes into" this law ("incorporates by reference") the current coronavirus epidemic executive orders that have been imposed under its authority, but with different termination dates for many than in the governor's order. In general, orders that are more restrictive of business reopening get earlier end-dates, and ones easing state regulations (including those on medical care providers and facilities) are extended for a longer time. Bars and restaurants could reopen with social distancing protocols on May 16 under the bill.

Second, it adds to this law "social distancing" protocols for businesses and public accommodations that are somewhat more general and flexible than those in the current orders.

On the day the bill passed, an angry breakdown occurred in lockdown-easing negotiations between Michigan's Republican Senate Majority Leader. This bill will not be signed by the governor and will not go into law, but may be significant as a political statement from the majority party in a co-equal branch of government, the legislature.

House Bill 5709: Revise penalties for violating governor's orders during declared emergency

To revise the penalties in the laws that authorize a governor to assume extraordinary powers during an emergency, including the statewide "lockdowns" ordered under the 2020 coronavirus epidemic. The current law makes violations "a misdemeanor," and the bill would add a "civil infraction" provision and specify fines of either \$100 for individuals, and up to \$500 for businesses or other entities. House Bill 5710 makes the same change in the other state of emergency law.

To adopt a non-binding resolution that would "urge the Governor to allow elective procedures in hospitals and to allow healthcare providers the freedom to determine their capacity to handle elective procedures."

House Resolution 250: Authorize lawsuit over epidemic emergency orders: Adopted on a voice vote

To authorize the Speaker of the House to commence legal action on behalf of the House of Representatives, challenging the authority and actions of the Governor, and the executive branch generally, taken during the coronavirus epidemic.

Dauner Martin Nature Sanctuary is a gem on northern edge of Fenton City

***Editor's note:** The entire state is dealing with stay-at-home restrictions, which has limited a lot of the outdoor activities one can enjoy. However, there is at least one family activity that remains — trail walking. The tri-county area has plenty of trails families can explore in a variety of environments, within a reasonable amount of time.*

Occasionally, the sports staff plans on detailing some of these area trails. Today's first installment will be the Dauner Martin Nature Sanctuary located in Fenton. Today's focus will be on its blue trail.

The Dauner Martin Nature Sanctuary is a 155-acre area featuring 4.5 miles of foot paths with starting locations on Dauner Road and on North

Leroy Road near VG's and Guns Galore gun shop. The area traces back to 1863 when Phillip Dauner purchased the land to grow hops for his Fenton brewery. Years later, his great-grandchild Robert Dauner spent years planting pines on the land. In 1998, the Dauner family donated the territory, creating the woods we know today.

Looking back — Fenton XC teams dominate Metro at first jamboree

***Editor's note:** With the loss of the spring prep sports season, we'll remember the 2019-20 athletic year with occasional stories from the fall and winter.*

Linden — Alexa Keiser is entering her senior season.

Entering Wednesday's first Metro League cross country jamboree, Fenton's star runner was a perfect 9-for-9 during her first three years in jamborees on the Tigers' squad.

She made it 10 straight jamboree victories, crushing the field in the 5K girls race with a time of 19:00.6 at Linden Middle School.

Keiser helped her team to a first-place finish with 26 points, 27 less points than second-place Flushing. Fenton's varsity boys team was without its No. 1 runner, Adam Jesse, but it ended up not mattering too much as the Fenton boys won the

men's jamboree with 61 points, 27 points less than second-place Linden.

Both Fenton teams are three-time defending league champs, and Wednesday's results seemingly suggest they are the clear-cut favorites to make it four straight league championships.

Keiser has some lofty goals this fall.

"I want to win all the Metros and create history a little bit," Keiser said. "I don't think (anyone has ever won 12 Metro races)."

Both Fenton varsity squads dominated by posting their top five runners before anyone else had more than three runners finished. Fenton's female scorers placed first through 11th overall, finishing before any other squad had more than two runners done. Meanwhile, the Fenton boys had all five of their scorers finish within the top 21.

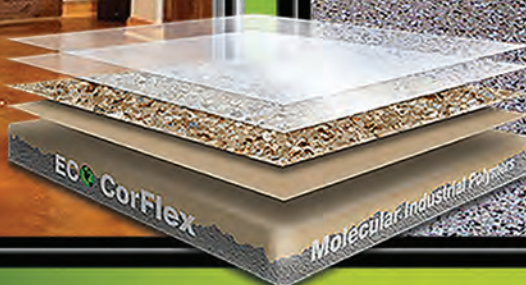

The woods includes many trails and each is well designated on a map at both entrances. The distances walked vary depending on the trail you select, but none is longer than the blue trail that is listed at 1.66 miles long. Other trails are about a mile long.

One of the nice features of this park is how close it's located to the city itself, yet when you are walking through the sanctuary it's easy to forget how close you are to it. Also, the path has plenty of diversity and gives you opportunities to see plenty of wildlife.

The blue trail is a trail I walk frequently. For the entrance we typically use, the trail starts with the walk down Dauner's dirt road. Deer are usually more visible from the road than from any of the trails in the park. We enter through the Dauner Road entrance, which begins in a typical wooded environment with a large, level path.

The trail will take you from a traditional wooded area to the first area of pine trees on this path. It's a beautiful, open

trail that is surrounded by the trees until you reach a small, open field that eventually takes you to what used to be the defining feature of the path — the park's largest tree. However, that tree has been uprooted and now lies on a 45-degree angle with a danger sign located on it. Still, looking at it one can recognize the enormous size this tree once was.

Once you walk beyond the tree, one starts walking near more of a swampish area. A boardwalk takes you by an area that can be very damp at times, and takes you to a small pond where you can frequently hear frogs as well as see ducks, swans and many other animals. The water level varies depending on the time of year.

From there the trail takes you through a traditional Michigan forest until you reach what is the largest swamp/pond on the territory for the first of two times. The pond includes the same animals as the other, but one can occasionally see turtles (a favorite of our family) on logs within the water body.

1984 Tigers broke some Major League Baseball records during early May

Editor's note: *The Major League Baseball season hasn't yet and may not. To make up for the loss of the season, we'll be reliving the last Detroit Tigers' World Championship season, 1984, with occasional stories. We'll be looking at the start of May in this edition.*

The Tigers were 18-2 and began May with the final three games of a six-game home stand. After beating the Indians two-out-of-three games, the Red Sox were headed to Tiger Stadium. May started just like April did, with a win.

The Tigers' offense crushed Boston, earning an 11-2 victory in the opener of the series. Chet Lemon hit two home runs while Lemon and newbies Rusty Kuntz and Barbaro Garbey all had three hits. Alan Trammell entered the month with a .403 batting average, and only helped it by extending his hitting streak to 18 games with two more in the opener. The Tigers (19-2) had played only 21 games, but were already 6 1/2 games ahead of the rest of the division.

The Tigers proved to be a little human in the second game, losing 5-4. Detroit had the tying run on second with just one out in the ninth, but were unable to score. The Tigers also lost the last game of the series, dropping a 1-0 contest. The Tigers were held to just six hits while Boston scored the winning run on Dwight Evans's solo home run against Jack Morris. Detroit was now 19-4 as they headed for a six-game road trip. The Tigers rebounded from the series loss to Boston with a three-game sweep of the Indians in Cleveland, running the Tigers road win streak to 10 games. The Tigers won the first game relatively easily as Detroit had 13 hits and Cleveland had five errors, resulting in a 9-2 Tigers' win. The weekend games were one-run thrillers.

Chet Lemon led Detroit in Saturday's game, going 4-for-4 with three RBI and his seventh home run of the season. Cleveland had a chance to win the game in the ninth.

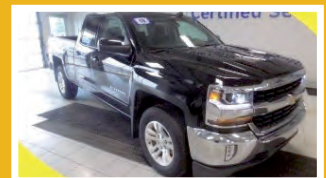
