Numerous local races and proposals for voters to decide

Registered voters will vote on numerous local races and millage proposals in the State Primary on Tuesday, Aug. 4. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic concerns and the fact that the Secretary of State sent absentee voter applications to all registered voters, local clerks are seeing several times the number of absentee voter ballots (AVB) being requested and returned.

Polling stations are open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. on Election Day. Election workers will begin processing returned absentee voter ballots at 7 a.m.

It's been more than a decade, but Argentine Township resident Joe Graves is running for a seat on the Argentine Township Board of Trustees again.

Graves is running for the clerk position in the Aug. 4 election,

which is currently occupied by his wife, Denise Graves. He is currently unopposed on the ballot.

Joe Graves, a Republican, served as the Argentine Township clerk from November 2004 until November 2008. He then became a Genesee County Commissioner in 2011 before he served three terms as a state representative for the 51st District seat in the Michigan legislature from 2012 until November 2018. He couldn't run again due to term limits.

For just over three years, Art Ingraham of Holly has been volunteering his time for Common Ground, an organization aimed at offering passionate and understanding assistance to those in need.

"It has been the greatest experience of my life and the most rewarding," he said.

Common Ground is a nonprofit organization. It was founded in 1971 in Birmingham by a group of parents and students concerned about the rising suicide rate and an increase in drug use.

According to Ingraham, Common Ground is manned by approximately 240 paid staff members and 120 volunteers. Volunteers do not receive reimbursement.

"Volunteers on the Resource and Crisis Helpline must complete 96 hours of training before they are allowed to answer calls," he said. "I completed over 130 hours of classroom study before I covered the phone lines."

In exchange for the free training, Common Ground requires volunteers to work at least one, four-hour shift per week for one year.

I sent a letter out this past week to our FAPS families announcing our goal to return to school August 25th and communicated a few of the requirements and recommendations from

the state's Return to School Task Force. Along with the goal of returning to school, we are offering a viable and quality virtual option for our families. We know that this is a lofty goal and there are many factors that could get in the way of us starting the school year together under the same roof. Despite the barriers in front of us, we will continue to work toward our goal of returning to school.

While we are developing our plan to return to school, like all public schools across the country, we know that flexibility is a must. During the next six weeks, much can happen and change is inevitable. Along with our return to school plan, we will have transition plans in case we must pivot as a district and transition to another instruc-

Our patience has been, and will be tested. In my letter, I noted that details will be sent out as we de-

velop our plan of returning. There are many questions out there, including what happens if a child or staff member is diagnosed with CO-

VID-19? These protocols, which will be part of our plan, are not set by us, as a public school system, but rather the health department and medical experts in the state. We know that the plan we are developing now may change overnight based on factors we do not have control over. Patience is a virtue

Genesee Health Plan (GHP) announced July 13 the winners of its fifth annual Health Heritage essay and scholarship contests, sponsored by Sovita Credit Union.

"We received a record number of entries in our Health Heritage essay and scholarship contests this year, despite the COVID-19 pandemic," said Jim Milanowski, GHP President and CEO. "We appreciate the teachers and parents who took the time to help their children understand the current health crisis and to encourage them to reflect on how their personal and family health history impacts their overall health outcomes and future."

"I wish I could have taken this training when I was 25 years old," Ingraham said. "How my life would have changed."

The calls that come into the center can range from folks looking for resources and/or services such as housing, food, work, to just someone to talk to and to active potential suicides. Common Ground gets referrals from many places, including the police, hospitals, schools and more. Common Ground is a local entity, serving Holly and the

surrounding communities, however, it also receives calls from all over the state, other states, and sometimes from all over the world, according to Ingraham.

"This work is very stressful and thankless," he said. "The folks at Common Ground have not missed a shift since the pandemic started and continue to be there for the people they serve. They are truly our unsung heroes."

Ingraham said he wants the community to know what they do at Common Ground and appreciate their compassion, understanding, empathy, and devotion to people in need.

Ingraham said he was a traveling salesman for over 40 years. "I met a lot of people in all those years. Each one had a story to tell. All I could do was listen and offer whatever advice I could come up with," he said. "I am also a veteran service officer and talk with a lot of veterans that have a story to tell as well.

"In all these years, I have dealt with, come in contact with, and listened to people that wanted to end their lives. There were times when I just didn't know what to say. When I saw an ad in

"It has been the greatest experience of my life and the most rewarding. My greatest reward is when a caller says, 'thanks for listening' or 'you made me feel better.' Sometimes we can save a life."

Holly Police Chief Jerry Narsh is reporting that Holly police officers responded to a home on Grange Hall Road at 1:12 a.m. on Saturday, July 11.

A homeowner told police that he watching TV at his home when he saw a group of approximately 10 people near his vehicle, which was on his property. He described the group as five white males, three white females and two Black males.

The homeowner confronted the teenaged looking group about their intentions. Most apologized but one white male, described as stocky, about 17-18 years old, wearing jeans and a grey and white Nike hoodie became sarcastic and argumentative with the property owner.

The younger male lunged at the homeowner and tried to assault him. The homeowner held him to the ground and told them all to leave.

The aggressive male left but returned a short time later and approached the victim pointing a pistol at him. The armed male then tripped and left the area.

In this State Primary, voters can only vote one political party in partisan races. Winnerswill advance to the General Election in November. Voters can vote both parties in November

Thomas Broecker, operations manager/deputy clerk for Fenton Township, said that voters need to remember that they need to vote either Republican or Democrat candidates.

Broecker said this written reminder is included with every absentee voter ballot, with the wording, "When voting your absentee ballot, please remember that this is an open primary. Although there are both Republican and Democratic candidates on the ballot, you can only vote in one of those party columns. This means you may vote for only Democratic candidates or you may vote for only Republican candidates for the entire ballot.

"For example: you cannot vote for a Democratic candidate for County Sheriff, and then vote for a Republican candidate for County Commissioner. Casting votes in both columns will result in a 'split ticket,' which will invalidate the entire partisan section of the ballot, and none of those votes will count. Votes in the non-partisan section of the ballot, (judicial and proposals), will still be valid, even if your partisan votes result in a split ticket."

When election workers insert the AVB into the tabulator, it will notify the workers that cross voting has occurred. The worker at that point in the voting process only has the option of selecting "cast as is" on the tabulator. If residents realize they have made an error on their AVB, they need to contact their local clerk prior to election day, so that new AVB can be filled out.

Because of the governor's latest executive order requiring face coverings in any public building, polling stations also are requiring face coverings. Broecker said they do have a limited number of facemasks if someone needs one to vote in person.

GENESEE COUNTY MASS TRANSPORTATION AUTHORITY (MTA) MILLAGE REPLACEMENT PROPOSAL

Shall the Mass Transportation Authority (MTA) replace the 0.40 millage approved by the voters Aug. 5, 2014 and the 0.425 millage approved by the voters Nov. 4, 2014 and the 0.40 millage approved by voters Aug. 7, 2018 with a new millage of 1.225 mills for a period of five years, 202-2024, inclusive, for the purpose of providing mass transportation services including demand response (Your Ride) and other related services for the elderly, persons with disabilities, the disadvantaged and other members of the public throughout Genesee County. The new levy of 1.225 mills would be \$1.225 per \$1,000 on the taxable value of property in Genesee County. It is estimated that \$1.225 mills would raise \$11,885,622 in the first year of this replacement levy. If his proposal is approved, the MTA would no longer levy the previously approved millages.

GENESEE COUNTY ANIMAL CONTROL SHELTER MILLAGE RENEWAL PROPOSAL

Shall there be a renewal of the previously approved authorization of the Genesee County Board of Commissioners to levy a tax of 0.1994 (\$0.1994 per \$1,000 of taxable property valuation), less any reduction computed in 2020 pursuant to Michigan Compiled Laws section 211.34d, upon the taxable valuation of the property within Genesee County, as finally equalized, for each of the seven years from 2021 t0 2027, inclusive, for the purpose of supplementing and supporting operations and modernization of the Genesee County Animal Control Shelter? This is a renewal of the Genesee County Animal Control Shelter Millage that expires after the 2020 levy. The estimated revenue that will be collected during the first year this millage is authorized and levied is \$1,889,419. In Genesee County, there are local authorities that capture and use for authorized purposes tax increment revenues from property taxes levied by the county. Such captured revenue would include a portion of the proposed millage levy. The total amount of captured tax increment revenues from the proposed millage levy in the first calendar year of the levy is estimated to be \$57,095. Locally, local authorities include city of Fenton Downtown Development Authority (DDA) and Local Development Finance Authority (LDFA), and the city of Linden DDA.

LAKE FENTON COMMUNITY SCHOOLS SINKING FUND MILLAGE PROPOSAL

Shall the limitation on the amount of taxes, which may be assessed against all property in Lake Fenton Community Schools, Genesee County, be increased by and the board of education be authorized to levy not to exceed 1 mill (\$1.00 on each \$1,000 of taxable valuation) for a period of three years, 2020 to 2022, inclusive, to create a sinking fund for the purchase of real estate for sites for, and the construction of repair of, school buildings, for school security improvements, for the acquisition or upgrading of technology and all other purposes authorized by law; the estimate of the revenue the school district will collect if the millage is approve and levied in 2020 is approximately \$612,630?

The estimated millage that will be levied for the proposed bonds in 2020, under current law, is 1.44 mills (\$1.44 on each \$1,000 of taxable valuation). The maximum number of years the bonds of any series may be outstanding, exclusive of any refunding, is 25 years. The estimated simple average annual millage anticipated to be required to retire this bond debt is 1.25 mills (\$1.25 on each \$1,000 of taxable valuation). The school district does not expect to borrow from the State to pay debt service on the bonds. The total amount of qualified bonds currently outstanding is \$122,095,000. The total amount of qualified loans currently outstanding is approximately \$48,696. The estimated computed millage rate may change based on changes in certain circumstances. Pursuant to State law, expenditure of bond proceeds must be audited and the proceeds cannot be used for repair or maintenance costs, teacher, administrator or employee salaries, or other operating expenses.

Looking back: Bronchos capture share of Metro Stripes league title

The Holly High School gymnasium has banners on the walls for every sport.

The Holly varsity volleyball team has made a habit of looking at their pennant this season. It reads the last time the Bronchos shared a Metro League championship was during the 1993-94 school year.

"Every year many times through-

out the season, we will pause and look at that banner and talk about what it would mean to put a number on that banner," Holly varsity volleyball coach Deena Maher said. "It's been a goal as long as I've been here."

Soon, there will be a time the Bronchos can look at that banner with some pride. That's because Holly captured the share of the Metro League's Stripe Division title Thursday night by defeating Swartz Creek 25-9, 25-11, 25-13 during Senior Night. The win ended Holly at 9-1, tied with Flushing atop the final Stripes Division standings.

The Bronchos took care of business this week. After beating Flushing in a sweep Oct. 21, the Bronchos crushed Kearsley 25-6, 25-14, 25-13 on Tuesday See BRONCHOS on 22

Sports Times **Bastille Day Run has created 18 years of great memories**

It started in 2002 with just a 5K run and walk competition.

The champions for the first Bastille Day Walk and Run had a local flavor as Kirk Walrath (16:18) won the men's division and Karen Alexander (20:20) won the women's division of the 5K run. The 5K walk victors were David Pichey (28:03) for the men and Stephanie Konsza (30:17) for the women.

It was a pretty encouraging start for the Bastille Day Run. It was so encouraging that a year later the event also hosted a 15K race around the streets of Fenton. And now, the Bastille Day is a Fenton mainstay for the running community.

This season's won't be happening around the streets of Fenton

due to the COVID-19 outbreak, so to celebrate the annual event, the sports staff has decided to honor it by looking back at its past.

Winning spouses: Eric and Sue Larsen may be the first couple running in Fenton, and during the first 15K race in 2003, the couple proved it. Husband Eric was the overall winner with a time of 52:04. Not too far behind Eric was his wife, Sue, in 1:00.48.

"There were a lot of good runners out here," Eric said. "It is a really nice feeling to win. I was happy with my time."

"I was happy with my performance," Sue said. "I thought I could be up there with the top few women."

The first 15K race drew 186 runners and there were 609 participants in the three events. That was up from 530 during the first year.

Susan Mora-Fassett dominates early on: Fenton's Mora-Fassett won the 5K women's walk event each year from 2003 until 2006. She also collected the women's title in 2008 and 2011, giving her six titles in the 5K walk event.

Harry Garrison owns six walk titles as well: Harry Garrison has won the men's 5K walk event six times since the 2012 event. He is the current two-time defending 5K walk men's champion, winning it in 2018 and 2019.

But Garrison, a Flushing resident, is more than one of the elite walkers in the field. The Flushing native spends a lot of his time encouraging other walkers to finish See BASTILLE on 22

the event after he finishes.

"Winning is not that important," the 73-year old athlete (at the time) said after winning the 2018 race. "It's just doing it. Anybody that crosses that finish line is a winner, and that's how I feel."

Three years in a row for Jesse Anderson and Kelsey Bragg: From 2014 to 2016, Jesse Anderson and Kelsey Bragg, both Fenton residents, won their gender's 15K event.

Anderson's third win came with a time of 53:24, beating the field by more than five minutes. Bragg had the fifth fastest time regarless of gender in the event (59:20), but it would represent the last time she ran in the event because she was getting ready to move to England.

"My fiancé lives there," Bragg said. "So I'm getting married and moving over there. I was like I have to do Bastille. I don't know when I'll be able to do it again, and it's one of my favorite races."

Anderson is one of many that enjoy keeping the titles within the tricounty area.

"I have always said that Fenton is the hotbed for running," Anderson said. "You have people like Lisa Veneziano winning Runner of the Year every year, ... and the coverboy for the Detroit Free Press Marathon. Everywhere you go, whether it is Canada or the newsstands across Michigan, Fenton runners are represented. It's a really cool atmosphere."

Only two repeat men's 5K run champions: Linden's Brad Ferrara became the first 5K run men's defending champion in 2009 when he won the race for the second straight year.

Ferrara won his second race with a time of 16:18.

The second repeat champion was Holly's Michael McCarty who won the men's 5K event back-to-back in 2012 and 2013 McCarty won his second title with a time of 16:12.

"Last year I came here and ran a 16:54 for my first race, so to come here and get a 40-second improvement is fantastic to me," said the Holly graduate. "I've done no real workouts, no intervals. ... I'm really happy with it." McCarty owns another record. He's the only male 5K runner to win the race three times. He won his third in 2015 with a time of 16:55.

The superstar of Bastille Day, Sue Larsen: Larsen won the first women's 15K event in 2003, and has made a habit of winning titles ever since. Larsen has won an eyepopping 10 titles. She's won the 5K women's race eight times (2004, 05, 07, 08, 12, 15, 17 and 18) while winning the 15K title twice (2010 was her second). Larsen's eighth 5K title (and 10th overall came in 2018.

"It's at home and they are roads I run every day," Larsen said. "I don't know how many more years I can do it. I am getting older, so I enjoy each one a little more probably."

The ageless wonder: Fenton's Lisa Veneziano is the area's ageless wonder. She won her third 15K female title in 2019.

"I'm on the verge of 55. I'll be 55 in mid-September," Veneziano said at the time. "It's so funny, when I go on my treadmill, I have to put my age in and I put in '54' and think who is that? And soon, I'll be putting in '55.""

and followed that win with Thursday's convincing victory against Swartz Creek.

Today, July 19, is National Ice Cream Day and a great time to reflect on where ice cream came from. There isn't just one person credited for inventing ice cream. But whatever the history, ice cream is here to stay.

A.D 54-68

For centuries, iced desserts were a luxury. Roman Emperor Nero is said to have sent his slaves into the mountains to fetch snow to mix with nectar, fruit pulp, and honey, although this widely told tale may be a myth.

A.D. 618-907

The origins of ice cream date back to China's T'ang period, probably as a dish for the country's rulers. The founder of the dynasty, King T'ang of Shang, kept 94 "ice men" on hand to lug ice to the palace to make a dish made of koumiss (heated, fermented milk), flour, and camphor.

17**8**Z

Ever hear how Martha Washington left a bowl of sweet cream on the back steps of Mount Vernon one night, and the next morning discovered ice cream? Nice story, but not true. George Washington did have, described in his ledger, "a cream machine for ice."





1843

Until Sept. 9, 1843, ice cream was made by the "pot freezer method," but on this day, Nancy M. Johnson of Philadelphia got her "artificial freezer" patented, containing a tub, cylinder, lid, dasher, and crank. This design is still widely used today.

1851

Baltimore dairyman Jacob Fussell opened the first commercial ice cream factory. He had a surplus of cream so he built an ice cream factory in Seven Valleys, Pennsylvania, and shipped it to Baltimore by train. Business boomed, and Fussell became the father of the wholesale ice cream industry.

1880

Buffalo, New York; Evanston, Illinois; Two Rivers, Wisconsin; and Ithaca, New York all claim to have invented the ice cream sundae. Wherever it happened, it first started appearing in soda fountains during the 1880s. It was invented because ice cream sodas weren't allowed to be sold on Sundays; the ice cream sundae was a way to circumvent that restriction.

1939

Grocery stores didn't start selling ice cream until the 1930s, and by WWII, ice cream had become so popular that it turned into somewhat of an American symbol (Mussolini banned it in Italy for that same reason). Ice cream was great for troop morale, and in 1943, the U.S. Armed Forces were the world's largest ice cream manufacturers.
