

# Voters make their voices heard

■ Unofficial local results, Genesee County reports 29.33 percent voter turnout

Voters in the tri-county area cast their ballots on several state, county and township races, and proposals in

Michigan's Primary Election on Tuesday, Aug. 4. Partisan races required voters to vote only Democrat or Republican candidates. Michigan voters will be permitted to cross party lines in the November General Election.

Overall, Genesee County had a 29.33 percent voter turnout, while

Oakland County had a 37.14 percent voter turnout and Livingston County had a 37.54 percent voter turnout.

With a Primary Election, the top Democrat and top Republican will advance to the General Election in November. In unopposed races, the candidates will still advance and

run unopposed again.

Potential write-in candidates for the November General Election must file Declaration of Intent forms by 4 p.m. Oct. 23. Go to [Michigan.gov](http://Michigan.gov) for more information.

■ Health departments say cases involve 15 to 19-year-olds that attended large gatherings in July

# St. Mary Magdalene blesses the fleet

■Church blesses kayakers before paddle down Shiawassee River

About a dozen people participated in the first Blessing of the Fleet Paddle on Saturday, Aug. 1 at St. Mary Magdalene Church Orthodox Church in Fenton.

With overcast weather and the Shiawassee River flowing behind him, Fr. Gabriel Bilas did a blessing of the water and a blessing of the fleet for a group of kayaks and kayakers before heading down the river.

“It’s a tradition that goes back 2,000 years,” said local resident Matthew Morgan, who organized the event. “It’s a really old tradition. When I was in the Navy, everyone had a blessing of the fleet.”

This tradition goes back to a time when populations relied on fishing as a main source of food. Religious leaders would bless the vessels and sailors for a safe return, and they would pray for a great harvest.

Pastoral Assistant Rebekah Humphreys said this is part of the Procession

of the Life-Giving Cross, and Aug. 1 is one of three times in the Orthodox liturgical calendar when they can bless water.

The kayaks and canoes fit into that. The church does a blessing of the

Shiawassee River in the beginning of January, and they do these types of community outreach events a few times a month. They gave kayakers snacks and water for the paddle.

## Just sayin'...

**W**hen a young lady I know was pregnant with her son a few years ago, I joked that the little fish she had tattooed near her belly button was going to look like a whale in nine months. I don't know why, but I thought about that while looking in the bathroom mirror the other day.

On the far side of my upper arm, there is a permanent scar that, too, has grown as I got older — the smallpox vaccination. It is about the size of a nickel with little pin pricks around the inner circle. It has faded considerably but is still present.

I received the smallpox injection when I was a small child. I vaguely remember getting the shot in my skinny little upper arm. I remember the doctor giving it was a man. And I remember the scab that eventually fell from the injection site after a number of days. I don't remember it hurting though so it could not have been too bad.

The early 20th century saw several smallpox epidemics, and

the infection was fatal for about 3 out of 10 affected people. Smallpox is an infection of the variola virus. Scientists developed a smallpox vaccine using a live variation of a virus called vaccinia. The vaccination was so effective that in the early 1950s, scientists declared that smallpox had been eradicated. In 1972, doctors discontinued smallpox vaccinations in the United States.

During my childhood years, many of the vaccines available today did not exist. I actually got the "mumps." Kids today get the MMR (measles, mumps and rubella) vaccine. I was miserable! For two weeks my throat hurt so bad and I looked like a squirrel with nuts stored under my jaws on each side of my neck. I also got the measles. I don't remember them being too bad except I could not go outside to play for a couple of weeks. The chicken pox were bad. The sores all over were itchy, ugly and I was miserable. Today, kids can get the varicella (chicken pox) vaccine.

My kids just missed that one and

both got chicken pox in the early 1990s.

I'm wondering now what the COVID-19 vaccine will look like. Will I have another lovely circular pin prick scar on my other arm? The one I have now kind of makes me feel like I've been branded like a farm animal. But, I can never get smallpox, and when the COVID-19 vaccine becomes available, I'll probably get it.

When there finally is a vaccine, why suffer if you don't have to?

Millions of us baby boomers survived the vaccines that saved our lives.

What's another battle scar — after all these months of dealing with this treacherous disease, we've earned it. Just sayin'!





# Genesee County 6<sup>th</sup> District race narrows to two

## ■ Voters will choose winner in November

Two people will face off in November for the Genesee County 6th District Commissioner seat.

Incumbent Shaun Shumaker ran unopposed in the Republican primary and received 4,378 (76 percent) votes.

Shumaker said, "I was very excited to see the increase in voter participation in Tuesday's primary election. I am so thankful for each and every one of my supporters. I look forward to the journey ahead, that God willing will end in November, with me being able to continue protecting what matters in Genesee County's 6th district."

Tim Draeger, a write-in for the Democratic primary, received more than 600 write-in votes and will face

Shumaker in the November election.

"I am humbled by the outpouring of support I received from so many people in the 6th District," Draeger said. "In just under three weeks time, from the date I filed as a write-in candidate to primary day, more than 600 people wrote my name in because they know I work hard, I'm always fair, and I deliver what I promise. I listen to all sides, and I seek a variety of sources because I value the benefits of soliciting and listening to diverse inputs."

"I have the best interest of this area and all of its citizens at heart, I will support our local sheriff, and I will work hard to deliver positive community development programs, like the LAFF Pathway project, through creative funding methods like grants and donations," Draeger said.

# Argentine Township election results

## ■ Two new members will sit on the board of trustees

The Argentine Township Board of Trustees will have two new people on the board for the coming years.

In the Aug. 4 Primary, Supervisor Brian Saad ran unopposed for his seat and received 672 (74 percent) votes. Treasurer Norm Schmidt ran unopposed for his same position and received 666 (73 percent) votes.

Joe Graves, former state representative and past Argentine Township clerk, ran for the clerk position unopposed and received 684 (75 percent) votes. He will take over the position after his wife, Denise Graves, stepped down as Argentine Township clerk

after more than a decade.

"I look forward to continue serving the community as the township clerk while working with the new board to continue the momentum of the existing board," he said.

In the race for trustee, Incumbent Scott Conner will remain in his position after receiving 555 (30 percent) votes, and a new trustee, Gwynne James, received 497 (27 percent) votes.

"Personally, I think it's great. We didn't have a third person running against me, but the votes show I'm a favorite, I think," Conner said.

There are only two trustee seats available, and there are no Democratic challengers for the November election.

A trustee seat was up for grabs after current trustee Tom Hallman decided not to run.

## Sheriff Swanson and Sanford win primary

■ Two will face off in November to win Genesee County sheriff seat for next four years

Genesee County Sheriff Christopher Swanson, 47, of Fenton Township, successfully defeated his opponents in the Democratic primary for Genesee County Sheriff. Swanson received 38,623 votes. The two other Democratic candidates were Phil Hart, who received 8,464 votes and Timothy Johnson, who received 12,881 votes.

Swanson will advance to the November general election and run against his Republican challenger, Stephen Sanford, 40, of Linden.

Sanford ran unopposed in the Republican primary and received 20,873 votes. He is a reserve police officer, and medically retired from the U.S. Army. He also is an author and firearms instructor.

Swanson said, "Clearly, the people have spoken, which is a humble reminder to continue doing what I've done over the last 27 years at the sheriff's office. I take care of people. Lead — protect — inspire. I'm looking forward to the final step in November."

Following the election, Sanford said, "I am eagerly anticipating facing Mr. Swanson in the general election. Genesee County deserves to have the critical examination of criminal justice that a sheriff's election brings."

"This is an excellent opportunity for people of all political views to take a hard look at law enforcement and how it affects all of us. I intend to present my ideas, plans and views for the voters to weigh. I believe that by the general election, the voters in this community will see my ideas, and ideals are clearly the better choice."

"As my military record shows, I am not a person who can stand by and do nothing."

## Four proposals pass in August Primary

■ Lake Fenton sinking fund, animal control and public transportation approved by voters

The four proposals tri-county residents voted on for the Aug. 4 primary passed.

The **Lake Fenton Community Schools sinking fund** millage proposal passed by fewer than 200 votes. The vote was 1,856 (50 percent) yes to 1,691 (56 percent) no.

Lake Fenton Superintendent Julie Williams said, "We are so grateful for the continued support from our families and community members. Thank you Lake Fenton community for valuing our schools."

This places a 1 mill (\$1 on each \$1,000 of taxable valuation) tax on all taxable property in the Lake Fenton Community School district for three years, from 2020 to 2022, to create a sinking fund for the purchase of real estate for sites for, and the construction of repair of, school buildings, for school security improvements, for the acquisition or upgrading of technology and all other purposes authorized by law.

It's estimated to raise approximately \$612,630 in the first year.

**Genesee County Animal Control**

The Genesee County Animal Control Shelter millage renewal passed with a vote of 61,475 (64 percent) yes to 25,119 (26 percent) no.

The proposal was a renewal of the tax of 0.1994 (\$0.1994 per \$1,000 of taxable property valuation) upon taxable valuation of the property within Genesee County for seven years, from 2021 to 2027, to pay for the Genesee County Animal Control shelter. The estimated revenue that will be collected during the first year this millage is authorized and levied is \$1,889,419.

**Mass Transportation Authority**

The Genesee County Mass Transportation Authority (MTA) millage replacement proposal passed with 57,517 (60 percent) yes votes to 31,049 (32 percent) no votes.

This creates a new millage of 1.225 mills, to replace old millages, in order to raise funds for the MTA, which provides mass transportation services including demand response (Your Ride) and other related services for the elderly, persons with disabilities, the disadvantaged and other members of the public throughout Genesee County. The new levy of 1.225 mills means a tax of \$1.225 per \$1,000 on the taxable value of property in Genesee County.

It is estimated that \$11,885,622 will be raised the first year.

**Hartland Consolidated Schools bonding proposal passes with 177 votes**

The Hartland Consolidated Schools bonding proposal passed by a vote of 4,516 to 4,339, a difference of 177 votes. Hartland Consolidated Schools may now borrow the sum of not to exceed \$45 million and issue its general obligation unlimited tax bonds therefore, in one or more series, for the purpose of numerous upgrades. The estimated millage that will be levied for the proposed bonds in 2020, under current law, is 1.44 mills (\$1.44 on each \$1,000 of taxable valuation). The maximum number of years the bonds of any series may be outstanding, exclusive of any refunding, is 25 years. Pursuant to state law, expenditure of bond proceeds must be audited and the proceeds cannot be used for repair or maintenance costs, teacher, administrator or employee salaries, or other operating expenses.







# Fenton Township Primary election results

■ Current trustee runs for supervisor, one trustee seat goes to a write-in

The Fenton Township Board of Trustees will be different in 2021.

Vince Lorraine, who's currently a township trustee, ran unopposed in the Republican primary for the Fenton Township supervisor position.

He received 1,895 votes (79 percent).

Lorraine does not have a Democratic challenger for the November election.

Clerk Robert Krug ran unopposed for his position and received 1,893 votes (79 percent). He does not have a Democratic challenger in November.

Current Treasurer John Tucker ran unopposed for the treasurer position and received 1,862 votes (78 percent).

Tucker said the election went "pretty much as was expected. Overall voter participation was very high for a primary election. Fenton Township was at about a 35-percent turn-out compared to 15-20 percent in most presidential election years," he said.

Tucker attributes this to the high absentee voter turnout. In the township, approximately 70 percent of the votes cast were absentee.

"The second thing I noticed was that the Fenton Township ballots were almost evenly split between Democratic and Republican Party votes. That was surprising to me. I attribute it to the lack of competitive races on the Republican side of things and some left-over angst from the last presidential election outcome. Likely means that we will have a heavy turn-out come November," he said.

In the trustee race, the three incumbents were challenged by three write-ins in the Republican Primary for four seats.

Incumbent Mark Goupil received 1,503 (16 percent) votes, Incumbent

Robert Kesler received 1,511 (16 percent) votes, and Incumbent Christine Reid received 1,505 (16 percent) votes.

"I am grateful to my constituents for having faith in me. I will continue to put the residents first and will continue to look at each issue independently and weigh the benefits and burdens as it pertains to the township as a whole. I

would like to see more residents run in these elections for a chance to sit on the board of trustees," said Goupil.

"I believe the township could benefit with new members and fresh ideas on the board. This is my fifth

term but in the last few elections, there was nobody new running for the trustee positions. In fact, the primary for this election cycle only had six people that turned in petitions or paid their \$100 filing fee for seven spots available," he said.

Reid, the newest member on the Fenton Township Board of Trustees, successfully won her seat. "I'm grateful to the election inspectors and voters that turned out for the primary election and look forward to their participation and support in November," she said.

Kesler said, "I am very pleased to be able to serve the township for another four years."

The three write-in challengers were Michael Peraino, Jay Nussel and Kenneth Baran. As of Wednesday, Aug. 5 the Genesee County election division website reports there are 58 unresolved write-in votes.

There were no Democratic challengers in the Primary.

The Genesee County Board of Canvassers has to examine and certify the write-in votes. Results aren't expected until next week.

Potential write-in candidates for the November General Election must file Declaration of Intent forms by 4 p.m. Oct. 23. Go to Michigan.gov for more information.



### AUG. 9

**1974:** In accordance with his statement of resignation the previous evening, Richard M. Nixon officially ends his term as the 37th president of the United States at noon. Minutes later, Vice President Gerald R. Ford was sworn in as the 38th president of the United States.

### AUG. 10

**1846:** After a decade of debate about how best to spend a bequest left to America from an obscure English scientist, President James K. Polk signs the Smithsonian Institution Act into law.

### AUG. 11

**2014:** Robin Williams, the prolific Oscar-winning actor and comedian, died by suicide on this day in 2014. He was 63.

### AUG. 12

**1985:** At 6:50 p.m. local time, a Japan Air Lines Boeing 747SR crashes into Mount Otsuka, 70 miles northwest of Tokyo. There were 524 people aboard, and all but four were dead by the time rescuers reached the remote crash site 12 hours later.

### AUG. 13

"We need parents and young people in our community to recognize the risk they take to their own health and that of their family and friends when attending gatherings without taking precautions," Leigh-Ann Stafford, Oakland County health officer, said. "We can work together across our communities to contain the spread and I urge parents to be aware of activities your kids attend."

Preliminary information indicates a significant increase in cases among high school age students and those numbers could change as case investigation continues in the three counties. In Oakland County, COVID-19 cases among 15 to 19-year olds in the South Lyon area increased from three cases during late-June to mid-July to 42 from mid-July to early August.

Similar trends for this age group have been observed countywide in Livingston and Genesee counties. For Livingston County, cases increased from three cases during late-June to mid-July to 19 from mid-July to early August and in Genesee County, cases increased from 19 during late-June to mid-July to 94 from mid-July to early August.

The three health departments are conducting case investigations to identify individuals who have potentially been exposed. Initial information has determined that 15 to 19-year olds from Oakland Livingston and Genesee attended at least six large gatherings.

If you attended a large gathering in the South Lyon and/or Fenton area during mid to late July and you think you are developing any of the symptoms of COVID-19 described below, call your physician or local health department. People with COVID-19 have reported a wide range of symptoms from mild to severe. Symptoms may appear 2-14 days after exposure to the virus. People with these symptoms may have COVID-19:

- Fever or chills
- Cough
- Shortness of breath or difficulty breathing
- Fatigue
- Muscle or body aches
- Headache
- New loss of taste or smell
- Sore throat
- Congestion or runny nose
- Nausea or vomiting
- Diarrhea

If you are considering attending an indoor or outdoor event, take precautions by:

- Maintaining 6 feet social distance from those outside your household
- Wearing a face covering when you cannot stay 6 feet from others
- Washing your hands regularly for 20 seconds. If soap and water are not

available, use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer with at least 60% alcohol.

- Staying home when sick

There is currently no vaccine to prevent COVID-19. The best way to prevent infection is to avoid being exposed to the virus. The spread of COVID-19 can be reduced with cloth face coverings, social distancing, and staying home when sick except to get medical care.


Fenton's mayor pro tem and a member of the Applefest committee. The Lockwoods had helped with Applefest for more than 40 years.




## Rose Township announces winners

■ Incumbents to retain seats, 1,275 voters cast absentee ballots

The Aug. 4 Primary election went very well in Rose Township, said Clerk Debbie Miller. She said the in-person voter turnout was 239 voters in Precinct one, 286 voters in Precinct two and 268 voters in Precinct three. Voter turnout was 37.14 percent. The absentee voter count was 1,275. As a comparison, Miller said the March 10 Presidential Primary absentee voter count was 752.

Supervisor Dianne Scheib-Snyder won the Republican primary on

Tuesday, Aug. 4, defeating challenger Linda Dagenhardt by a vote of 913 to 437. Scheib-Snyder will advance to the November general election. There were no Democrats in this race.

Miller won the Republican primary to retain the clerk's seat. She defeated Linda Stouffer by a vote of 781 to 570. Miller will advance to the November general election and run unopposed.

Treasurer Paul Gambka defeated Tim Cole and Jill Stern in the Republican primary. Gambka received 603 votes, while Cole received 339 and Stern received 391. There were no Democrats in this race and Gambka will advance to the November general election and run unopposed.

Trustee Glen Nobel and Patricia Walls won the two trustee seats in the Republican primary. Nobel received 577 votes and Walls received 441 votes. Ron Mann received 417 votes, Tim Claus received 387, Linda Watson-Call received 398 and Frazer Wadenstorer received 137. There were no Democrats running. Nobel and Walls will advance to the November general election.





three years, the Tigers have held at least half of the 16 positions, including an all-time high of nine during the 2018-19 season. So, there can’t be any way Fenton suddenly dropped from holding at least half of the positions for three years to just four this season, right? Of course that hasn’t happened. Each of the top four teams are Fenton squads, so that means this will be

the fourth straight year the Tigers have at least eight of the positions. That’s a pretty impressive stat.

Now on to today’s No. 4 team.

**No. 4 – Fenton boys cross country:** Last year’s No. 4 squad has held its position for the 2019-20 school year. Cross country has been the area’s top prep sport for more than a decade, and this year, the

### Football practices during COVID-19 era start Monday

■ Social distancing, masks are among many changes teams must deal with

Denny Hopkins has spent about four decades preparing for prep football seasons either as an assistant or head varsity football coach. He’s been the head varsity coach since 1998.

He’s seen his share of changes through the years and has had to adjust each time. But preparing for the 2020 football season has been completely different than any other he’s experienced. Of course that has

to do with the COVID-19 epidemic.

“There’s been changes, but I think everybody is rolling with the punches. You have no choice,” Hopkins said. “You never know what’s going to happen. Things are changing every day. Right now we are still practicing Monday but next Monday could be different. All we can do is control what we can control and prepare ourselves.”

The same is true at Fenton High School. There were some sort of team camps or sessions during the summer, but they were much different than year’s past for all teams in the state of Michigan. That was the case for Fenton as well.

"We conditioned and held a couple of football camps. When you consider all the things in place it made it difficult to do the things we normally do," Fenton varsity football coach Jeff Setzke said. "We did what we possibly could. We stayed 6 feet apart and we were blocking garbage cans, just doing what we had to do."

The typical 7-on-7 sessions teams use to prepare for seasons were eliminated during the summer, and as the current COVID read from the Michigan High School Athletic Association (MHSAA), there won't be any scrimmages for football (or any sport for that matter) this fall during the practice seasons.

Practices start Monday with no pads just as they have in the past. However, the entire week will be padless, which is a change.

Equipment will be sanitized as frequently as possible during practice with social distancing taking place with those not engaged in active participation of drills or practice activities. Masks will be worn by individuals

when they are not involved in activities. Prepare to hear chants like "Tiger up" which means lift facemasks.

Temperature checks, questionnaires and other COVID-19 preventions will be part of the day as well.

"The rules are the rules ... and we are going to follow them so we don't put ourselves or others at risk," Setzke said.

Fenton plans on holding its first practice Monday at midnight just as it has for more than a decade now. Linden will begin its practices at about 4 p.m. on Monday, about the same schedule they've had for more than a decade as well.

# 1984 Tigers slumped horribly at start of August


*Editor's note: The Major League Baseball season has started, but the sports staff is going to continue to remember the 1984 season within our publication. Enjoy.*

When the 1984 Detroit Tigers were playing strong baseball, the squad ranked among the best in baseball history.

The records prove it. No team has ever had a better 40-game start than the Tigers' 35-5 beginning that season. The team's 17-game road streak also tied a Major League record. Once the Tigers got beyond the All-Star Break, they were at it again, ripping off a 14-5 record in their next 19 games. After splitting four games at home against Boston, Detroit held a 70-32 record and were on pace to win more than 110 games. They led second-place Toronto by 12 1/2 games.

But even the 1984 Tigers had their moments of bad baseball, and when August began, they were about to hit one of those periods. Detroit split a four-game series against Cleveland after the Boston series, winning the final game on Aug. 2 when Jack Morris pitched eight strong innings and earned a 2-1 victory. Lou Whitaker hit a two-run home run, providing all the offense Morris needed in the contest.

After that series, the Tigers would go on to lose six of their next seven ball games. Beginning a four-game series with Kansas City on Aug. 3, the Royals hit Detroit pitcher Milt Wilcox hard in the fourth inning and be-

fore Detroit knew it, the home squad trailed 8-2. Alan Trammell and Tom Brookens would hit home runs in the game, but Detroit lost 9-6. Kansas City scored nine more runs about 24 hours later, in a 9-5 Tigers' loss. Glenn Abbott was ineffective as the starting pitcher and relievers Doug Bair and Sid Monge struggled as well. A day later, Detroit played what was the first of three straight days of doubleheaders due to rainouts earlier in the year, losing both games to Kansas City. Boos even were heard in Tiger Stadium several times during the twinbill in front of more than 40,000 fans.

## Argentine pathway on path for completion

■ Engineers hope to have pathway completed near schools in time for first day of class

Work is continuing on the 2.1-mile Argentine Township non-motorized pathway that passes through the Linden Community Schools complex off Lobdell and Silver Lake roads.

As of Wednesday, Aug. 5, construction workers with Sommerset Paving and Concrete were paving the pathway parallel to the road heading to Linden Middle School.

Work began June 15. Geric Rose, operations manager from Fleis & Vandenbrink which is the construction engineer for the project, said they're in the paving stage for the pathway along Lobdell Road and in the Linden schools complex. They're doing grading along Silver Lake Road.

Erie Construction is overseeing the project.

When done, the pathway will start

at Haviland Beach Drive and Lobdell Road, traverse through the Linden schools campus to Silver Lake Road and then continue east on Silver Lake Road, through Fenton Township and connect

into the existing city of Linden's sidewalk and bike lane.

The trail cost about \$1.4 million and is anticipated to be completed by this fall. Funding came from federal,

state, local and private dollars.

Teresa Ciesielski, pathway organizer and former Argentine Township trustee, said they have seen a lot of support since the beginning of construction. People have walked along the graded path to see the progress.

“Two eagle scouts have stepped up and are building trash containers and recycling containers. The benches for the project have been donated,” she said.

The next step is to develop programming and activities for the path.




