Lund leads our boys basketball team again

Call it the Tri-County Triple Play. Linden star prep boys basketball player Blake Lund has been the area's top player ever since he joined the Eagles' varsity squad.

His freshman season, Lund averaged 16 points a game and was named 2018 Tri-County Boys Basketball Player of the Year honor.

During his sophomore season, Lund only got better. Helping lead the Eagles to a Flint Metro League title, he averaged 15.8 points a game, nailing 43 percent of his shots. He also collected 3.4 assists a contest. Of course, he ended the season as a two-time Tri-County Boys Basketball Player of the Year award.

So what did Lund do his junior season? His performances took off dramatically. His season scoring average jumped to 23.0 points per a game, doing it by nailing 72 three-pointers at a 42 percent clip. While averaging 23 points a game, he was extremely unselfish, collecting 4.0 assists a game. He also grabbed 4.5 rebounds and 2.5 steals a contest, helping the Eagles to an 18-2 regular season record while earning the Flint Metro League Stripes Division title with a perfect 10-0 mark. So when it came to deciding who the 2020 Tri-County Boys Basketball

Player of the Year is going to be, the choice was obvious. Lund has earned the honor for a third straight season.

"It was the most connected team I've ever been with," Lund said. "We had a lot of close guys with very little separation if at all. Everyone knew each other and liked each other and that made the season more enjoyable. We went 18-2, that's a great season.

"Obviously, my scoring ability made a big jump. I averaged nine to 10 more points a game and my assists made a big jump too. ... Each year, my on-ball defense has gotten better. This year I played against big-

ger guys, but it was a challenge I was willing to take and I did pretty good in my eyes."

"Skill-wise he improved," Linden varsity boys basketball coach Chris Root said. "He got better with his ball-handling and with his decision making, finishing at the rim better. He did a great job taking quality shots. ... I think everything came together. His skills improved, he's now a third-year player so he was more confident and he just took off."

The only low-point to the season for Lund and the entire Eagles' squad had to do with something Lund couldn't impact — the COVID-19 pandemic ending the season early.

Barnes, in a 2012 interview with the Times, said he knew he wanted to be a superintendent after years of teaching and being a principal at elementary,



middle and high schools.

He had been a superintendent for 19 years, 14 of those years in Holly.

When Barnes retired, he said he would miss the people — the staff and students — the most.

In his 2012 interview, Barnes said, "I feel I have been privileged to have worked in the Holly Area Schools district for the past 14 years. Our area has become home, and I look forward to the upcoming months and years living in the area watching our granddaughters attend our school system and being a part of local civic groups."

Also, anyone who knew Barnes has heard his rich, radio-ready voice. He

had experience in broadcasting and expressed interest in doing radio work again.

In a 2013 interview with the Times, Barnes said he was most proud of his role in bringing the community and the school system closer together. "There's a lot of good things going on," he said. "There's a lot of good people in this community, there's a lot of good people in this school district and I'm just proud to be a part of it."

Former school board president Tony Mayhew said Barnes was a giant in the greater Holly community, and he leaves behind a gaping hole in the hearts of all who knew and loved him. "As a neighbor of Kent's for 16 years, and having served as HAS school board president for six, I got to know Kent's true character," Mayhew said. "Everything he did for Holly Area Schools was done with great thought and commitment. From his early morning road checks in the winter to his weekly visits to all of the schools, he gave staff and students alike the opportunity to know him."

Mayhew said Barnes always made them smile, and he was one of a kind. "He was caring, kind, sincere, and funny – the whole package," Mayhew said. "There is no doubt, the community of Holly will never forget Kent and everything he did for us."

1984 Tigers' bullpen led team through mid-August

Editor's note: The Major League Baseball season has started, but the sports staff is going to continue to remember the 1984 season within our publication. Enjoy.

As the 1984 Detroit Tigers left Boston after a five-game series over a span of just three days, the Tigers were a wounded squad.


After losing to Boston 8-0 on Aug. 8, the Tigers held a 3-9 record over their last 12 games but the tide was about to turn again. The Tigers were about to finish an eight-game road trip with three games against the Kansas City Royals, and Detroit righted the ship once again, winning all three games.

The first win didn't come easy, but the Tigers won a 5-4 verdict in the Friday night affair. Dan Petry pitched 6 1/3 innings of shaky ball and then gave way to the bullpen with the contest tied at 4-all. The Tigers took the lead on Ruppert Jones's solo home run in the eighth inning, while reliever Aurelio Lopez earned the victory in relief. Willie Hernandez pitched a shutout ninth inning, earning his 25th save of the season.

The next two victories came a tad easier. Jack Morris struggled in the Saturday contest, but Detroit's offense was strong, giving him a 9-2 lead at one time during the game. Larry Herndon, Lance Parrish and Kirk Gibson each hit home runs while Alan Trammell collected four hits.

The bullpen duo of Lopez and Hernandez were masterful in the third victory as well. Detroit scored four runs in the first inning and Milt Wilcox pitched a strong game for six innings, sparking an 8-4 Tigers' victory. The Royals did score three runs against Wilcox in the seventh, but Lopez and Hernandez combined to pitch three innings of shutout ball, earning the victory.

Lopez and Hernandez had outstanding seasons, particularly Hernandez and his nearly impossible-to-hit screwball, eventually earning him the American League Most Valuable Player and the American League Cy Young Award winner. Combined, Lopez and Hernandez combined to pitch in 151 games and

in 278 innings in relief. Numbers like that just don't happen in today's game. Hernandez allowed just 96 hits in 140 1/3 innings of work, posting an earned run average of 1.92 during the season. Hernandez finished the year with a 9-3 record and 37 saves. Meanwhile, Lopez had a 2.94 earned run average, recording a 10-1 record and 14 saves.

After the sweep, the Tigers returned home for a 10-game homestand, starting with four games against the California Angels. The series didn't start well with the Tigers losing both games of a doubleheader, dropping the first 6-4 and the second 12-2. By being swept, the Tigers' lead against the Toronto Blue Jays was now just 7 1/2 games. However, the homestand quickly turned around after being swept. A day later, Dan Petry pitched eight innings of strong ball, leading Detroit to an 8-3 victory.

During his first two seasons, Lund didn't get a chance to display his talent during the district tournament due to two different injuries. His junior season was supposed to finally be his shot to do just that. However, after earning a thrilling 67-66 victory against the Holly Bronchos in a district semifinal contest the season came to an abrupt end with the COVID-19 pandemic.

"For the seniors it hurts the most," Lund said. "We had guys who played all four years and during your senior year, you want to go out with a district championship. Obviously that's not the way it ended.

"For me, it was my first postseason and for many other guys it was their first postseason as well. ... You only get so many and to have them taken away from you like that definitely sucks."

Lund has been working hard preparing for his senior season. Along with his younger brother Reichen Lund, Blake has spent many hours on the family's own court in their yard.







House Bill 5265: Overhaul state budget to reflect federal epidemic relief money

To adopt a revised version of the state budget for the 2019-20 fiscal year. This substitutes \$1.008 billion federal coronavirus relief dollars for \$538.7 million of state tax receipts that had been projected but won't be realized due to the epidemic and business lockdowns. The bill also makes some modest budget cuts and adjustments that reflect fewer demands on certain state functions and services due to the epidemic. The state's Medicaid and other social welfare programs receive a large boost under the bill, including more federal "match" dollars tied to spending state dollars on Medicaid, and an outright grant of \$600 million additional dollars for food stamps. Sen. Jeff Irwin (D-Ann Arbor) was the lone dissenting vote.

Senate Bill 373: Overhaul school budget to reflect federal epidemic relief money

To use federal coronavirus epidemic relief money, and a \$350 million withdrawal from the state "rainy day fund," to fill holes in 2019-2020 education budget, brought about by a decline in state revenue caused by the epidemic and business lockdowns. For the fiscal year that ends Sept. 30, public schools will actually get \$136 million more revenue than the previous year under this budget. Community colleges and state university will see no changes in their net current-year appropriation amounts under the bill. Sen. Jeff Irwin (D-Ann Arbor) was the lone dissenting

To prescribe requirements, standards, limitations and more on conducting public school classes electronically over the internet. Among many other things school districts would have to ensure that all students will have access, and that the specific needs of different students are met including special education students.

House Bill 5912: Specify public school epidemic hours and methods eligible for funding

To revise and waive many of the rules on the required number of hours and days of public school instruction, including allowances for snow days, rules for conducting classes online, and the amount of state funding provided for both these exceptions to regular schooling, and to days on which fewer than 75 percent of a school's students are in attendance. Public schools could continue to operate under distance learning plans during the coronavirus epidemic, but with added steps intended to assure students receive instruction and meet academic goals.






