TRY RACE WALKING

■ 'It gives you a full body workout'

Fenton. Twp — More than a dozen people came out to Linden County Park on Saturday, Oct. 10 to learn a new skill and exercise — race walking.

Kathy Gurin, a Lapeer resident, and Robin Keene, who's from Swartz Creek conducted the race walking clinic, which was the first event in the LAF-FAPALOOZA 2020 series to celebrate the opening of the new Argentine Township non-motorized pathway.

"Race walking could still be really big. It's a great option instead of running. It's still competitive. It's a technique," Gurin said.

On Saturday, they went through the basic technique of race walking. This includes what stretches to do before

and after a workout, what shoes to wear, what clothes to wear and more. They also taught how not to get injured and how important it is to listen to your body.

"It gives you a full body workout," Keene said. "You are working different muscle groups then when you run. It does your inner and outer thighs, your glutes, abdominal muscles, and you don't have the impact that you have from running."

She switched from running to race walking in 1991 when she was pregnant with her son, and she discovered she could walk as fast as she was jogging.

Keene got Gurin into race walking when Gurin was going through chemotherapy to treat cancer.

"She came to my house, got me off the couch and said, 'come on, I'm going to teach you how to race walk. It'll be good for you. That's kind of where the whole thing started,'" Gurin said.

They've raced walked together for years and have done marathons together. They did the Crim this year, which was virtual, and Keene has previously won two marathons in race walking.

Both have done dozens of races. Race walkers can find competitions for 5Ks, 10Ks and more.

"Those who want to learn to walk faster, we can do that. Those who want to learn to race walk, we'll show them how to get started with the race walking

and techniques," Keene said.

Gurin said the best piece of advice was to invest in a good pair of shoes.

"Believe it or not, you can easily put 500 miles on a pair of shoes," Gurin said.

They recently found out about the paths around the tri-county area. Keene said pathways are "really nice" to walk on. They don't have many in Swartz Creek, so she walks mainly in subdivisions.

They've trained on all kinds of roads, and some can be more dangerous than others, especially on streets with traffic.

"This is a beautiful thing for these guys to have, somewhere where kids can ride and walk and be a little bit safer," Gurin said, mentioning the pathway in the Linden County Park.

The new Argentine Township pathway starts at Haviland Beach Drive and Lobdell Road, which is the beginning of the Phase 1 Pathway, and continues into the Linden schools campus where it heads north and then onto Silver Lake Road heading east to the city of Linden.

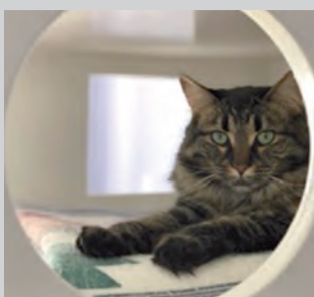

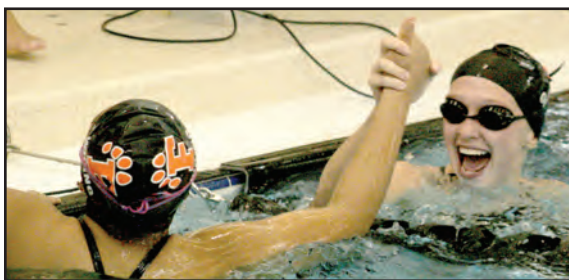
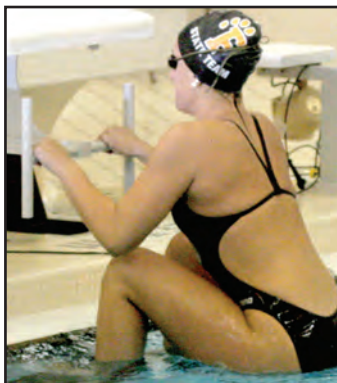

Tigers compete with Dexter in battle of two top 10 teams

Fenton — Two of the top 10 teams in the state competed in a dual meet on Saturday, and with it came some strong times and performances.

The Fenton Tigers, ranked 10th in Division 2, took on the eight-ranked Dexter squad and Dexter left with a 117-69 victory.

There was no race with more

anticipation than the 100 backstroke. In it, Dexter's defending 100-yard D2 state champion backstroke Charlotte Schultz competed against Fenton's Gracie Olsen. Olsen won two individual state championships a year ago herself, taking the top spot in the 200-yard freestyle and in the 100-yard butterfly. Taking Schultz on in her own cham-

pionship event, Olsen took an admirable second with a time of 1:01.25. Schultz won with a time of 1:00.53. Schultz won the event with a time of 56.42 seconds last year. Olsen loved competing against Schultz.

"It was awesome. ...I talked to Charlotte after the race and she said congrats. She's super sweet,

Fenton, Linden soccer end up tied atop Metro with Goodrich again

■ Tigers defeat Swartz Creek 4-2 to earn share of league championship

All the Fenton varsity boys soccer team could do on Monday was take care of its business.

The Tigers had to beat Swartz Creek in order to have any chance of earning a three-way-Metro League championship with Linden and Goodrich for the second straight season.

After that, the Tigers had to hope Goodrich could beat Linden to force the three-way tie.

The Tigers (10-1) took care of business. Des Coughlin scored a goal just four minutes into Fenton's road contest at Swartz Creek and never trailed in a 4-2 victory against the Dragons.

The Martians — and Mother Nature — helped out with the rest as Goodrich won a 1-0 verdict at Linden, a game that was called at halftime due to weather. That meant for the second straight season, the three teams tied for the league crown. It also meant Fenton earned at least a share for three straight seasons and four of the last five seasons. Of course,

■ Eagles fall to Goodrich, creates three-way deadlock for title

Linden — The Linden varsity boys soccer team entered its battle with Goodrich already knowing it was going to at least share the Flint Metro League championship.

The Eagles could also leave with an outright championship.

The end result was the Eagles had to settle for a three-way tie atop the final Flint Metro League standings with Fenton and Goodrich for a second straight season.

The three-way tie happened because the Eagles lost to Goodrich by a 1-0 score, tying those two teams atop the standings. Finally, Fenton defeated Swartz Creek 4-2 to also earn a spot atop the final league standings.

Linden had two opponents it had to battle on Monday. First off, the Eagles had to beat the Martians. Secondly, once they fell behind, they had to also find a way to beat out Mother Nature. As the first half continued, it became apparent thunderstorms were going to be a part of the night's future, making it appar-

Bronchos remain perfect in Metro, defeats Fenton

Holly — In Metro League history, the Holly Bronchos have never won an outright championship in volleyball.

The Bronchos have just two championships to their name. Holly shared the title with Lakeville during the 1993-94 school year, and shared the Metro League Stripes Division crown with Flushing last season.

This season has the possibility of being the first. Holly captured another big victory in the pursuit of that

goal by defeating the Fenton Tigers in three sets 25-15, 25-20, 25-11. The win keeps the Bronchos (6-0) undefeated in Metro League Stripes Division play, one game ahead of the Flushing Raiders. The Raiders are the only team that has a realistic shot at catching the Bronchos. Fenton fell to 3-3 in league play with the loss. And for the Bronchos, it's always nice to beat the Fenton Tigers.

"It's always a big rival so we know we have to work

even harder because we want to beat them really bad," Holly senior Paige Weeder said. "We know we have to come together and play as a team and we won."

The Bronchos started out a little slow in the opening set, but it didn't matter too much because the Tigers did as well.

Holly had hitting errors on the first two points of the set, but the Tigers followed that with a service error and a hitting error of their own.

Tigers open D1 district action with 5-0 victory vs. Davison

A year ago, the Fenton varsity boys soccer team had an incredible 2019 post-season.

The Tigers edged out the Linden Eagles in a shootout in a Division 2 district title match and eventually advanced all the way to the D2 state semifinal round before seeing their season end.

This year the dynamics have changed. The Tigers are now in Division 1 and will have to face some larger sized schools if they want to make a similar tournament run this year.

The Tigers won their opening game of their D1 tournament (being hosted by Fenton) by defeating Davison 5-0 Wednesday night at Fenton High School.

"The boys came out fired up tonight," Fenton varsity boys soccer coach Matt Sullivan said. "They know it's uncharted territory being in Division 1, but we can not change the way we play. We have to outwork our opponents if we want a chance to win, and that is what we did tonight."

The Tigers took control of the contest early on, scoring just eight minutes into the contest. Calvin Curtis crossed a ball into the middle of the goal where Will Dickens capitalized on the cross, scoring the opening goal. The Tigers led 1-0 and would never look back.

Before the first half was over the Tigers pulled ahead with two more goals. Ben Chapple scored Fenton's second goal off Curtis's second assist of the

night. Finally, with 10 minutes left, the Tigers had a memorable goal off a corner kick. Dickens crossed a ball that actually curled into the top far corner of the goal, giving him a goal off the actual corner kick. The Tigers led 3-0 and were now in control.

Any chances of a Davison come back ended when the Tigers (13-2-1) scored a fourth goal halfway through the second half. It came when Des Coughlin scored on a Dickens' cross.

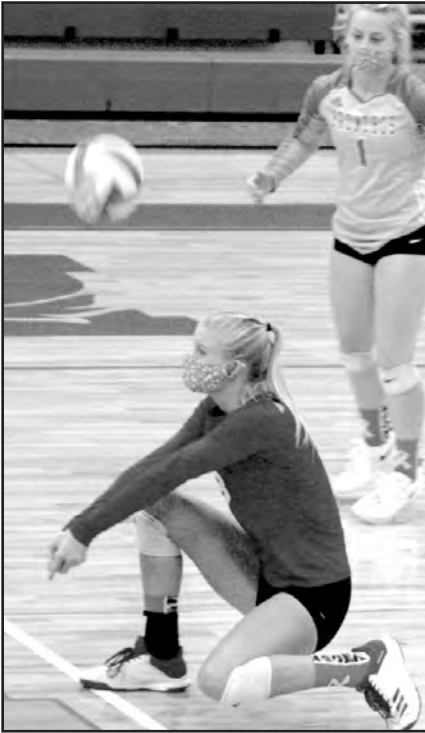

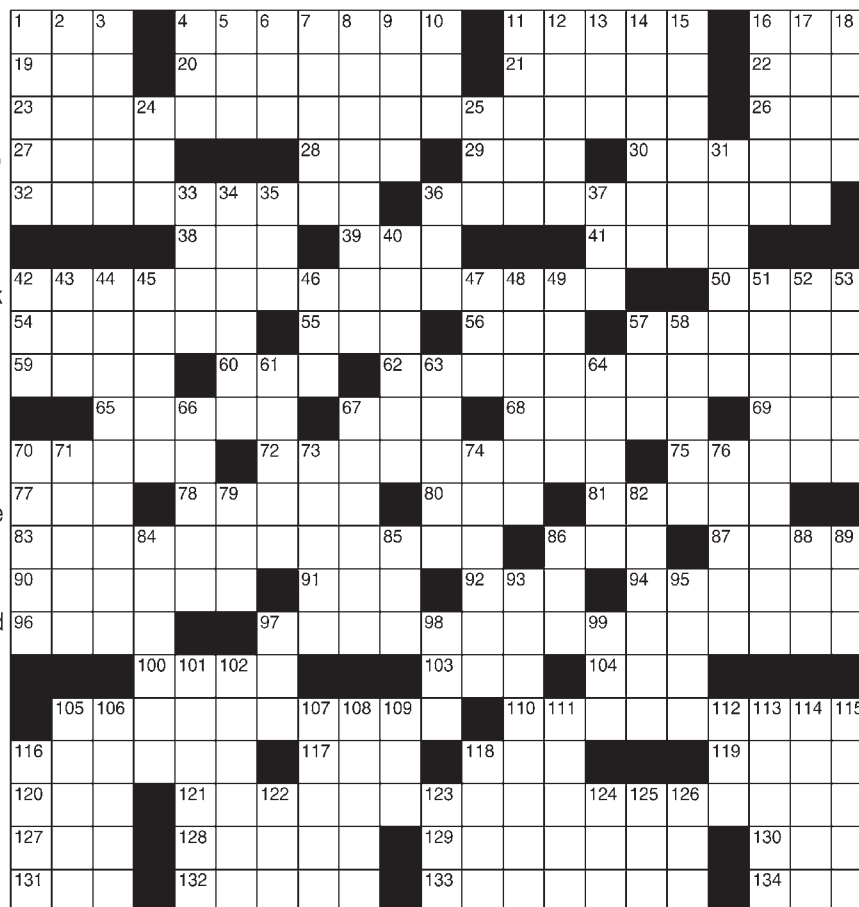
