

Fenton Freedom Festival canceled

■Instead, smaller scale patriotic theme encouraged during Street Experience on Friday, July 2

The Fenton Freedom Festival Committee had given itself a deadline of

April 5 to decide if this year's Freedom Festival would take place to celebrate Independence Day on the Fourth of July.

Disappointed, Pat Lockwood, committee chair and Meghan Grimshaw, event coordinator, sent a letter to the entire committee saying that this year's

Freedom Festival has been canceled.

In the letter, Lockwood and Grimshaw explained that after several meetings and discussions with the city of Fenton and due to the safety risks associated with COVID-19, this year's Freedom Festival will not take place.

July 4 falls on Sunday this year and the festival would normally take place on Monday, July 5. The current State of Michigan order allows for a maximum of 1,000 people at an outdoor gathering and this popular festival draws far more

North Road bridge could be replaced

■Fenton City seeks Local Bridge Program funds from MDOT — if approved, work to begin in 2024

Based on a 2019 annual inspection of city bridges, the North Road bridge over the Shiawassee River needs replacement and is a candidate for Local Bridge Program funding.

The Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT), Local Agency Program (LAP), Local Bridge Program is calling for Fiscal Year 2024 projects.

On March 22, Fenton City Council approved Resolution 20-02 to request MDOT to include

Three lawyers charged with criminal enterprise

■Fishman Group, doing debt collection work, charged with forging victims' signatures and more

A 69-year-old Bloomfield Township man, his 31-year-old son and a 32-year-old Waterford Township woman have been charged in Genesee County 67th District Court with conducting a criminal enterprise, forgery and obstruction of justice.

The three individuals are lawyers with the law firm, Fishman Group, in Bloomfield Hills, with additional offices in Florida and Colorado.

Charged are Marc Allan Fishman, 69, of Bloomfield Township. He is president and CEO of Fishman Group. He was arraigned April 6 on one count of acquiring

A message from the superintendent

On Nov. 3, 2020, the voters of Linden Community Schools approved a \$55-million bond initiative. The bond initiative addresses the needs of our district in four general areas.

1. Enhance student safety and school security
2. Expand and enhance the instructional environment
3. Modernize, upgrade and construct school facilities
4. Upgrade technology and technology infrastructure

The bond has been broken into three different series with a projected timeline of seven to eight years. Construction is planned to begin as early as August of this year.

The bond proposal calls for numerous projects, including adding a student collaboration center to Linden Elementary School, expanding the Linden High School Media Center to become a student collaboration center, adding secure entrances to Central, Hyatt, and Linden Elementary, Linden Middle School, and Linden High School, relocating our Early Childhood Center from its current location in Argentine to Hyatt Elementary, building a new Multipurpose

Center between Linden Middle School and Linden High School, and adding space for robotics instruction and Science, Technology, Engineer, and Math (STEM) programming.

Currently, we are working with design teams, Barton Mallow (our construction management team), and French Architects (our architectural group) on the footprints of the multi-purpose building, the addition to Linden Elementary, secure en-

trances to our buildings, technology upgrades, and site improvements at Linden High School, Linden Middle School, and Central Elementary.

We are very excited with the amount of opportunities that this bond will provide our students, staff, and community. We have information on our website (www.lindenschools.org) that outlines the scope of projects associated with our bond initiative. We continue to be amazed at the amount of support that the community of Linden has given Linden Community Schools. Thank you!

Fundraiser started to help save Holly Union Depot

■ Committee plans to move historic train depot 1,000 feet northwest

Main Street Holly created a Go-fundme to help raise funds to save the Holly Union Depot.

The campaign on Facebook is called, "Save Our Holly Union Depot." A go-fundme page is also being established.

The current Depot, which was built in 1886 after a fire burned down the original, has been an historic focal point of the Holly community since the 1860s, when the railway helped connect Canada to the eastern U.S. and allowed more travel within Michigan. The building is on the National Register of Historic Places.

Nick Klempp, secretary of Main Street Holly and the Holly Downtown Development Authority (DDA) director, said because the Depot is between two railroad tracks and safety policies, it can no longer be used and workers cannot do maintenance.

The Depot committee plans to use the funds to move the Depot about 1,000 feet northwest to a spot that is "safe to maintain the integrity of the Depot and also make it into something that can be used for many different situations for the community," Klempp said.

There's also the potential that the railroad would be moved to a position where the Depot would need to be torn down.

"We, obviously, do not want to see that happen or to see it go into disarray, so the money we are raising will all go toward the process of moving and restoring the depot for our community as it is such an important part of our history," Klempp said.

Joe Mishler, chair of the depot committee, said, "Railroads have been an important part of Holly's history going way back to 1855." That was when the first depot was built. The current building is the third depot.

"We were, for a long time, a service center for railroads probably for well over 100 years," Mishler said. Two tracks flank the current depot. One helped bring a lumber boom to Saginaw, and the other connects to the west part of the state. Kids and families would ride the trains from Holly to Fenton and beyond.

Township approves lawn maintenance contract

■ Annual costs are 33 percent higher than previous contract

The Fenton Township Board of Trustees voted to award a contract for lawn, landscape and beach maintenance services to Michigan DPW, LLC.

During a virtual meeting Monday, April 5, the board approved the four-year contract, from April 1, 2021 through March 31, 2025, for an estimated annual cost of \$19,997.

This includes handling seasonal and regular lawn maintenance at the Fenton Township Civic Community Center, Fire Station #1 and Fire Station #2, Podunk House and Museum, Gage Cemetery, Odell Cemetery and Long Branch Cemetery and the U.S. 23/Thompson Road interchange.

Thomas Broecker, operations manager and deputy clerk, wrote in the

meeting packet, "Michigan DPW has been providing lawn services to Fenton Township since 2011 and they do an excellent job. Based on the proposal analysis and prior experience, I recommend that the township board award the contract to Michigan DPW, LLC, and approve the attached lawn, landscape and beach maintenance services agreement between the Township and

Michigan DPW."

It's a 33-percent increase from the previous \$15,270 contract, which was for the years 2018-2020. Broecker said this is due to inflation, field costs and it's a four-year contract instead of a three-year contract.

"They do a good job and total dollar wise, it's not a huge hit to the budget," Broecker said.

Flint woman jailed on charges

■Facing three felonies related to fatal motorcycle crash last summer in Holly Township

Jemeila Brewer, 36, of Flint, was arraigned April 5 in Oakland County 52-2 District Court on a three-count warrant authorized by the Oakland County Prosecutor's Office. She is facing one count of second-degree homicide, operating a vehicle while intoxicated causing death and one count of failing to stop and identify herself at the accident resulting in death. Bond was set at \$25,000 (10-percent). She is lodged in the Oakland County Jail pending further court proceedings.

Killed in the crash was a 48-year-

old Swartz Creek man driving a motorcycle. Police did not release the victim's name.

Jeremy Lintz, the North Oakland County Fire Authority (NOCFA) chief, said NOCFA responded to this crash at 3:30 a.m. on July 26, 2020. He said a passenger vehicle driven by a female, later identified as Brewer, struck a motorcycle in the northbound lanes of I-75 near Lahring Road. The motorcyclist

was pronounced dead at the scene. The freeway was shut down for more than three hours for the investigation.

According to the Michigan State Police Metro North Post, the suspect driver was found farther north on I-75 and alcohol and marijuana are suspected factors in the crash.

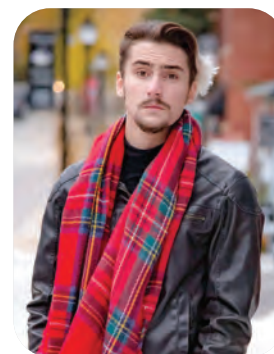

Barron Road in Groveland Township to close April 12-Nov. 5 for gravel road paving project

The Road Commission for Oakland County (RCOC) expects to close Barron Road from Grange Hall Road to Groveland Road in Groveland Township beginning April 12 through approximately Nov. 5 for a gravel-road paving project. During the closure, access to homes and businesses will be maintained. The detour for through traffic will be Groveland Road to Jossman

Road to Grange Hall Road, back to Barron Road and vice versa. The approximately \$5.5-million project is mostly federally funded, with the remaining portion shared by RCOC, Groveland Township and Oakland County general government (through the Tri-Party program. The 2.39-mile project includes:

- Paving section of gravel road with asphalt
- Placing concrete curbs and gutters
- Installing storm sewers to improve road drainage
- Improving the driving sight distance

The contractor for the project is lafrate Construction of Warren. Barron Road carries approximately 500 vehicles daily.

the North Road bridge on the Local Bridge Fund list for bridge replacement.

If the project is approved, it would be constructed in the spring and summer of 2024. The city should learn this fall if the project has been approved.

Fenton City Manager Lynn Markland said engineers expect the reconstruction project to take approximately eight to 12 weeks to complete.

The bridge, between Adelaide Street and N. LeRoy Street, was originally constructed in 1958.

Orchard, Hiltz & McClimment, Inc. (OHM), consulting engineers for the city of Fenton, completed the 2019 annual inspection of six bridges within the city, including this one. Based on the firm's inspection report, it was determined that the North Road bridge needs to be replaced.

Based on that report, Dan Brisson, director of the Department of Public Works (DPW), recommended that city council authorize that the director to submit an application to MDOT to include the North Road bridge on the state and federal bridge programs as a priority for bridge replacement.

"This Depot was quite an active place for a long time," Mishler said. "We're trying to save it because it is central to our history."

They are in the first of two phases for the Depot restoration. The first is preparing the area and the second involves moving the building. Phases three and four involve updating the depot and then doing landscaping work.

"The \$50,000 was chosen at this point just because we are looking to raise at least that amount in order to get our full match that the Holly DDA has promised in order to help with the project and to use as a match for a grant that was previously received through The National Trust," Klempp said. "More will be needed, but that is the first goal of many to come. If people in the Holly area donate \$50 or more, they can choose to receive a Depot decorative brick. If they donate \$100 or more, they can receive a larger one that has a picture of the Depot on it."

All these funds are being collected by fundraising, grant writing and money through the DDA specifically earmarked to be used for these types of projects. The money is not coming from a general fund balance. Holly Main Street was awarded a \$150,000 grant by the National Main Street

Center as part of their Partners in Preservation program in association with American Express that needs to be matched. The Depot project will also receive a 2:1 match on all donations from the Holly DDA up to \$100,000.

The Holly community has been supportive of the committee's efforts to save the Depot.

"They love knowing the important part the depot played in our past and do not want to see it go away. People are very supportive of the project because it is so important," Klempp said.

The committee held a Meet and Greet event Friday, April 9 and Saturday, April 10 with information for the public about the Depot res-

toration, including a timeline on what they hope to accomplish and ways people can donate and get involved.

They also held an online auction through Friday, April 9, and people finished bidding Saturday in person. They auctioned off items such as photography from Lincat Photography, a 3-D printed lampshade and lamp made by Grugel Photography with iconic pictures of Holly, a historic Holly package and a quilt donated by the Holly His-

toric Society, a train depot package, a Holly shirt and hoodie and sesquicentennial water glasses with iconic photos on them.

Also in the auction is an original framed painting by Holly's own William Brody of the Holly Depot.

They have created a Facebook page, "Save Our Holly Union Depot," to spread word about the fundraising efforts and an auction that is taking place.

Adopt an osprey this summer

■ DNR seeks to monitor them closely to document health and abundance of their populations

An early sign of spring, ospreys are making their return to Michigan. The magnificent fish-hawk with striking brown and white plumage can be seen flying along shallow, fish-filled waters of the Great Lakes region — hovering, then plunging feet-first to snare fish in its talons.

Ospreys can be found across the state, but they once faced an uncertain future here. Locally, an osprey nest can be seen atop the cell phone tower behind the Sears Hometown Store in Fenton. In past years, Jeff Stone, owner of Sears, said he has seen ospreys carrying fish, most likely from Lake Fenton, to their nest.

There are likely other nests in the tri-county area.

According to the Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR) Ospreys were severely affected by use of the pesticide DDT and were listed as a threatened species in Michigan after their population declined precipitously in the 1960s. However, the sale and use of DDT was banned in 1972, giving ospreys a fighting chance. Thanks to the hard work and dedication of MI Birds partners, the DNR, the Detroit Zoological Society and friends at

Huron-Clinton Metroparks, the osprey was successfully reintroduced to southern Michigan and removed from the threatened species list in 2009.

However, it is incredibly important that ospreys continue to be monitored closely statewide to document the health and abundance of their populations. While this species now boasts more than 200 known nest locations throughout the state, it is still listed as a Michigan species of special concern.

Volunteer community scientists like you can help the groups understand how ospreys are rebounding across the state. All ages and experience levels are invited to participate in the Adopt-A-Nest monitoring program, and it's easy to do. A minimum commitment of three nest visits

between May 15 and Aug. 1, lasting at least 15 minutes each, is all it takes to determine 1) if there is a nesting attempt, 2) if birds are actively nesting and 3) if there are any chicks in the nest. You can visit your nest more often if you'd like.

Binoculars are adequate for most observations, but a spotting scope is useful for determining the number of chicks. Most nests are located on cellular towers and are easily viewed from public roads.

Fill out the sign-up form at act.audubon.org to adopt an osprey nest.

MI Birds is a public outreach and education program created by Audubon Great Lakes and the DNR, aimed at increasing all Michiganders' engagement in the understanding, care and stewardship of public lands that are important for birds and local communities.

and maintaining a criminal enterprise and one count of obstruction of justice. He was lodged at the Genesee County Jail until his arraignment and released April 7 after posting \$4,000 cash bond.

Fishman's son, Ryan Jacob Fishman, 31, of Bloomfield Township was arraigned April 6 on one count of conducting a criminal enterprise, 30 counts of forgery and one count of obstruction of justice. He too was lodged at the jail until his arraignment. He was released April 7 after posting \$16,000 cash bond.

A Fishman Group colleague, Alexandra Ichim, 32, of Waterford Township, was lodged at the jail and arraigned April 6 on one count of conducting a criminal enterprise, 30 counts of forgery and one count of obstruction of justice. She posted her \$16,000 cash bond and was released April 7.

During a press conference Tuesday, April 6, Genesee County Prosecutor David Leyton and Genesee County Sheriff Chris Swanson explained the charges against the three lawyers.

Leyton said the prosecutor's office was aware of at least 30 cases in Genesee County involving the trio. He said there could be more victims.

Leyton said Fishman Group does debt collection work. When there is debt to be collected, defendants must be served with the appropriate paper work. Their investigation revealed that process servers attempted to serve papers to defendants, at least 30 in Genesee County. Leyton said even if the process server could not successfully serve papers to the defendant, the lawyers took a short cut and allegedly forged victims' signatures, showing that they were served.

Unknown to the defendants, their wages were then garnished, bank accounts were accessed and more.

"These lawyers put a dagger in the heart of due process and victimized the most vulnerable in our state," Leyton said. He added that it pained him to see

those in the law profession would do something like this.

Swanson said the prosecutor's office worked side-by-side with investigators. He said they believe this group has been practicing this scheme over several years.

"They embezzled, lied, forged and destroyed the lives of hundreds," he said. He added the amount stolen is well over \$1 million.

"They are operating a criminal enterprise," Swanson said. "The victims never knew they were served. You didn't realize you had an outstanding debt."

Swanson said Fishman Group forged notification to the court and defendants had no due process. He and Leyton believe there are more victims out there. He added that the process servers are victims because their job was underscored with fraud, and the courts were victimized by its own profession.

Swanson said they have learned of plaintiffs who have filed cases, yet heard nothing. They believe that money was collected but the plaintiffs never saw any of the money.

Swanson and Leyton said the scheme spans multiple counties, and will likely expand across the country.

Swanson thanked the victims who had the courage to come forward. He also encourages anyone who has had dealings with Fishman Group, and believe they too might be a victim, to contact the prosecutor's office. He advised individuals who believe they might be a victim to get all of their paperwork together, make copies, print emails, compile a timeline and put it together as a package for the prosecutor's office to review.

"We will fight for you," Swanson said. "We will fight for every penny owed to you."

No further court dates have been scheduled.

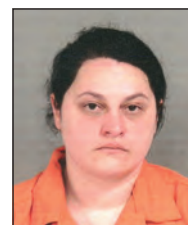

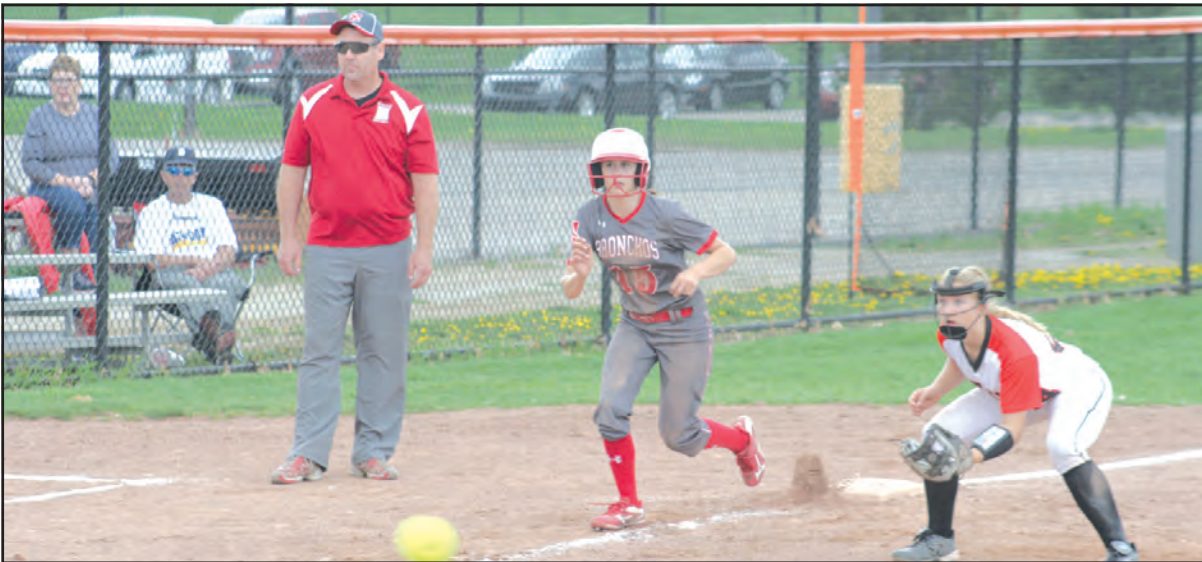

Three inmates graduate from IGNITE In2Work program

■ They graduate with two job offers, plans for future work and schooling

Three more people graduated from the IGNITE program at the Genesee County Jail on Wednesday, April 7.

IGNITE stands for Inmate Growth Naturally and Intentionally Through Education, and it allows inmates to take classes and study for careers while they're serving time.

Sheriff Chris Swanson held the ceremony during his weekly press briefing via Facebook Live, which featured U.S. Rep. Dan Kildee presenting the certificates to the graduates. In total, 18 people have graduated from the program.

Joe Walker, Delante Darrough and Dallas Whiting-Popielski are three members of the 2021 In2Work graduating class. They each took a 240-hour, eight-week food service training program. They passed the federal test on food safety, which allows them to work in any kitchen in the country, with an average

score of 93.

The three graduates each have two job offers.

"I get to see it on a front row seat," Swanson said. "As the sheriff, which is the people's guardian, I get to witness transformation, and transformation is great but transcendence is greater. When you three guys transform your life, and transcend into the world and transform others, that's why everyone here believes in you."

Walker served in the Army National Guard for six years. He plans to continue schooling in culinary arts, and he wants to open his own food truck. His goal is to reconnect with his stepdad in Hawaii and his mother in Grand Rapids. His grandmother was in the audience on Wednesday.

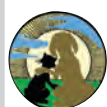
"When you have family that supports you and believes in you, it just triggers so much more momentum," Swanson said. "Mr. Walker, I want you to know

that this office, this sheriff, these leaders behind me and those that are watching are proud of you."

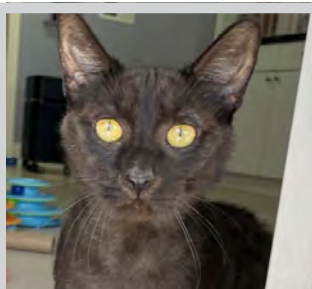

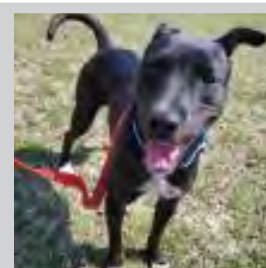

The third graduate is Dallas Whiting-Popielski, who has an associate's degree in business law and wants to obtain his bachelor's in psychology to study the reasons why people hurt and abuse animals.

"I am a proud graduate of the In-2Work program," Whiting-Popielski said. "When I got into this to begin with, I didn't know how big it was going to be. I definitely didn't know the values that it was going to teach me. I've learned so much. As you've heard from the sheriff, a lot of my support comes, not only from the staff here ... but from people who have been here with me."

The biggest thing he learned was how to have self-value and worth again. His goal is to be a productive member of society.

"I'm now eager for my future. When I first got here, I was very low, very depressed ... I am not only being provided a job, but I'm being provided a whole second chance at life. This means so much to me. If my mom was alive, she'd be really proud," he said.

Gary West, Nutrition Services chef/production manager, from the Genesee County Community Action Resource Department (GCCARD), announced that these three graduates have job offers from GCCARD. The organization is a meals on wheels program that delivers food to vulnerable people in the county. They average approximately 2,800 a day.

Swanson said they also have full-time job offers from Starlite Coney Island in Burton.

Kildee said, "I can't think of a more impressive display of how to use the tools of government to affect the trajectory of lives and people who need a government that understands their needs. This is a tough situation for a lot of folks who come here, who have lots of challenges to overcome. The fact that the sheriff and his team had decided intentionally to see the inherent goodness and potential in every one of these individuals."

Kildee told Swanson that he's going to do "everything in (his) power" to make sure Genesee County has the tools and resources to make sure this program continues.





LEGISLATIVE ACTIVITY

House Bill 4210, Exempt some developers’ “broadband equipment” from personal property tax

To exempt “broadband equipment” owned by certain internet developers claiming to serve “underserved areas” from personal property taxes levied on business tools and equipment. The bill is connected to Senate Bill 46, and the Senate Fiscal Agency is unable to quantify the amount of foregone revenue the tax subsidies they promise would cost the state, in part because the bills would permit developers to claim them in areas where broadband internet may already be available.

House Bill 4211, Authorize enhanced sanctions for disarming a law enforcement officer

To authorize an enhanced penalty of 20 years in prison and a \$5,000 fine for taking a law enforcement or corrections officer’s gun by force, which would be added to penalties imposed for the underlying crimes.

House Bill 4354, Impose oral chemotherapy insurance mandate

To impose a new coverage mandate that would require insurance companies to include coverage for orally administered chemotherapy in all health insurance policies that provide for cancer chemotherapy treatments, without requiring any dollar limit, deductible or co-pay for these that does not apply to other treatments. Also, to ban charging a copay of more than \$150 per month on these drugs.

To prohibit health insurance policies from requiring a covered person to pay a co-pay for insulin greater than \$50 per month.

House Bill 4355, Permit “telehealth” services

To establish that medical service professionals in another state may provide “telehealth” services to Michigan patients without needing to also get a Michigan license.

House Bill 4022, Require state agencies post employee salaries and benefits (without names)

To add employee salary and benefit information to information each state department is required to post on a state website. This would include individual employee position titles, (unionized) civil service status, salary and general benefits information, but no names, emails or other identifying information (which may still be obtained through a specific Freedom of Information Act request).

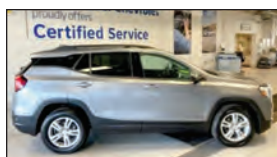

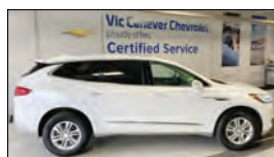

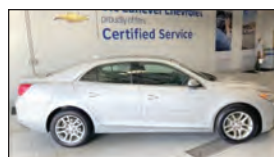
