One motorist critically injured

Multiple vehicle crash on southbound U.S. 23 Monday morning closes highway for seven hours

Fenton Twp. — Two crashes less than 100 yards from each other on southbound U.S. 23, south of Lahring Road in Fenton Township, resulted in

two injured motorists, one critically.

The first crash at 10:15 a.m. on Monday, April 12, involved a truck and a flatbed truck hauling shipping containers. The loads tipped over and spread across all lanes. The axle and tires could be seen in the ditch close to North Road. Capital Asphalt will not seek a special land use permit from Tyrone Township to develop an asphalt plant in the township.

Capital Asphalt sent a letter to Tyrone Township this past weekend withdrawing its application to construct an asphalt plant within Tyrone Township.

Owen Road bridge work expected to be completed in June

■MDOT repairing numerous bridges in Fenton and Fenton Township

The Owen Road bridge in Fenton that travels over U.S. 23 is likely to be under construction until the summer.

Keith Brown, construction engineer at the Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT), said they're doing maintenance work on numerous bridges in Genesee County.

People driving through Fenton and traveling on the highways will be impacted. After the Owen Road bridge is done, MDOT will begin work on the Silver Lake Road overpass. MDOT also plans to complete maintenance on the Thompson Road bridge, Torrey Road bridge, Lahring Road bridge and approximately a dozen other bridges in Genesee County as part of a \$12.3-million investment.

Brown said they're replacing the barriers on the outside of the bridge, doing repair work on some of the steel beams underneath, doing deck replacements,

repairing the joints on top and more. They also will complete an epoxy flood coating on the whole surface of the bridge in the summer of 2022, which is expected to help when it rains.

Motorists can only use the three middle lanes on the Owen Road bridge as employees work on the outside barriers. Once they complete work on the barriers, MDOT will close the middle lanes and motorists will be able to use the outside lanes.

Construction started Monday, April 12. Brown estimates they'll be done working on the Owen Road bridge by the middle of June.

Then MDOT will start repair work on the Silver Lake Road overpass.

This work is part of MDOT's investment into bridges in Genesee County that includes 16 bridges that go over U.S. 23: Hill Road, U.S. 23 over Swartz Creek, Grand Blanc Road bridge, Torrey Road, Baldwin Road, Thompson Road, Lahring Road, U.S. 23 over the Shiawassee River, Silver Lake Road and Owen Road.

Argentine church and food bank give groceries to those in need

■Food Bank of Eastern Michigan representative says they might plan more events at church

The Argentine Church of the Nazarene partnered with the Food Bank of Eastern Michigan to feed hundreds of low-income families and people Saturday, April 17.

More than 30 volunteers set up tables and boxes of thousands of food items in the church parking lot. People drove up and did not have to get out of their cars as volunteers put boxes and bags of food in their vehicles.

There were 20-24 pallets with approximately 20,000-25,000 pounds of food.

Pastor Robert Lindsay said anyone, not only Argentine Township residents, could come get food. They didn't ask for proof of income, and people could pick up groceries for other people who needed help.

Food included eggs, milk, bread, desserts, canned goods, oranges, healthy snacks, frozen foods, potatoes and more.

t the end of a busy week, I heard my email notification go off after 5 p.m. People who work for newspapers don't quit working at 5 p.m., so really the only reason I noticed the time is because my better half had already started cocktail hour. I opened the message from our publisher to find a copy of a thank you card one of our newsrooms received.

The note was from a reader thanking everyone for their hard work on a recent edition. That email, that card was the best thing I've seen in weeks.

I know we're all sick of hearing this, but the reality is, we've been in a pandemic for more than a year. The New York Times recently published an article titled "We Have All Hit a Wall" detailing the ways people are experiencing burnout and its effect on our ability to work.

From the piece, "Malaise, burnout, depression and stress - all of those are up considerably," said Todd Katz, executive vice president and head of group benefits at MetLife. "The company's most recent Employee Benefit Trends Study, conducted in December and January, found that workers across the board felt markedly worse than they did last April.

"The study was based in part on interviews with 2,651 employees. In total, 34 percent of respondents reported feeling burned out, up from 27 percent last April. Twenty-two percent said they were depressed, up from 17

percent last April, and 37 percent said they felt stressed, up from 34 percent." Not great statistics.

I've been working from home for more than a year and for the most part I've enjoyed it, but as the days tick on, I'm ready for real life to start again.

One bright spot of spending more time at home has been watching "CBS Sunday Morning" each week. A couple of weeks ago, the show did an interview with now retired Washington Post editor Marty Baron. Baron is a newsroom legend having also led the teams at The Boston Globe and The Miami Herald. Under his leadership, those papers won 17 Pulitzer Prizes.

I was hooked on every word of the interview, and thanks to the timing of the email from my own publisher, I was especially drawn to Baron's practice of posting thank you notes and kind

messages on a wall in The Washington Post office. Baron's response to why he does



this, "Our staff has received a lot of threats, a lot of vile emails, and I think it's important that our staff recognize that there's a huge portion of the population that appreciates what they're doing."

While the team at View Newspaper Group does receive some negative mail, we are fortunate to also receive nice notes from readers and clients on occasion and I'm glad we're now in the habit of sharing those.

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

plant as the main reason cited for withdrawing."

In the letter, Capital Asphalt thanked everyone for their efforts and they were very appreciative.

In mid-February, the Tyrone Township Planning Commission had been requested to rezone vacant land for the plant and warehouses. The preliminary review was held via

Zoom on Feb. 9.

Concerned with the prospect of an asphalt plant so close to their homes, more than 100 people attempted to join the first online planning commission meeting, which had an initial cap of 100 people. Future meetings allowed for all the

ings allowed for all those interested in watching and providing feedback.

The property is zoned Farm Residential (FR) and is owned by Newman TTP, LLC. The prospective buyer of the property, Jon C. Sawyer of Lansing, was asking the township to rezone the vacant land to Heavy Industrial (M2).

Parcel 47-4-17-40-007 is 30 acres and sits just north of Center Road and west of Old U.S. 23. This would have been the southern most portion of the Capital Asphalt project.

To the north of the above parcel is parcel 47-4-17-40-001. It is approximately 75 acres. The developer had requested the southern most 54.5 acres of the 75 acres be rezoned to M2. They had requested the northern most 20 acres be rezoned RM1 (multiple family residential) to act as a transitional zoning and buffer to the development.

The sale of the property was contingent on the rezoning.

Several residents spoke out with concerns of heavy truck traffic, noise and odor. Soon after the rezoning request was made, a Facebook group called Citizens Resisting Asphalt Plant was created and drew more than 3,000

followers.

On Monday, April 19, Cunningham said there was still an application pending on the rezoning request and the township has not heard from the land owner's agent yet on the rezoning and what their intentions are.

Tyrone Township

resident Donna Fialka is a member of the Facebook group opposed to the asphalt plant. Upon hearing the news that the developer withdrew the special land use permit application, she said, "I am thrilled about Capital Asphalt's decision to withdraw their application. The community rallied together and our voices were heard.

"We haven't heard about the rezone request yet, so we aren't completely out of the woods at this point. We need to stay involved and diligent.

"Going forward, as the Master Plan is updated, the community's participation will be crucial. The Master Plan is what will ensure we aren't faced with a similar situation in the future."



Distracted driving

The National Safety Council has declared April as National Distracted Driving Awareness Month to remind us all of its dangers.

Distracted driving has been defined as any activity that diverts attention from focusing on the road.

At the top of the list of activities that cause distracted driving is the use of a cell phone.

Studies have shown that a person who texts while driving is eight times more likely to get into a crash. A person talking on the phone is four times more likely.

Nationally in 2019, there were 3,142 people killed in distracted driving accidents and over 400,000 injured. It is a serious problem and there are laws, which prohibit distracted driving in all states.

For example in Michigan, texting while driving is a civil infraction with a fine of \$100.

When distracted driving causes death or injury, Michigan law considers it a criminal offense and the penalties are more severe including possible jail time.

Our statute provides that it is a crime when a person commits a moving violation while operating

a vehicle, which causes death or a serious impairment of a body function of a person. A "moving violation" is an offense punishable by a fine.

Distracted driving can result in moving violations such as running a red light or rear ending another vehicle.

I have had moving violation causing death cases in my court and one especially stands out.

It involved a semi-truck driver going northbound on a winter's day on a very icy U.S. 23 in Fenton. He was talking on his cell phone and didn't realize that the traffic up ahead of him had stopped due to an accident. By the time he did, it was too late, as although he had slammed on his brakes, he couldn't stop in time and ran over the back of a small car killing a young wife and the mother of two.

The entire incident was captured on audio and video from the inside of the driver's cab, with the driver's last words being "I think I just killed somebody."

I won't add to that except to say to all drivers — stay focused and remember to keep your eyes on the road, your hands upon the wheel. Be safe.

City of Fenton, Water Main Flushing, May 3rd thru May 7th.

Fenton, MI: The City of Fenton Water Department will begin water main flushing in quadrants 1 and 3, beginning May 3rd and continuing through May 7th. Water main flushing will be performed from 10:00PM through 4:00AM to minimize water pressure disruptions.

Flushing water mains removes minerals and sediment that naturally accumulate in the water distribution system. Fire hydrants are used for the flushing process which allows Water Department personnel to operate each hydrant to ensure proper function for fire protection.


Once flushing is completed in your area, water may appear rust colored because iron and other mineral deposits in the water main are stirred by high velocity water flow associated with the flushing process. There is no health hazard associated with discolored water and the water customer may need to run the cold water tap at all faucet locations in the home to eliminate discolored water. We recommend waiting a day after discolored water is flushed from your pipes before doing laundry.

If you are experiencing discolored water after at least five minutes of cold water flushing at all faucets in your home, please contact the City of Fenton Water Department at 810-629-6347 for assistance.


stole home making it 5-2.

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
