football coach
'had a good run'

Bring up Linden High School and for many one name pops up immediately in their head.

That would be varsity football coach Denny Hopkins.

Hopkins has won almost 1,000 varsity events expanding three sports (baseball, basketball and football) since the late 1970s at Linden High School.

He's won 13 MetroLeague crowns among those sports and, more importantly, has been a father figure for thousands during that time.

Gone but never forgotten

■ The Times remembers local loved ones who died in 2021

While the death of any loved one is life changing for every family affected by their loss, the Times looks back on the deaths over the past year of local residents that resulted in a news story in the paper. The following are local residents who died in chronological order.

Cameron “Charlotte” Jenkins, 20, of Fenton, died Jan. 16, 2021 in a three-car crash in the Upper Peninsula. Jenkins was a third-year computer engineering student. Jenkins’ passenger was transported to UP Health System Marquette with serious injuries. Two other drivers involved in the crash also were transported to the hospital for treatment of injuries.

Evan Silva, 26, of Hartland, died Feb. 6, 2021. According to Michigan State Police, Silva was attending a baby shower/gender reveal party in Gaines Township when he was struck by metal shrapnel.

Peter (Pete) VanDriessche died April 18, 2021. He was 72. VanDriessche began as a reserve officer for the city in 1970 and went full-time in 1981, later becoming chief. He retired in 2010 and that year he was selected to be the grand marshal of the Linden Holiday Happening parade and he rode with his wife of just over a year, Becky, who owns Shirley’s Café and Grill in Linden.

Robert Harris Sr., 97, of Fenton, died April 21, 2021. A lifelong resident of Fenton, Harris had authored seven books on Fenton’s history. He also wrote the novel, “Many Come, Few Are Chosen,” about the U.S. Marines. Harris graduated from Fenton High School in 1941. He went on to earn his Ph.D. and was the commencement speaker for the FHS Class of 1972. At the time, he was president of Johnson County Community College in Overland Park, Kansas. He started Harris Financial (on N. LeRoy Street in Fenton) in 1980. His son, Bob Jr., joined him after 14 years in the FBI. The business is now run by his grandson, Rob Harris.

Court cases of 2021

Crimes range from fraud, drug possession, larceny to homicide

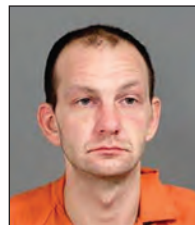
Samual Smart, 30, of Holly, is facing a charge of felony murder in the Saturday, Dec. 19, 2020 death of Trinity Chandler, 30, of Groveland Township. Smart was the live-in boyfriend of Justine Comstock, Trinity's mother.

Detectives were able to retrieve a deleted two-minute video from Smart's phone, which showed him allegedly assaulting the young girl five days prior to her death. The

medical examiner testified in court that the girl's cause of death was blunt force trauma to the chest. Bond was denied and Smart remains lodged at the Oakland County Jail. If convicted as charged, he faces life in prison. He will be back in Oakland County Circuit Court Feb. 9, 2022 for a pretrial.



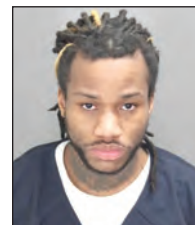

Joshua Hunter, 29, of Flint, was arraigned in Genesee County 67th District Court on possession of methamphetamine and uttering and publishing counterfeit bills. Fenton police responded to Walmart on Owen Road on Jan. 9, 2021 on a report of a male attempting

to pass counterfeit money. Responding police recovered several counterfeit \$50 bills and methamphetamine in his possession. With a plea agreement, the drug charge was dropped and Hunter was sentenced to 60 days probation.

Lesley Aikins, 53, of Grand Blanc, was arraigned Jan. 28, 2021, in Genesee County 67th District Court on one count of felon in possession of ammunition. Genesee County Sheriff's Office deputies responded to a construction site in Fenton Township on Monday, Jan. 25, 2021 for a reported felonious assault. Aikins pleaded guilty to a lesser misdemeanor charge and was sentenced to 10 days in the county jail.

Marcel Hinkle, 27, of Flint, was arrested Feb. 4, 2021. Bond was denied and he remains in the Oakland County Jail. The FBI Oakland County Gang and Violent Crime Task Force assisted the Oakland County Sheriff's Office in investigating nine armed robberies, which occurred in Oakland and Genesee counties, between Jan. 19 and Jan. 31, 2021.

Two of the robberies occurred at pharmacies in Holly Village and Fenton City. A competency evaluation was ordered April 2 and he is expected back in court for a competency hearing Jan. 4 at 9 a.m.

Vincent Merrill, 51, of Springfield Township, was sentenced Aug. 20, 2021, to 25 to 70 years in state prison.

This came after he pleaded no contest July 23 to first-degree homicide. He was also ordered to an automatic two years in prison on the felony firearms charge. On, Sept. 3, 2020 Merrill called 911 to report that he had killed his girlfriend, Vicki Fortin.

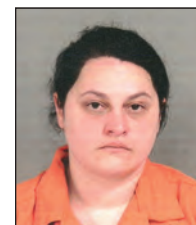
Matthew Wrosch, 47, of Owosso, was arraigned on three charges April 28, 2021, by in Oakland County 52-2 District Court, via Zoom. He was charged with one count of disturbing a school, one count of creating a disturbance at a school and failing to leave upon request, and one count of resisting/obstructing a police officer. He pleaded not guilty and requested a jury trial through his attorney. The charges stem from an incident March 10 in Holly Village. He appeared at the Holly Area Schools administration offices, Karl Richter Campus and Holly Village offices. He filmed a 50-minute video with his interaction with Holly police officers and then posted his video on social media. A final pretrial is scheduled for March 30 at 2 p.m.

Marc Fishman, 69, of Bloomfield Township, his 31-year-old son, **Ryan Fishman** and colleague, **Alexandra Ichim**, 32, of Waterford Township were charged in Genesee County 67th District Court with conducting a criminal enterprise, forgery and obstruction of justice in April 2021. The three individuals are lawyers with the law firm, Fishman Group, in Bloomfield Hills.

Marc Fishman was arraigned on one count of acquiring and maintaining a criminal enterprise and one count of obstruction of justice. Ryan Fishman was arraigned on one count of conducting a criminal

Woman attempts to set post office on fire

■ **Reward offered for information that leads to arrest of arson suspect**

Oakland County sheriff's deputies responded to the United States Post Office at 376 Beach Farm, Highland Township in Oakland County at 10:03 p.m., Sunday, Dec. 26 for a burglary alarm.

Upon arrival, deputies observed flames and smoke in the front lobby. The Highland Township Fire Department (HTFD) responded to the scene and extinguished the fire. The lobby of the Post Office is open 24 hours a day and seven days a week. There is extensive damage of well over \$100,000. No injuries were reported.

The HTFD requested an OCSO Fire Investigator for a cause and origin investigation. A representative from the U.S. Postal Inspector's Office provided surveillance video of the

incident. The video revealed a female subject entering the lobby, igniting paper, and placing it inside of a trash receptacle. The unknown white female was described as wearing a black hat, gray coat, carrying a red hand bag and wearing white tennis shoes.

The fire is considered arson and the investigation is ongoing. It is a joint investigation by the Postal Inspector's Office, OCSO Fire Investigations Unit, the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives and the Highland Township Fire Department.

There is a reward of up to \$5,000 from the Arson Prevention Reward Program via the Detroit Crime Commission for information leading to an arrest and an additional \$1,000 reward from Crime Stoppers. Go to detroitcrimecommission.org for reward details.

Anyone with information is asked to call Crime Stoppers at 1-800-SPEAK-UP and you will remain anonymous.

The summer of construction

The summer of 2021 was an unprecedented year for the number of construction projects completed in an approximate six-month time span. Most projects took place in Fenton.

Beginning in April, the Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT) started repairs and maintenance work on the Owen Road bridge that passed over U.S. 23.

MDOT also completed work on the Silver Lake Road overpass, the Thompson Road bridge, Torrey Road bridge, Lahring Road bridge and approximately a dozen other bridges in Genesee County as part of a \$12.3-million investment.

During the Silver Lake Road/North Road overpass work, the city of Fenton had Silver Lake Road redone. Work started in early July on Silver Lake Road, from the western city limit to Poplar Street, which is approximately 1.53 miles. The project was funded by MDOT and consisted of asphalt milling and resurfacing, concrete curb, gutter and ramp repair, and more.

The construction caused traffic delays and detours through Fenton Township and Linden. Motorists took detours to Linden Road and Owen Road.

MDOT also did repairs on the S. LeRoy Street bridge, the Caroline Street bridge and the Torrey Road bridge. The city also had Shiawassee Avenue resurfaced from Bent Oak to Adelaide Street in the spring. The orange cones were gone from Fenton in November.

Fenton road bond passes

On Tuesday, Nov. 2, 2021 Fenton voters passed a \$24-million bond to fix local roads. The vote was 1,041 yes votes (60%) to 694 no votes (40%). The majority of local roads are considered to be in poor condition, and the city engineers, OHM Advisors, and the Department of Public Works are identifying which roads will be redone and the timeline. Officials estimate that 90-95% of roads will be improved.

This comes three years after residents voted down a proposal to raise 5 mills to fix roads in 2018.

The State Bank Trail

Non-motorized pathways are coming to the tri-county area, and 2021

was a productive year for these efforts by multiple local organizations. In June, LAFF (Linden, Argentine Township, Fenton Township, Fenton) Pathway Inc., Southern Lakes Parks & Recreation, the city of Fenton and The State Bank announced a \$500,000 donation from The State Bank to fund Phase 2 of the LAFF pathway project.

Phase 2 will connect Linden, Fenton Township and Fenton. It will begin at Triangle Park in Linden, travel through Fenton Township on Silver Lake Road and connect to Fenton City sidewalks. It will be called The State Bank Trail. Construction is expected to begin in 2023.

Phase One was completed in October 2020 and connects Argentine Township to the city of Linden through Silver Lake Road and the Linden Community School complex.

Linden's Sesquicentennial

The city of Linden turned 150 years old and celebrated with two days of activities and events. On Saturday, July 17, 2021 Linden Mayor Danielle Cusson accepted the Michigan Milestone Award from the Historical Society of Michigan (HSM) to commemorate the city's sesquicentennial. The celebration was attended by politicians, Linden descendants and more. The event coincided with River Fest. The Linden Mills Historical Society put together a book on Linden, called "Linden Memories Past & Present."

Linden Gazebo redone

One of the most significant changes in Linden is the new gazebo. Roger Sharp, CEO and founder of Sharp Funeral Homes, and Joe Kimble, Emeritus Professor at WMU-Cooley Law School, funded the restoration. It was unveiled at Linden's Sesquicentennial.

Fenton Gazebo to be restored

Fenton City Council also approved spending \$65,000 on restoring the Fenton gazebo at the millpond.

Argentine Township dam repairs likely

Argentine Township officials, the Genesee County Road Commission and multiple county and state politicians are working to find funding to repair the Argentine Township dam. In November 2019, the right principal spillway failed, resulting in Lobdell

and Bennett lakes losing approximately 11 inches of water over the course of about five days.

The spillway is still not fixed, however, the township has held meetings with the county and engineers on getting it fixed.

Construction begins on new Linden schools

In September 2021, construction began on the new Linden Community Schools 44,000-square-foot multi-purpose center located between the high school and middle school. Planned amenities include a fitness room, a community space for parties and events, an elevated running track, wrestling room, batting cages, a gymnastics space with 300 seats, and a traditional gymnasium with 300 seats.

Linden mural

In November 2021, the Linden Downtown Development Authority reaffirmed its goal to bring a new mural to downtown. Due to state historic guidelines, the DDA is limited with where a mural could be painted, and they chose the west-facing wall of Linden City Hall. The mural is expected to be done in 2022.

Beacon & Bridge redevelopment

Construction for the redevelopment of Beacon & Bridge in Linden began June 14, 2021. When construction is done, the convenience store will be located at the north end of the property and the gas pumps will be at the southern portion. After work is done, the convenience store will be 2,592 square feet and there will be eight pumps.

Redevelopment is coinciding with the installation of a remediation system to clean up the underground gasoline leak.

enterprise, 30 counts of forgery and one count of obstruction of justice. Ichim was arraigned on one count of conducting a criminal enterprise, 30 counts of forgery and one count of obstruction of justice.

The three co-defendants were released on bond and have preliminary exams scheduled for Jan. 24, 2022.

Steve Ruth, 66, of Holly Township, pleaded to operating a vehicle while impaired May 26. He was ordered to pay \$643 in cost recovery from the Oakland County Prosecutor's Office and \$500 restitution to Holly Village for the damage done to a patrol vehicle.

Benjamin Reinhart, 25, of Gaines, was charged with four counts related to communicating with who he thought was a 15-year-old girl. He was a corrections officer for the Genesee County Sheriff's Office. A decoy and Reinhart allegedly agreed to meet, however, Reinhart did not show up



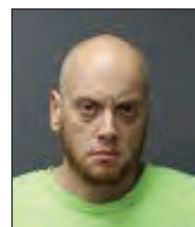

He pleaded guilty to attempted soliciting and attempted soliciting using a computer and sentenced to six years probation.

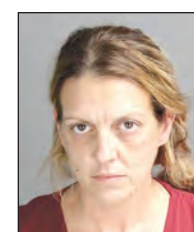

Township later that night. She waived her district court arraignment and was bound over to Monroe County Circuit Court where she is facing charges of carjacking, felonious assault and two counts of felonious firearms. Her accomplice, William Lanham, was found deceased in the Holly Township home from a self-inflicted gunshot. Holladay is expected back in Monroe County Circuit Court Jan. 7 for a pre-trial hearing.

Mary Ann Spring Tremaine resigned from her role as Genesee County 911 director Aug. 30, 2021. This came after she was charged with a misdemeanor of disorderly conduct relating to a neighbor and family dispute. Tremaine was seen dumping yard waste on her neighbor's driveway in August. Her neighbor is her ex-sister-in-law. She pleaded not guilty and during a court hearing Nov. 17, 2021 a jury trial in district court was scheduled for Feb. 17.

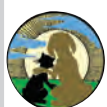

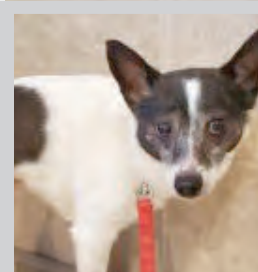

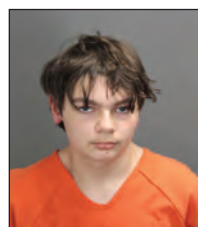

Ethan Crumbley, 15, of Oxford, was charged with four counts of first-degree murder, seven counts of assault with intent to murder, terrorism and multiple firearms counts. He faces life in prison. Oakland County Prosecutor Karen

McDonald is charging him as an adult. Ethan has a probable cause conference Jan. 7 at 9 a.m.

Ethan is the alleged shooter in a mass school shooting that happened Tuesday, Nov. 30, 2021 at Oxford High School in Oakland County. The sheriff's office reported that James and Jennifer Crumbley legally purchased the handgun that was used in the shooting four days prior to the shooting and said the parents posted on social media that the gun was a gift for Ethan. Four high school students, Hana St. Juliana, Tate Myre, Madisyn Baldwin and Justin Shilling, died from gunshot wounds. In addition to those four students who died, seven other people were shot — six students and one teacher.

Joshua Antwan Liggins, 31, allegedly shot multiple times, unprovoked, at a truck occupied by eight Fenton area men aged 18, 19 and 20, while they were exiting a club parking lot on Ravine Road in Kalamazoo on Oct. 2, 2021 at 3:25 a.m. Several bullets hit the truck. Liggins was arraigned Nov. 23 on eight counts of assault with intent to murder and eight counts of felony firearms. A cash surety bond of \$20,000 was ordered and he posted bond Nov. 2. According to court records, an examination hearing is scheduled for Jan. 10 at 1:30 p.m.

WISDOM TEETH

The third molar teeth are last teeth to develop and erupt into the mouth. This usually occurs when a person is around 18 or 19 years of age. They are called Wisdom Teeth because these teeth appear in the mouth once the person has reached the "age of wisdom." I think most would agree that this is a misnomer as I personally can't think of any 18 year olds exhibiting much wisdom. Few people have adequate room in their mouth for their third molars to erupt into full position. For those that do, my philosophy, in their case, is if they can keep their wisdom teeth healthy then they can keep them. Most wisdom teeth, however, are problem teeth. Few people have enough space for their developing third molars. This lack of adequate room causes most wisdom teeth to become impacted. An impacted tooth is trouble. Impacted Wisdom Teeth create pressure which can cause damage to the other teeth and can cause crowding of the other teeth. Impacted third molars can become infected and can sometimes develop cysts or develop periodontal disease which can spread throughout the mouth. It is best to have impacted wisdom teeth removed before any serious trouble develops which involves surgery. It's best to have wisdom teeth surgery at ages 18-20. At this stage in their life the person is young and healthy, the third molar teeth and bone are not fully developed, and there is no active infection in the area. Third molar surgery in this situation is usually considered minor surgery and recovery is fast and easy. Conversely, the impacted third molar surgery on a 50+ year old is often considered a more major surgery with a much prolonged and difficult recovery with a great chance of post-operative complications. Because of this, I recommend removal of Wisdom Teeth for my young adult patients.

"After talking with the administration and the parents I decided to step away and resign my position," Hopkins said Friday morning. "I had a good run and overall, I've had some great assistant coaches. I was able to coach a lot of really great players."

"He's meant a lot to the school," Linden Community Schools Superintendent Russ Ciesielski said. "The positive impact he's had on student-athletes for the years of service he's put in — I don't even know how to put it in words. He's brought so much to the table to our students, and not just the athletic part of it. It's outside of athletics and just being a good person."

"It was a pleasure coming in, being a new athletic director and having someone you can lean on for answers because he's done it for so long," Linden Athletic Director Lance Belill said. "He made my transition easy when it came to football season. Linden is lucky to have him."

Depending on when one attended Linden, they may have looked at Hopkins as a legendary baseball, boys basketball or football coach. He began coaching the varsity boys basketball program during the 1978-79 school year and did so for 32 years, earning a 408-340 record, 10 district championships, four Metro titles and a regional championship. He coached varsity baseball from 1979 until 1998, recording a 401-254 record, which included two Metro crowns.

But now, most think of Hopkins as a football coach. He took over the varsity position in 1998 and posted a 162-87 record. He won seven league titles. His squads qualified for the playoffs 19 times, including a string of 16 times in a row at one time. He led the team to three 9-0 seasons and to two district crowns. And through it all, he's been invited to numerous ex-players' weddings and is in touch with many of them to this day.

"Thank God the players dedicated themselves to the program," Hopkins said. "The kids and hard work is the reason we've been so successful. And the assistant coaches — I can't say enough about those guys. They've been loyal. I want to thank those guys for

their loyalty."

Hopkins is a member of the Michigan High School Baseball Coaches Association, Michigan Football Coaches Association and the Linden Athletic Hall of Fame. He's among the most winningest coaches in the Flint area with his combined 971 victories among the three varsity programs. But for his athletes, the wins don't matter as much as the person himself.

"I would've met him around 1977 or 1978 and at that time most coaches were older and more conservative and structured in their approach, but Denny was very relatable," said ex-Linden baseball, basketball and football player Clint Fayling. "What made him so endearing with so many students was he was so relatable. ... And he had that enthusiasm to want to make us all better."

"I was four years younger than Clint and I became a gym rat and a ball boy to the basketball and baseball teams," Blake Fayling said. "I started having a relationship with him in the fourth or fifth grade and have had a relationship with him ever since. I'm not unlike thousands of others in Linden where he was a father figure to me. It was important to him to raise great young men and not necessarily win games. But while he did raise young men, he happened to be a Hall of Fame coach in multiple sports."

Blake played basketball and baseball for Hopkins.

Hopkins's influence extends into his own family. His daughter, Cori Mason, is the current Linden varsity volleyball coach.

"Ever since I could remember, I wanted to be just like him," Mason said. "We always had people step by, and my mom made team dinners. I was a gym rat ... and I would go to Dad's practices. That's what my family did. We were a sports family."

"Everything I do today is based on what I witnessed and watched him do."

Ryan Buckler, a football and basketball player from the early 1990s, was one of those players who spent a

good amount of time at their home.

"I not only got to experience his coaching abilities, but he made us better all around people because we spent a lot of time with his family outside of school," Buckler said. "His students weren't just students or players. They were family. And to this day so many of his former players have relationships like that. I'm 47 and I make a point

to see him every time I come home. ... You don't see relationships like that very often anymore."

When Hopkins was inducted into the Linden Athletic Hall of Fame, both Fayling brothers came from their homes in Colorado to attend. While he was a ball boy, Blake earned his nickname

through Hopkins. He had a T-shirt with the word 'Wheels' on it.

"He'd call Blake wheels," Clint said. "Half of the athletic teams knew him as wheels. Blake's daughter wears the shirt now. She dug it out and wears it

to basketball practice now."

Hopkins is proud of his career at Linden, but says the community helped him to his success.

"Linden was my home and I want to thank all the people that backed me through the years. Linden is my home and always will be," Hopkins said. "I just want to thank the people for allowing me to be a small part of the community."

Police Department investigated his disappearance and several stories had been written with the intent of locating him and having him return safely to his home. His body was found in September 2021 in Southfield.

Jimmy Myers, a FHS graduate and soccer player, fell backwards down a flight of stairs and hit his head on a brick wall in June. He was rushed to Hurley Medical Center for emergency brain surgery. While he was recovering, his teammates, friends and community rallied behind Jimmy and his family to show support and helped fundraise to pay for medical bills, including a soccer game. He succumbed to his traumatic brain injuries July 31, 2021.

William Lanham, 39, was found deceased in a home in Holly Township on Aug. 4, 2021, with a self-inflicted gunshot. He was a suspect in an armed carjacking in Frenchtown Township, a police chase, two car crashes and an armed home invasion and barricaded gunman situation. His accomplice, Michelle Holladay, turned herself into authorities and is facing multiple charges.

James "Jim" Smeets, 84, of Sun City West, Arizona and formerly of Fenton Township, died Sept. 11,

2021. He lived in Fenton Township for more than 50 years and was supervisor of the township for 20 years in the 1970s and '80s. When they lived in Fenton Township, Smeets served on the Lake Fenton Property Owners Association. As supervisor, he also served on a committee of the Genesee County Road Commission, the Genesee County Metropolitan Planning Commission, Girl Scouts Council and Big Brothers association. On Monday, Oct. 18, 2021, the Fenton Township Board of Trustees approved a memorial resolution in honor of Smeets.

Ron Wetherell, 54, of Gaines, was killed in a motorcycle crash Sept. 12, 2021. His body and Harley-Davidson motorcycle were located at 9:33 a.m. Sunday approximately 30 feet from Seymour Road, between Whitney and Ray roads in Argentine Township. A gofundme account "In Honor of Ronnie Woo Woo" said Wetherell could always make everyone laugh and he lived life to the fullest.

Timothy Dale White, 70, of Holly, died Oct. 11, 2021, from injuries he sustained in a three-vehicle crash on U.S. 23 in Tyrone Township. His vehicle was stopped for heavy traffic and was rear-ended by a van driven by a Grand Blanc resident. White was very active at the Benchmark Church of Fenton, and was known for always being ready to help whoever was in need.

Leslie Dean Goff, 50, of Grand Blanc, died as a result of injuries he sustained in a single vehicle crash Oct. 1, 2021, in Tyrone Township. He was the passenger in the van when it crashed on Rohn Road.

Tate Myre, Madisyn Baldwin and **Hana St. Juliana** were shot and killed Tuesday, Nov. 20, 2021 while at Oxford High School in Oakland County. Another student

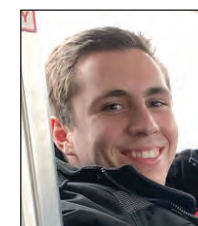

shot, 17-year-old **Justin Shilling**, died from his injuries Wednesday morning. The alleged shooter is a 15-year-old sophomore from the school. Six other high school students and one teacher also were shot.

Emanuel (Manny) Vomvolakis, 23, of Linden, was killed in a plane crash Friday, Dec. 10, 2021, in New Hampshire. He was the pilot and lone occupant of the plane, which was delivering medical supplies. The flight originated from the Essex County Airport in Fairfield, N.J., and was en route to the Manchester-Boston Regional

Airport when Vomvolakis reported engine trouble just prior to the crash, the chief said. Vomvolakis' family has created a gofundme account "Fly High Manny Memorial Fund" to create a scholarship fund in his name. This fund will be a way for Manny's name to live on in the hopes and dreams of those who wish to become a pilot.

Spencer remains perfect, wins by knock out in fifth round vs. Ponce

Joey Spencer got the gift he wanted at the Prudential Center in Newark, New Jersey during Christmas night in his 14th professional boxing match.

The middleweight fight-

er captured his 14th victory in as many bouts, defeating an experienced Limberth Ponce by knock out with 1:24 remaining in the fifth round of the scheduled eight-round fight. The fight, as have 13 of his bouts, was

televised live nationwide by the FOX network.

In what was more of a deliberate fight, Spencer dominated his foe from the start of the first round until the final blow — a right hand followed by a left hook with 1:24 remaining in the fifth round. The left hook put Ponce on the canvas and the referee ended the bout immediately.

A few moments prior to the winning two-punch combination, Spencer stunned Ponce with a left hook as well, setting up his eventual knock out in the same round.

"He was a game guy. He came to win," Spencer said. "He was trying to counter me, and I landed the first shot and I hurt him. I knew from previous experiences, I realized I had to chill for a second, not rush him off the bat, and I knew the perfect shot would set up and that's what happened."

Spencer led this bout from the start. While it was a slow-paced fight, Spencer went into the contest knowing his opponent had a repu-

tation of being a solid counter-puncher. Spencer landed more punches in each round, and finished with a 60-19 landed count on the punches. He was more efficient as well, landing 39% of his shots compared to Ponce connecting on just 13%.

Spencer, who fought with the words, "A savior is born" on his shorts during his Christmas bout, had other solid hits in previous rounds, but was unable to get Ponce (18-5) on the canvas. However, his solid shots gave an impression that the knock out would only be a matter of time.

Spencer, who goes by the nickname "The Small Town Soldier" because of his Linden roots, recorded his ninth knock out in 14 fights. Prior to this bout, Spencer said his next goal was to begin fighting 10-round matches.

"I hope he gives me some good rounds being I want my next fight to be a 10-rounder," Spencer said prior to the bout.

Life is getting exciting for Spencer.

In 2021, the tri-county area was able to double the number of boxers they can call hometown athletes.

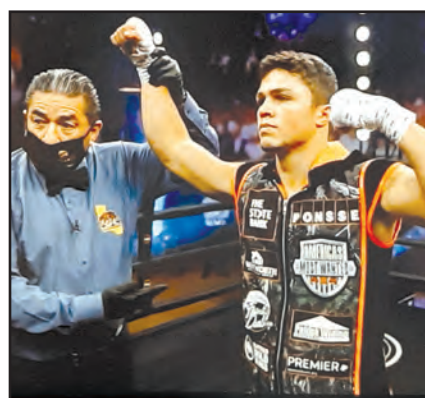
