Brookwood Fenton. The meeting starts at 6 p.m.

The applicant is Chris Garner. If approved, the developer will build a neighborhood of attached condominiums.


The library also will soon start a "plant library" with donations from the community.

A seed library loans seeds to gardeners. A seed library works much like a traditional library, but not quite.




The Holly Township Library will begin a Lending Seed Library where visitors can take or donate seeds.

Businesses, customers struggle with inflation

■Survey shows staff shortages, supply chain problems and inflation are primary issues for small businesses

Businesses are struggling with inflation and supply chain disruptions, and consumers are noticing.

On Facebook, we asked our readers if they've noticed supply chain issues and inflation at local grocery stores.

One reader, Holly resident Sarah Koza, who works as a personal shopper, said she's spending approximately \$600 to \$800 more on groceries for a family of 10.

"Last year at this time, I would spend approximately \$800 a month on groceries / toiletries for our family. Now I am spending approximately \$1,400-

\$1,600 a month for those same items. It has gotten difficult at times due to many items not being available or out of stock. So I have to buy up on some brands or shop around," she wrote.

She said inflation has increased the prices of the following items: meat, poultry, frozen food items, produce, boxed meals, cereal, diapers, toiletries, dairy, lunchmeat.

Marvin Yono, co-owner, of Alpine Marketplace, said they're dealing with supply chain issues like many food retailers.

"Scheduled deliveries continue to be a problem. It's gotten better now that the

holidays are over," he said. The snowy weather has not affected supply.

It's been a challenge to stock certain items such as Capri Sun and Gatorade, and many companies, such as Coke and Pepsi, have cut down on producing varieties of products and are focusing on producing core items.

"I would say that Alpine is pretty well stocked overall," he said.

Michigan's small businesses are struggling with workforce shortages, inflation, and supply chain disruptions, according to results of a new survey released January 2022 from the Small Business Association of Michigan

in Lansing. Approximately 56% of respondents said workplace shortages and inflation were primary issues, while 59% said supply chain disruptions was a primary issue.

Alpine also has been affected by inflation. However, they do their best not to raise prices.

"Inflation has had an effect on our operations but because we are an independent retailer, we have the flexibility to purchase goods from any supplier we choose. Corporate stores have to stick to their supply chain," Yono said. "When we see price increases, we immediately search other suppliers for better pricing. We see cost increases on everything from packaging to the ingredients we use to produce our items. We do our best to not raise prices though."

Watch for horses on Rolston Road

Linden family asks council for permission to put up 'equestrian crossing' signs

Linden — Drivers who travel on Rolston Road should be aware of horses.

Linden resident Craig Hatch, who lives off W. Rolston Road and takes care of horses, asked Linden City Council if he could erect three equestrian traffic warning signs on the road for safety reasons.

At the Monday, Jan. 24 meeting, Linden Police Chief Scott Sutter said, "I think it's a good idea just to warn people because they have the right to ride on the road."

The council approved the request.

Hatch and his family moved from Fenton to Linden this past summer. They raise horses on their 13-acre property, which is fenced in. They currently have four horses and a miniature donkey named Dallas, and they often ride their horses on the road even in the winter, except for when the temperatures are too low.

"We just want to be safe because we ride out a lot from the house to Rolston Road and to Hogan and to all the dirt roads," he said. "Some of the cars coming around that corner, I want them to be aware that there's a horse crossing over there."

Delivery drivers are some of the worst ones, he said.

Two of the signs will be placed on the speed limit signs and a third will be placed closer to their house. All signs will be placed in accordance with Michigan State laws governing height, width and distance from the roadway.

Hatch owns these signs and used them when they lived in Fenton.



What will Punxsutawney Phil predict?

Will he reveal if there's six more weeks of winter or if spring is around the corner

One of the most publicized weather forecasts of the entire year is just days away: the prognostication heard around the world shortly after daybreak in central Pennsylvania on Wednesday, Feb. 2, Groundhog Day.

However, AccuWeather forecasters have already been busy for weeks analyzing weather trends for the coming months and, in a bid to be ahead of Punxsutawney Phil's renowned prognostication, are releasing a preview of the spring forecast for the United States.

Phil's forecast has been made almost every year since 1887, although there have been 10 years where there was no record of Phil's prognostication and a time during WWII when Phil did not make an appearance.

According to the Punxsutawney Groundhog Club, Phil's forecast follows an English folk song to determine if there will be an early spring or if Old Man Winter will have an extended stay.

"If Candlemas be fair and bright, Come, Winter, have another flight; If Candlemas brings clouds and rain, Go, Winter, and come not again."

For folks eager to find out whether Phil will see his shadow, AccuWeather Lead U.S. Long-Range Forecaster Paul Pastelok has shed some light on what he thinks will play out on Feb. 2 and beyond.

"I think this year, he is not going to see his shadow, and that spring will be around the corner," Pastelok said. "However, it doesn't mean that we're not going to see any significant winter weather coming our way, at least in the northern tier of the U.S., for the next several weeks."


Even if Punxsutawney Phil sees his shadow, meaning six more weeks of winter weather are in store, there are a few regions of the contiguous United States that can expect spring-like weather to arrive early. Meteorological spring across the Northern Hemisphere officially begins March 1.

For much of the Northeast and Great Lakes, Pastelok said, March and April will experience a "back-and-forth" between the seasons with cold spells followed by warmups. He added that March as a whole is looking to be slightly warmer than normal, but this doesn't mean that residents can pack away coats and break out shorts just yet.

Cold fronts could still periodically swing through the Great Lakes and Northeast in February, March and April, although the cold blasts may not be as intense as they were throughout January.

AccuWeather will release its full U.S. spring forecast Feb. 2 along with updates on whether Phil sees his shadow. The spring forecast will include a detailed, region-by-region breakdown of what people from coast to coast can expect throughout the entirety of the new season.

According to a letter of intent from Kevin Royston of PE/Wade Trim, the proposed project is an "age restricted, multi-family" residential community development with recreation areas and pathways. It's expected to be an age 55 and over community.

Plans call for the following: eight two-plex buildings, which hold 16 1,000-square foot units, 22 four-plex buildings, which hold 88 1,000-square-foot units; and 20 six-plex buildings, which hold 120 1,000-square-foot units.

In total, there would be 224 units. Plans also call for a 2,500-square-feet clubhouse.

The parcel is 73 acres. The develop-

ment would provide 55 acres of open space, said Michael Deem, Fenton Township zoning administrator. The unit density is projected at 3.07 units per acre.

Deem said the township typically looks for a development density of fewer than four units per acre for this type of use. They will consider development setbacks, open space and overall density in the review process.

The letter of intent states that they will build multiple detention basins to handle the stormwater. The public sanitary sewer and water main would be installed with connections to both services at Lahring Road. The landscaping would act as a buffer for the development from U.S. 23 and Lahring Road.

Developers will also conduct a traffic study.

Koza mainly shops at Walmart because she knows the store, gets discounts and can easily plan meals.

She begins meal planning a week in advance because of their busy schedules. If they have leftovers, that food becomes lunch or goes into the freezer to be eaten at a later date.

The family cuts down on food costs in multiple ways. They saved "a lot" of money this year picking fresh vegetables from their garden, and they have chickens so they haven't had to buy eggs in years.

She said they saved a lot of money by picking fresh veggies from our garden this past year.

"If I see a good sale on an item, I may stock up on it and buy multiples of that

item and store it," she said. "We plant a large veggie garden in the spring and we have fruit trees that provide pears and apples. We also try to buy from local veggie stands in the summer."

Her son and husband hunt. Bringing home a few deer helps cut back on meat costs. Koza also bakes bread and other baked goods from scratch.

"I tend to buy our baking items in bulk which saves us a little. I'm trying to talk my husband into (buying) a milking cow because we average about 14 gallons a week and having our own cow would save us money," she said. "The best tip I can give is to stick to a list, do not impulse buy. Plan your meals and have a couple back up meals because many items have been on back order. I run into that problem every week."

20 years," the plan states. "Spillover market demand from Silver Lake Village, Walmart, and the Shoppes of Fenton PUD has led to the upgrade of existing sites and buildings such as Speedway, BP/Tim Hortons, Taco Bell, Arby's and KFC."

City planners expect continued demand to improve properties in this area and accommodate new investment.

A. Northeast corner: Behind the BP minimart, Taco Bell, McDonald's, Culver's, etc.

The plan states that coordinated access and redevelopment is crucial here. All the traffic signals were synchronized in 2011 to optimize traffic flow. The redevelopment opportunities exist in the land behind BP and Taco Bell, which contain industrial buildings. The site behind BP is "underutilized," according to the plan, and the building behind Taco Bell could be developed in a more efficient manner.

The topography at the back end of the McDonald's and Culver's sites create





a barrier to create a cross connection.

"The intersection, especially the north side, is not equipped to handle additional traffic, so alternative ingress and egress must be provided if sites to the north are to be redeveloped," the plan states.

Key recommendations include: promoting more office-related industrial uses to create more demand for local services while only generating mild traffic; directing traffic north and discourage cut-through traffic; maintain a positive image from U.S. 23; and provide pedestrian connections.

B. Fenton Area Public Schools Site:

The Shoppes of Fenton/Target area is built out, except for the land to the east between the driveway and the Fenton Area Public Schools property. For years, city planners have discussed creating an additional outlet on this property at the entrance to the Shoppes of Fenton.

"At the northwest corner of the property is a vacant area that could be sold and redeveloped using the existing traffic signal for access because the south side of the intersection was designed to carry greater volumes of traffic. There is a large berm located along the Shoppes of Fenton entrance drive that would need to be excavated.

but the task is not insurmountable," according to the plan.

Key recommendations include: rezone the site low density residential to general business district/planned unit development to accommodate commercial opportunities; use Shoppes of Fenton driveway for access; provide parking facilities in the rear; and provide pedestrian connections to the school site.

C. Sunoco Mini-Mart

The plan identifies this site as "poorly maintained and underutilized."

Barrels & Vines, which owns multiple mini-mart facilities in Michigan, has plans to redevelop the site at 3325 Owen Rd. in spring 2022. Plans include a new gas station, convenience store, and fast food restaurant with drive-through.

City planners thought the rear of the site could be an opportunity for expansion, but the steep slope does not allow it. However, there are opportunities for shared parking.

Key recommendations include: encourage full redevelopment; restrict the number of driveways to Owen Road and connect driveway to existing access driveway; and maintain a positive image from U.S. 23.



D. Boston's Pizza

"The primary challenge with this area has been the left turn access into and out of the property," according to the plan. It highlights circulation fixes for the area.

These buildings were developed individually without a cohesive access driveway plan.

"Coordinated circulation and use of cross-access between the Boston's (restaurant) site, the gas station, and (former) Kmart would improve access options in general, and would alleviate some existing concerns, especially for eastbound traffic turning out of the Boston's driveway, which is located especially close to the U.S. 23 interchange," according to the plan.

Key recommendations include: promoting infill development at underused land; encourage full cross-access between properties; and considering creating a new planned unit development extending the Silver Lake Village PUD.

It's been a week like no other for the Lake Fenton varsity girls basketball team.

The squad faced what are probably their two toughest opponents so far this season within a 24-hour period, and the order of how they were supposed to play them had changed as well.

Expecting to play Goodrich on Monday, snow canceled those plans and moved the contest at Goodrich to Wednesday, 24 hours after a scheduled contest on Tuesday with Flushing.

Lake Fenton increased the lead to double-digits in the second quarter. The Lake Fenton lead reached doubledigits for the first time at 20-10 on a Howdeshell trey and it grew to as many as 14. The Bronchos continued the pattern against Owosso Tuesday night.


Holly was outscored 19-4 in the opening quarter and eventually lost a 59-26 verdict to the Trojans.





Oxford and growing up I played Holly in football and basketball. I liked the school and the area. When I started my teaching and coaching career, I thought Holly is a really nice place I'd like to end up one day. ... It's a one high school community and a tight community.

Keenist has been a varsity football coach since 2018. The last four seasons, he took over a struggling Troy Athens program. The program went 1-17 prior to him taking over in 2018. Keenist went 1-8 in 2018, 3-6 in 2019, 2-4 in 2020 and posted the school's first winning record since 2015 in 2021 with a 5-4 mark. He also spent a year at Berkley High School as the varsity football coach.

He was a quarterback for Adrian College from 2006 to 2009 and was the quarterback coach after his playing career. He also spent time on Oxford's football staff with legendary coach Bud Rowley. Rowley remained at the varsity helm for 42 years, retiring after the 2019 season.

"All of my experiences in life are going to help me (with the football program)," Keenist said. "My expereince playing and coaching for Bud Rowley, playing and coaching at Adrian College and leading two programs at Berkley and Troy Athens has taught me it's going to take a lot of hard work. ... We have to keep working at it, be demanding and aggressive in our approach. We can't take any days off and have to keep working."

"Coach Keenist brings years of experience leading successful football programs at the high school and collegiate levels, and we are excited to have him on board here in Holly," Holly Area Schools athletic director Casey Lombard said. "I am confident he will continue our proud tradition of making athletics central to a well-rounded education that prepares our Bronchos for the real world."

Keenist will face a challenging task at Holly. Holly has enjoyed just six winning seasons since the turn of the century and has never won more than seven games, doing that in 2011. Lesperance was the program's mentor the last three seasons, going 6-19 during those seasons. The Bronchos went 2-7 in 202, earning wins against Avondale and Clio.



Iconic movie and TV cars to headline Chrome & Ice show

The 2022 Chrome & Ice Indoor Car Show is going Hollywood this February with a line-up of iconic vehicles from classic movies and TV.

One of those cool cars will be the Knight Industries Two Thousand, better known as KITT from the 1980s TV show "Knight Rider." The 1983 Trans Am Firebird, owned by Tom Brown and his son Brien Lord, will be among several movie replica cars gracing the lobby of the Dort Financial Center from Feb. 11 to 13.

Lord of Linden said that he and his dad bought the Firebird in the mid-2000s and followed through with an idea to convert it into a KITT replica in 2010/2011.

"It was an Arizona car, and when we bought it, it was brownish gold with a white quarter panel," he said. "All the body metal was undented and didn't have rust, but it was an '83 car in 2005, after all, and needed a lot of work."

Lord and his dad soon made several modifications to the car to give it a distinctly "Knight Rider" appearance, such as applying a sleek black paint job and adding KITT's signature red laser grill lights to the hood. They also purchased a custom-made "futuristic" dashboard and other modifications designed by KITT replica parts makers.

Lord said he hopes that kids will be in awe of the car when it's displayed at Chrome & Ice.

"I remember coming to a car show here (at the arena) when I was a kid in the '80s and getting to see KITT," he said. "It was fun to turn around and build this car with my dad and have those memories. Now, the young kids will be able to come and have a similar experience like I did when they see this car."

Fans of the 1977 hit action film "Smokey and the Bandit" will also get to see a replica of the iconic "Bandit" car—a black and gold 1977 Pontiac Trans Am. 
