Council will ask voters to amend charter

■ If passed, indefinite 5-mill millage could only be used for police and fire services

Linden — Linden residents will vote

in August on an indefinite 5-mill millage for police and fire services and on a charter amendment.

On Monday, Feb. 28, the Linden City Council unanimously approved a resolution that would place the question of whether to amend the charter on the August ballot along with the mill question. If it passes, the levy will begin Dec. 1, 2022.

This is an effort by the council to procure a steady flow of money for police and fire services, which would allow them to spend more of the general fund on capital improvement projects.

Five mills is approximately \$1 per \$1,000 of taxable value of a property. If levied, it would raise an estimated \$621,085 in the first year. If passed, this money could solely be used for provid-See **MILLAGE** on 11

The commission was expected to vote on site plan approval and special land use permit that would allow landscaping materials, concrete storage bins, a sales office and the recycling facility at the vacant property at 400 Meadowridge Dr., which is in the industrial district, is 11.6 acres.

Funds will help make city amenities more handicap accessible, build safe path for students

Linden — Linden has been approved for multiple grants that will allow them to install a handicap accessible kayak launch, a handicap accessibly bathroom at the Linden Library, and a safe path for students.

The city will receive \$30,000 to install a handicap accessible kayak and canoe launch on the Shiawassee River at the access point off

Tickner Street.

City Manager Ellen Glass made the announcement during the Monday, Feb. 28 city council meeting. The grant will come from the Michigan Economic Development Corporation.

"I know that you

guys have worked on that for many years and so that's an exciting thing," she said. "This location is a perfect location because of the fact that you can paddle up and back. A lot of times when they install these, they put them in but there's no place down river to maybe exit."

She doesn't know when the launch will be installed.

"We're hoping spring. It'd be great if we could have it in before all of our summer events," Glass said. She said this was possible with the help of State Rep. Mike Mueller.

"I think it's great," said Mayor Danielle Cusson. "Just giving someone that added availability and offering the use of our Mill Pond and opening it up to people. Just like it's important for us to have the ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act) accessible bathrooms in our library."

Linden was also able to secure \$15,000 in Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds to make the Linden Mill Library handicap accessible in accordance with the ADA. These funds come through the Genesee

> County Metropolitan Planning Commission.

Improvements include expanding the bathroom to have enough space for someone to maneuver a wheelchair.

Glass is not sure when the improvements will be made. They have not yet

signed the final documents.

The city also secured \$306,025 for a Safe Routes to School grant for 2024, which would go to the development of a non motorized pathway at Stan Eaton Drive and Hyatt Elementary.

"More to come on that. We haven't gotten to the design phase of that just yet, but it looks like the funding has been approved so that's a plus. We're trying to be aggressive with all that stuff and trying to bring money back into the city any way that we possibly can," she said.



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Good Samaritan laws

The story of the Good Samaritan comes to us from the bible. It involves a traveler from the region of Samaria who, out of the goodness of his heart, stopped on a road to help a stranger who had been beaten and robbed.

Fast forward to today and, based on the story, we have what are commonly called, "Good Samaritan" laws.

These laws generally provide that if a person acts in good faith to assist someone in need of emergency care, they will not have civil liability if their actions cause further harm.

Every state and the District of Columbia has a version of this law.

Michigan's law protects a wide range of individuals from liability when they help another in specified emergency situations as long as they aren't "grossly negligent" or engage in "willful or wanton misconduct."

Michigan's original law took effect in 1963.

There is another type of Good Samaritan law, which protects individuals from criminal liability when they call 911 or are presented for medical care regarding a suspected drug overdose. These laws have come into effect more recently with New Mexico being the first state to enact its statute in 2007.

As of 2021, 47 states and the District of Columbia have such laws, including Michigan. Ours was enacted in 2016.

Michigan's statute protects both the individual who overdosed and the individual who seeks help for them.

As to the overdosed individual, for immunity it must be shown that they were incapacitated because of a drug overdose when presented for care and they possess or possessed drugs in an amount sufficient only for personal use.

For the individual who seeks help for the one who overdosed, any evidence of their possession of drugs obtained as a result of their help is not to be considered a violation of the drug possession law.

The rationale for all Good Samaritan laws is to encourage people to help other people and to protect and save lives.

It's north of Grant Street and east of Fenway Drive.

However, the commission tabled the item due to receiving a large amount of information from residents and other parties a few hours before the meeting began.

About a dozen residents spoke against the proposed landscaping business at the Feb. 24 meeting. They mainly have concerns about the concrete recycling operations. However, Dennis said this use is a small portion of his proposed business.

He said there's been a "significant misunderstanding."

"I have proposed a landscape supply yard with a concrete mixer. Some of the people in opposition to my plan have been spreading that this is a 'cement plant' and circulating research relating to cement plants, which are large-scale industrial factories that do have pollution issues. That is 100% not what I have proposed," he said.

The topic will be back on a planning commission agenda once they go through the information and a noise study is completed.

Chairwoman Charity Thompson did not guarantee that it would be on the March agenda because they do not yet know how long everything will take.

Dennis needs multiple approvals before he can build his landscaping business. Fenton has to approve the site plan and special land use permit. From the state of Michigan, the Department of Environment, Great Lakes and Energy (EGLE) has to grant air quality permits and he has to follow state regulations for dust control.

Justin Sprague, vice president of CIB Planning, who is Fenton's planning consultant, said they are requiring the application to submit decibel information on all the equipment he proposes to use at the site.

"Essentially, we'll all need to see a study that verifies the decibel range, and then the city will have to verify that with a third party acoustic engineer for that piece of equipment," he said at the Feb. 24 meeting. "Right now, our current decibel limit for that type of use is about 65 decibels. We have to make sure it stays under that decibel limit. Until we have that third party review, we cannot verify that there would not be excessive noise on the site."

Dennis said there's also significant misunderstanding regarding the scope of recycling activities.

"Certain people opposing my plan appear to think this is a large-scale recycling operation as opposed to a supply yard that periodically processes materials to resell to the public. I proposed a publicfacing, family friendly supply yard that will positively add to the community."

He said his operation incorporates all of the controls required by the State of Michigan and the manufacturers of the machines to avoid dust.

"Due to the technicalities of the local zoning ordinance, the city has asked that I apply for a recycling use permit in order to operate the machine. This is a single small scale mobile machine that can fit on the back of a trailer. It is only used periodically.

"Please note that a significantly larger concrete crushing operation has been operating directly next to the proposed site for years without any complaints on file with the city," Dennis said. Certain people opposing my plan appear to think this is a largescale recycling operation as opposed to a supply yard that periodically processes materials to resell to the public. **77**

sign upgrades and pavement markings where applicable.

The roads selected for the 2022 program are based on the city budgeted funds and recommendations from the Department of Public Works (DPW) staff as well as the OHM team. All of the existing roads are asphalt roads and will be reconstructed and rehabilitated based upon the best fix for each individual road. Limited sections of storm sewer will be repaired or installed to ensure no adverse drainage conditions are created as a result of the project.

Topographic survey work is proposed for all intersections and where pedestrian facilities will need to be updated to be in compliance with ADA standards.

OHM will begin task one — project initiation and obtain information. Task two is preliminary plan development. Task three is final plan development.

It is anticipated that the field work for the design would take place as soon as possible, with design, permitting and bidding following.

construction services for the Mill Pond Dam Maintenance and Repair Project at a cost of \$299,135. Fenton City Council unanimously approved the contract at its meeting Monday, Feb. 28.

Funding will be provided by the Downtown Development Authority (DDA) operating budget.

In March 2021, engineering services for the design and bidding was approved to begin the project, which consists of concrete repairs to the dam walls, raceway walls, structural joint sealing and the installation of a seepage drain system behind the wall located between the dam and the raceway.

Work is to be completed by this fall. While the schedule for the project's start date is not determined, the work itself is estimated to take 30 days to in order to be eligible for the Trustee Scholarship award. Scholarships are given to students based on academic achievement as well as demonstrated leadership abilities and community engagement activities. Additionally, student recipients must have graduated high school by June 28, 2021 in order to be eligible.

To be eligible, students must:

•Graduate from high school by June 28 of 2021

•Have a minimum cumulative grade point average of 3.0 or better

•Enroll at MCC in the academic year immediate following high school graduation (Fall 2021)

Scholarship requirements include: •Attending the Trustee Scholars orientation event

•Enrolling full-time in both the fall and winter semesters

•Enrolling in one Honors course in the first semester

Dan Brisson, the Department of Public Works director, wrote a Feb. 16 memo to City Manager Lynn Markland indicating that city staff and OHM recommend the project be awarded to Pullman SST, Inc., the low bidder.

The DDA approved funding for this project at its Feb. 15 meeting.

House Bill 4195: Delay divorce filing publication until defendant served

To establish that when a person files for a divorce the court may not make the filing available to the public until the defendant has been served with or received notice of the complaint. or until 92 days have passed, whichever comes first.

House Bill 4084: Revise fines for illegal garbage dumping

To make it a misdemeanor punishable by fines up to \$2,500 for unauthorized dumping of between 3 cubic feet and 5 cubic yards of refuse or trash, with the fine going up by another \$2,500 for each subsequent offense. Employers would be potentially liable, and offenders could also be ordered to clean up the mess. Under current law, this is a civil not criminal offense.

House Bill 5058: Exempt industrial hemp from food adulterant list

To amend a section of the state food law that deals with adulterated food.

House Bill 5304: Authorize "robobartenders"

To authorize and create a comprehensive regulatory regime for the use of "robo-bartender" dispensing machines for beer, wine and mixed drinks that are located at a customer's table or with use of a secure "key card" in other parts of establishments with a liquor license, including restaurants, certain hotel rooms and more. The machines could not dispense more than 96 ounces in a single order, or dispense spirituous liquor "straight." Customers would still have to place the order with a human staff member, and staff members would still be required to monitor the service.

Senate Bill 768: Cut state income tax rate

To cut the state income tax rate from 4.25% to 3.9% starting Jan. 1, 2022; authorize a \$600 nonrefundable tax credit for dependents age 18 and below; and reduce the corporate income tax from 6.0% to 3.9%. The bill would also increase the annual income tax deduction allowed for individuals age 67 and above from \$20,000 to \$30,000, and for couples from \$40,000 to \$60,000.

ing police and fire protection services, equipment and services.

Council approved placing the millage question on the ballot on Monday, Jan. 31.

They are also asking residents to amend the city's charter because Section 8.2 states, "... an ad valorem tax levy for general municipal purposes shall not exceed 13.5 mills on all real and personal assessed property values in the city."

An indefinite 5-mill millage would push them over the limit. Currently, Linden imposes 10.1316 mills on residents, and they are expecting to roll this back due to the Headlee Amendment.

The charter revision, if approved by voters, would include language that gives an exception to this rule for certain levies including: "any levy for paying principal and interest on outstanding general obligation bonds; (b) any other levies authorized by law to be made beyond charter tax rate limitations; or (c) an additional levy of 5 mills upon the taxable value of all real and personal property in the city to be used solely for the purpose of providing police and fire protection operations, equipment and services."

Linden attorney Michael Gildner has been in contact with the state's attorney general's office, which must give approval before the city places a charter amendment question on the ballot. Council originally wanted to place these two question on the May ballot and potentially begin the levy in July 2022. However, the attorney general's office did not approve the request prior to the deadline to place it on the May ballot.

The vote will take place in August.

The resolution states, "the City Council believes it is in the best interests of the City to authorize a permanent levy of 5.0 mills to take effect in 2022, which fixed amount would be dedicated solely for the purpose of providing police and fire protection operations, equipment and services."

At the Jan. 31 meeting, City Manager Ellen Glass spoke about the difficulties in finding funds to work on capital improvement projects, such as the water project, roads, and the city facilities that are getting older and require maintenance. Police and fire services are constant expenses the city is mandated to pay for.

Linden spends approximately \$782,150 for police and fire out of the general fund every year. Having a dedicated police and fire millage would free up that general fund money to be used for other capital improvement projects.

Multiple councilors spoke about using more funds on roads.
