Sections of Fenton area lose power

Consumers Energy map showed 3,600 customers in isolated outage

Fenton—Morethan 3,600 Consumers Energy customers lost power Monday evening, May 16. Those affected span as far west as the customers on the east side of Lake Ponemah to as far east for those along N. LeRoy Street and N. Fenton Road.

Terry DeDoes, senior public information director for Consumers Energy, said the power interruption at the West Fenton Substation began at approximately 9 p.m.,

Monday, May 16. He said Monday night Consumers Energy crews patrolled and found what they thought was the cause of the electric interruption.

"They trimmed trees away from the lines but found when they re-energized the system, the power did not come back on for customers," he said. "So crews continued their investigation.

"We now (Tuesday morning) have two forestry crews working to clear trees away from lines in another area and have an estimated time of restoration of 11 a.m. for the 3,264 customers affected by the outage caused by trees." Power was fully restored at 11:35 a.m. See outage map on page 11.


This is the second year for the workshop and exhibit. Thirteen students participated this year. The exhibit will be on display from May 14 to May 21.



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THE SUPREME COURT LEAKS

On May 2, the publication "Politico" released a 98-page secretly leaked draft opinion written by United States Supreme Court Justice Samuel Alito in the case of Dobbs v Jackson Women's Health Organization.

The opinion had the votes of five justices and would overturn the 1973 Roe v Wade case, which held that there is a constitutional right to an abortion.

The reaction has been both positive and negative.

I won't go into all of the specifics except to say that there have been protests, editorials, and a call for an investigation by Chief Justice John Roberts as to who was responsible.

Unfortunately, this isn't the first time that the Supreme Court has had leaks as to deliberations and decisions and the following are some notable examples.

In the 1852 case of Pennsylvania v Wheeling and Belmont Bridge Company, the New York Tribune published the court's ruling 10 days before it was released. When the case returned to the court in 1854, the Tribune published the ruling ahead

of time again.

In the 1857 Dred Scott slavery case, the deliberations were also leaked.

The suspected source of all three leaks was Justice John McLean.

In 1919, a law clerk to Justice Joseph McKenna was indicted for leaking a pending decision to Wall Street traders.

He wasn't convicted as the witness against him had his own legal issues, but the evidence against him was very strong.

During the 1970s and 1980s, there were a number of leaks including some of the Watergate cases and some civil cases.

Ironically, one of them was Roe v Wade when the final decision was leaked to Time Magazine and, due to a delay, published before its official release by the court.

More recently, there have been leaks as to Chief Justice Roberts switching his votes in the 2012 "Obamacare" decision upholding the statute and a 2019 opinion as to the propriety of a citizenship question on the 2020 census.

The Dobbs leak is unprecedented as it involves the release of an entire written opinion. The chief justice has called this an "egregious breach of trust" and "absolutely appalling." He vows that it will not affect the work of the court in any way.

A final decision in Dobbs is expected by the end of June.

House Bill 5968: Create state "opioid healing and recovery fund"

To create a segregated state account ("fund") to hold money extracted from pharmaceutical companies in lawsuits related to their sales of opioid pain killers, and spend it in a manner consistent with the "judgment, settlement, or compromise of claims" in legal settlements with certain drug producers (called the "Janssen settlement" and the "National Prescription Opiate Litigation"). Passed 89 to 10 in the House

Senate Bill 627: Adopt another remonumentation of Michigan-Indiana state line plan

To create a Michigan-Indiana state line commission comprised of the county surveyors of Berrien, Cass. St. Joseph, Branch, and Hillsdale counties, to oversee a survey and remonumentation of the Michigan-Indiana state line. This would be paid for from an existing state account that collects fees on recording deeds. It would be the eighth law passed in the past 20 years related to this task. Passed 99 to 0 in the House

Senate Bill 258: Mandate newspapers post printed legal notices on free website

To require a newspaper in which government legal notices are published

to also place these on a section of a website that can be accessed at no charge. Note: Before the internet, even most small communities had daily or weekly newspapers, and state laws required them to publish certain local government notices to the public, for which they were paid. As the 21st century advances. these laws have been modified to reflect changes in technology and the newspaper industry, with some changes opposed by newspapers previously paid to run the notices.

Passed 61 to 38 in the House

I will let you know how the doctor's trip goes next week. (Yeah, I haven't been there yet.)



Katie Badgley became branch librarian at the Linden Library in the summer of 2020.

From the Genesee District Library:

"The Linden Library has been located in the historic Linden Mill since 1961. Built around 1850, the mill was the first structure in Genesee County to be placed on the national register of historic places. The grist mill operated until 1956 and later was purchased by the village of Linden (now city) for use as municipal offices and a future library. The library was previously located in the Linden Village Hall from 1941-1961 and in a school basement from 1937-1941.

The library was founded in 1937 by a group of citizens and run by a rotating volunteer staff until 1941 when Decola Jepson became the first librarian. In 1944 the library became associated with the recently formed Genesee County Library system (which provided the librarian's salary and some books) while remaining otherwise independent. In 1961, shortly after moving into the mill, the library became a full member of the county system.

In 1979, Genesee County Library became Genesee District Library, an independent entity, when voters approved a .7 mill property assessment. In 1984, the Linden Library was the first GDL branch to go online."


