■Supported by \$250,000 grant, facility to generate investment of \$4 million, create 59 new jobs in city

On Monday, June 13, the Michigan Economic Development Corporation (MEDC) announced two business expansion projects expected to create 68 new jobs and generate a total private investment of \$7.7 million in Cadillac and Fenton City. The two projects have received support from the Michigan Strategic Fund.

■93-acre, 395-home development proposed off Fish Lake and Quick roads

Holly Township is considering Riverside Village, a proposed 93acre, four-phase development north of Grange Hall Road, east of Fish Lake Road and south of Quick Road. Developers say it will be a lively, walkable community with a commitment to fostering the small-town community fabric of Holly Township. It would offer 395 homes.

The project applicant/developer is S-HQZ, LLC and Silverman Holly Properties, LLC. Jim Eppink, of J







Bastille Day Race set for July 9 in Fenton

■Proceeds to benefit Genesee County Habitat for Humanity

The 20th annual Bastille Day Race presented by Foundation Systems of Michigan will take place July 9 in downtown Fenton. The event features three timed races: the 15K run, the 5K run and the 5K walk. The 15K starting time is at 7:45 a.m. and the 5K run is at 8 a.m., with the 5K walk immediately following.

The hilly and challenging 15K starts in front of CRUST on Caroline Street and then heads south through the city of Fenton. Runners loop south to Runyan Lake, then head back toward Fenton, braving the notorious Denton Hill on the very last part of the race. With Denton Hill being as tough or tougher than the infamous Bradley Hills of the Crim race, many runners use the Bastille 15K as a prep for the 10-mile Crim, which takes place in August.

"We've heard the response from people since the first time we had the Bastille 15K that it was extremely challenging, but they really loved it," said Mark Hamel, one of the founders of the race. "If you can do the Bastille

Oakland County's Bouchard named 'Sheriff of the Year'

Oversees more than 1,400 employees, annual budget of over \$166 million

Oakland County Sheriff Michael J. Bouchard was named the 2022 "Sheriff of the Year" by the Michigan Sheriffs' Association. He received the award Sunday in Bay City before more than 200 attendees at the association's annual awards dinner. He was named Sheriff of the Year in 2016 by the National Sheriffs' Association, becoming the first sheriff in Michigan to receive both the state and national awards.

"I'm very humbled and honored to receive this award," Bouchard said. "But I view this as more a reflection of the skill and dedication demonstrated every day by our team at the Oakland County Sheriff's Office than by me as an individual. It's a tremendous honor I share with the entire staff and I'm very grateful. An award from your peers or coworkers means a great deal because they know the demands of the profession."

The award recognizes a sheriff who has made outstanding contributions to law enforcement and the criminal justice profession, demonstrates exceptional service to their community, and has contributed to the betterment of the Michigan Sheriffs' Association.

Now in his sixth term, Bouchard is the longest serving sheriff in Oakland County history, having been appointed on Jan. 11, 1999, to succeed the late Sheriff John F. Nichols. Bouchard runs one of the largest Sheriff's Offices in the country, overseeing more than 1,400 employees and an annual budget of more than \$166 million.


Under his leadership, the sheriff's office has grown in size and scope, providing the primary law enforcement services for 15 communities and more than 350,000 of Oakland County's 1.2 million residents. It has

its own Forensic Science and DNA Lab, a Computer Crimes Unit, a newly created Technology Unit as well as canine, aviation, motorcycle and bicycle patrol units, community policing and mental health programs.

The sheriff's office received national acclaim for its handling of the tragic shooting at Oxford High School in 2021. Within minutes of their arrival at the school, deputies neutralized the threat and took the gunman into custody, likely saving many more lives as deputies recovered 18 unspent rounds.

Bouchard is the recipient of more than 50 awards and honors from various law enforcement, civic and government organizations.

Bouchard is a former Michigan legislator, having been elected to serve in both the House and Senate. He is a graduate of Michigan State University, the U.S. Secret Service Dignitary Protection Program, the FBI National Executive Institute Program, and the National Sheriff's Institute.

■City to hold open house at Fenton Community & Cultural Center on June 22

The city of Fenton will host a Local Road Program open house in the Van Gilder Room of the Fenton Community & Cultural Center, 150 S. LeRoy St., on Wednesday, June 22, from 5 to 7:30 p.m.

General information about the scope of work and timing of this year's work will be discussed. City leaders invite residents to meet city staff and the city's engineering team that will oversee this year's project. Light refreshments will be served.

About the program:

Year one of the Local Road Program will reconstruct First, Second, Third,

Fourth, Sixth, N. Oak, Thurber and N. Howard streets. Critical sewer repairs on Walnut Street near Second Street and sewer repairs are included, as this infrastructure is located under the streets.

Several existing combined sewers will be brought up to standard, and manholes and storm drains will be repaired.

Sidewalk-at-street intersections will be updated to meet current standards. Replacement street signs and pavement markings are included in the project.

The contractor is Waldorf and Sons, Inc., of Mt. Morris.

Staging and underground excavation work is planned to start as early as the week of June 27 with substantial completion by Nov. 15. Depending on weather, final grading and lawn restoration may be completed in spring of 2023.

No detour route is planned. The contractor and site supervisor will advise each homeowner when driveway access will be limited or restricted as work progresses though the project area.

Upon arrival, deputies made contact with the parents of the female. From their investigation, deputies learned that the female had been communicating on social media with a male from Sterling Heights. Other sources reported the female was still in the area. On June 12, sheriff's detectives went to Sterling Heights and made contact with Sterling Heights Police Department. The female was later found in a mobile home community in Sterling Heights. Detectives interviewed the boyfriend who was later released to the custody of his parents. The female was transported back to her home where she was released back to her parents.

Grand Blanc Township pulls out of project

■Construction expected to begin this year on \$11.2 million Thompson Road Corridor water project

Grand Blanc Township has pulled out of the Thompson Road Corridor Watermain Project, which will reduce costs for Fenton and Mundy townships.

The Fenton Township Board of Trustees approved the new agreement Tuesday, June 7.

Originally, the three municipalities entered into an agreement with Genesee County in April to construct a water main and an elevated water tank along the Thompson Road Corridor in Fenton Township.

Genesee County maintains the Genesee County Water Supply System. The "Southern Loop" provides water to the townships of Davison, Flint, Flushing, Genesee, Grand Blanc, Mt. Morris, Mundy and Vienna, and the cities of Burton, Mt. Morris, and Swartz Creek.

The Genesee County Board of Commissioners authorized the expansion of the water supply district to include the entirety of Fenton Township.

Phase one initially entailed running a water line down Baldwin Road to connect to an existing Grand Blanc Town-

ship line. With Grand Blanc Township no longer participating, the updated plans include connecting to an existing Mundy Township line on Fenton Road. This will reduce the total length of new water line to be constructed, which reduces the total estimated cost. The project also includes the construction of a 0.5 MG elevated water storage tank.

The initial estimated cost of the project is \$12,464,365.

On Oct. 13, 2021, the Genesee County Board of Commissioners allocated \$6.5 million county American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds to this water infrastructure project. Initially, the three townships were responsible for allocating the remainder, which is \$5,964,365.

- Fenton Township (69%): \$4,115,411
- Mundy Township (25%): \$1,491,091
- •GrandBlancTownship(6%):\$357,861

John O'Brien, director of the Division of Water and Waste Services at the Genesee County Drain Commissioner's Office, wrote to the board that with Grand Blanc pulling out of the agreement, they lose direct access to the water tower on Holly Road. This will limit the number of connections onto the system until a new water tower is in service.

City applies for road funding grants

■Funds would help improve Hickory Street and W. Rolston Road

On Monday, June 13, Linden City Council approved applying for two grants to help fix two local roads.

The two Transportation Economic Development Category B grants are available through the Michigan Department of Transportation. They can be used for the reconstruction or maintenance of local or major roads.

The deadline to submit an application was June 15.

These grants are available for small cities with a population of fewer than 10,000 people. They are matching

grants with a maximum limit of \$250,000. If approved, Linden can do a project of \$500,000 or more and received a grant for \$250,000 to offset project costs. If approved, the funds would be available in the 2023 construction season.

The letter from Manager Ellen Glass and Department of Public Works Director Don Grice states that staff identified two roads that could be designated for this grant:

- Hickory Street from Bridge to Broad
- W. Rolston Road from Bridge Street to the west side of Beach Buggy Lane

Grice said they expect to hear in August if Linden will receive the grants.

Eppink Partners, Inc. of Clarkston, presented the Riverside Village development to the planning commission on Tuesday, June 7.

The applicant would have to have a special land use request and site plan approved by the township.

The proposed four-phase development provides a substantially similar, but updated site plan from the original Riverside Village neighborhood that was previously approved by Holly Township in 2007. That development was never constructed because of the economic downturn that soon followed.

According to Eppink, Riverside Village would incorporate the vision, intent and principles of the Holly Township Master Plan 2040, which identifies this location as the Rural Town Center of the community with the goal of creating an interconnected neighborhood of "small lot, higher

intensity, affordable residential and missed use commercial" uses.

Site plans have been updated based on feedback from the township and developer's meeting in April. Enhancements include additional circulation and connections between the four phases, direct connections to Quick Road, reorientation of the commercial uses, additional sidewalks and pedestrian linkages, reduction in single family and multi-family density and the addition of a 6.5-acre central community nature park with walking trails.

Riverside Village's proposed development is comprised of four interconnected phases — three residential and one commercial. The phases may be developed individually or concurrently and will not necessarily be developed in sequential order based on their phase number as presented on the site plan.

Under consideration is phase one, which is 48.2 acres and 145 homes. Phase two would be 10.14 acres and 26 homes. Phase three would be 30.5 acres with 224 garden-style leased

apartment homes. Phase four would be 4.84 acres and space for 25,500 square feet of retail/restaurant.

Riverside Village sits within the existing water and sewer district immediately adjacent to the western boundary of the village of Holly. According to the developer's proposal, "The purpose of the township water and sewer district is to permit the extension of sewer facilities form the village of Holly into the township in order to permit higher intensity development that requires these services while providing the opportunity to preserve natural features," (Holly Township Master Plan 2040). The village of Holly would provide water and sanitary sewer.

Karin Winchester, clerk and zoning administrator for Holly Township, said that the applicant will be making changes per concerns from the June 7 meeting and will be resubmitting an updated site plan for review by the planning commission. A public hearing will then be scheduled to gain input from residents.

Township increases election worker pay

■Election inspectors will receive \$200, chairperson \$250

Fenton Township election workers will receive an increase in compensation.

On Tuesday, June 7, the Fenton Township Board of Trustees unanimously voted to increase pay for election workers.

An election chairperson will now make \$250 instead of \$200, and election inspectors will receive \$200 instead of \$150. Workers also will be paid \$25 for training.

"Townships and cities are finding it's hard to get trained election workers or even untrained election workers," said Clerk Robert Krug.

After doing a survey and researching the compensation other neighboring municipalities pay to election workers, Fenton Township officials discovered theirs was lower comparatively. Krug also proposed to pay workers for training. "I certainly support it," said Supervisor Vince Lorraine. "I think, especially with what's going on with elections these days and all the controversy surrounding it, that having well trained and fairly compensated ... people looking over our elections is very important."

The new pay scale will increase the salary cost of a large election by \$2,000-2,500, according to meeting minutes. The estimated cost increase relating to the training pay would be around \$2,000 every other year. The last increase to election worker compensation was in 2012 and this proposed increase would bring the pay rates more into line with other communities.

The city of Fenton pays election chairpersons \$235 and Linden pays \$10 per hour plus \$25. For election inspectors, Fenton pays \$205 and Linden pays \$10 an hour. Both cities pay workers \$25 for training.

Township and Mundy Township. The estimated cost of the project is now \$11,273,224. Fenton Township and Mundy Township are responsible for paying \$4,773,224. Fenton Township will now pay \$3,508,319 and Mundy Township will pay \$1,264,904.

"It really doesn't affect the project. The only thing is that in phase one, with Grand Blanc's participation, we were going to tap into one of their towers so we would have pressure," said Supervisor Vince Lorraine. They expect construction to begin this year. The system may not be fully operational until the fall of 2023 or the spring of 2024.

American Recreational Products' facility in Owosso has reached its capacity with no options to expand. The company has identified an existing facility in the city of Fenton that can accommodate its existing business as well as a new fiberglass product line.

Michael Hart, assistant city manager and executive direction of the Fenton Downtown Development Authority (DDA), said the new business would be located in the city's Business and Technology Park.

Hart said this week's announcement was somewhat of a surprise to him and the city. He said there had been talk about the possibility of the businesses expanding in Fenton, but there had not been anything official until now. He added, "It's awesome, very good news."

The project is expected to generate a total capital investment of \$4 million and create 59 jobs, supported by a \$250,000 Michigan Business Development Program performance-based grant.

According to National Composites, American Recreational Products in Fenton will soon be manufacturing Paddle Wheeler Pedal Boats and BOKA e-boats.

American Recreational Products employs many veterans and uses local schools to reach talent in disadvantaged areas and underrepresented employees.

The city of Fenton anticipates approval of a five-year Industrial Facilities Tax Abatement in support of the project. Individuals interested in careers with American Recreational Products should visit https://nationalcomposites.com/careers/.

Due to supply chain overseas, Rexair is bringing manufacturing of certain products back home to Michigan. Rexair plans to expand at its facility in the city of Cadillac, where it will install nine new injection molding machines. 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Flag Day event inspires young patriotism

Fenton — With the sun shining, the American flag blowing in the wind behind the platform, and members of the VFW present, the I Pledge Project event at Uncle Ray's Dairyland was certainly a patriotic affair Tuesday, June 14.

It commemorates the historic date of June 14, 1777, when the Second Continental Congress passed a resolution stating that "the flag of the United States be 13 stripes, alternate red and white," and that "the union be 13 stars, white in a blue field, representing a new constellation," according to history.com.

In 1916, President Woodrow Wilson officially established June 14 as Flag Day.

Holly police chief issues updated motorcycle awareness guide

It's unofficially summer, and a friendly reminder to shift into motor-cycle awareness mode.

Holly Police Chief Jerry Narsh asks that all motorists take a moment to consider some scary and some interesting data that tells us cycle riders and crash statistics are changing — and we have some simple safety ideas to help mentally look for motorcycles before we pull out or turn.

Crash facts and data

In 2020, 5,579 people died in motorcycle crashes, 82,528 motorcyclists were injured nationwide according to a National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) report.

Motorcyclists were about 28 times more likely than passenger car occupants to die in a crash per vehicle mile traveled and five times more likely to be injured.



Now that nice weather is here in Michigan, all motorists are reminded to be aware of motorcyclists and to share the road with possibly their friends and family members.

- Majority of fatal crashes are a result of impact with passenger cars.
- 79% of all fatalities involved alcohol.
- 36% of riders killed in crashes did not have a valid motorcycle license.
- Michigan has the 13th highest rider fatalities in the USA with 152 killed and 2,429 injured in 2020. California is the highest with 474.

Changing data on who is riding

Older motorcyclists account for more than half of all motorcyclist fatalities. NHTSA data show that 56 percent of motorcyclists killed in crashes were age 40 or over. The number of motorcyclists age 40 and over killed in crashes increased by 63 percent from 2003 to 2020. In contrast, fatalities among young motorcyclists have declined, relative to other age groups.

Ten things all car and truck drivers should know about motorcycles

- Over half of all fatal motorcycle crashes involve another vehicle. Most of the time, the car or truck driver, not the motorcyclist, is at fault. There are a lot more cars and trucks than motorcycles on the road, and some drivers don't recognize a motorcycle, they ignore it (usually unintentionally.)
- Because of its narrow profile, a motorcycle can be easily hidden in a car's blind spots (door/roof pillars) or masked by objects or backgrounds outside a car (bushes, fences, bridges,

and more). Take an extra moment to look for motorcycles, whether you're changing lanes or turning at intersections

- Because of its small size, a motorcycle may look farther away than it is. It may also be difficult to judge a motorcycle's speed. When checking traffic to turn at an intersection or into (or out of) a driveway, predict a motorcycle is closer than it looks.
- Motorcyclists often slow by downshifting or merely rolling off the throttle, thus not activating the brake light. Allow more following distance, say 3 or 4 seconds. At intersections, predict a motorcyclist may slow down without visual warning.
- Motorcyclists often adjust position within a lane to be seen more easily and to minimize the effects of road debris, passing vehicles, and wind. Understand that motorcyclists adjust lane position for a purpose, not to be reckless or show off or to allow you to share the lane with them.
- Turn signals on a motorcycle usually are not self-canceling, thus some riders (especially beginners) sometimes forget to turn them off after a turn or lane change. Make sure a motorcycle's signal is for real.
- Maneuverability is one of a motorcycle's better characteristics, especially at slower speeds and with good road conditions, but don't expect a motorcyclist to always be able to dodge out of the way.
- Stopping distance for motorcycles is nearly the same as for cars, but slippery pavement makes stopping quickly difficult. Allow more following distance behind a motorcycle because you can't always "stop on a dime."
- When a motorcycle is in motion, see more than the motorcycle see the person under the helmet who could be your friend, neighbor, or relative.
- If a driver crashes into a motorcyclist, bicyclist, or pedestrian and causes serious injury, the driver would likely never forgive himself/ herself.

Narsh thanks motorists and reminds everyone to be aware of others and share the road.



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

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

Senate Bill 166: Let pharmacists fill more out-of-state prescriptions
To establish that a pharmacist who receives a prescription from an advanced practice registered nurse prescriber or physician's assistant prescriber in another

assistant prescriber in another state or Canada may dispense the drug or device without determining whether the prescriber has the correct licenses. Under current law, Michigan pharmacists may fill such prescriptions written by out-of-state doctors, dentists and veterinarians.

Passed 103 to 0 in the House Rep. Bob Bezotte (R-Dist. 47) Rep. Mike Mueller (R-Dist. 51)

House Bill 4375: Authorize more "double dipping" by pensioned ex-teachers

To permit public school teachers and other staff who retire and begin collecting a pension to return to work in a school district and claim both a paycheck and a pension check if at least 12 months have passed since the "retirement." Under current law, with some exceptions for hard-to-fill positions, retirees who "double dip" get reduced benefits. The bill would also repeal a requirement that a school district must pay the unfunded pension benefit liability contributions associated with employing a retired teacher. Also, it would extend for 10 years a 2021 sunset on allowing retirees to fill certain high-demand positions and collect both a paycheck and full pension check. Passed 102 to 1 in the House YES Rep. House Bill 4077: Restrict regulations on unattended self-service gas stations

To prohibit state regulators from requiring unattended self-service gas stations to install measures to prevent public access, including locked dispensers, security fencing or other measures. The bill would instead require daily inspections by an owner or operator, emergency shut-off switches, surveillance cameras, fire extinguishers and more.

Senate Bill 884: Ban use of non-U.S. made voting machines in Michigan





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Brawl highlights 1968 Tigers' first west coast trip

The west coast road trip.

It has meant doom to many Tiger teams. The 1968 Tigers began a 10-game road trip at Minnesota on May 20th, two games ahead of the second-place Cleveland Indians. After that, would come three against the Oakland Athletics and four against the California Angels.

The trip began just fine, and with the Tigers doing what they did best in 1968 — win a thriller. Trailing at one time 3-0, the Tigers bounced back to score two in the fourth and one in the top of the ninth, forcing a 3-3 tie and extra innings.

The run in the ninth came on a lead-off home run by Willie Horton to deep right field of Twins' starter Jim Merritt. Then, in the 10th, Al Kaline reached base on an error and scored on another Twins' error off a batted ball by Bill Freehan, giving the Tigers a 4-3 lead. In the bottom of the 10th, Denny McLain did something you never see today. He continued to pitch and got the Twins out in order for the complete-game victory.

From there, the trip to Minneapolis hit a snag, and so did the Tigers' bats. Twins' pitcher Dean Chance tossed a four-hitter in the second game, leading the Twins to a 3-1 win. Rich Rollins hit a two-run single in the eighth to break a 1-1 tie. On May 22, the Tigers made an eighth-inning comeback to tie the game at 3-all, only to see the Twins score a run in the bottom of the eighth to get the 4-3 victory. However, Tony Olivia hit the game-winning double to earn the Twins the victory. Don Wert hit two home runs in the loss.

The Oakland series started with a 2-2 tie. The game eventually was halted by rain in the seventh, maintaining the official-game tie.

A day later, McLain tossed a six-hitter, as the Tigers snuck away with a 2-1 victory. Kaline was hit by a pitch, and the man who was called "Mr. Tiger" was placed on the disabled list.

A hit batter created one of the most memorable games of the season during the final game of the series with Oakland. A brawl broke out when Jim

Northrup was hit in the batter's helmet by a pitch by Oakland pitcher Jack Aker.

"Fifty players and coaches went at each other with fist and foot — like two cavemen armies and it took 15 minutes to restore order," said one account of the fight in The Sporting News.

After being hit, the report said Northrup staggered to his feet, appeared ready to head to first, but then charged Aker. That started the riot on the field, with most of the Tigers' players getting there first and apparently doing most of the damage. "There were more fights in the infield than could be watched at once," the TSN report suggested.

Aker was taken out of the game with five spike marks on his right leg, a bruised eye and a cut lip.

"I told him I didn't intend to hit him, and I told him I was just trying to brush him back," Aker said he told Northrup.

The Tigers lost what was an entertaining game, but probably felt secondary to the fight. Detroit lost 7-6 in 10 innings.

The road trip ended with the Tigers taking three-of-four games against California. Detroit lost the first game 7-6 in 12 innings, but the Tigers' Eddie Mathews hit back-to-back home runs in the contest, bringing his career total to 512, sixth on the all-time list ahead of Mel Ott's 511.

Tigers have made it as far as a state quarterfinal game. The last time was in 2007 when the Tigers competed at the D2 level. That squad played Monroe in the quarterfinals and lost a tough 2-0 verdict.

Finally, the Tigers had to deal with their share of adversity. There was a slow start to the season that saw them begin with a 5-8 record. That start included being swept in a Metro League doubleheader by rivals Holly Bronchos.

The season also saw Ken Brant relieved of the head coaching position. Tome Bertschy, who was part of Brant's staff was named interim head coach, starting with a twinbill against Holly on May 16. The squad was able to adjust to the changes, and finished the rest of the regular season with a 7-1 record.

After that the squad had the confidence to begin the postseason. The Tigers won a district title by crushing Swartz Creek and Flushing, advancing to the regional tournament in Grand Blanc. The Tigers saw their season end

in the regional championship contest a year ago, but earned the crown this year with a 4-2 win against Midland and a 2-1 victory against Grand Blanc.

I've learned how to react in different ways, depending on who I'm talking to with the girls. ... I've learned how to talk to a wider range of people, and I'm very thankful for the girls. I've made connections with all of them and different kinds of connections with each of them, which I think is really important."

The season's ups and downs were a learning experience for Best as well.

"I've definitely become more of a leader in the past year," Best said. "Having four seniors (Lauren Miller and Jordyn Bommersbach were the other two seniors on the team) all together working as a team so we'd have strong leadership was huge. I think I really developed some leadership abilities."


The future remains bright


