Parents: DEA issues warning for 'rainbow fentanyl'

Brightly colored pills, powder targeted toward young people are lethal

The Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) is advising the public of an alarming emerging trend of colorful fentanyl available across the United

States. In August, DEA and law enforcement partners began seizing brightly colored fentanyl and fentanyl pills in 18 states. Dubbed "rainbow fentanyl" in the media, this trend appears to be a new method used by drug cartels to sell highly addictive and potentially deadly fentanyl made to look like candy to children and young people.

"Rainbow fentanyl, fentanyl pills

and powder that come in a variety of bright colors, shapes and sizes, is a deliberate effort by drug traffickers to drive addiction amongst kids and young adults," said DEA Administrator Anne Milgram. "The men and women of the DEA are relentlessly working to stop the trafficking of rainbow and defeat the Mexican drug cartels that are responsible





Paddle boat manufacturer expanding to Fenton

Company expected to bring 59 jobs to city

Fenton — American Recreational Products, which manufactures paddle boats, is coming to Fenton.

On Thursday, Aug. 25, the Fenton Planning Commission approved the site plan for the approximate 30,725-squarefoot facility to be built at 130 N. Alloy Drive.

The land is zoned industrial and is currently undeveloped.

Along with paddle boats, ARP also manufactures playground equipment, outdoor fitness courses, shade and shelter structures and more. The company is a subsidiary of National Composites, which makes composites and plastics for John Deere, Navistar, Crest Marine, Avalon Pontoons and more.

The project is expected to generate a total capital investment of \$4 million and create 59 jobs, supported by a \$250,000 Michigan Business Development Program performance-based grant. Michigan was chosen for the project

over competing sites in Minnesota and Missouri, according to a press release from Gov. Gretchen Whitmer's office.

ARP is expected to ask the city for a five-year Industrial Facilities Tax Abatement.

Justin Sprague, vice president of CIB Planning, Fenton's planning consultant, said the commission had a few comments and revisions when the company submitted a site plan last month. They submitted a revised site plan in August. ARP also received a variance from the zoning board of appeals in order to include an overhead door facing N. Alloy Drive. Sprague said they were mostly in compliance. They had concerns about what material the outside of the building would be constructed from and if the architectural characteristics would match the other buildings in the area.

ARP will utilize an underground storm water management system.

Sprague recommended approval with a number of conditions relating to approval from the zoning board of appeals for specific variances, the building materials, certain architectural features, a revised landscaping plan that met U.S. 23 buffer requirements, signage and a few other topics.

Patrick Fenton, a representative from ARP and National Composites, said they're going to expand their at-capacity paddle boat business in Owosso to Fenton. He plans to work with the city on the buffer and other requirements.

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

Affected by Ford Mo. Co. Cuts? Your Best Road is Right Ahead

With the recent memo sent out by Executive Chair Bill Ford and Jim Farley, Ford Motor Company announced it will cut up to 3,000 salaried jobs, with a 'significant' portion of that number in Michigan. Are affected



When you face losing your job, you face the reality of losing your identity, salary, and work colleagues - many of which have become like family. This can be stressful and calls for clear headed thinking.

Will I be able to find meaningful work to provide for my family? Could I retire? Is this a calling to pursue an old passion or choose a different path? Perhaps you may take the road less traveled. Decisions will need to be made that requires forward thinking. This is not the end of the world.

Here are a few things you may want to be thinking about if you are affected by the unexpected layoff.

Take the high road. Think about your situation and what you are really pursuing in life. Assess your assets and spending. While you are likely to receive a severance package, this is a great opportunity for you to forge deeply into your current situation, seek counsel and plan for your long-term goals.

Call a trusted family member, a mentor, and your financial advisor. Get their perspective if you are having butterflies on where to turn next. If you do not have a trusted advisor, this is a perfect opportunity to meet with one.

Healthcare, Retirement Pension Benefits, 401(k) Savings Plans, Employer Stock Savings Plans, and Life Insurance are all necessary items which you must consider. Do not wait until decisions are rushed. While you may not have to decide on what to do with each of these items at first, you will want to map out what things will look like in the future.

Healthcare coverage.One of the first challenges

in a layoff is your loss of healthcare coverage. While some employees may be able to go on to a spousal plan, others may need to research the best coverage for this moment in time. You may be able to go on a traditional short-term Cobra plan if you are job searching. Not sure if you are Medicare eligible yet? Look for a good agent that can help you with your Medicare eligibility, benefits, and timing. If you are over 65 you will need to transition to a Medicare plan if Ford does not offer you a lifetime benefit. for the vast majority of the fentanyl that is being trafficked in the United States."

Brightly colored fentanyl is being seized in multiple forms, including pills, powder and blocks that resembles sidewalk chalk. Despite claims that certain colors may be more potent than others, there is no indication through DEA's laboratory testing that this is the case. Every color, shape and size of fentanyl should be considered extremely dangerous.

Fentanyl is a synthetic opioid that is 50 times more potent than heroin and 100 times more potent than morphine. Just two milligrams of fentanyl, which is equal to 10-15 grains of table salt, is considered a lethal dose. Without laboratory testing, there is no way to know how much fentanyl is concentrated in a pill or powder.

Fentanyl remains the deadliest drug threat facing this country. According to the Centers of Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), 107,622 Americans died of drug overdoses in 2021, with 66% of those deaths related to synthetic opioids like fentanyl. Drug poisonings are the leading killer of Americans between the ages of 18 and 45. Fentanyl available in the United States is primarily supplied by two drug networks, the Sinaloa Cartel and the Jalisco New Generation Cartel (CJNG).

In September 2021, DEA launched the One Pill Can Kill Public Awareness Campaign to educate Americans about the dangers of fake pills. Additional resources for parents and the community can be found on the DEA's Fentanyl Awareness page.

Acting Fenton Police Chief Jeff Cross said the first thing to remember is to not touch the suspected drug.

"Fentanyl is very dangerous and just a minor exposure can cause serious health complications and in some cases even death," Cross said. "Call 911 if someone is in possession of or has ingested fentanyl. Time is of the essence.

"If someone has touched the suspected fentanyl, they should immediately wash their hands prior to touching their mouth, nose, or eyes."

Cross added that as law enforcement, they've have been dealing with it for several years.

"It's so dangerous that we have been advised not to field test suspected fentanyl and to only send it to the lab for analysis," he said.

orty-five years in operation has cemented the name Adopt-A-Pet into the hearts and minds of everyone in the Fenton area. It's a nonprofit animal center that operates on eight acres of land in Fenton Township on Fenton Road.

"Adopt-A-Pet is committed to helping people and animals in need. We hold ourselves to a high standard — one which looks out for the physical and mental wellbeing of the animals who come into our care. Our mission is to provide a means to place unwanted, adoptable animals into appropriate, loving homes," said Director Jody Maddock

Inside, they have multiple rooms and a screened-in area, called "catios" for cats, along with dozens of kennels for dogs. Outside, dogs are free to enjoy the agility course and fenced-in area for them to play.

The state-of-the-art shelter helps on

average 1,100 animals per year. Currently, the shelter is taking care of more than 140 cats and dogs. Over 40 volunteers help clean cages, feed the animals and do dayto-day work to ensure they receive top quality

"Adopt-A-Pet takes pride ensuring the animals' mental faculties are attended to by utilizing puzzle bowls for feeding, including enrichment activities in

their daily care, providing music and olfactory stimulation to take their minds off the shelter. Each animal gets at least one session of training per day," Maddock said.

Adopt-A-Pet is a unique animal care facility because they often take in animals that need extensive medical care. These animals come into their care through owner surrenders, animal control organizations, police calls and hoarder/puppy mills.

The shelter doesn't receive any county or government funds. Their financial foundation comes from the generosity of the community, grants and fundraising at their popular yearly events, including the upcoming Spaghetti Dinner and The Howling Haunted Trail this fall.

"There are several incredible fundraisers we hold throughout the year," Maddock

> said. "February holds our Wags & Whiskers Auction & Dinner Party."

At this event, more than 100 auction items are

In April, they have the Kitten Shower where they play games, have raffles and get supplies for the upcoming kitten season.

'May holds our Golf Outing that is so much fun, groups of people have been coming back for years. This event sells out every year," Maddock said. "July holds our Picnic where a great group of people pull together a magical day for the community

to come together with bounce houses, music and doggone good BBQ."

In September, they hold their annual Spaghetti Dinner that Brick Street Bar & Grill hosts. Finally, in October they hold their newest fundraiser- The Howling Haunted Trail & Party.

'This event has grown every year to







Fenton man brings home the gold

■ Represents USA at regional powerlifting championship in Panama



Kirk Wiley of Tyrone Township traveled to Panama City, Panama with the USA team to compete in the 19th North American Powerlifting Federation (NAPF) Championships from Aug. 15-20.

Wiley, 57, competes in the 50 to 59 age group, 105kg weight class (231lbs).

In addition to winning the gold medal with a total of 562.5 kg or 1,240 pounds, Wiley set a new NAPF record and a new USA record in the squat, lifting 237.5kg or 524 pounds. That squat is the fourth best in the world in 2022.

Powerlifting events are organized around three lifts and competitors are given three attempts at each lift. The lifts are the squat, bench press and deadlift. All lifts are judged according to strict rules for form and control, so while moving the weight is the critical component, judges can "red flag" a lift for other reasons that deny the competitor a successful attempt. Adding together the highest successful



attempt from each of the three lifts gives the competitor a total, which is compared to other competitors to determine gold, silver and Bronze medals.

Other countries represented included Canada, Mexico, USVI, Costa Rica, Belize, Guatemala, Nicaragua, Dominican Republic, Jamaica, Puerto Rico, Cayman Islands and host nation Panama.

Wiley has been powerlifting competitively since 2018, with a break during the first year of COVID. He trains at Jeff Tirrell Fitness in Fenton with coaches Jeff Tirrell, Amanda Quasarano and Tracey Smith. He trains three to four days weekly and adds aerobic activity on alternate days as schedules permit.

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

If anyone is considering trying powerlifting, Wiley said, "Do it! It's a lot of fun and there is space for everyone."

Wileysaidtherearenumerousreasons to trying powerlifting, including:

- Being stronger has practical applications throughout life carrying a bag of water softener salt, shoveling a walkway, pushing a lawn mower, moving a couch to vacuum, carrying groceries, and more.
- The powerlifting community is super supportive. They embrace new lifters with encouragement, guidance, etc.
- The powerlifting community is body positive — every body shape and size can be found.
- Coaching makes the difference.

eyesore.

"The Kimble—Sharp Park is looking better and better, but the waterwheel was detracting from a picturesque site," he said. "Second, for family reasons. My dad, Ralph Kimble, and his friend Lee Eneix hauled the waterwheel to Linden. I'm not sure exactly where they found it or exactly when, but I believe the late '60s."

The wheel was also redone in 1971.

Kimble didn't want to say how much restoration cost. He and Sharp split the cost. They also donated to restore the gazebo, which is now called the Kimble-Sharp Gazebo, and it's been used many times this summer during events.

"During the restoration of the gazebo, Imentioned the water wheel. The city was looking into getting it restored. And Roger and I agreed to handle the cost," Kimble said.

Bob Vitale, president of Waterwheel Manufacturing, which is based in North Carolina, said he began talking with Linden officials about working on the wheel in 2021. Fabrication work began this past March. Vitale said one hang up was that when they took down the wheel, the foundation had to be reinforced.

The structure is a Fitz metal water wheel. Vitale specializes in metal water wheels, and to his knowledge, he's the only metal water wheel manufacturer left in the country. He's been in the field for more than 22 years.

He dismantled the old wheel and replaced the rusted wheel that was attached to the axel, which was built in the 1920s or '30s. Vitale made 3D printer templates.

"Everything was made with an aerospace CAD system. Everything was laser cut. We used high end 21st century tech to replicate a 20th century wheel," he said.

Metal water wheels became popular in the U.S. in the 1860s, 1870s. They were installed

along rivers to generate power for factories. They were utilized less and less when diesel engines were invented and metal water wheels were often taken apart and used for scrap parts during World War II, Vitale said.

Metal water wheels still exist in the U.S. and around the world, but people with the knowledge to restore them are rare. Vitale is currently working on four other metal wheels.

He worked closely with Don Grice, Linden's Department of Public Works director, who Vitale said helped with installation on Monday, Aug. 29.

"It was a full day's work but we got it up," Vitale said.

Kimble said it was a "great pleasure" to donate and be able to work and reconnect with Sharp after so many years.

"There's a little more work to be done, including some painting, but it's very cool to see the wheel turning again. And it's great to see so many people using the park area and the river," Kimble said. "Next in line for needed restoration is the historic Linden Mill building, the heart of the city. Of course, that's a much bigger project. But the process is underway."

In the summer of 2021, when Sharp was asked why he donated to improve the gazebo and river area, he said that he grew up in Linden and spent a lot of time by the river as a kid.


"I was part of the self-proclaimed 'River Rats' with a group of kids from Linden. I also wanted to honor my parents along with Joe's parents. 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


