to another male's head and ordered him into the truck while saying racial slurs. Fearing the sight of the gun, the couple drove away and called 911.

Officers were on location within one minute. Genesee County sheriff's deputies, police from Linden City and Argen-

FEB. 5

1883: The Southern Pacific Railroad completes its transcontinental "Sunset Route" from New Orleans to California, consolidating its dominance over rail traffic to the Pacific. One of the most powerful railroad companies of the 19th century, the "Espee" (as the railroad was often called) originated in an ambitious plan conceived in 1870 by the "Big Four" western railroad barons: Collis P. Huntington, Charles Crocker, Leland Stanford and Mark Hopkins. A year earlier, the Big Four's western-based Central Pacific had linked up with the eastern-based Union Pacific in Utah, creating the first transcontinental American railway. With that finished, the "Big Four" began to look for ways to increase their control over West Coast shipping, and decided to focus their efforts on extending the California-based Southern Pacific southward.

We are now in the second month of 2023, and while that tournament ended more than a full month ago, the darn thing still has my undivided attention.

Why? It involves some silly stickers. Each World Cup, an Italian company named Panini sells stickers. They also sell an empty sticker book. Once one purchases this book, the ultimate goal is to complete the book with the stickers you purchase, one sticker pack (five stickers in a pack) at a time. As anyone who has collected them in the past can tell you, this is a daunting task. There are 670 stickers. Each team in the World Cup (32 teams) has a twopage layout of 20 stickers. Those pages make up the overwhelming majority of the book. However, the book also includes photos of each World Cup venue, stickers of some of the past winning World Cup teams and a couple of other ones. Trying to finish this book five stickers at a time isn't easy.

How popular is it worldwide? The stickers are collected by people of all ages worldwide, and some try to collect a completed book for each World Cup. A completed 1978 World Cup sticker book can be purchased right now for about \$600 (including shipping). A common white bordered Lionel Messi (known as one of the great-

est players in the world) sticker from this season is currently going for \$11 on Ebay, and some rare special colored border Messi stickers are going for more than \$300. Even 60 Minutes did a story about them during the World Cup. So, basically, these silly little stickers are big business.

My wife Anna and I have a serious issue. We purchased our own books for the first time during this World Cup cycle. We'd usually buy as few as five packs at a time and sometimes purchase 50-pack boxes. At the start, it was pretty fun. Hey, there's America's top player Christian Pulisic. Hey, look, Anna just got Poland legend Robert Lewandowski's sticker. Wow, this reasonably rare red border Luca Modric sticker is going for about \$30 on eBay. Early on, it was fun. All four or at least four of the stickers in each

pack were going in our book.

But as Christmastime came, it started to be three stickers a pack. By January, it was maybe two stickers a pack. The good news is I'm about 40 stickers and Anna is about 60 stickers away from being done. But now when we open packs, it's pretty likely all of the stickers are going to be extras (or what sports card fans call doubles). Last night we opened 15 packs each. shared our doubles and we were able to stick a combined 20 stickers in our books. That's 20 stickers in 30 packs.

And as we go through these stickers, it becomes aggravating. We now own 12 Ilias Chair doubles, after getting him in another pack last night. We've opened so many packs, we are to the point where we pretty much know if we have the sticker or not as soon as we see the stickers.

Then there are favorite teams everyone can't wait to finish. Mine are the United States, Germany and Poland. I do have the U.S. and Germany done. Poland is a different story. I'm still missing four of them, the most I'm missing of any of the team.

A little help, please?

Digital display speed alert signs approved

■ Motorists to see signs on Grange Hall and Tripp roads

Groveland Twp. — Motorists on Grange Hall and Tripp roads through the township will soon be reminded just how fast they are traveling.

On Jan. 9, the township board of trustees voted 5-0 to install digitally displayed speed alert message signs on a section of Grange Hall Road and all of Tripp Road.

Four signs, for east and west travelers, were approved at a cost of about \$5,500 each.

The decision follows a study from March to September 2022. The Road Commission for Oakland County monitored and recorded the speed of motorists from Jossman Road near Fire Station Two, 3085 Grange Hall Road to Van Road near Tripp. The posted speed is 55 mph.

"The mean speed was 61 and a half miles per hour," said Bob DePalma, township supervisor. "That does not seem like excessive speed. But, the signs will be a reminder to be aware of the speed."

In addition, the 50 mph Tripp Road speed alert signs will be located just east of Dixie Highway and near Grange Hall Road

DePalma suggested the signs do help slow drivers down that may be inadvertently speeding. If the new Grange Hall Road signs are not opposed by residents or other drivers, the paved section of Barron Road, the paved section of Groveland Road, and Oak Hill Road of which Springfield Township could possibly share in the cost, would be considered.

Speed on Grange Hall Road may have been a factor in several fatal accidents over the past years.

In February 2019, Michigan State Police (MSP) troopers responded to a crash on Grange Hall Road near Foxwood Trail. A pickup truck was traveling at a high rate of speed on Grange Hall Road. The driver lost control at the intersection near Foxwood Trail and the vehicle left the roadway striking a tree. The male driver was transported to Ascension Genesys Hospital Grand Blanc Township with unknown injuries. A 23-year-old male

from Brandon Township died at the scene.

In November 2022, MSP troopers responded to the 200 block of Grange Hall Road in Groveland Township after a passing motorist observed a vehicle in the ditch. On scene investigation revealed that the 33-year-old driver from Caro, who was pronounced dead at the scene, was on eastbound Grange Hall approaching a sharp curve. The vehicle veered left in a straight line, ran off the roadway to the left. The vehicle then hit a tree and uprooted another before coming to a rest in a ditch, several feet lower than the roadway.

1952: After a long illness, King George VI of Great Britain and Northern Ireland dies in his sleep at the royal estate at Sandringham. Princess Elizabeth, the older of the king's two daughters and next in line to succeed him, was in Kenya at the time of her father's death; she was officially crowned Queen Elizabeth II on June 2, 1953, at age 27. Queen Elizabeth, born April 21, 1926, and known to her family as Lilibet, was groomed as a girl to succeed her father. She married a distant cousin, Philip Mountbatten, on Nov. 20, 1947. The first of Elizabeth's four children, Prince Charles, was born in 1948. She died Sept. 8, 2022.

It was the first visit to the United States by the Beatles, a British rock-and-roll quartet that had just scored its first No. 1 U.S. hit six days before with "I Want to Hold Your Hand." At Kennedy, the "Fab Four"— dressed in mod suits and sporting their trademark pudding bowl haircuts — were greeted by 3,000 screaming fans who caused a near riot when the boys stepped off their plane and onto American soil. Two days later,

Paul McCartney, age 21, Ringo Starr, 23, John Lennon, 23, and George Harrison, 20, made their first appearance on the Ed Sullivan Show, a popular television variety show.

FEB. 8

1936: At Philadelphia's Ritz-Carlton Hotel, University of Chicago halfback Jay Berwanger, the first Heisman Trophy winner, is picked No. 1 overall by the Philadelphia Eagles in the first NFL draft. His rights are traded to the Chicago Bears, but Berwanger never plays for them or any other NFL team. Berwanger's contract demands were too much for George "Papa Bear" Halas, the Bears' coach and owner. So, the college star became a foam rubber salesman. "[Halas] asked me what I wanted," Berwanger told the New York Times years later. "I said \$25,000 for two years and a no-cut contract. We shook hands, said goodbye and he and I have been good friends ever since."

FEB. 9

1971: Pitcher Leroy "Satchel" Paige becomes the first Negro League veteran to be nominated for the Baseball Hall of Fame. In August of that year, Paige, a pitching legend known for his fastball, showmanship and the longevity of his playing career, which spanned five decades, was inducted. Joe DiMaggio once called Paige "the best and fastest pitcher I've ever faced." He earned his nickname, Satchel, as a boy when he

earned money carrying passengers' bags at train stations. Baseball was segregated when Paige started playing baseball professionally in the 1920s, so he spent most of his career pitching for Negro League teams around the United States. During the winter season, he pitched for teams in the Caribbean and Central and South America.

FEB. 10

1962: American spy pilot Francis Gary Powers is released by the Soviets in exchange for Soviet Colonel Rudolf Abel, a senior KGB spy who was caught in the United States five years earlier. The two men were brought to separate sides of the Glienicker Bridge, which connects East and West Berlin across Lake Wannsee. As the spies waited, negotiators talked in the center of the bridge where a white line divided East from West. Finally, Powers and Abel were waved forward and crossed the border into freedom at the same moment, 8:52 a.m., Berlin time. Just before their transfer, Frederic Pryor, an American student held by East German authorities since August 1961, was released to American authorities at another border checkpoint.

FEB. 11

1990: Nelson Mandela, leader of the movement to end South African apartheid, is released from prison after 27 years on Feb. 11, 1990. In 1944, Mandela, a lawyer, joined the African National Congress (ANC), the oldest Black political organization in South Africa, where he became a leader of Johannesburg's youth wing of the ANC. In 1952, he became deputy national president of the ANC, advocating nonviolent resistance to apartheid, South Africa's institutionalized system of white supremacy and racial segregation. However, after the massacre of peaceful Black demonstrators at Sharpeville in 1960, Nelson helped organize a paramilitary branch of the ANC to engage in guerrilla warfare against the white minority government. In 1961, he was arrested for treason, and although acquitted he was arrested again in 1962 for illegally leaving the country. Convicted and sentenced to five years at Robben Island Prison, he was put on trial again in 1964 on charges of sabotage. In June 1964, he was convicted along with several other ANC leaders and sentenced to life in prison.

tine Township and a Michigan State Police helicopter also responded to the area to assist.

Upon arrival, police ordered the individuals, later identified as Flint and Burton residents between the ages of 15 and 18, out of the truck. There were four males and two females who were sisters, one a juvenile and the other 18 years old. The juvenile female was a runaway with an arrest warrant. She was transported to the Regional Detention Center in Flint.

The male suspect, a 16-year-old Burton resident, was asked about the gun. He told officers it was just a BB gun. The gun, which Forbush said looks like a black Glock 19 handgun, was located in a glove compartment.

Police recovered a concealed hatchet on the suspect. A gun holster was located on the floor, as well as railroad spikes. The suspect was handcuffed and arrested. Police will be seeking one count of aggravated felonious assault from the Genesee County Prosecutor's Office.

All of the parents were called to the Fenton Police Department where the juveniles were interviewed. They were then released to their parents.

Forbush said the male victim admitted to police that his friend held the BB gun to his head.

The group said they had intended to go to a party in Fenton Township and stopped to get gas. Due to a leak in the pickup truck's gas tank, gas spilled onto the ground and the Fenton Fire Department was called to clean up the hazardous liquid.

Fenton Pride Collective aims to help LGBTQ+ community

he Fenton Pride Collective was officially incorporated as a nonprofit organization less than a year ago in April 2022. However, the organization has already made colorful waves in the Fenton area.

"Our board members really saw a need for a community organization that was founded on the principle of helping the LGBTQ+ community because there really wasn't one around here," said Ky Orvis, president of the Fenton Pride Collective.

The board consists of Orvis, Vice President Connie Lee, Treasurer Josh Orvis, Recording Secretary Stephanie Young, Corresponding Secretary J Waddell and trustees Annie Anglim, Terina Greenway and Jasmyn Lee.

Orvis, a Tyrone Township resident, said their goal is working toward a greater level of acceptance of the LGBTQ+ community.

"We're here. We're not going anywhere. We are your neighbors, your servers at restaurants, your baggers at the grocery store. All we want is to be accepted and having an open community helps with that," Orvis said.

To accomplish that, the organization plans events and spreads information about the LGBTQ+ (lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer +) community. Their most recent event was a sold-out Drag Queen Bingo at The Laundry Room in Fenton on Jan. 21.

Orvis said when they first became an organization, they discussed ways to fundraise and found the South



Lyon Pride organization. One of the members helped them draw up their bylaws and incorporate the nonprofit. They also suggested hosting a Drag Queen Bingo night, which features drag performers, bingo, dancing and more. The show raised approximately \$600.

"The event went really good. It was the second one. I heard it went very smoothly and that people were having a great time," Orvis said. "How could they not?"

The collective is currently in the planning stages for the 2023 Fenton Pride Night that will take place in June, which is historically LGBTQ Pride Month. This will be the third Fenton Pride Night event. The first in 2021 was spontaneously planned during one of the Street Experience nights when select downtown roads were closed. Approximately 45 people attended that year.

More than 500 people attended Pride Night 2022:

Celebrating Progress in Fenton on June 16, 2022.

"Hopefully we get the same amount plus more this year," they said. Orvis said planning the event was more work than they originally anticipated. However, Pride Night was a success with the help of the community.

"The city was amazing to work with. They were very welcoming of anything we needed. They threw out a bunch of suggestions for places we could have people and live entertainment," Orvis said. "The police were beyond amazing. As far as working with others in the city, it was a very welcoming thing with open arms. I was almost taken back."

The Fenton Pride Collective is planning a social gathering event at a local restaurant to give people the opportunity to come and mingle. Orvis said they're also working toward creating a support group to offer people a safe place to talk about their hardships regarding being the LBGTQ+ community.

Orvis said the acceptance level in the Fenton area is "very very high."

"There are some isolated incidents when you get people who are not as tolerant," they said, adding that overall, the community has welcomed them with open arms.

They're always looking for volunteers to help at events. The Fenton Pride Collective also has open spots on a few committees. Go to fentonpride.org for more information.





Local state senator sponsors heart month

Michigan Senate approves her 'Go Red for Women' resolution

The Michigan Senate on Thursday, Feb. 2, approved Sen. Ruth Johnson's resolution to increase awareness of heart disease and stroke risks and recognize February as American Heart Month in Michigan. Senators and staff wore red in support of this effort as Johnson partnered with the American Heart Association for National Wear Red Day, which was Friday, Feb. 3.

"Cardiovascular diseases are the number one killer of women in the U.S., killing more women than all forms of cancer combined," said Johnson (R-Holly). "Unfortunately, many people and especially women still don't have a good understanding of their risks or of the warning signs or heart attacks and strokes, which can be different in women than in men."

Women, especially Black and Hispanic women, are disproportionately impacted by heart disease and stroke. Research also shows that heart attacks are on the rise in younger women.

"This resolution is a chance to help save lives by increasing women's — and men's — cardiovascular awareness through the Go Red movement," Johnson said. "I encourage everyone to wear red on Friday and to talk about cardiovascular health with your friends, coworkers, and loved ones."

Senate Resolution 7 proclaims February 2023 as American Heart Month in Michigan and Feb. 3 as National Wear Red Day. SR 7 says that from 2019 to 2020, deaths from heart disease increased by 4.8%, the largest increase in heart disease deaths since 2012, while stroke deaths increased by 6%.

It also says, "In 2015, cardiovascular disease accounted for \$555 billion in health care expenditures and lost productivity, and by 2035, cardiovascular disease will account for over \$1 trillion in health care expenditures and lost productivity annually."

Board approves study

■Will look at Groveland Township Fire Department

Groveland Twp. — On Jan. 9, the Groveland Township Board of Trustees voted 5-0 to retain Rich Marinucci of the Firefighters Safety Officers Association to study the township fire department.

"It's clear we have to know what we're going to do going forward," said Bob DePalma, township supervisor. "I want an objective third party with no specific objective except to look at the fire department and decide if there is something we can do differently that's better. If not, we have to determine what we're going to be doing with the millage.

"We are not going to close the fire de-

partment, we're not bankrupt, but I can't run the fire department year after year if it consistently spends more money than it gets in," he said. "I don't want to ask the residents for a tax increase until I have somebody who does this for a living take an objective look at it."

The cost of the study is \$4,000.

The study is in advance of a vote on the renewal of fire department millage, which expires in December 2024. The current millage is 3.5 mills, which was approved by voters in 2000. A temporary fire millage hike of .44 mills was approved by the township board of trustees in 2011 due to a significant drop in property values after 2007. The millage has since been returned to 3.5

Brandon 71-9 in Metro action. Holly lost to Swartz Creek by a tight 43-35 verdict.





"The individual was identified as an older white male with grey-white hair driving a black Chevy truck. It was reported that the vehicle was slowly following the student, who was on the way to the bus stop. When the student stopped walking, the man reportedly stepped out of his vehicle. As a result, the student ran back home. The student did a great

job of maintaining distance, fleeing the area and reporting the concern.

plan and on Jan. 19, they passed a resolution to recommend adoption of the plan. It will help the city apply for funding assistance.

A few objectives identified are acquiring more land, promoting seasonal recreation activities, supporting the farmers market and more. The full plan can be found at lindenmi.us.

Goals for the next five years

- Develop a recreation system which will provide for the full range of recreation and open space needs of residents
- Promote cooperation between all groups, individuals, organizations and neighboring communities involved with recreation planning
- Develop a balanced year-round recreation program that will encompass a full range of facilities and activities, serve individuals of all ages and abilities, and promote healthy living
- Dedicate and preserve sufficient and suitable land for recreation and open space
- Ensure that parks and recreation facilities are accessible, and provide nonmotorized links
- Implement recreation projects and programs which complement other federal, state, local and private investments being made in the community and which further the city's development strategy

Public input

Linden conducted a citizen survey in 2022 as part of the master plan update process. It garnered 624 total responses.

"Regarding recreation, results of the survey were mixed. On one hand, survey participants cited, 'Lack of youth activities' and 'Lack of recreation options' in the Top 10 'least favorable aspects' of Linden. On the other hand, 'access to non-motorized transportation' and 'recreation options' were both included in the Top 10 'most positive aspects' of Linden," according to the plan.

"'Need for youth facilities/activities' was a common response regarding things that should be changed in Linden. One way to address this would be spreading awareness to residents about youth programs offered by organizations such as Southern Lakes Parks & Recreation."

Twelve citizens attended a public

workshop in September 2022. The top four identified projects were bike racks, seating along the water at Mill Pond Park, potential property acquisition to expand Eagle's Wooden Park, and adding restrooms at the Kimble-Sharp Gazebo & Park.

The plan also includes information from Southern Lakes Parks & Recreation and LAFF Pathways about the organizations' respective efforts to bring more recreation opportunities to the area.

Current parks facilities Kimble-Sharp Gazebo & Park (formerly Linden Mills Park)

This 2.09-acre community park on both sides of the Shiawassee River in downtown Linden, which includes the historic Linden Mill building, is home to the Kimble-Sharp Gazebo and water wheel, which were both renovated in recent years. The accessibility rating is two.

Mill Pond Park

This 0.39-acre mini-park on the south shore of the Mill Pond along Tickner Street features a volunteer-built and maintained butterfly garden, picnic table and benches. It also has a paved canoe/kayak access site. The accessibility rating is two.

Triangle Park

This 1.26-acre park along Silver Lake Road in the southeastern portion of Linden is used for casual picnicking and other passive activities. It will be upgraded with added amenities when it's converted into a trailhead for The State Bank Trail, which will connect Triangle Park to the city of Fenton. Construction is planned for 2023. The plan does not include an accessibility rating.

Eagle's Wooden Park (formerly Walmar Park)

Eagle's Wooden Park, the largest park in Linden at 9.70 acres, is home to a playground and wooden pathway near the Shiawassee River. The park has an accessibility rating of three.

Shiawassee River

The Shiawassee River State and National Water Trail is part of an 88-mile water trail which travels through Oakland, Genesee, Shiawassee, and Saginaw counties, providing recreational, development and economic opportunities. Linden has two public launch sites, at the Linden Mill Pond and one at the end of Walmar Street.

coming to Fenton Township.

A Fenton Township resident is planning to build the Ruffy Ranch Retreat, a doggy daycare with a 24-hour boarding facility, canine massage, spa services and obedience training, on 3.85-acres of land on the northwest corner of Thompson and Fenton roads. The design plans show a 3,600 square-foot building

The Thompson Road Dog Park is about 0.16 miles west of the property.

On Thursday, Feb. 26, the Fenton Township Planning Commission recommended approval for Allore Sharp's request to conditionally rezone the land from single family residential R-3 to general commercial C-2, limited to a commercial kennel with a doggie daycare and a caretaker's quarters.

She said it's "fantastic" that the commission recommended approval. Her goal is to open the Ruffy Ranch Retreat in July. This is the fourth time Sharp has sought approval to build the doggy daycare.

"My dreams have become my goals," she said.

Sharp's letter of intent states, "RRR will offer doggy daycare, boarding with 24-hour care, canine massage, spa services and obedience training. Our mission is to love and care for each fur baby as our own, to provide a fun-filled environment, yet a relaxing and stressfree getaway. In addition, our premise will be pristine and offer a safe canine club to all clientele.

"RRR will use all natural pet-friendly products including by-product free dog food and treats, grooming products and aromatherapy. Canine massage will be held in a dim-lit chandelier setting with soothing music."

The outdoor play arena will have a privacy fence to allow dogs to play and attend outdoor activities and training. For safety, dogs will be separated based on their size, according to the letter. Any anxious or temperamental canine owners will have the option of private suites and runs.

The hours of operation would be Monday through Friday from 5 a.m. to 7 p.m. and Saturday and Sunday by appointment. The number of dogs allowed will be determined during the site plan review.

This use is compatible with the town-

ship's master plan. The future land use classification for this land is community commercial, according to the report by Zoning Administer Mike Deem.

"The Community Commercial land use category includes centers that are intended to provide service to the entire community rather than a single neighborhood. They are located at major road intersections, such as Fenton and Thompson Roads," according to the report.

"A commercial kennel with doggie daycare provides a personal service that is supported by the greater community. The proposed use is consistent with the Thompson Road Corridor and is located in close proximity to the Thompson Road Regional Dog Park."

Commercial kennels, which have seven or more dogs, are permitted by a special use permit in agriculture, commercial and industrial zoning. The facility must be licensed by the Genesee County Department of Animal Control. These facilities must be a minimum of 300 feet from a residential zoning district.

All dogs must be enclosed and have a concrete surface, and the applicant must provide an acceptable plan for disposing animal waste. Sharp plans to use a septic system in the summer and utilize Scoop-n-Go, a pet waste management company, in the winter.

The facility must also meet the requirements of the township's dog control ordinances.

Sharp's letter describes RRR as a "premium and luxurious retreat."

"Iam diligent in creating a controlled and clean structure for the animals of our community. Presently, there are no other businesses of RRR-like in the Fenton community or surrounding areas. This business could support the community for their pet needs," according to her letter.

"RRR will be in close proximity to Thompson Road Dog Park and also offer retail experience, employment opportunities and a needed service to the community. An important aspect of my business plan is to offer 24-hour boarding care. For this to be possible, a living quarters would be required within the business. Since the plan is to develop into a "mixed purpose corridor," I am asking for a variance to allow for this needed space within the business."





year,106,077 secondary students were enrolled in 2,130 CTE programs.

According to the 2021-2022 follow up survey (six months after exiting high school), CTE concentrators reported a placement rate of 95.2%. Specifically, 68.4% of CTE concentrators were continuing their education, 56.7% were employed, 2% were in the military, and 0.1% were participating in national, community service or the Peace Corp. In addition, 71% reported they were using the skills learned in their CTE programs for continuing education or in their current job.

MDE also offers Early Middle Colleges (EMCs), in which students can earn high school and college credit while pursuing a program of study at the college level. In 2021-2022, 15,013 students were enrolled in EMCs, with 1,429 CTE Early Middle College students.

"All Michigan students should have access to a wide range of CTE programs, which help make learning relevant, help

students develop career interests and skills, and help prepare students for college and the workplace," said State Superintendent Dr. Michael Rice. "We need to expand CTE programs in areas that have limited offerings. It's a matter of fairness, career development, and workforce development."

Postsecondary institutions in Michigan have 370 qualifying CTE programs offering a certificate or associate degree. During the 2021-2022 school year, there were 113,821 students enrolled in these postsecondary programs in the state.

In celebration of CTE Month, a virtual event will be held Wednesday, Feb. 22 at 10 a.m. to share information about how career and technical education benefits Michigan's employers. To learn more and to register for the free event, visit MDE's CTE Month website.


