



If you work in sales, you already have courage. We all have the knowledge too. The skill is having that knowledge at the ready when faced with an objection. And curiosity should be easy. Don't you want to know what digital advertising a client is doing

You also must have your client's best interest at heart. When our team objects to a client's objection, we aren't doing it because we're aiming to get rich off their hard-earned dollar. We do it because we want to see our clients succeed. We know that print advertising is a proven way to make that happen. Also, our team walks the walk. 



'Ninja' business approved for liquor license

■Township officials speak of saving liquor licenses for Thompson Road Corridor

On Tuesday, Feb. 21 after a lengthy discussion, the Fenton Township Board of Trustees voted 4-2 to approve a tavern license with Sunday sales to Tri-County Ninja & Collectibles.

Trustees Robert Kesler, Mark Goupil, Christine Reid and Kade Katrak voted yes. Supervisor Vince Lorraine and Clerk Robert Krug voted no. Treasurer John Tucker was absent.

Multiple township officials favored saving the township's quota liquor licenses for businesses on the Thompson Road Corridor.

Ed McNulty, owner of Tri-County Ninja & Collectibles at 14283 Fenton Road, said they offer ninja warrior training for kids and adults, which is similar to obstacle course training. They do family classes. They also have a collectible store that sells Pokemon cards, board games, trading cards and more. Tri-County Ninja also offers scholarships to help people afford classes. The company also hosts adaptive ninja, which is for people with special needs.

They opened Tri-County Ninja in 2018. McNulty is a recently retired police officer after working 16 years in Oakland County.

McNulty said they offer an alternative means of physical activity, as well as gaming opportunities that can no longer be found in the area.

"We're the number one searched and booked birthday party destination in Genesee County. We bring a lot of people from all sorts of zip codes into town," he said.

McNulty said they could acquire the 8,000-foot Sear's Hometown Store space, which is a part of the same building. With that space, they plan to add bowling, corn hole, shuffleboard tables,

Homicide, murder and other crimes resulting in death

When I was a freshman in law school, a required class was Criminal Law where I learned all about crimes and their parts or elements. One thing that I especially remember, and certainly didn't know at the time, was that a homicide isn't always a murder as it all depends on the particular circumstances. Clearly watching TV crime shows didn't help my understanding.

That was many years ago and some things have changed about the law of homicide and related crimes and some remain the same.

Accordingly, I present the following homicide primer. The word "homicide" comes to us from Latin and means "killing a man."

When a homicide has occurred there are three possibilities to consider: Was it justifiable, excusable or criminal? An example of a justifiable homicide is killing in self-defense. An excusable homicide is when it is due to accident or inadvertence.

A criminal homicide is any unjustified, unexcused killing of one human being by another human being.

The most serious type of homicide is murder.

Every state has its own murder and homicide laws. In Michigan, murder is either first degree or second degree.

There are three types of first-degree murder:

- A killing perpetrated by means of poison, lying in wait, or any other willful, deliberate, and premeditated killing;
- "Felony murder" when a killing occurs during the commission of one or more of 14 specified felonies;
 - Killing a peace officer when they

are on duty.

Second degree murder is defined as all other types of murder.

There are other crimes less than murder with the closest being manslaughter.

Again, there are two types.

"Voluntary manslaughter" is a killing without premeditation, and with sufficient provocation by the victim, to cause an ordinary person to lose control and commit the crime in passion.

"Involuntary manslaughter" is when the killing is due to gross negligence.

As society has changed, new criminal statutes have been enacted in death cases with self-defining names.

These include operating while intoxicated causing death; reckless driving causing death; delivery of a controlled substance causing death; and committing a moving traffic violation causing death.

The law has always had a profound respect for life with criminal laws and suitable punishments for those who don't.

This will never change.

would allow the city to provide a onetime \$5,000 signing bonus to new hires upon the successful completion of field training.

In a memo from City Manager Lynn Markland to council members and the mayor, Markland wrote that over the last couple of years, the city has had difficulty with hiring police officers. He added that the shortage of applicants is attributed to several factors that include the current labor shortage, the pause of police academies during the recent pandemic and a number of police officers throughout the region becoming eligible for retirement.

Markland said the city administration has been working with POAM, which represents the city's officers in their collective bargaining agreement.

The new officer would be required to sign a promissory note to assure the obligation is fulfilled or to reimburse the city for all or a portion of the signing bonus. The agreement between the parties is indefinite and the city could terminate the agreement at the city's discretion. The amount is a one-time payment of \$5,000 less applicable withholdings and deductions.

The effective date has been set to include the city's two new hires who were sworn in Jan. 23. The termination of the agreement can be decided when the city indicates the necessity to do so.

The victim, a 78-year-old man, advised troopers that he was initially at the Mobil gas station in the village of Holly and walked inside the convenience store. Upon coming out of the gas station and back into his vehicle, he was met by the suspect who was hidden in his back seat claiming to have a gun.

The suspect advised the victim to drive. The victim drove to his residence. At that point, the suspect took the keys to the vehicle and took the vehicle after the victim got out.

After the vehicle was identified, dispatch was able to have the vehicle disabled. The vehicle became disabled near 4130 1st St., in Brown City in Sanilac County, approximately one hour northeast of Holly Village. Troopers and local officers approached the vehicle and observed the suspect walking toward the vehicle.

The Juvenile suspect resisted arrest. The Sanilac County sheriff's deputy deployed his Taser on the suspect and ultimately took him into custody without further incident. No pistol has been located.

The case remains under investigation, pending the identification of the suspect. The case will be submitted to the Oakland County Prosecutor's Office for review.

Following the carjacking in broad daylight Monday morning, village of Holly Police Chief Jerry Narsh offered safety tips to motorists who may find themselves in a similar situation.

- 1. Never leave a vehicle unlocked or with the keys inside when stopping at businesses or for gas. Keep your keys with you and always lock your doors.
- 2. Pay attention to your surroundings. Carjackings happen at a greater rate at gas stations and quick stop convenience stores. Look for people loitering outside a business before you exit or enter your vehicle. If you feel you are being watched or unsafe, enter the business and call the police.
- 3. Never leave a child alone inside a vehicle. While you are outside the vehicle pumping fuel, be alert to persons in the vicinity of your vehicle. Cease fueling and leave the area if you feel unsafe.
- 4. Keep your cell phone on your person when you exit your vehicle. If your vehicle is stolen, you will be able to call 911 immediately.
- 5. Although this incident did not happen at night, try to refuel during the day and at a known location as much as possible.

confident that will continue under Chief Cross' leadership. Jeff always does what is right and will serve the city and the residents well."

Fenton Mayor Sue Osborn said, "Jeff Cross has to be chosen. 77 been a long time valued employee for the city of Fenton. He has made our

citizens' and businesses' safety his primary concern. I'm pleased the council accepted the city manager's recommendation and voted unanimously to appoint him as our police chief. I think he'll do a great job protecting and serving our community.'

Following the meeting, Cross said, "I'm very grateful for the opportunity and I'm very honored to be chosen." He said he appreciated so many supporters at the meeting, including police chiefs from other municipalities.

Looking forward, Cross said he wants the Fenton Police Department to be at the forefront of technology and to stay ahead of the crime wave. He'd like to get as many people into the department as possible.

> He also would like to bridge the gap between law enforcement and the community as a whole. He said he'd like to see a citizens police academy in Fenton, which would essentially be an eight-week course where anyone in the community could learn what the fire department, police

department, EMS and 911 dispatch do and to get everyone involved.

Hiring part-time cadets who are actively involved with criminal justice programs could be a positive investment in the city.

Although the city swore in two new police officers in February, Cross said the department is still short two officers as the city becomes busier. He said there are potential hires in the near future and the newly approved \$5,000 signing bonus should be of assistance.

They are one of 31 gold winners in the nation and the only gold winner in the state of Michigan.

"We were the only gold winner this year in Michigan. It feels fantastic. Our 2022 summer food service team, Kelli Clark, Paulette Fox and Susan Dagenais, did a wonderful job," she said.

The Meet Up and Eat Up Summer Food Service Program USDA Turnip the Beet! Award recognizes outstanding summer food service program sponsors across Michigan who work hard to offer high quality meals that are appetizing, appealing, and nutritious during the summer months, according to fns.usda.gov. The three award levels are bronze, silver, and gold.

Nominations are submitted to the Michigan Department of Education Summer Food Service Department, which then submits its winners to the USDA.

The Turnip the Beet! Award Program began in 2016. Fenton has been a recipient of a Turnip the Beet! award in 2016, 2017, 2018, 2019, 2021 and now 2022. There were no awards for

summer of 2020 due to the pandemic.

Goss was sent a congratulations email by a school nutrition staff member at Michigan Department of Education along with a list of winners.

Schools must submit a one-month

menu to the MDE Summer Food Service Program. Menus need to show that schools are feeding students meals that meet a certain nutrition evaluation. This includes whether the vegetable and fruit are fresh, frozen, canned or diced, the type of milk and bread, if water is available at no cost, etc.

"The meals we serve during the summer are the same high-quality meals we serve throughout the school year. We also have a full salad bar in the summer as well. We had to submit a menu and supporting documentation, invoices etc. and pictures. Buying and serving local produce is another criteria for the award and each year Fenton is able to purchase more produce locally," Goss said.

The Meet Up and Eat Up Summer Food Service Program can positively impact children's lives by offering nutritious meals and encouraging children to develop healthy habits at a young age.

Bronze, silver, and gold winners will be featured in the Michigan

Department of Education (MDE) SFSP Newsletter, MDE social media announcements, will receive a certificate from the USDA, and will also be featured on the USDA Turnip the Beet webpage.

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

With every booth that gets built and torn down, every prize won, every new connection made and lasting friendship strengthened, there's always something new to be learned at the annual Fenton Community Expo.

The event takes place Saturday, March 4 from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. and Sunday, March 5 from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. at Fenton High School.

The structure of the event remains the same every year. Hundreds of vendors, consisting of businesses, nonprofits, churches, schools and civic groups gather in one so the public has the opportunity to see what their community offers.

The consistency of the Expo does not mean it's stagnant. Veterans of the lasting event said they learn something new every year.

Mike Wagner, district manager of the Fenton office of Coldwell Banker, said there's many different aspects of the Expo that he's learned from over the years.

"I personally walk around and get to know some of the businesses that are still anchors in the community and some that are new. Obviously in our business, in real estate as a manager, I'm always looking for those that want to come in and meet our agents and come and expose their business to us," he said.

His favorite part of the event is talking with the attendees and seeing both the longtime vendors and the new ones.

"There are people we remember talking to 20 years ago that are coming through again," McAndrews said.

The event also allows people the opportunity to see others they might not see on a regular basis.

"The event as a whole has really come to a level that we're shooting for. It's a goal to get to. The chamber does an awesome job with organizing it and putting it on. We appreciate the opportunity for getting to be a part of it," McAndrews said.

Denise Penwell, president of the Fenton Lions Club, said, they've been involved with the Expo for more than 20 years. She's learned that education is key.

"The time at the Expo gives us the opportunity to educate not only the other vendors but all of the patrons as well on what the Fenton Lions Club does and how we help our community," she said.

The Fenton Lions Club offers free eye testing on children who stop by their booth. They tested 150 kids last year, found issues with seven children and they were able to refer them to an eye doctor.

"Ilove seeing and getting to visit with all of the vendors. This time gives us the opportunity to educate the vendors and the community on who the Fenton Lions Club are and who we help in the community. By attending the Expo this past year, we ended up gaining nine new members from the Expo, which is huge for us," she said.





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Fun for kids at the Expo

Kids Zone returns, business brings the Easter Bunny

More than half a dozen inflatables and games. Over 50 prizes. Six hundred bags of candy.

All of this and more can be found in the Kids Zone at the annual Fenton Community Expo on March 4 from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. and Sunday, March 5 from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m., at Fenton High School.

The event, put on by the Fenton & Linden Regional Chamber of Commerce, continues to be a family event year after year in part thanks to the Kids Zone in the auxiliary gym at FHS.

Faith City Church has organized and ran the Kids Zone with the help of volunteers for nine or 10 years. Pastor Andrew Barancik said the room is for kids to have fun and for parents to sit for a while.



"When parents come in, there's an area for them to come in and relax. They can come in and get off their feet for a few while their kids are playing," he said.

They're expecting several hundred kids to come in throughout the weekend. Barancik, who's on the Fenton & Linden Regional Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors, said between 400 and 600 children come into the Kids Zone.

"It's kind of wild," he said.

Valley City Tent will bring several inflatables for kids to enjoy. When they

enter, kids or their parents fill out a piece of paper with the kid's name, school and age. Volunteers will draw names for a prize every 15 minutes, which is four per hour. Kids will get to choose from a range of age appropriate gifts for ages 5 to 12.

"It adds value just because sometimes the show can be a lot for kids to walk through. It gives them space to let their kids come in and have fun," Barancik said. "Kids are kids, they just love to run around and enjoy those opportunities. You don't always get to have a huge bounce house and inflatables and, of course, they want those prizes."

Prizes range from smaller, handheld toys to the grand prizes, which are bikes from CycleFit.

"They're always excited (to win). We have some kids who hover around and when names are called, it's 'was it my name?' They're excited. They want a prize," he said.

Children don't have to be present to claim their prize. Winners are announced at the main booth of the Expo as well. Vendors and attending businesses will also drop off prizes such as coloring books and balls.

When kids win the grand prize, "They're stoked. They can't believe it," Barancik said. "The parents are usually really excited."

Occasionally in past years, kids whose families might not be able to afford a new bike have won the grand prize.

"That's kind of what you hope happens," he said.

Volunteers draw for the grand prize once each day of the Expo. The Faith City Church congregation and students from the local school district's National Honor Societies volunteer in the Kids Zone.

Barancik said for him, the Expo is an opportunity to see people he doesn't see often throughout the year.

"It's not so much about the products, it's just seeing faces I haven't seen in a while. It's always nice to have new vendors come in," he said.

Primary Prevention Physiotherapy, which has offices in Fenton and Flushing, will have the Easter Bunny at their booth in the gym.

"We want to meet the community more and have great conversations. We are bringing the Easter Bunny and a backdrop with a professional photographer to offer free photos for people who come to visit. Sometimes the photos are pricey. We figured why not," said Cody DeLorenzo, marketing director.

This is the first year Primary Prevention Physiotherapy is attending the Expo. DeLorenzo said they've been growing in Fenton for a few years.

"We figured what a great year to go and get to know the community a little bit more," he said.








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

move forward with purchasing a new ladder truck for the fire department during its meeting Monday, Feb. 27.

The purchase of the new ladder truck was discussed during city council's Feb. 6 work session.

As reported in the Times on Sunday, Feb. 12, the fire department has sought to replace its 18-year-old ladder truck. Cairnduff met with Treasurer Jon Satkowiak during the summer of 2022 to discuss the possibility and to determine if the fire department had the funds to move forward with the project. It was determined then that the fire department

did and that Cairnduff should research what was needed.

During the Feb. 6 work session, Cairnduff informed the council that he was waiting on proposals from the two remaining manufacturers that the truck committee had narrowed their choice down to.

Cairnduff said their truck committee has worked diligently for the past seven months on this project.

"With the exploding costs, delayed delivery (two to three years depending on the manufac-

turer), and the current state of the used market for fire trucks, we determined that we needed to do something sooner than later," he said. "We worked diligently to keep the cost down and to still get the truck equipped they way we need it. The cost has nearly doubled since we bought or current truck in 2005. We bought our current truck for \$838,000

and this new truck will cost \$1,479,830. The cost for fire trucks has skyrocketed in the last three years."

The latest proposals included a Rosenbauer Cobra Mid-Mount 100 Aerial, which would cost \$1,479,830 and have a 22-month delivery timeframe, and the KME Severe Service 102 Mid-Mount Aerial, which would cost \$1,746,125 and have a 27-month delivery timeframe.

The fire department currently owns trucks built by both companies and Cairnduff said he had no reservations with either company. The Rosenbauer Cobra truck would be \$266,295 less than the KME truck.

Cairnduff advised council that Rosenbauer would be implementing a March 1 price increase if they decided to go with that truck. A 4% increase would have been an additional \$60,000 to the cost of the truck.

Cairnduff requested approval to move forward with purchasing the Rosenbauer truck, for the reasons given above. He also requested that the city manager be given permission to sign the necessary documents and process the order in time to avoid the 4% price increase.



bounce houses, and other rotating games. Plans also include installing a bar and retro arcade.

McNulty said even though a tavern license allows beer, wine and mixed drinks, they're not planning on having full bar service. Their goal with the liquor license is to allow patrons to drink while watching their kids exercise and playing games. McNulty said they would have minimal food that would not require a kitchen. They would encourage patrons to bring their own food.

They have an agreement with Shaffer Distribution to install arcade equipment. They also could purchase the games through financing. Tri-County Ninja also has agreements with board game distributors.

"We really just want

to add to Fenton without taking away from the current businesses," he said, adding that there is a need for facilities in the area that offer family activities. McNulty said he currently employs eight people and they are "severely" understaffed for what they do. He anticipates doubling their staff after expanding. They're hoping to implement these changes in mid May.

Lorraine said he doesn't approve of letting parents drink when they're going to be driving their kids. Reid said she likes the opportunity to bring something like this to Fenton

Zoning Administrator Michael Deem said municipalities are allocated one quota liquor license per every 1,500 residents. Based on numbers from the Census, the township has 11 liquor licenses and nine

are now active with this approval. Two licenses are left.

According to the Michigan Liquor Control Commission, quota licenses are "a limited number of specific license types allowed based on the population of a local governmental

unit. Once the quota limit for a license type is met, no new licenses of that type can be issued in that local governmental unit. However, most quota licenses are transferrable by location from one local governmental unit to another."

There are three main licenses included in that number — hotel license, tavern license, and Class C license. A Tavern License would allow a "restaurant or bar to sell and serve beer, wine, and mixed spirit drink products for consumption on the licensed premises."

Deem said in the last few years, the township has invested into planning the future land use of the Thompson Road Corridor. Their goal is to promote economic development in the area.

"Townships are very limited in what economic development tools we have to promote in bringing businesses to the township. A liquor license is one of those few tools that we have," Deem said.

"When considering which locations are best or most appropriate at this time based on the investments into the Thompson Road Corridor, I would have a hard time recommending approval of this quota license. That has nothing to do with the business itself... If they were able to bring in a license, I think you guys would find that an appropriate use for that location."

Having liquor licenses available for hotels or sit-down restaurants in the Thompson Road Corridor is an "important economic development tool," Deem added.

Once a license is issued, the municipality cannot control it anymore. A liquor license can be sold or transferred out of the township. If a business were to bring in a liquor license from another municipality, it would not count against the township's

quota licenses. If one of the nine businesses with a Fenton Township quota licenses were to move out of the township, the license would still count against the Township's quota licenses, Deem said.

Two liquor licenses are active on the Thompson Road Corridor. One of them counts as a quota license.

The state also has a 500 foot setback requirement from churches and schools. There is a waiver process. However, Tri-County Ninja is fewer than 250 feet from a church across the street.

Lorraine said other municipalities with corridors, such as Miller Road, that have hotels and other establishments have saved liquor licenses for these corridors.

"I look at the long term for what's best for this township and I truly believe there is going to be a better use for that license. It does not prevent him from getting one," he said.

Goupil spoke in favor of approving the liquor license for Tri-County Ninja.

"The thought of punishing someone that lives locally with a local business that wants to do something because of what potentially might happen — we're favoring the people that aren't even here yet over somebody that is here and trying to make an honest living. And honestly, I'm biased about him because he's a retired deputy," said Goupil, who's a retired deputy, adding that they wouldn't put up with poor drunk behavior.

"A retired cop isn't going to put up with any of this stuff that we see at these other places. I guarantee you, as a 21-year deputy, that a hotel with a liquor license causes a lot more problems than a Magic the Gathering place with a liquor license."

McNulty said if they aren't able to acquire a quota license, they could buy one for \$50,000 plus filing fees. He said chains are most likely the businesses that will come to the Thompson Road area.

"\$50,000 doesn't even move their needle. What I could do with \$50,000 with the charity work that we do and the stuff that we do for kids and how many arcade games or how many more ninja rigs I could put in? I could do all sorts of things with \$50,000 and I don't have \$50,000 in reserve somewhere," he said. "I've lived in this township, we've been here, we are active in the community. It is not fair, and I understand life's not fair, but it's not fair for us to be punished to hold a carrot out for some corporation who's going to pay it anyway. \$50,000 for me is a lot of money."

Holly boys, Lake Fenton girls are Metro champions

■Bronchos avenge previous losses to Fenton, capture league title

Fenton — Ka'Vion Smith was getting tired of losing to Fenton.

So Smith and the rest of his Holly varsity boys basketball teammates did something about it Friday night in the Flint Metro League's boys basketball championship game right on Fenton High School's home court.

After a pretty competitive first quarter, the Bronchos dominated the final 24 minutes. Smith led the way with a game-high 28 points as the Bronchos defeated the Tigers 69-52. Holly became the first-ever Metro League boys basketball tournament champion while earning the program's first league crown since 2015.

"It means everything," Smith said. "We beat a team that is right around the corner from us. They sent us home during football season. They beat us twice during the (basketball) regular season. But we got them in this FML tournament. We got the job done."

"We put in so much work,

the entire team over the summer," Holly senior Andrew Lewis said. "It was like non-stop every day. We were grinding. We were working outside of practice, games, scrimmages and all that. We put in countless hours and it paid off. I'm so happy it paid off."

The Bronchos (17-4) had two hot guards on offense —

Lewis and Smith — and played outstanding team defense to earn the victory. Fenton scored 18 points in the first quarter after netting 7-of-14 shots in the opening quarter. The Tigers hit on just 13-of-43 shots over the final three quarters, resulting in the Tigers' demise.

"Recently we played them, we committed (a lot) of fouls

■ Smith's buzzer-beating shot sparks 41-38 win vs. Goodrich

Fenton — Championship games that conclude a team's 22-0 perfect season isn't supposed to come easy.

And Friday night's against Goodrich didn't for the Lake Fenton varsity girls basketball team.

But, wow, did the challenge of it all make for a memorable moment.

Facing the Martians for the third time this season, the Blue Devils trailed as late into a game as they have all season, but freshman Kendyl Smith came through. Fenton Tigers extend Metro streak to 12 straight championships

The Fenton varsity boys swimming and diving team had just 11 athletes on its squad.

Entering the season it seemed repeating as Flint Metro League champions for the 12th straight year would be quite the challenge.

Consider it a challenge accomplished.

After finishing the Flint Metro League's regular season with an undefeated dual record, the Tigers completed their outright championship by winning the Metro League meet at Fenton High School Friday and Saturday.

Despite having just 11 athletes, the Tigers won all three relays and won eight of the 12 league event championships. The squad earned 16 individual placings in the finals heats with 11 of those placings being in the top three.

"It's hard to put into words how

proud I am of these guys," Fenton varsity boys swim each Brad Jones said. "With only 11 on the team, everyone had to contribute. ... We talked about the meet before the prelims and said in order to win we had to want to hold on to the title more than everyone else wants to take it, and they did. Everyone did what they needed to do on Friday to put us in position to win on Saturday. Everyone stepped up."

Fenton scored 387 team points at the meet, while second-place Owosso recorded 357.5 points. Brandon/Goodrich was a tight third with 355 points.

There were many key moments to the title. Winning all three relays meant that the Tigers were going to collect 18 points more than any of their opponents could get in those events. Max Haney and Zach Michelson took part in four event firsts, helping spark the team. Another key was divers Owen Cox and Caleb

Markley finishing 1-2 in diving. That gave Fenton 37 points in an event which no other squad scored more than 16 team points.

Haney had a pool record time in the 200 freestyle (1:42.44) and a meet-record time in the 100 butterfly (50.36) en route to two individual league championships. Michelson earned his in the 200 individual medley (2:10.74) and the 500 freestyle (5:12.30). Cox earned the final individual event championship, taking first in diving (426.50).

The relays were key. Haney, Jacob Grifka, Isaac Gurnsey and Finley Hughes won the 200 medley relay (1:46.91), while Haney, De-Fina, Grifka and Michelson won the 200 freestyle relay (1:35.27). The 400 freestyle relay team of DeFina, Michelson, Hughes and Gurnsey (3:35.61) concluded the meet with team's final first.

The Holly varsity boys bowling team had a pretty successful weekend at regional action at Waterford Township's 300 Bowl.

The Bronchos had three of its bowlers advance to the Division 2 state finals by finishing in the top 10 of the individual bowling regional.

Sean Dankert, Ryan Sparklin and Ryan Dalton earned top-10 finishes. Dalton snuck in at 10th with a six-game series pinfall total of 1,104, just two pins better than Lake Shore's 11th-place Tyler Kiroski's 1,102. possible Spencer threw more than 100 punches and he certainly landed a great percentage of them. Midway through the round, he switched from an orthodox stance to southpaw and the results were the same — complete Spencer dominance. As Spencer held court in the middle of the ring, Hernandez found it challenging not to eat most of what Spencer threw at him, while not mounting any type of offense of his own. Spencer was comfortable enough to lift one of his arms to the crowd while one attack.

"Briefly one time he hit my glove and me," Spencer said when asked if Hernandez ever hit him with any punches. "(Offensively) I've been working on my accuracy and power and I'm happy to see it pay off."

Spencer finally worked him into a corner and it was a right hand that put Hernandez (3-5-1) down.

"It was a right-hand," Spencer said of his knockout blow. "I knew right before the stoppage (it was going to be over).

He lost a unanimous decision to Bryce Mills (10-1) on Jan. 14. Hernandez last win came against William Hernandez on July 14, 2022.
